

# Indians Advance To Play-offs

The Haskell Indians clinched a berth in the State Class A Football playoffs last Friday night when they defeated Paducah, 67-8.

The Tribe finished the regular season with a 8-0-1 record. Haskell tied Quannah, 21-21 and will represent the district because of a rule which states in case of a tie the team with the most penetrations will advance.

Haskell will face the Rotan Yellowhammers for the bi-district title this Friday night in Sweetwater. Game time is 7:30 p.m.

Last Friday, the Tribe had little trouble with Paducah, rolling up 30 first downs, and 515 yards total offense.

Several players made their debut in varsity action with Jonnie Hise scoring one TD and rushing for 153 yards on 19 carries. Domingo Villa scored two Tribe TD's and rushed for 44 yards. Both are Sophomores.


Indian Monnie Hise scored three TD's, Jim Harris and Steve Escobedo both scored two TD's.

Rotan is 10-0 for the season. The only team which both Haskell and Rotan played is Hamlin and Rotan defeated them 6-0 when they recovered a fumble in the end zone.

Rotan's defense is a split six similar to Haskell's and according to the scouting report of the Haskell Coaching staff, they are a better defensive team than offensive. They are not a physical team, but wait for a mistake and then try to capitalize on it.

Offensively, they run from a Houston Veer and are not explosive but are very consistent.

## Bill Introduced To Exempt Savings From Tax

"Americans need positive incentives to save more during inflationary times. But our country actually discourages thrift by taxing the interest earned from savings accounts," observed John W. Harrel, President, First Federal Savings and Loan Association of Stamford. Harrel is urging public support for legislation pending in Congress that would provide tax incentives for savers. The bill, S. 246 by Senator Lloyd Bentsen (D-Tex.), exempts from taxation the first \$500 of interest earned by an individual on his savings accounts in savings and loan associations, banks and credit unions. Couples filing a joint tax return could exclude up to \$1,000 from their taxable income. Harrel said the legislation is needed because: "It would encourage personal savings to help finance loans for housing and industry. It would be anti-inflationary because it would reduce demand for goods and services in the consumer marketplace. Many other countries use tax incentives to encourage thrift by their citizens. And com-

pared to other countries, we Americans do a relatively poor job of saving. The Swiss average saving 17 percent of their disposable income, the West Germans save 15 percent and the highly-productive Japanese save 25 percent. Americans invest a mere 5 percent. The first \$100 of stock dividends are already excluded from taxation in the same manner being proposed for savings interest. Any opposition to S.246, or other bills similar to it, will arise from concern over lost tax revenues. The Treasury Department has estimated that tax losses associated with S.246 would be approximately \$4 billion. But Harrell noted "that is less than 1 percent of this year's federal budget. And the initial loss of tax revenue would very likely be offset by the tax-paying jobs created when capital is invested in America's productive capacity."





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## Carol Of Lights TT Tradition

It began in the late 1950's. Now two decades later, the Carol of Lights has become a Christmas tradition of Texas Tech University.

Lights will be turned on Dec. 7 as the university prepares for another holiday season.

Reflecting the theme of "An Eternity of Light," approximately 28,000 red, yellow and white lights will outline the Mass Communications, Math, Science, Chemistry, Holden Hall, Administration and Home Economics buildings.

Work crews began stringing lights for the Carol in late October. More than 47,000 feet (nearly ten miles) of electrical wiring will be used.

The idea for lighting the campus was conceived in 1958 by Harold Hinn, former member of the Texas Tech Board of Regents and Foundation Board. Hinn provided the

first 5,000 lights for the annual affair.

The ceremony will begin with a torchlight procession around Memorial Circle, led by Saddle Tramps, men's spirit organization.

The Texas Tech Brass Ensemble and the Texas Tech Choir will provide music for spectators before the program begins. After illumination of the lights the audience will sing carols, and Judson D. Maynard, professor of music, will play the carillon in the Administration Building Tower.

Luminarios (lighted candles in paper sacks) will be provided by Alpha Phi Omega (APO), men's service organization. They will line the walkways from the campus entry at University and Broadway to Memorial Circle.

Lights will be turned on every evening from dusk until 11 p.m. through Dec. 26.

This year's program is sponsored by the Residence Halls Association (RHA), Saddle Tramps and APO.

Significant changes are on the horizon for researchers working on agricultural projects. Underlying factor for these changes is the growing consensus among scientists that current research with its aims at yield increases through better fertilization and cultivation technique may be nearing its peak. In short, there is a growing feeling that we are reaching the stage of making a plant produce all that is possible. That's the reason for the change in direction. Scientists are now beginning to experiment on changes in the biological potential of plants. Basic changes in photosynthesis are being considered. Methods of limiting a plant's respiration are under study and the strange yield increases of some plants when exposed to carbon dioxide are being examined. In short, the new direction for research involves changing the plant itself in ways which could develop new and much greater yield increases.

### 4-H Shooting Sports Interest Increasing

Texas 4-H members are taking to the shooting sports project like ducks to water. "More than 4,000 4-H members across Texas have found shooting sports to be an exciting and attractive 4-H project," points out H.T. Davison, 4-H and youth specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Davison serves as coordinator for the 4-H shooting sports project.

He predicts that enrollment in the shooting sports project will continue to increase for these reasons: 4-H is a flexible organization that's easy to join, and 4-H offers young people interested in shooting a place to learn and the opportunity to achieve and be recognized.

The project began in 1976, with major emphasis on training volunteer coaches to enable them to work effectively with youth. Shortly afterwards, the National Rifle Association offered Texas 4-H a chance to become a pilot state in its attempt to assist youth organizations with an interest in shooting sports.

Davison points out that in many areas of the state adult shooting organizations specialize in one area of shooting. "For instance, trap and silhouette shooting is popular in West Texas. Thus, it is a natural for county Extension agents to establish a similar youth program in the local interest areas."

Presently, the Extension Service annually conducts a State 4-H Rifle Match as part of Texas 4-H Roundup and a State Trap and Skeet Shoot at the National Gun Club in San Antonio. More than 225 4-H'ers participated in the 1979 State Trap and Skeet Shoot.

"Trap and skeet shooting is becoming extremely popular because it is active and fast-moving," explains Davison. "It also provides the participant immediate feedback."

The major thrust by Extension specialists is to arrange for high quality training programs for volunteers in the shooting sports project. In September, the NRA conducted a special Class "C" Coach School for Texas 4-H volunteer coaches. During the four-and-a-half-day workshop, coaches received in-depth training on shooting techniques as well as on psychology, philosophy and the many aspects of how people learn and develop new skills.

According to Davison, the 4-H program is the only youth organization promoting shooting sports on an active scale. The Texas model is presently being copied and implemented by state Extension Services in Washington, Minnesota and New York. Several other states are arranging with the NRA to organize coach training programs. Working closely with the NRA to implement 4-H coach training workshops is the Federal Cartridge Corp. of Minneapolis, Minn.

Parents, youth and volunteer leaders who want to learn more about the 4-H shooting sports project should contact Max Stapleton, County Extension Agent.


### Cotton Classing

Cotton prices were steady to slightly higher and trading was moderate on local markets; according to Garland Dye, Officer in Charge of the Munday Cotton Classing Office. Grade 31, Staple 32 miking 35 to 49 brought from 57.60 cents to 58.90 cents per pound. Grade 41, Staple 32 brought from 56.30 cents to 57.60 cents per pound. Grade 31, Staple 33 brought from 60.05 cents to 61.35 cents per pound.

Scattered showers early in the week slowed the cotton harvest somewhat, but good harvesting weather returned to the area by the weekend and the harvest resumed.

The Munday Classing Office graded 10,330 samples this week and this brought the total for the season to 35,000 just under 40 percent of the area's estimated production.

The predominant quality this week was Grade 31 with 42 percent of the total. Next was Grade 41 with 32 percent and Grade 32 with 15 percent. Staple length was about evenly divided between Staple 32 and Staple 33. Staple 32 was 38 percent and Staple 33 was 34 percent. Eighty-four percent of the samples miked in the 35 to 49 range.



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



## Conservation Viewpoints

USDA Soil Conservation Service

The Board of Directors of the Haskell Soil and Water Conservation District reported a varied, but successful year for their fiscal year, ending August 31, 1979.

Dan M. Wadzeck of Rochester was appointed to the Board to fill the unexpired term of W.L. "Knott" Ballard. They worked with the Haskell County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service County Committee in the developing and initiating of the Emergency Conservation Program (ACP), plus the Mini-Longterm Conservation Agreement program (LTA).

Johnny Wheatley was elected to the board to serve Zone 5, replacing Milton Christian.

R.V. Earles and M.W. Phemister, and wives attended the 1978 State Convention of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Districts Association in Corpus Christi.

Poster Contests were conducted in the Paint Creek, Rochester, Rule, and Weinert Schools. The grand champion poster was prepared by Kathleen Kutch, Grade 2, Rule Elementary School. Kathleen is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Kutch of Rule.

Land Judging, and Pasture and Range Judging Contests were conducted in cooperation with the California Creek SWCD.

The district conducted Soil Stewardship Activities during Soil Stewardship Week. The board also assisted the State Association in sponsoring a

state-wide radio and television promotional program.

Forty-eight new conservation agreements on 15,100 acres were approved, and 59 new conservation agreements on 36,054 acres were revised.

574 landusers were serviced during the reporting year receiving 2308 technical services during the year. 294 cooperators applied one or more conservation measures. 15 units of government were serviced.

The most outstanding accomplishment of district work was the rebuilding of 3,122,538 feet of standard level terraces and 1,440,765 feet of parallel terraces under the EC Program. Over 790,000 feet of new terraces were constructed, and 139 acres of grassed waterways were constructed and sodded to grass. Over 72,000 acres of land was benefited by the application of conservation practices during the year.

The directors wish to thank the Haskell Free Press, the Twin Cities News, and Radio Station KDWT-Stamford for their fine cooperation in carrying out an outstanding informational program during the year.

Bake at 375 degrees F. for one hour, uncovering pan last 15-20 minutes of the cooking time.
