





have to hurt to be helpful. "If you can't carry on a conversation while jogging, you are doing it too hard - slow down. says Dr. George Jessup, assistant professor of health and physical education.

Jessup, an authority on exercising to improve the cardiovascular system, advises the novice jogger to start slowly, running only until the body begins to feel tired. The purpose is to get the heart rate up, which can be accomplished with moderate exercise, he emphasizes.

# **Lone Star Files Application**

Jennings emphasized the base rate being charged for gas consumed by residential and commercial customers will not be increased under the

The new service charges being requested by Lone Star are \$20 for a reconnection; \$18 per hour for appliance service; \$20 per hour for air conditioning service: \$5 for a returned check; and \$40 to disconnect and reconnect a customer's vard line for

"These charges are designed to recover Lone Star's expenses for these services," says Jennings. "A relatively small portion of Lone Star's customers require these special service, and these charges put the cost of the work on those who use the service."

The gas cost adjustment requested in the application would allow Lone Star to recover distribution operating expenses that increase with the city gate cost of

The estimated total revenue for Lone Star's Haskell distribution system under the proposed change is \$11,808 or 2.74 percent.






