## Four Holiday Accidents Result In One Fatality

Four accidents including one fatality occured in Haskell County during the Labor Day Weekend according to local law enforcement officials.

Texas Department officials estimated that 37 persons would lose their lives in traffic accidents during the holiday period and including the fatal accident in Haskell the total for the State ended at 41.

During the holiday weekend, four accidents occured in Haskell County, two of which were in the City of Faskell. The first accident occured at about

1:20 a.m. Sept. 1, about 3.4 miles south of Haskell on U.S. 277.

A 1971 Oldsmobile driven by Jerome Whitmil of Abilene left the road and

Whitmil of Abilene left the road and stopped in a small creek bottom when he apparently went to sleep.

He was treated and admitted to

He was treated and admitted to Haskell Memorial Hospital and released later that day.

The fatal accident occured sometime Saturday night but was not discovered until early Sunday morning when a crew enroute to the West Texas Utilities Power Plant sited the wreck.

The accident occured 3.6 miles east of Haskell on U.S. 380 when the 1969 Ford driven by Juan Segura of Rt. 2, Haskell, failed to negotiate a left curve. The vehicle left the road on the right, skidded broadside across the road and traveled about 720 feet before stopping

in a pasture.

Pronounced dead at the scene was Alejandro Salcido Hernandez, 21, of Rt.

1 Lueders. Justice of the Peace, Geraldine Hise, pronounced Hernandez dead.

Segura was transported to Haskell Memorial Hospital where he told hospital personnel that there were three people in the vehicle.

#### City To Enforce Ordinance

Persons who have shredders and would consider custom mowing are asked to contact personnel in City Hall. If private individuals will agree to provide the service, personnel at City Hall will be happy to provide their names to individuals who need assistance.

Cost for mowing private property if City equipment is used is \$35.00 per hour. Individuals who would like to provide their service should inform the City of prices.

#### Public Notice 🔅

An ordinance requiring weeds and grass to be cut upon premises and that rubbish and trash be removed therefrom: and fixing a penalty for failure to comply with such ordinance: and providing that same shall be done by the city in the event of such failure and providing for the fixing of a lien upon the property for the expense incurred in removing and declaring that allowing weeds to grow and trash and rubbish to accumulate to be a

nuisance. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Haskell, Texas.

Sec. 1 It shall be unlawful for any owner, lessee, occupant or person in charge of any premises in the city of Haskell to allow weeds to grow upon the premises, or trash or rubbish to accumulate upon said premises to such an extent as is reasonably calculated to create a fire hazard or calculated to become injurious to the health of the citizens of Haskell, and either act is hereby declared to constitute a

public nuisance.

Sec. 2 Whenever weeds are allowed to grow, or trash or rubbish allowed to accumulate upon any premises of the City of Haskell as prohibited by this ordinance the Board of Commissioners shall hear evidence and determine whether or not such accumulation of rubbish and trash or the growth of weeds thereon, or both, are sufficient to constitute a nuisance as herein defined, and if they so find, they shall pass a resolution declaring that the growth of weeds or accumulation of trash and rubbish upon such premises, or both, constitutes a public nuisance, and shall order same removed by the owner, occupant, lessee or person in charge of such premises, within five days from the date such notice is given.

Sec. 3. In the event the owner of the premises upon which is located a nuisance as prohibited by this ordinance can not be found or served with notice, and there does not appear to be any person of such premises or occupancy, or in the event the nuisance is not abated by the cutting the weeds and removing the trash and rubbish or either of them, as the case may be, then said nuisance shall be abated by the City of Haskell, and the expense incurred which shall include salary and wages of all employees, and reasonable charge for machinery and tools, vehicles, etc., used in abating said nuisance shall be assessed as a lien against the property on which such nuisance is located and removed therefrom, and shall be due and payable to the City Tax Collector the following tax paying period, that is, the first day of March following the date at which such nuisance is abated and failure to pay when due shall cause a ten per cent penalty to be added and the same shall bear interest from

the date the same is due at the rate of six per cent per annum. Sec. 4 Failure to cut weeds and remove trash and rubbish or to do either of them when notified to do so, as set out in this ordinance by any party obligated to do so by this ordinance, shall be punished by a fine in any sum not exceeding fifty dollars (\$50.00) and each day that such nuisance shall continue after the time for abatement as herein set out shall constitute a separate offense.





Controlled traffic farming is a concept getting a lot of attention lately . . . and pro-bably even more in the future. Idea of the operation is to keep tractors moving only on surfaces not used for crops. Basically that seems quite un-reasonable since the crops are in the field and it is usually necessary to get the tractor out there to do any good. None of that has changed. With controlled traffic farming the tractor would be driven on paths between the rows. Paths used only for the machinery. In most concepts of this type operation the paths would be the only points of compaction in the field. Therein lies the reason for concern. If compaction can be reduced, root systems can be more completely developed and higher yields would result. At Auburn University in Alabama a controlled traffic farm experiment resulted in a yield 43 percent higher than crops grown with con-ventional tillage.



#### Conservation Agrements Approved By SCS Board

G. W. Wedeking of Stamford was approved at the last Board of Directors meeting for a new conservation agreement on 379 acres. This farm is located just east of the Plainview Church. Mini-Longterm Agreements

(LTA's) on Herbert Williams and Dan Griffith were reviewed. William's agreement is on a portion of the Joe Zack Miller farm located south of Rule. Griffith's agreement is on a part of the John Porter

farm located south of Lake Stamford. Only two LTA's were approved for Haskell County for 1979. LTA's are administered and funded by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS). Planning and application work for LTA's are assigned to the Soil Conservation Service.

A new agreement was approved on 219 acres for Wilbert Klose. This unit is

located northwest of Irby and is the old M. H. Sorenson

Work is continueing at a rather brisk pace under the Emergency Conservation Program, the annual ACP program, and Great Plains. We are over half way through completing requested assistance under the 1979 ACP with three more jobs under construction. Only seven applications for assistance remain to be completed.

The ECP work is approximately 42% completed, 261 applications have been completed, 136 applications are under construction with 220 applicants remaining to be serviced and work started. Let me urge all applicants who haven't been certified by SCS to start work to get busy and get your SCS technician out to check your needs as soon as possible. We stand a chance of getting cut off one of these days whether we are completed or not completed.

**Congressional Comment** 

After World War II the confidence of Americans seemed almost unlimited. We had defeated the Axis powers and then, through the Marshall Plan, rebuilt most of Western Europe. We could do all this and at the same time provide prosperity for our own citizens. People all over the world were beginning to predict that the next 100 years would be an

"American Century." Looking back on this era, it confidence in our leaders and ourselves is at such a low ebb. Few people are talking about extending America's power and influence and no one is using the phrase "American Century." The present situation is,

shattered the belief in our ability to find pragmatic solutions to difficult problems. It has shaken the concept of ourselves as a Nation.

Now there is a pervasive sense among Americans that we ought to put Vietnam behind us and get on with the business of the world. This attitude neither does justice to ourselves or to the people who fought and died in this conflict. If we sweep the issue under is hard to imagine today that the rug, the lump will show.

One of the legacies of Vietnam that we must continue to confront is the MIA question. Uncovering the fate of these American servicemen and civilians listed as missing must remain important to the United

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Vietnam War. This conflict their families have made. This Country should be ever mindful of the pain and uncertainty which shrouds the lives of the families and friends of those still listed as missing. The Vietnam conflict is still very much alive in the hearts and minds of these people and we must not

forget them.

It has been over six years since the signing of the Paris accords and we still have not received a full accounting of the over 2,500 MIA's. Very little has been done to convince the Vietnam government that we will not forget the issue. The President's MIA commission was told by the Defense Department that it is reasonable to assume the Hanoi regime can provide information on over 1,000 of the missing servicemen. But the Administration has applied little pressure to receive this

The communist governments of Vietnam, Laos, and Cambodia have repeatedly sought economic assistance from the United States. They claim that we owe them 'reparation' payments. Though they seek our aid, they have done little to provide information about MIA's. It is callous and cruel to use this knowledge as a pawn in an international chess game.

We must not allow the issues of the present to bury the problems of the past. If we are going to revitalize our confidence as a Nation, we should not suppress the difficulties of our recent history. The MIA question still remains unresolved - let us not forget.

newest VA pension program is tied directly to increases in Social Security payments. The latter were raised 9.9 percent January 1, 1979. as of June 1, 1979.

Nearly 432,000 veterans have asked the VA to switch their pensions to the "improved" plan.

VA is reminding eligible veterans who haven't made up their minds whether to "stay put" or switch that they have only until October 1 to qualify for retroactive benefits.

The improved plan offers substantially higher pension rates than the old program, but changes in some income counted under the new plan is ignored under the old plan

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
