County Fair To Begin Today

It's Fair time in Haskell and preliminary looks at the fourteenth annual Haskell County Fair indicate that the three day event this Thursday, Friday and Saturday will be one of the best ever.

A schedule of events includes: judging of all exhibits in the exhibit hall at 9 a.m. Thursday; beef cattle judging at 1 p.m. Saturday; sheep judging at 10 a.m. Saturday; poultry and rabbit judging at 10 a.m. Saturday.

Other events will include a drawing for \$100.00 each night at 10 p.m. and a free blood pressure clinic Thursday and Saturday from 7 to 8 p.m.

The blood pressure clinic is sponsored by the American Heart Association and qualified personnel will be on hand to check blood pressure of anyone who would like the service.

The Haskell County Fair Queen will be crowned Thursday in the Elementary cafeteria. The event will begin at 7:30 p.m. and tickets for this event can also be used to enter the fair grounds the same night.

The Haskell Jaycees will sponsor playnights on Friday and Saturday with events scheduled in Barrels, Flags, Poles, Calf Roping, and Steer Riding.

The events will be staged in groups competing for jackpot money.

Registration will be held prior to the activities in the rodeo grounds at the fair.

Friday night activities will include

music by the Roundup Boys of Stamford under the direction of Davis Jones.

The country and western band will perform from 7:30 to 10 p.m.

Activities Saturday night will include Quartet and Gospel singing from 7:30 to 10 p.m. Tom Watson is coordinating this and all interested persons are asked to contact him as soon as possible for scheduling.

Other activities will include food booths sponsored by several local groups and a carnival in addition to the exhibits.

Motion Results In Postponement

A last minute motion by Stamford attorney Charles Brownfield resulted in the postponing of a criminal trial in Haskell which was scheduled to begin Wednesday morning.

The original motion requested a postponement of the trial of Gary Lee Lewis because Davis Scarbrough had been retained to assist Brownfield and Scarbrough had previous commitments and could not attend the trial.

District Attorney Joseph Thigpen contested the motion and while the court was awaiting the arrival of Lewis, Brownfield filed another motion requesting that he be released as Lewis' attorney and Scarbrough represent the defendant.

During the Hearing, Brownfield testified that he did not feel he could provide Lewis with effective counsel and the Scarbrough had agreed to take the case.

District Judge Joe Williams granted the motions late Tuesday afternoon and instructed that all prospective jurors and witnesses be notified.

Thigpen said following the ruling that he would request that the case be set for trial as soon as possible.

Lewis is charged with aggravated assault in connection with the stabbing of Don Hisey April 7 in Rule.

Registration Now Underway For Annual Punt, Pass, And Kick Contest

Registration is underway for the 1979 Punt, Pass & Kick Competition in the showroom of Bill Wilson Motor Co. In making the announcement, J. B. The Bobcats are scheduled to play Roby September 28, and school officials are hopeful that the team will be back in shape by that time.

Defense Deals Destruction To Hamlin

A super tough Haskell Indian defense recovered four Hamlin fumbles and intercepted two Pied Piper passes during the Tribe's second win of the season.

The Tribe downed Hamlin last Friday 27-7 and the offensive unit capitalized on the Hamlin turnovers converting three of the six into Tribe scores.

Both offensive units had trouble holding onto the ball during the first half with Hamlin giving it up four times and the Tribe twice.

Hamlin received to opening kickoff and moved the ball 19 yards in six plays before punting. A partially blocked punt gave the Tribe their first opportunity.

The possession ended five plays later with a punt.

The first of four Hamlin fumbles came on their second play. The Tribe moved the ball to the three yard line and also fumbled. The Pied Pipers moved the ball to their own 40 before another fumble gave the Tribe the ball.

Throughout the game the fumbles were results of hard hitting defense by both teams and did not result from sloppy handling of the ball by the offensive backs.

With 57 seconds in the first quarter the Tribe attempted to get on the board with a 13 yard field goal but the attempt failed.

Early in the second quarter, Hamlin intercepted a Tribe pass and with the aid of two fifteen yard penalties against the Tribe, moved the ball to the 18 before fumbling.

David Gonzales recovered the loose ball on the Tribe 17 and the first score of the game came sixteen plays later when Quarterback Jim Harris carried in from the nine.

In addition to Harris, Indian Backs, Monnie Hise, Steve Escobedo and Joe Benavides each earned substantial yardage in the drive. Harris also connected with Kirk Flippin on an eleven yard pass on a third and six situation to keep the drive alive.

Hamlin ended their offensive chances in the first half with a fumble two plays later. The ball was recovered for the Tribe by Albert Enriquez.

The second half started much like the first with the Tribe fumbling on their third offensive play. The fumble gave Hamlin the ball on the Indian 37 yard line. The Tribe defense held Hamlin and presented the offensive unit the ball on the Haskell 30.

The Pied Pipers held and the Tribe punted. Two plays later, Indian Giles Kemp partially blocked a Hamlin pass and David Drinnon intercepted. Drinnon carried the ball 24 yards and set up the second Tribe Score.

The TD came seven plays later when Escobedo carried in from the three. The key play in the drive was a 21 yard Harris to Joseph Browning pass.

The lone Hamlin scoring drive started late in the third quarter and lasted five plays in the final stanza.

Not to be outdone, the Tribe came back with another TD on their first play from scrimmage following the kickoff with Hise going 57 yards for the score.

Jeff Hatfield recovered a Hamlin fumble on their next possession and the Tribe scored again on the next play. The TD was the final score of the game and came on a 38 yard Harris to Benavides pass. Hise carried for the two point conversion.

The Tribe threatened late in the final period when a 20 yard pass to Flippin and two Hamlin penalties moved the ball to the four yard line. The Pied Piper defense held and the game ended ten plays later.

The Tribe will face Seymour this Friday at 8 p.m. in Panther Stadium.

Warriors

The Haskell Junior High Warriors opened their 1979 campaign on a successful note by defeating the Hamlin Junior High last Thursday night. The 7th graders made their football debut impressively by defeating their foes to the tune of 14-6. The 7th warriors controlled the ball the entire 1st half and scored both their touchdowns. 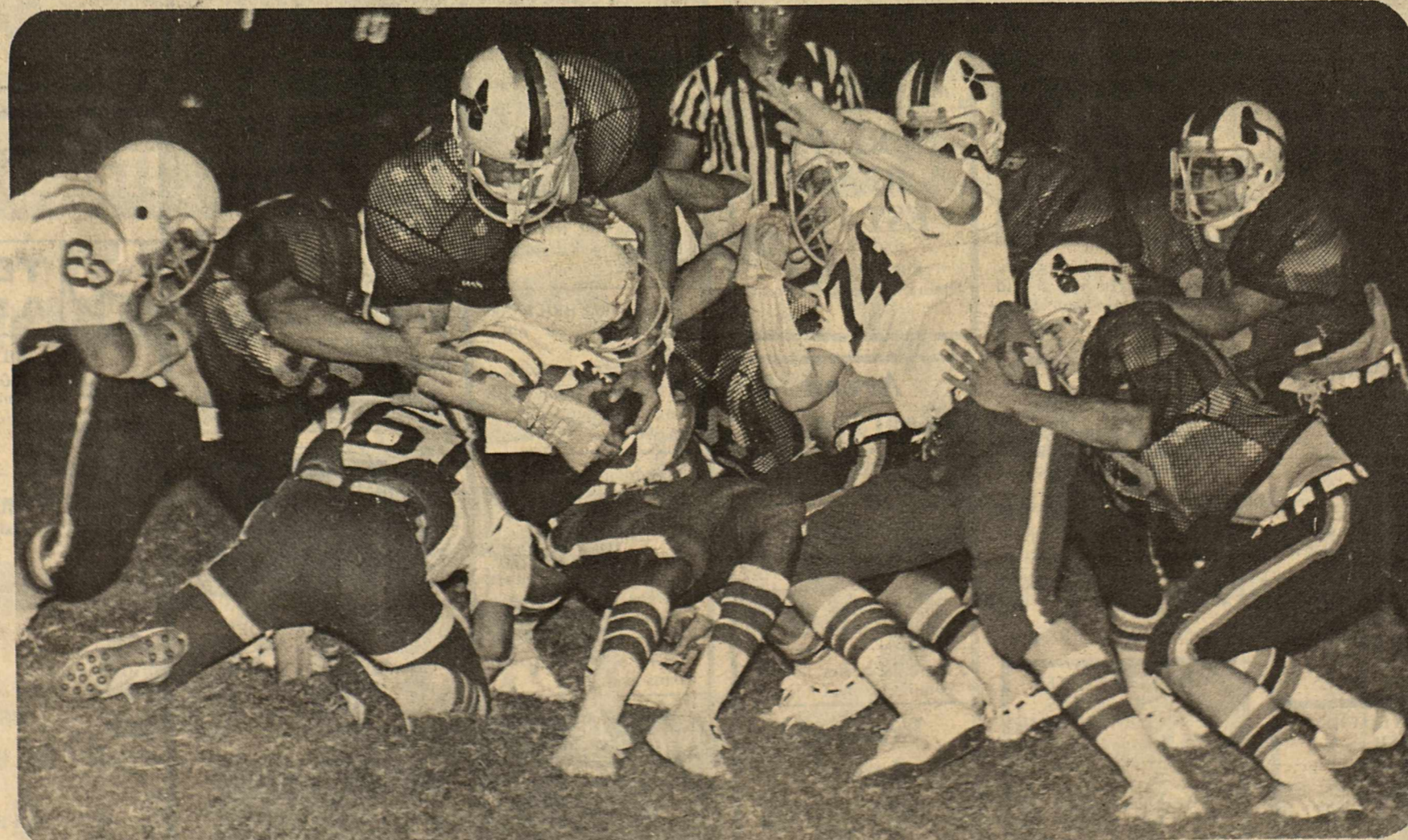

To this day, there is a plaque at lakeside telling the complete tale of the "Muskie Musical". My one claim to fame for this unusual episode—I'm listed as the accompanist.

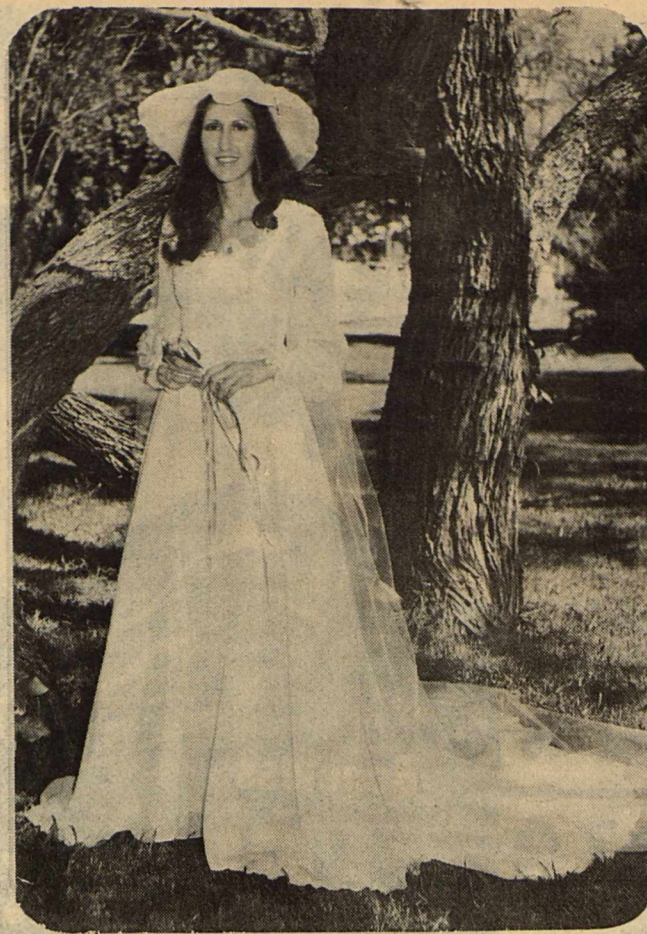

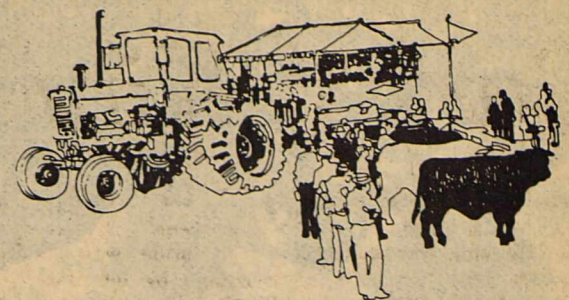

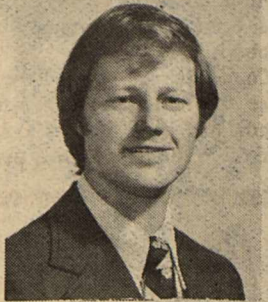

Breves Declaraciones Explicativas De Las ENMIENDAS CONSTITUCIONALES PROPUESTAS ELECCION ESPECIAL 6 DE NOVIEMBRE DE 1979

PROPOSICION NO. 1 EN LA BOLETA (H.J.R. 108)

La Resolución Conjunta #108 de la Cámara de Representantes propone una enmienda en la constitución de Texas referente al nombramiento y a los plazos de los notarios públicos.

La enmienda propuesta: —Requerirá que el Secretario de Estado nombre a un número conveniente de notarios públicos para el estado; y

—autorizará para que los plazos oficiales para notarios públicos sean por no menos de dos años y por no más de cuatro años.

La provisión temporal de la enmienda constitucional propuesta declara que la enmienda entrará en vigor el 1° de enero de 1980; que cada persona que haya sido nombrada como notario público antes del 1° de enero de 1980 continuará ejerciendo como notario público hasta vencerse el plazo por el que fue nombrado; y que esta provisión temporal se vencerá el 1° de enero de 1982.

La enmienda propuesta aparecerá en la boleta como sigue:

"La enmienda constitucional para el nombramiento de notarios públicos para el estado para un plazo de no menos de dos años ni de más de cuatro años, según lo provisto por la ley."

PROPOSICION NO. 2 EN LA BOLETA (H.J.R. 133)

La Resolución Conjunta #133 de la Cámara de Representantes propone una enmienda en la constitución de Texas para proveer una revisión del proceso reglamentario en las agencias del departamento ejecutivo. Esta enmienda propuesta permitirá a la Legislatura el decretar leyes:

—Para proveer una revisión legislativa del proceso reglamentario en las agencias del departamento ejecutivo;

—Para prescribir condiciones para que las leyes sean puestas en vigor;

—Para suspender, revocar o expirar las reglas;

—Para prescribir procedimientos; y

—Para delegar autoridad a cualquiera o a ambas cámaras, o a los comités de cualquiera o de ambas cámaras.

"La enmienda constitucional para proveer una revisión legislativa del

proceso reglamentario en las agencias del departamento ejecutivo."

PROPOSICION NO. 3 EN LA BOLETA (S.J.R. 13)

La Resolución Conjunta Senatorial #13 propone una enmienda en la constitución de Texas para autorizar a la Legislatura para que provea una garantía de préstamos, a las personas calificadas, para la compra de bienes raíces agrícolas y ganaderas. De esta manera, la enmienda propuesta podría permitir a la Legislatura el proveer, emitir y vender bonos de obligación general llamados "Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds" (Bonos de Seguridad Para Préstamos Agrícolas y Ganaderos) del Estado de Texas, sin exceder la cantidad de \$10 millones de dólares. Todo dinero recibido de la venta de estos bonos sería depositado en un fondo diferente en la Tesorería Estatal y sería administrado por el comisionado de agricultura, sin más apropiaciones. Estos fondos garantizarían préstamos para la compra de bienes raíces agrícolas y ganaderas. El comisionado de agricultura usaría estos fondos bajo las provisiones prescritas por la Legislatura, con el propósito de garantizar préstamos para la compra de bienes raíces agrícolas y ganaderas; para adquirir hipotecas de bienes raíces escrituras de bienes raíces compradas con préstamos garantizados. Estos fondos serían usados también para adelantar un porcentaje del principal y del interés debido en esos préstamos, a la persona que califique para el préstamo. La Legislatura también podría autorizar al comisionado de agricultura para que venda cualquier terreno adquirido mediante esta enmienda. El comisionado de agricultura requeriría al menos un 6 por ciento de interés en dichos préstamos. La enmienda propuesta apropiaría la cantidad suficiente para pagar el principal y el interés de los bonos que van adquiriendo más valor, o que se venzan durante el año fiscal, menos la cantidad del fondo de interés y amortización al final del año anterior.

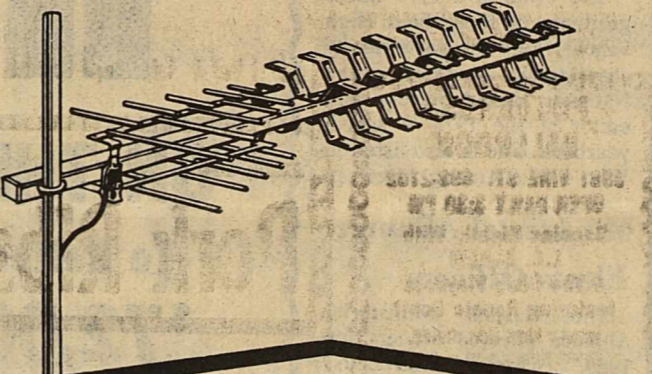

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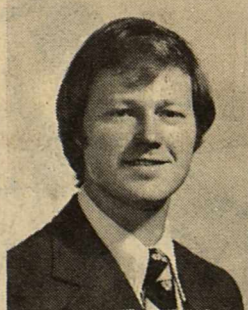

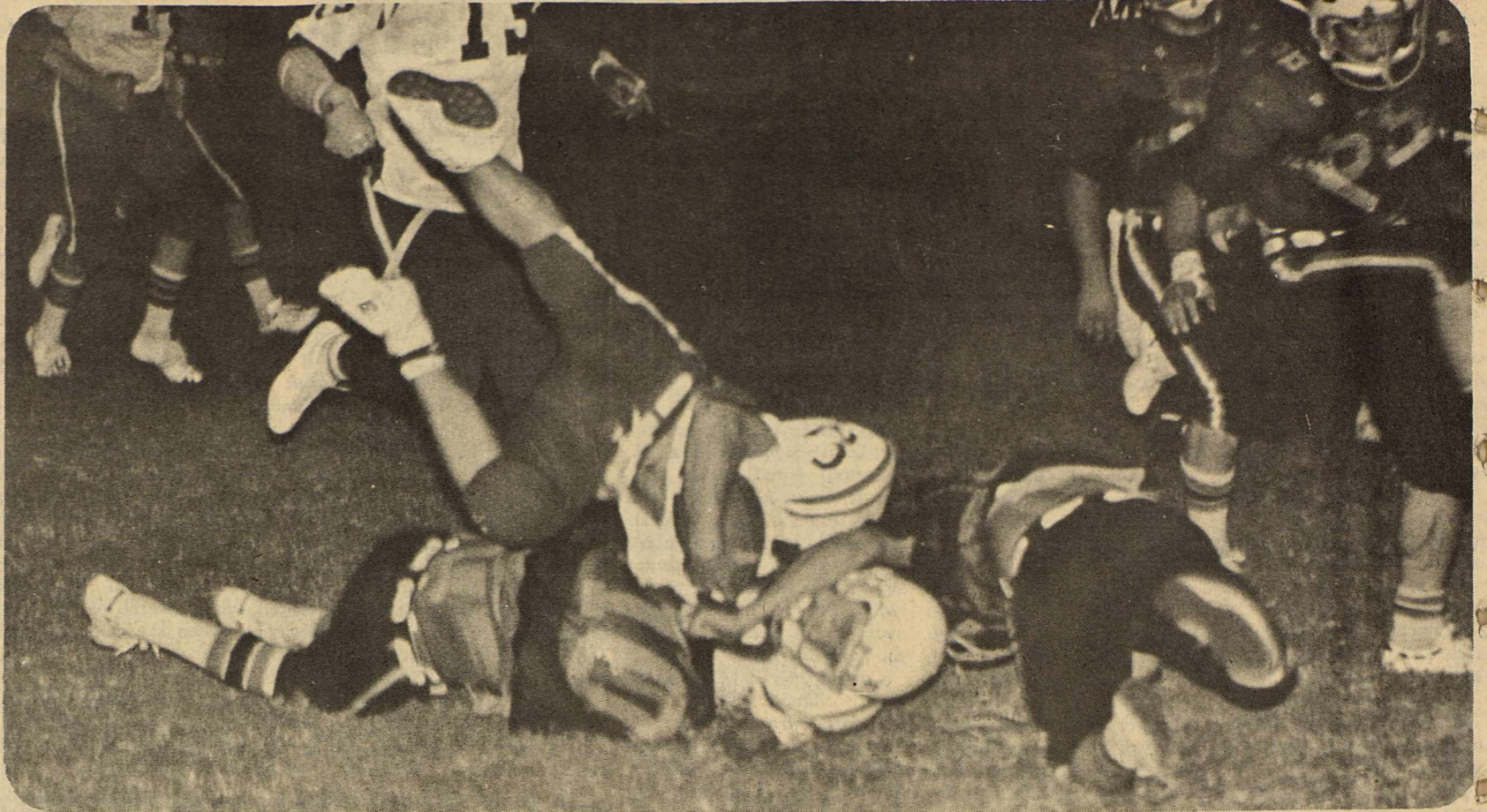

Sales Tax Checks Mailed

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday said rebates to Texas cities of the local option one-percent sales tax set a record in the tax's 11-year history.

Bullock said more than 900 cities shared in \$124.2 million during July, August and September—passing the state's previous high three-month allocation in the final quarter of 1978 by more than \$6 million.

Bullock also announced that his office was sending September sales tax rebate checks totaling \$73.4 million.

"This month's allocations are just under the record payments of \$74.9 million made in December of 1978," Bullock said.

"I think the state's strong economy and our ability to rapidly process tax returns helped to produce these peak rebates," he said.

The City of Haskell will receive a check for \$16,029.67. Dallas will receive a check for \$8.7 million, bringing that city's total for the year to \$40.4 million, an increase of 12 percent over last year's total to date.

The city of Houston will get a check for \$15.1 million, raising its yearly total to \$71.7 million, up 11 percent.

Fort Worth's check will be \$2.9 million, making total payments this year \$13.7 million, compared to payments of \$12.8 million thru September of last year.

San Antonio will get \$3.9 million, raising its total for the year to \$18.9 million. This is a 6 percent increase over last year.

Bullock also announced that payments to the Houston and San Antonio Metropolitan Transit Authorities would exceed \$17 million. San

Antonio will get \$2 million and Houston will receive \$15 million.

The city and MTA sales tax is collected by merchants and

other sales tax permit holders along with the state sales tax and is rebated monthly to cities in which it is collected by the Comptroller's office.

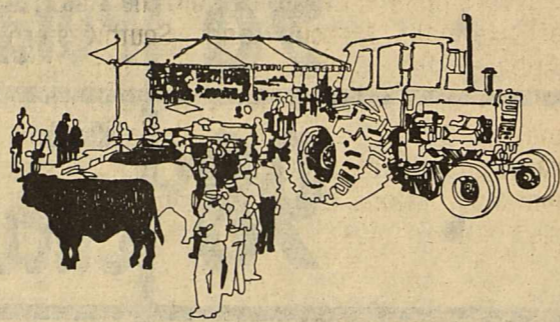

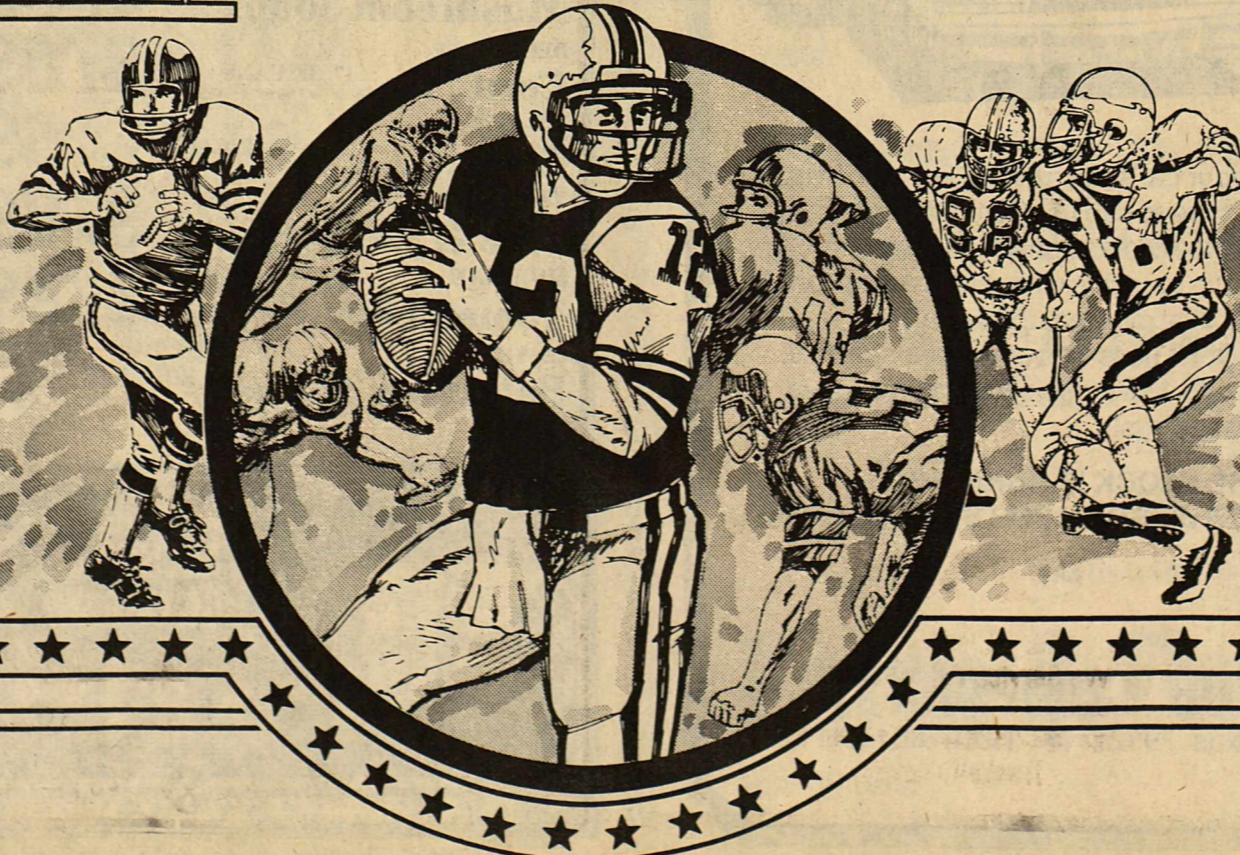

One week before the cattle sale at Abilene Livestock Auction, the feed pens of the Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children have begun to fill.

The cattle sale will be at 1 p.m. Monday, September 24, followed by other livestock sales in Abilene, Coleman, Junction, Brownwood, and Tusculu during the fall.

Trailers from throughout

the state have begun to wind their way toward Abilene from as far west as Toyah and Marfa, as far north as Hereford and Silverton, and as far south as the famous King Ranch in Kingsville, and Caterina.

Pledges from such famous ranches as the Pitchfork, 6666, Spade and SMS have been received.

Brands of the cattlemen

donating to help the handicapped are placed on the walls of the West Texas Rehabilitation Center, honoring more than 1200 of the most famous brands in the southwest.

Jim Alexander, a second generation cattlemen, is general chairman of Cattlemen's Round-Up and urges all stockmen throughout the southwest to make an extra effort to donate livestock.

Those desiring to donate may call 915/692-1633. All livestock will be picked up and transported free.

The Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children was started 20 years ago and has been a basic means for financing the operation of the West Texas Rehabilitation Center. More than 7,000 handicapped children and adults will be treated, without charge, at one of the WTRC campuses in Abilene, San Angelo and Snyder.

Stenholm Requests Applications

Congressman Charles W. Stenholm has announced the final request for applicants who are interested in competing for nominations to the service academies for the class entering July, 1980. A competitive nomination procedure will be used to select the nominees in order to give all interested young persons who meet the requirements an equal opportunity.

The service academies are the Naval Academy at Annapolis, Maryland; the Military Academy at West Point, New York; the Air Force Academy near Colorado Springs, Colorado; and the Merchant Marine Academy at Kings Point, New York. "These institutions offer a fine education and a great opportunity for service to their country by young persons who wish to follow a military career," Stenholm said.

In order for Congressman Stenholm to consider applicants, a candidate must meet the following requirements: (1) Must be a U.S. citizen; (2) Must be over 17, and a legal resident of the 17th Congressional District; (3) Must be under 22 years of age on July 1, 1980; (4) Must never have been married; (5) Must be physically fit, including excellent eyesight; (6) Must have a good high school record.

Stenholm stressed that political influence is not a factor in his nomination to the academies. Nominations are based on the individual's mental and physical abilities. Interested young persons who meet the requirements should write to Congressman Charles W. Stenholm, House of Representatives, Washington, D.C. 20515, no later than October 15.

Congressman Stenholm emphasized that all young persons who are genuinely interested in a military career have the opportunity to compete for nomination and he will consider all qualified applicants fully.

TSTI To Conduct Short Course For Stamford Electric Coop Members

Texas State Technical Institute of Sweetwater will be conducting a 24 hour short course at Stamford Electric Cooperative to instruct interested members in energy-saving techniques and the installation of solar energy equipment. The instructions are offered at no cost to Cooperative members.

The short course has been scheduled for the first two weeks in October. Classes will be held for 3 hours, 3 nights a week, Monday, Tuesday and Thursday, October 1, 2, 4, 8, 9 and 11. The final 6 hours of the 24 hour short course will be held on the TSTI campus at Sweetwater on Saturday, October 13th.

Objective of the short course is to instruct cooperative members in energy-saving techniques, purposes and functions of a solar collector for water heating, how to install solar equipment and how it can effect dollar savings for them. Instructors for the course will be from the Air Condition Technology and Solar Energy Mechanics Department of TSTI. They will bring to the Cooperative solar equipment that can be installed by the participants themselves as part of their instructions.

Because of limited classroom space at the Coopera-

tive, class size will have to be limited to 24 people. We will enroll members for the short course on a first come basis. Those wishing to enroll should contact Jerry Terrell or Pat Prewitt.

We wish to stress that you should not enroll unless you are sure you can attend. Because of our limited space, a person who enrolls and fails to attend would be denying someone else the opportunity

of receiving some very valuable information. PUBLIC NOTICE

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1979

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 108)

House Joint Resolution 108 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution relating to the appointment and terms of notaries public. The proposed amendment would:

- Require the Secretary of State to appoint a convenient number of Notaries Public for the state; and
- Authorize terms of office of Notaries Public of not less than two years nor more than four years.

A temporary provision of the proposed constitutional amendment provides that the amendment would take effect January 1, 1980; that each person who was appointed a notary public before January 1, 1980, would continue to serve as a notary public for the term for which the person was appointed; and that this temporary provision would expire January 1, 1982.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the appointment of notaries public for the state and for a term of not less than two years nor more than four years as provided by law."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 133)

House Joint Resolution 133 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to enact laws:

- To provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department;
- To prescribe conditions for rules to take effect;
- To provide for suspension, repeal, or expiration of rules;
- To prescribe procedures; and
- To delegate powers to either or both houses or to committees of either or both houses.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for legislative review of

the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans used to purchase farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds called "Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds" of the State of Texas not to exceed 10 million dollars. All money received from the sale of such bonds would be deposited in a separate fund with the State Treasurer and administered by the commissioner of agriculture without further appropriations. These funds would be used to guarantee loans for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate. The commissioner of agriculture would use these funds, under provisions to be prescribed by the Legislature for the purpose of guaranteeing loans used for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate, to acquire real estate mortgages or deeds of trust on lands purchased with guaranteed loans. These funds would also be used to advance to the borrower a percentage of the principal and interest due. The Legislature may also authorize the commissioner of agriculture to sell at foreclosure any land acquired in the manner authorized by this amendment. The commissioner of agriculture would be required to charge at least 6 percent interest on such loans. The proposed amendment appropriates an amount that is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that mature or become due during the fiscal year less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans for purchase of farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers by the sale of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas."

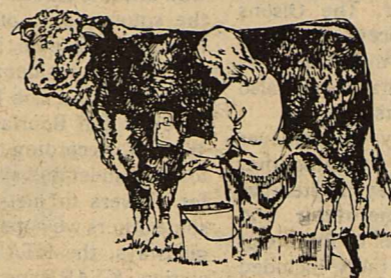

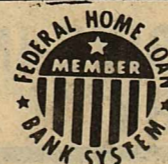

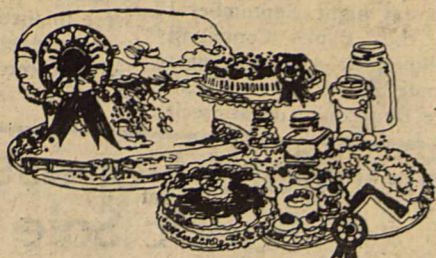

Stock Seminar Scheduled

Livestock production in the Rolling Plains of Texas will be the subject of a mini-conference to be held September 27 at the Abilene Christian University Student Center in Abilene, according to Max Stapleton, Haskell County Extension Agent.

The conference, co-sponsored by the Rolling Plains Economic Program and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will begin at 1:00 p.m. with a welcome by Dr. Keith Justice, Professor and Head of the Abilene Christian University Agriculture Department. Presiding over the conference will be the R-PEP Chairman Gary Mathis of Stamford.

Seminars on horse, sheep, swine, and beef cattle production will follow Dr. Justice's welcome, according to Mr. Stapleton.

The horse seminar will feature discussions on the economics of owning and using ranch horses by B. F.

Yeates, TAEX Horse Specialist. The nutrition and feeding management of horses will be covered by Dr. Doug Householder, TAEX Horse Specialist.

In sheep production, the outlook for this type of endeavor will be given by Robert H. Kensing, TAEX Area Economist. Sheep health will be examined by Dr. Percy Turner, veterinarian; and feeding and marketing will be covered by Jamie Kothman, feedlot operator at Menard.

Discussions on swine production will be introduced by Floyd Borchardt, R-PEP Vice Chairman. John Thurwanger and David Graf, swine producers, will explain their swine operations and health programs. Ken Horton, Secretary of the Texas Swine Producers Association, will give a report on the association's promotional efforts.

The beef cattle seminar will be chaired by Rick Perry, Chairman of the R-PEP Beef Cattle Task Force. Use of accounting records in ranching will be explained by Norman Brints, TAEX Area Economist-Management; and Dr. Whitney Rounds, TAEX Area Livestock Specialist, will tell about beef cattle analysis using programmable calculators.

Question and answer sessions will be held following each of the seminars. The afternoon session is expected to end at 3:30 p.m., says Stapleton.

... Ever grow a gallon of gasoline? Lots of folks are taking a hard look at that very thing. Well... not gasoline... but fuels distilled from grain. Not unlike the legendary white lightning... a 200 proof product that will give nearly anything a start. There's no secret about the ability of alcohol to power combustion engines (the four cycle engine was invented for it) but the cost spread between alcohol and gasoline has made such uses obsolete for several years. Lately that spread has been noticeably thinner. Thin enough for a serious experiment with a product called gasohol carried out around Holdrege, Nebraska to get national attention. Use of gasohol (90% gasoline - 10% alcohol) in the Holdrege tests resulted in reports of 7% better mileage, better starts in cold weather, and exhaust emissions no worse than regular gasoline. Looks like the choice could come down to taking a drink or a drive.
