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# Fingerprints Lead To Obtaining Identity

The identity of a Mexican man who was found about four miles north of Haskell has been

established as Camillo Frautos, 25, of Abilene.

The identity of the man was established following an anonymous phone call to the Abilene Police Department recently. Local officials and Abilene policemen began working together and confirmed the identification through fingerprints of the dead man and Frautos who was arrested in Abilene December 11, for public intoxication.

Lupe Duran and Elmer Graham, detectives with the Abilene Police Department, were in Haskell

Tuesday and Wednesday and are questioning friends and co-workers of Frautos in Abilene.

Frautos was employed by Gooch Packing Company in Abilene and investigators are not certain of his citizenship status.

His body was found February 5, and his identity was not known until recently. He was buried February 12 as an unidentified "Child of God".

An autopsy reported the cause of death as strangulation, but there had also been a blow to the head.

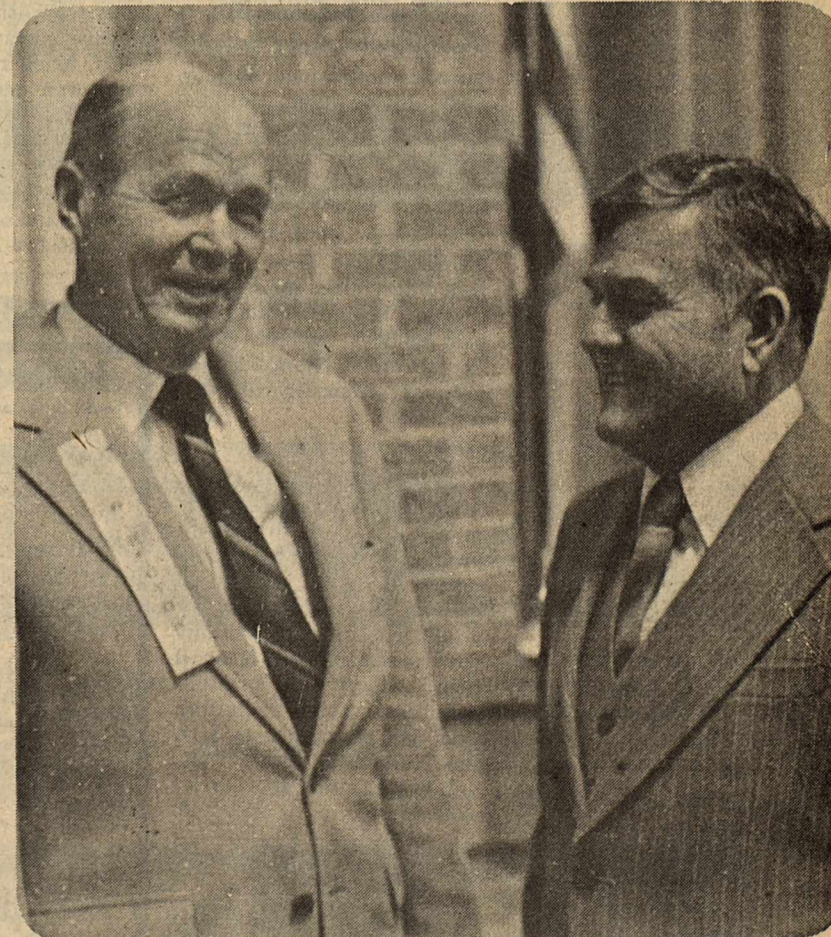

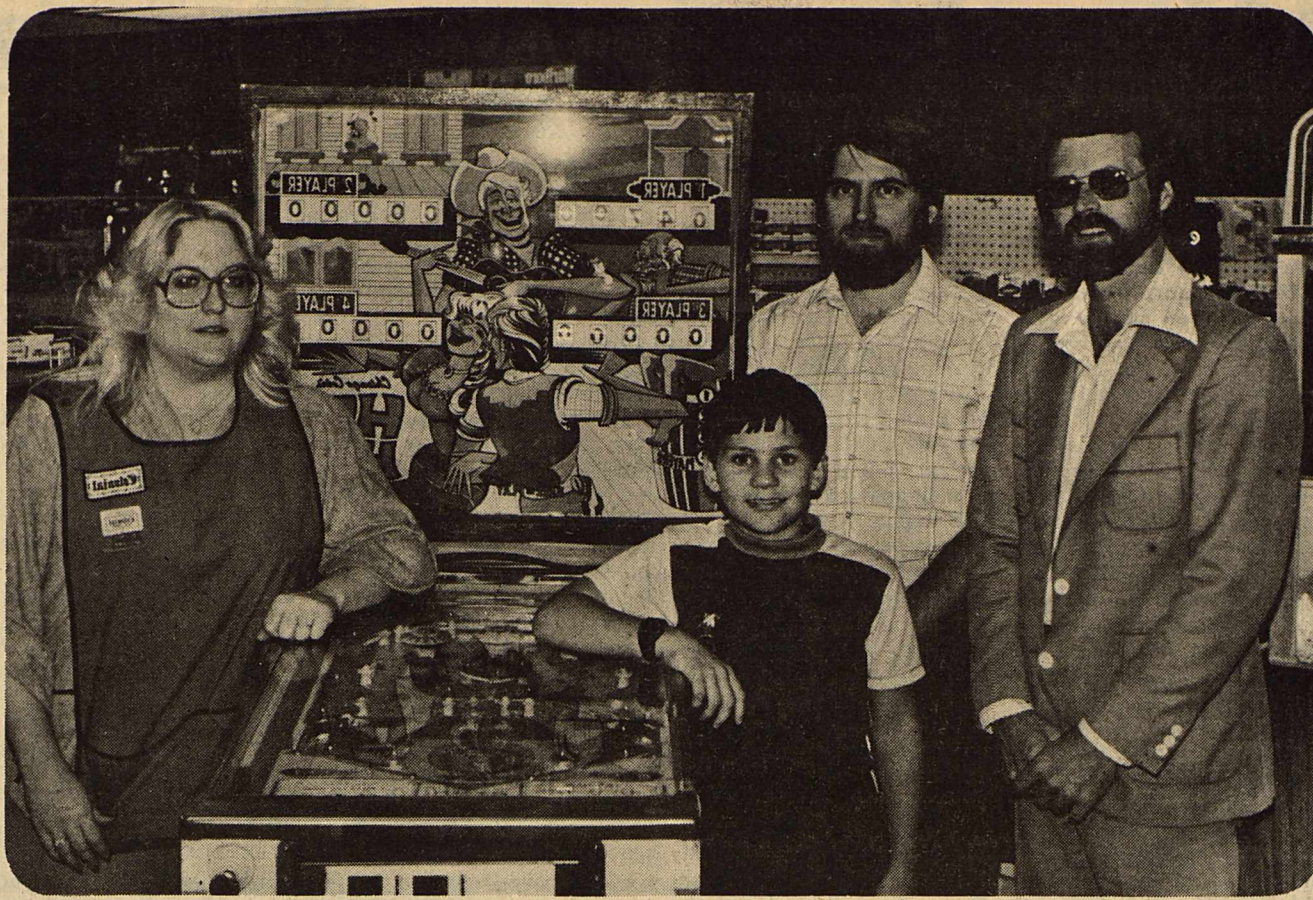

# GED Test Set In Haskell

The General Education Development Test will be given in the official testing center, the Haskell Junior High School Library, on Saturday, Feb. 23, 1980, beginning at 9:00 a.m. The fee for the battery of five tests is \$20.00. An applicant is advised to bring his Social Security Number and driver's license for proper identification.

The multiple choice test battery has 5 parts: Writing Skills, Social Studies, Science, Reading Skills, and Mathematics. Three of the tests have an hour's time limit, while two (Social Studies and Science) have a limitation of one and one half hours. Therefore, most examinees take six hours to complete the test battery.

Persons eligible for testing must:

• be a resident of Texas or a member of the Armed Forces stationed in Texas;

• be at least 17 years of age and officially withdrawn from school for one calendar year. Applicants who have attained their 17th birthday and will enter the Armed Forces any test immediately after withdrawing from school.

To receive a certificate of high school equivalency, the examinee must:

• complete the examination with a minimum standard score of 40 on each of the five tests or an average standard score of 45 on all five tests.

• have attained at least their 17th birthday prior to the date of testing and be out of school for one calendar year.

The GED Program provides a means for determining the educational level of adults who have not completed a formal high school education. A certificate of high school equivalency will be issued to adults who successfully complete the GED examination. This verifies that the holder has demonstrated a level of competence on the examination which is equivalent to that of a high school senior.

# Cotton Classing

B.B. Manly, Jr., Area Director of the USDA Cotton Marketing Services Office reported that 30,000 cotton samples were classed in Abilene during the week ending Friday, February 15th. This brought the seasonal total to about 838,000 samples classed. An additional 180,000 samples were classed at Munday, bringing the combined total to 1,018,000 samples classed.

Local cotton prices advanced by one to two cents per pound early last week, and were mostly steady the rest of the week. Cotton miking 3.5 to 4.9 sold mostly at 20 to 25 1/2 cents per pound over CCC loan values. Grade 32, staple 32 cotton miking 3.5 to 4.9 sold at physical prices ranging from 67 1/2 to 72 cents per pound. The supply of cotton was light to moderate. Demand was mostly moderate for base mike cotton, and was light to moderate for low mike cotton. Demand for low grade cotton weakened. Trading was slow to moderate. Cottonseed

prices paid producers ranged from 95 to 120 dollars per ton. The quality of cotton classed in Abilene was slightly lower than during the previous week. Grades were 5% white, 64% light spotted, and 25% spotted. Grade 32 continued predominant at 36%. Grade 42 comprised 25%, grade 33 comprised 12%, and grade 43 comprised 11%. Fiber length was 57% staple 32, 32% staple 31, and 7% staple 33. Micronaire readings were 36% within the 3.5 to 4.9 range. Twenty-one percent miked from 3.3 to 3.4, 31% miked from 3.0 to 3.2, and 10% miked 2.9 or lower. About 8% of the samples classed were reduced in grade because of bark or grass content.
