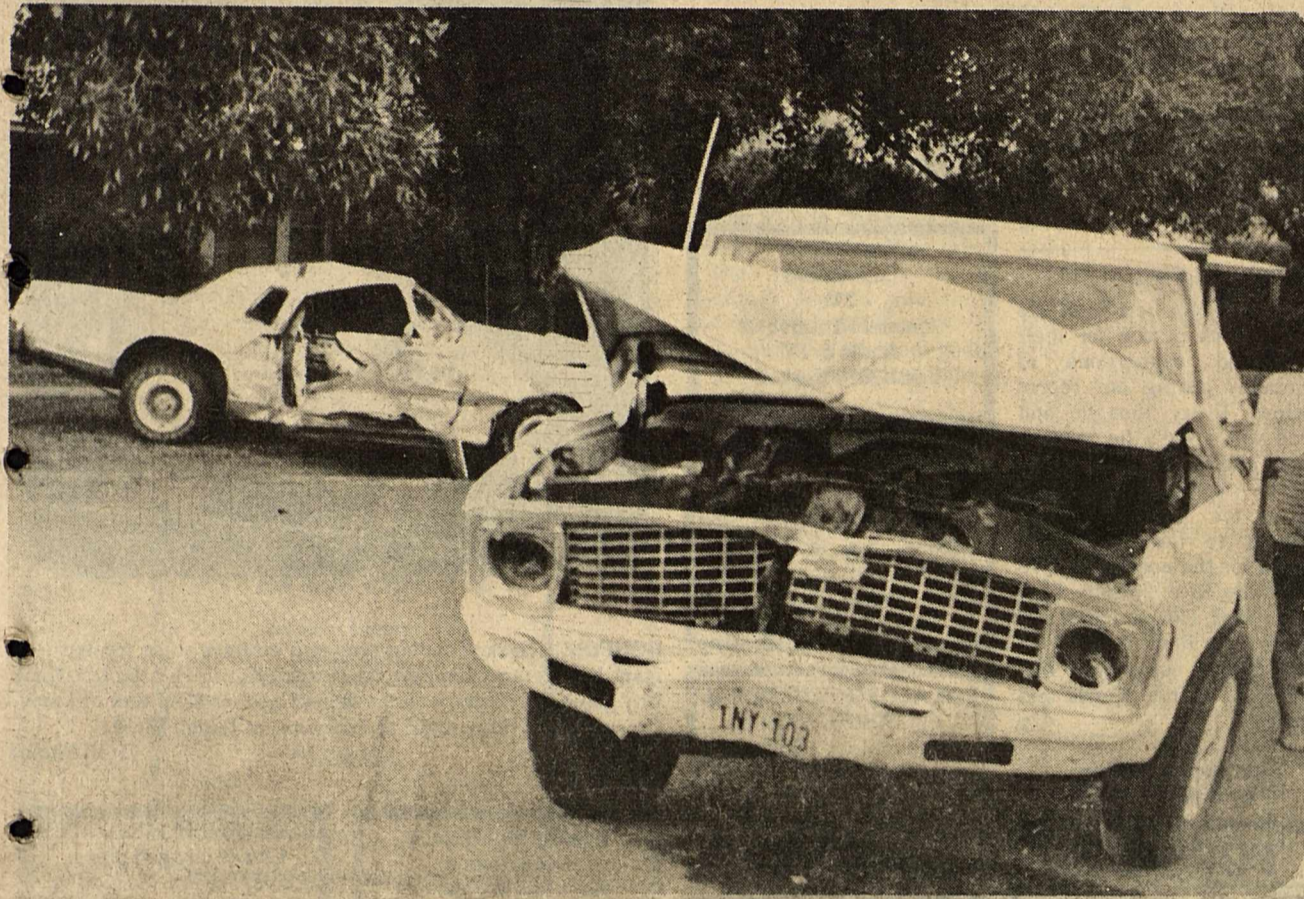

Accident Results In Fatality and 7 Injuries

A car and pick-up collided shortly before 6 p.m. Sunday in the intersection of N. 8th St. and N. 8th St. in Haskell. The collision resulted in the death of Sandra McFadden and injuries to seven others.

Mrs. McFadden, 27, was transported to Haskell Memorial Hospital where she died from injuries received in the accident.

The accident occurred when a car driven by Jama Louder, traveling east on N. 8th St. collided with a pick-up which was traveling north on Ave. G. The pick-up was driven by Jonnie Hise.

Mrs. McFadden was a passenger in the car with her seven year-old daughter, Devona.

Both Mrs. Louder and Devona McFadden were admitted to Haskell Memorial Hospital. Devona was released Monday and Mrs. Louder was released Tuesday.

Passengers in the pick-up were: Monty Moeller, Robert Ivey, Shawn Lane and Kevin Strickland. Moeller, Ivey and Lane were all treated and released from Haskell Memorial Hospital. Strickland was transferred to Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene.

He underwent surgery Tuesday to remove burned abdominal tissue. The abdominal area was apparently burned by a catalytic converter on the car when Strickland was thrown from the pick-up. Strickland's doctors plan to graft skin on Monday and estimate that he will be hospitalized for about 10 more days.

Hise, driver of the pick-up, was admitted to Haskell Memorial Hospital where his condition was listed as good Wednesday morning.

Services for Mrs. McFadden were held Tuesday in the First Assembly of God Church with the Rev. J.C. Amburn officiating. Interment was in Willow Cemetery directed by Holden-McCauley Funeral Home.

Mrs. McFadden was born June 17, 1952 in Haskell. She married James C. McFadden, March 29, 1974 in Haskell.

She was a graduate of Quanah High School and had been a resident of Haskell for the past five years.

Survivors include her husband; three daughters, Devona Beshale and Thresa Kay of the home, and Mrs. Jama Levern Louder of Munday; two brothers, Orvis Hommer West Jr. of Jud and Wayne Davis of Quanah; four sisters, Mrs. Calvin Robertson and

Betty Davis of Quanah, Mrs. Debra Gibbs of Haskell and Mrs. Delores Bartley of Merkel; mother and step father, Mr. and Mrs. Emize Davis of Quanah; paternal grandmother, Mrs. Mamie West of Amarillo and a maternal grandfather, Raymond Crane of Haskell.

The Haskell Indians defeated the Knox City Greyhounds 12-6 last Friday in Knox City to retain their unblemished record.

The game was the first in district play and earlier in the year, was forecasted to be the game that decided the district title.

Last Friday, the Tribe received the opening kick-off and in less than two minutes, covered 63 yards in five plays for the opening score of the game. The PAT failed. The score came on an eight yard run by Quarterback Jim Harris. Big plays in the drive were a 40 yard scamper by Monnie Hise and a 12 yard carry by Steve Escobedo.

The Greyhounds fumbled the ball to the Tribe to end their first offensive attempt and four plays later, Harris carried in again from the 30. The TD was called back because of a penalty and the Tribe gave the ball up on downs on the Knox City 30.

Throughout the remainder of the first half, the two teams exchanged offensive attempts without either mounting a serious drive.

The Greyhounds took the second-half

kick-off and drove to within nine yards of the tying score. A fumble halted the drive and following a Tribe punt, the Greyhounds gave the ball back to the Tribe on a pass interception.

Four plays later, the Tribe again punted and recovered a Greyhound fumble on their first offensive attempt. The recovery came on the Knox City five yard line and it took the Tribe five plays to cross the goal line. The TD came on a two yard dive by Hise and the PAT failed, completing the Tribe scoring.

During the entire second half, the Tribe managed only 30 yards rushing and the only first down came on the TD. The Greyhounds mounted their only

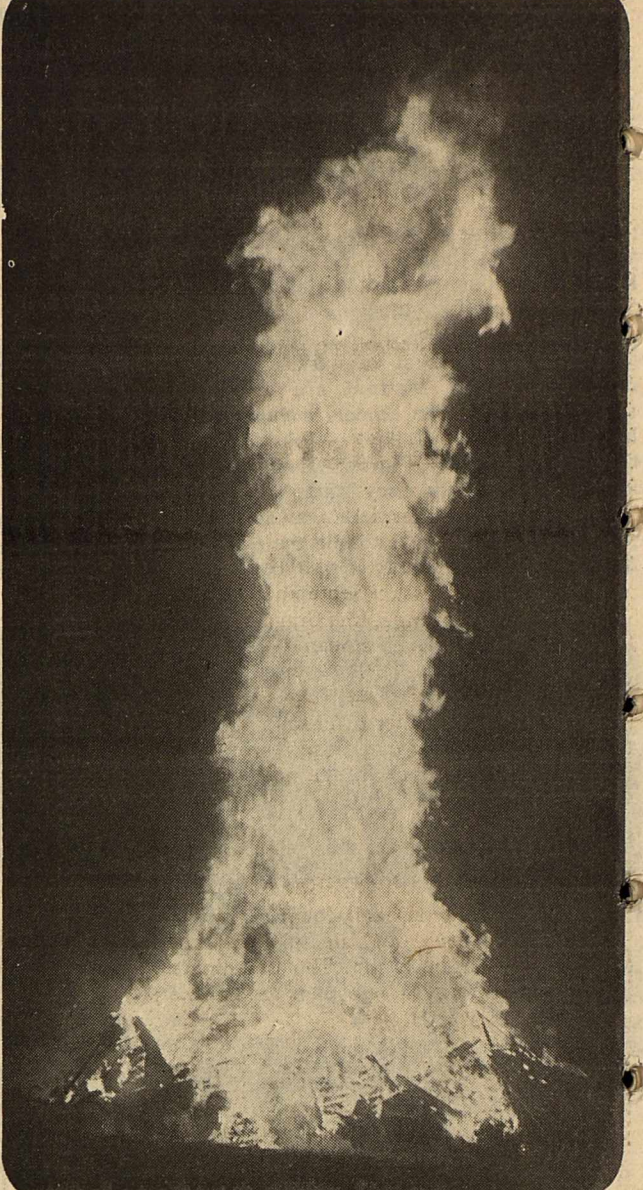

One-half Vets Eligible For Benefits

Half of all veterans who served during the Vietnam War are still eligible for GI Bill education benefits, according to Veterans Administration statistics released recently.

Although 65 percent of the 9 million plus veterans of the Vietnam Era have used the GI Bill, VA estimates that more than five million are still entitled to some or all of the training time they earned.

The estimate is based on the number of veterans who have not reached the tenth anniversary of their separation from military service when, by law, their GI Bill education rights expire.

"VA is eager that veterans know that training must be completed within this ten-year period," Administrator of Veterans Affairs Max Cleland said. "It is a waste to allow this valuable entitlement to slip by."

VA predicts that 887,000 veterans will lose their eligibility during the twelve-month period starting October 1, fiscal year 1980 for the Federal government.

This is eligibility that could mean up to:

*45 months of financial assistance for school or college, farm or on-the-job training or a combination of school and job training;

* \$725 in earnings a semester through VA's work-study program if the veteran is in college full time;

*825 tutorial assistance if the veteran is deficient in a required subject; and

* \$2,500 in low-interest direct loans an academic year, based upon financial need.

Quail Bag Limit Set

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission at a public meeting in Austin Wednesday (Sept. 26) set a 20 quail per day bag limit in south and west Texas for the upcoming hunting season.

In response to biological surveys which showed unusually high quail populations, the commission set limits of 20 per day and 60 in possession for counties under the department's regulatory authority in South Texas and the Trans-Pecos.

These are the highest quail bag and possession limits allowed in Texas since the department first was given authority to set the limits beginning in the early 1950's, according to Don Wilson, quail species leader for the department.

Other regions also were given increased limits, with a 16 per day and 48 in possession limit established for much of the western half of the state and in 16 Southeast Texas counties.

The smallest limits were assigned in East Texas and in roughly the western half of the

Panhandle, at 12 per day and 36 in possession.

Wilson told the commission that outstanding quail production during the year warranted the increased bag limits to allow additional recreation from quail which would otherwise be lost to natural causes. Extensive research through the years has shown that quail populations are extremely cyclic and annual mortality is commonly as high as 80 percent in some years whether the population is hunted or not.

Premiums To Exceed \$300,000

Some 5,800 premium lists outlining rules, premiums and other information were mailed this week to potential exhibitors at the 84th annual Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show, reports W. R. Watt Jr., show president-manager.

"Premiums for our Jan. 23 through Feb. 3, 1980, Stock Show will exceed \$300,000," Watt said. "There have been several revisions of rules in our various departments, and exhibitors are urged to read the premium list carefully before making their entries."

"We know there are many who would like to exhibit at our show," he said. "If those who did not receive a premium list will let us know, we'll be happy to mail one to them. Or, they can stop by our office and pick one up."

Exhibitors of cattle, sheep, swine, horses, donkeys and mules must have their entries into the Stock Show office by Dec. 10, while poultry, rabbit and pigeon exhibitors have until Jan. 15. Entries should be sent to P.O. Box 150, Fort Worth, Texas 76101.

The Stock Show will again have a Register of Merit Hereford Show and Standard of Perfection Polled Hereford Show. Maine-Anjou breeding cattle are new this year joining with other breeds to total 11

breeding cattle departments.

Exhibitors of junior beef breeding heifers are urged to pay special attention to the new ownership rule. "By being properly prepared upon arrival at the Stock Show, the exhibitors will not be disappointed or have their animal disqualified," Watt said.

Ten top quality cattle auctions are scheduled this year. New sales include Shorthorn, Brahman and Maine-Anjou cattle and Longhorn bulls. These join with commercial Hereford and Angus females, Hereford bulls, Polled Hereford and Simmental cattle and Longhorn females and trophy steers.

Auctions also are set for Paint and Quarter Horses, and donkeys and mules. Horse exhibitors should notice changes in schedules, especially Quarter halter classes.

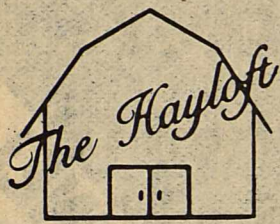
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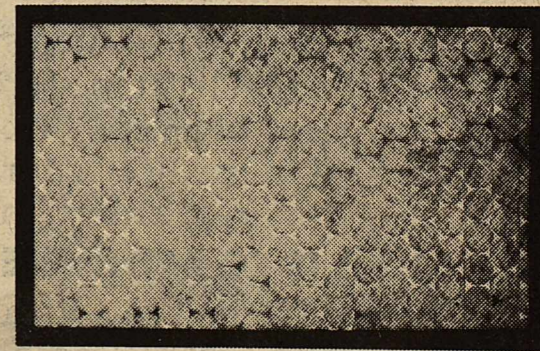

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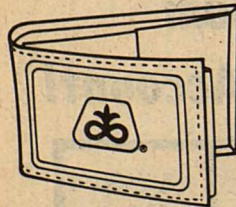

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Naman Addresses Haskell County Farmers Union

The President of Texas Farmers Union told a Haskell audience Monday night that the Inspector General's Report (U.S. Department of Agriculture) on the Cotton Research and Promotion Program is a serious indictment of the administration of that program.

Jay Naman of Waco, Addressing the annual meeting of the Haskell County Farmers Union at the Haskell Steak House, Haskell, cited from the Inspector General's Report, instances of wasteful expenditure of funds, blatant favoritism, and the invasion of the privacy of farmers requesting refunds. "It is obvious that the report from the office of the Inspector General pictures such irresponsible and cavalier treatment of cotton producers' funds that the Administration and Congress must immediately look at a complete overhaul of the program."

Responding to a statement by Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland last week that USDA and the Cotton Board had reached an agreement to take the "first step" in strengthening the administration of the Cotton Research and Promotion Program, Naman said that he was pleased that the Secretary of

Agriculture was pursuing the recommendations of the Office of the Inspector General, but that he felt that what had been agreed on was little more than "cosmetic" treatment to the problems involved with the program.

"The serious defects in the Cotton Research and Promotion Program which have been exposed by the Inspector General go far beyond what can be remedied by the regular submission of reports on projects, budgets, meetings and other administrative matters. The problem strikes at the very heart of the structure of the Cotton Board and Cotton, Inc." Naman said.

The state farm leader said that the only way to restore the integrity of the Cotton Research and Promotion Program would be to give farmers the right to democratically elect their representatives to serve on the Cotton Board and on the Cotton Inc. Board. He said that this, along with the authority to recall the program

Employer's Deadline Is October 31

October 31, 1979, is the date by which employers must report on Form 941 Social Security and withheld Federal income taxes for the third quarter of 1979, and pay any taxes due, the Internal Revenue Service said. If the quarterly liability (reduced by any deposit during the quarter) is \$200 or more, the unpaid balance must be deposited.

This deadline does not apply to those employers who

make timely deposits of the full amount of tax due in Federal Reserve or approved commercial banks. They are allowed until November 10 to file Form 941, "Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return."

If employers have not received Form 941 by mail, they can obtain one from local IRS offices. IRS Publication 15, "Circular E--Employer's Tax Guide," is also available at local offices.

Oct. 7-13 Is National 4-H Club Week

The week of October 7-13 has been designated as National 4-H Club Week. Over 7 million 4-H members in the nation will be joining in the observance of this special week.

4-H is the largest voluntary youth organization in the United States which is the youth phase of the Agriculture Extension Service. Members may be found in urban, suburban, and rural areas. 4-H is a non-profit, educational program which is open to all youth regardless of race, color, religion, or national origin. Boys and girls age 9-19 may join 4-H clubs.

A 4-H club is a group of boys and girls who elect officers and run their own club, develop their own programs with the help of adult volunteer leaders, and participate in 4-H projects. Every member is expected to enroll in, work on and complete at least one 4-H project during each 4-H year. A 4-H project is a doing and learning activity in which members do one or more of the following: (1) make an object, (2) raise or grow something, (3) care for and train an animal, (4) complete a task, (5) assemble information into a presentation, or (6) develop or improve specific skills. There are many misconceptions about the fact that 4-H'ers only cook, sew, or show animals. This is only a small part of the 4-H project program. In Texas there are over 70 projects in subjects such as bicycle, dog care and training, landscape horticulture, photography, and wood-working. This is just to mention a few. Adult and teen leaders guide members in project work. Members are required to keep records on their projects such as inventories, expenses, income, and important events.

After a 4-H'er becomes 14 he or she can try for state and national awards. This may include a trip to Texas 4-H Roundup, Texas 4-H Congress, or out-of-state trips to Chicago, Washington, and other points of interest.

College scholarships are also available to outstanding 4-H members through the Texas 4-H Foundation.

Haskell County has five 4-H clubs. There is one in each of the following communities: Haskell, Paint Creek,

Rochester, Rule, and Weinert. Whatever your interests or hobbies, 4-H is for you. As an adult, you can help young people learn and grow by volunteering your time to work

with 4-H clubs. As a youth between 9-19, you can make new friends, have fun, and learn new things. For more information contact the Extension Office at 864-2546.

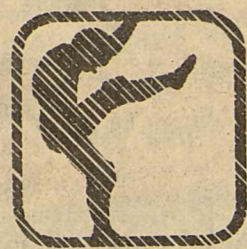

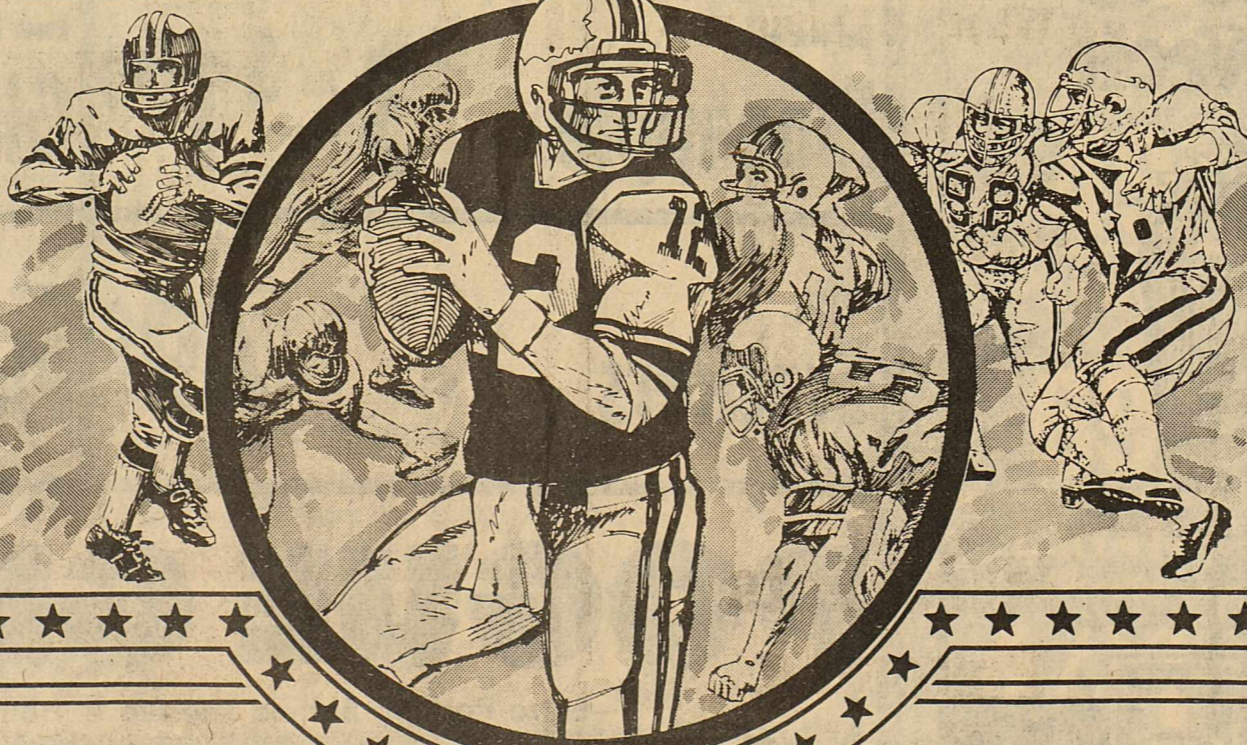

Roles are very important to all of us and sometimes as people grow old their roles tend to diminish to others and yet they need to feel something of self worth. When

someone moves into a rest-home this changing of roles becomes more drastic because it happens over night, not because of natural causes such as children moving away from the home. No preparation time has been present as in natural role changes. There is an immediate loss of responsibility.

Also a loss of being able to be independent is present. No longer are you able to choose what you eat, when you wake up, or go to sleep. These are real life situations an older person must struggle with. Many have lost their home through no one's fault except they are no longer physically able to take care of themselves. Because of these and myriads of other problems one may struggle with identity.

This makes the job of a volunteer perhaps the most vital function of a nursing home. The personnel in a rest home are busy taking care of their physical needs and

because of time just barely touch the surface of their emotional needs where a volunteer can come in and work with someone on a one-to-one basis.

Each one of us have special talents, some have a knack to making a generally boring day into one with excitement and expectation. It may be listening to someone's story of yesteryear, helping someone look for pieces of a puzzle, doing simple exercises, reading to someone who is blind, or just holding the hand of someone who has just lost a lifetime friend. Older people aren't looking for someone with high degrees or years of schooling, they just want someone to care enough to be themselves.

Dear Free Press,

Your headline of 6 September 1979 was WANT A HORSE OR BURRO? ADOPT ONE.

May I respectfully suggest that you do a little research

before printing a hand out from The Bureau of Land Management, Department of the Interior?

The reasons given for the Adopt-a-Horse program were shrinking lands and growing herds. It does not specify

which herds are growing—horses or cattle. This is government land and the wild horses are a heritage of the United States. For a very small fee, nearby ranchers can graze cattle on this land and they resent ever wild horse that nibbles a blade of grass. Your Texas cattlemen seem to do well without this almost free grazing.

Sen. Thomas Eagleton (D-Mo) instigated an investigation of the Adopt-A-Horse program which he called an "administrative debacle" and, for the horses, "a one-way trip to the slaughterhouse." Horse meat brings good money. Some of the abuses have been modified by the bureau preventing wholesale slaughter of horses for pet food.

However, the "wild horse for a pet" is not for the usual youngster. They are wild. I know. I have worked with them. And worked with horses for sixty years. Surely your Texas readers know it is just as realistic to go out and rope a deer as it is to rope a wild horse.

Please do not recommend the wild horses to a public where there are so many "horse crazy" youngsters.

AHA Funds Research Projects

The American Heart Association will spend over \$1 million on Texas-based cardiovascular research projects during its 1979-80 fiscal year.

The organization's national component will spend \$499,971 on 25 research projects in Texas, while some 50 grants totaling \$618,976 have been awarded by the AHA's Texas Affiliate.

The \$1,118,967 total is the most ever appropriated by the AHA for research in Texas and represents a \$90,528 increase over last year's total. Texas institutions with

research projects slated to receive AHA funds include: University of Texas Health Science Center, Dallas; Texas Woman's University, North Texas State University and Texas College of Osteopathic Medicine, Denton and Texas A&M University, College Station.

Others include: University of Houston, Baylor College of Medicine and University of

Texas Health Science Center, Houston; University of Texas Health Science Center, Houston; University of Texas

Medical Branch, Galveston; Texas Tech University School of Medicine, Lubbock and University of Texas Health Science Center, San Antonio.

The AHA, a publicly-funded voluntary health agency, financially supports approved research projects related to the prevention, diagnosis and treatment of heart attack, stroke and other forms of cardiovascular disease.

Additional monies are spent for public education, professional education and community service programs.
