

Democratic Primary Set Saturday—7 a.m.-7 p.m.

Texas residents will go to the polls Saturday to select the nominees of the Democratic Party.

Voters will also select their preference in a Presidential candidate with three candidates listed and a space designating uncommitted.

All voters are urged to present their white voter registration card when voting. The cards will be stamped to allow admittance into the precinct and county conventions.

If persons are registered but do not have their cards, they will be allowed to vote but the card will speed the process.

In local elections, voters will make selections in six contested elections.

Three candidates are seeking election as sheriff with Truman Therwhanger, Ricki Russell, and G. T. (Garth) Garrett appearing on the ballot.

Bobbye (Guffey) Collins and Charlene Brothers are seeking election to the office of County Tax Assessor-Collector.

Weaver Arrested In California

Texas Ranger Marshall Brown was notified Monday that Joe Jay Weaver was in custody in Bakersfield, California.

Weaver has been indicted by two different Grand Juries in Haskell County and has been a fugitive from justice since April 4, 1979.

He was arrested Monday by California Highway Patrol and charged with driving while intoxicated.

Weaver was indicted July 21, 1978 for two counts of aggravated kidnapping and was indicted for felony bond jumping and failure to appear, April 16, 1979 following his failure to appear at a pre-trial hearing.

District Attorney Joseph Thigpen said Tuesday that he was awaiting a response from Weaver in California as to whether or not Weaver would waive extradition or not. Thigpen said that if Weaver would not waive extradition, the District Attorney's office would start extradition procedures immediately.

Cable TV To Offer New Programs

Jerry Smith, manager of CenTex Cablevision Corp., announced this week that the local TV Cable company would add two channels to local programming in the next two weeks.

Trinity Broadcasting has been added to the cable and is currently available to cable subscribers on channel 8 in Haskell.

The station is operated by a California television station that also serves several areas by regular broadcast television.

Programs cover the full range of religious thought, with programs produced by the Lutheran Church, the Catholic Church (including Spanish-language shows) and many other Protestant denominations.

Also to be added within the next two weeks is a Madison Square Garden Sports Channel, cable channel 5 in Haskell.

The channel will bring over 200 events each year from the Garden ranging from New York Knicks to hockey, horse shows and boxing.

Garden programming will be primarily in the evening hours.

During week days when the U.S. Congress is in session viewers will be provided with C-SPAN, which will telecast live debate from the house floor, background and explanations.

Highway Patrol Officers at the scene Sgt. Frank Jircik and James Davis were unable to determine the exact cause of the accident, however, they said skid marks seemed to indicate the car had veered sharply away from the shoulder swerved across the road then back where it hit a concrete abutment.

The members of the board instructed High School Principal Bill Blakley to recheck grades and make certain there were no mathematical or procedural errors in the calculations.



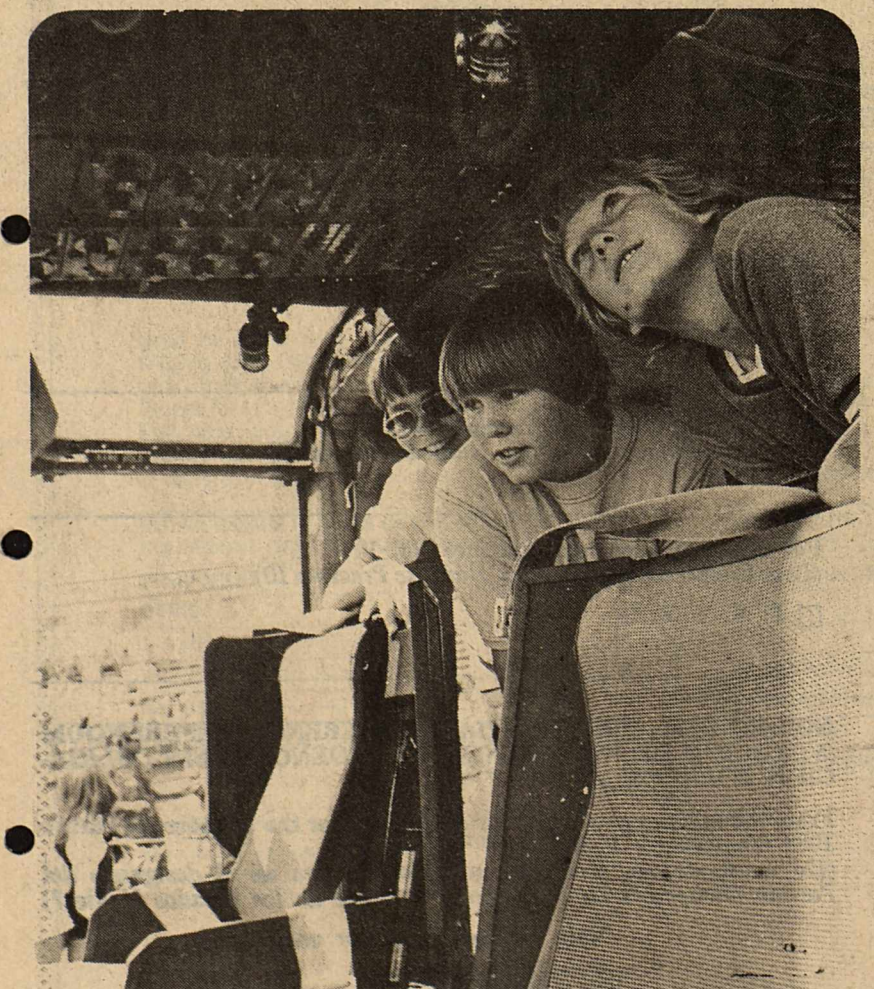
Election Day for the Democratic Party is Saturday and with that comes our plea to all voters to cast their ballots.

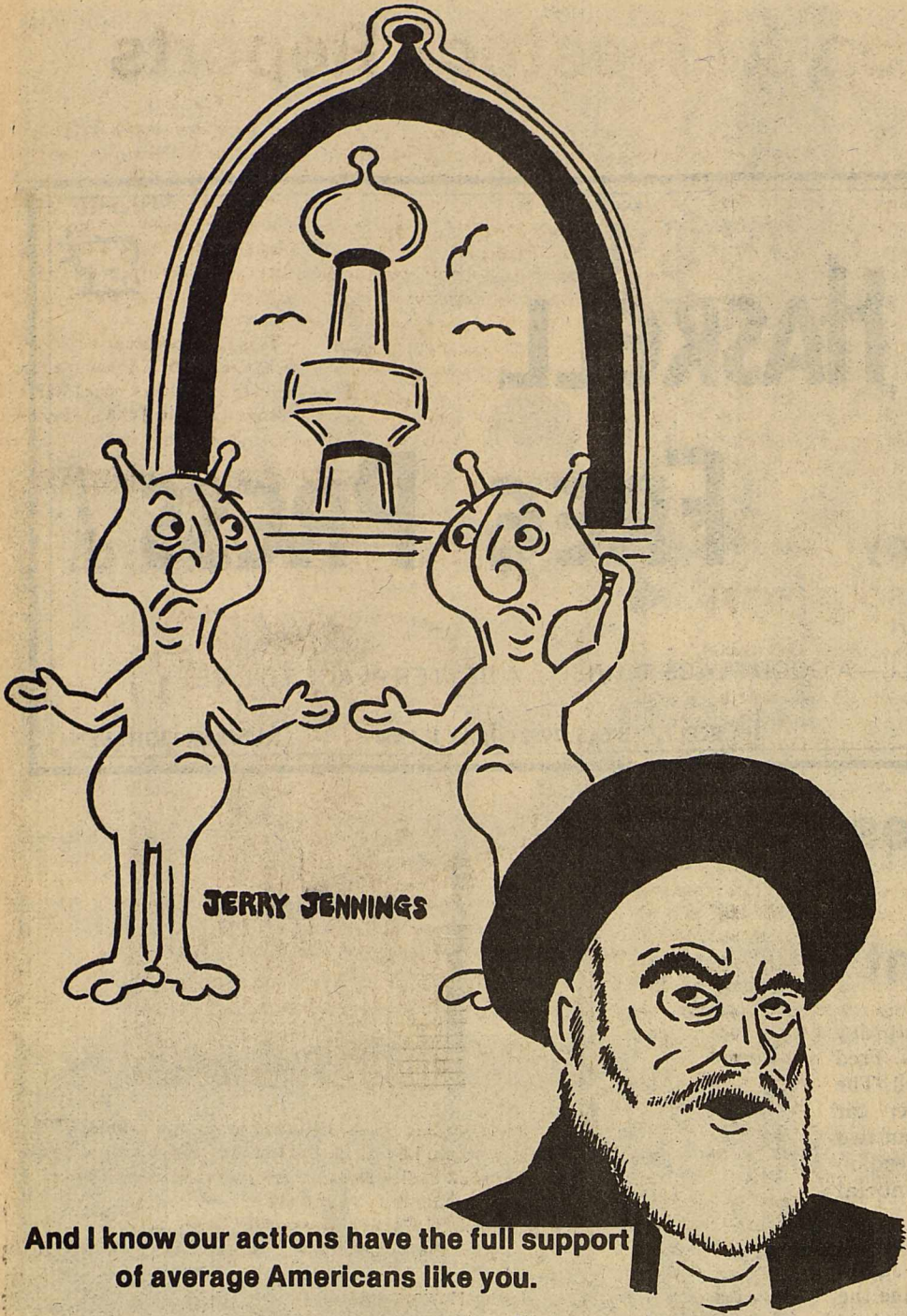

Library Participating In Reading Program

The Haskell County Library is among nearly 400 libraries throughout Texas participating this year in the Texas Reading Club. The program is sponsored by the Texas State

Library and participating libraries. Young readers will take part in activities built around "Sports Splash," the theme selected for 1980. The nearly

universal interest in sports that range from solitary activities like jogging to team sports like baseball and football gives them appeal for most young readers. And libraries have books about sports that range from books on how to play the games through biographies of famous players to novels and stories with sports themes.

Most important of all, young Texans who participate will sample the full of recreational reading. Today's public libraries include a wide range of books and other printed materials for young readers. Summertime is vacation time, but skills honed by vacation time reading will be sharp for the year ahead.

"One of the most serious problems we face today is the

deterioration of reading ability among young people," said Dr. Dorman H. Winfrey, director of the Texas State Library. "We know, however, that people of all ages who develop the habit of reading for recreation become good readers. Reading is a recreational activity with both immediate and long-term benefits."

In recent years school libraries and learning resource centers have undergone major improvements. As a result many youngsters have developed sophisticated skills in using libraries. The Reading Club encourages them to use these skills and the library materials they find for recreational purposes.

Return Crop & Livestock Reports

During late May and June, many Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service or will be personally interviewed by the Service's field staff. The information gathered through the questionnaires and interviews provides the basis for determining the acreage devoted to the various crops and midyear livestock numbers for the state of Texas and for each

county. Crop and livestock reports provide a dependable, unbiased picture of Texas' most important industry—agriculture. The estimates in these reports are tools to help farmers and ranchers work out their planting, breeding, feeding, storing, producing, and marketing plans. Farm organizations and legislatures use them in planning programs. The estimates are also used in establishing

the various government program acreage and payment levels to farmers for the state and county. Extension economists and private farm and ranch management consultants use them as a basis for advising farmers and ranchers. Exporters use them in planning and promoting the sale of agricultural products abroad. Prompt and accurate completion of the survey forms

provides for more reliable estimates and helps to reduce survey costs. All individual farm and ranch information is kept confidential, and only state and county summaries become part of the final published estimate. This is a cooperative effort of the USDA's Economics, Statistics, and Cooperatives Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

First Federal Ranks High In S&L Report

The results of the U.S. League of Savings Association's Mirror Series 2, a management and operation research report, has just been released reporting First Federal Savings and Loan Association of Stamford in the top 10 to 20 percent in several categories of savings and loans nationally.

"Futures"-Proof Of Money Madness

Since the recent fiasco involving the silver speculations of the illustrious (or filthy rich, if you will) Hunt family, it has come to my attention that a surprising number of people are totally ignorant of the workings of that method of speculative investment called "The Futures Market."

Actually, I don't know why this should surprise me so much since I could be counted among the ignorant. That is, until lately. I have done some investigating about futures and have come out a little (a very little) bit wiser.

One thing that I must make very clear is that I am not, nor do I ever plan to be, involved in the futures market for reasons which I believe will become clear. The most speculative investment I ever make occurs at the dairy section occasionally when I purchase three gallons of milk instead of two on the off chance that the extra gallon will not sour before it is consumed and predicting that milk prices will be up the next week. (Even this gamble breaks me into a cold sweat.)

Still it is enlightening to see what "moneyed" people do. These are the people who have money enough to go out for pizza when there's a chicken thawed at home and not feel a twinge of guilt. What I have discovered is that something I long suspected is true. My theory is that penny by penny and dollar by dollar, the acquisition of money makes the owner thereof more and more eccentric until one day, sitting amidst a 20 foot pile of deposit slips, the rich man goes completely mad. You ask for proof? I give you the Futures Market.

In this form of investment John Dough, who already has more money than he needs decides he wants more. John calls a broker (who he probably does not know personally but who has been recom-

mended to him as reliable) and asks for market advice. Perhaps John's broker thinks August sow's ears would be a good investment. Now John has \$10,000 cash to invest but to make even more money he buys on the margin. On about a 10% margin, this means that John buys approximately \$100,000 worth of sow's ears with his \$10,000. Supposing that sow's ears were currently selling in the futures market for 50 cents a pound, John is suddenly the proud owner of 100 tons of sow's ears.

One must understand at this point that John Dough does not want even one sow's ear--much less 100 tons of them. However, he trusts his broker who assures him he can sell the ears at a higher price than he paid for them. This, of course, he must do before August lest he end up with a whole truckload of ears and a demand for payment of the \$90,000 he owes on them. It is almost certain that whoever buys the sow's ears from John will not want them either but will buy them anyway in the hope that he too can sell up.

The risk is that something unusual will happen to the market which the broker cannot foresee and the demand for ears de pig takes a dive. For example, if some farmer in Ohio comes up with a new swine mutation and produces a line of pigs that have six ears each, the market would be glutted with ears and the price would naturally fall. In this event, John's broker makes a margin call and asks John to cough up some more money.

At this point our Mr. Dough has a decision to make. If he thinks mutant pigs are here to stay, he may want to take his loss and sell out before his loss is increased. If he has the cash, he may choose to pay the additional margin money and stay in the game on the chance that a severe freeze may hit pig farms and ears everywhere will get brittle and

break off--in which case the shortage would make the market strong again and John will make his money.

What is amazing is the fact that the fluctuation in demand for John's futures may not have anything to do with either pigs or their ears. For example, if the president bursts into tears in the middle of his "State of the Union" message, speculators may become wary of the economic health of the country and refuse to buy anything. If the dire situation persists, John may find himself the proud owner of his investment; wishing he had lived in the days of Julius Ceasar listening to those immortal words, "Friends, Romans, Countrymen lend me your ears."

If speculators will not buy Mr. Dough's ears then to avoid being stuck with them himself, John can bail out by selling them to the Manhattan Silk Purse Factory. This would be unfortunate for John because the factory does in fact want the ears and John was hoping to sell his ears to someone who did not want them. And because of the depressed economy and the whimpering president, Manhattan Silk is only willing to pay a fraction of what John bought them for and poor John is out a bundle.

In short then investment in the Futures Market is this: One man buys a large quantity of a commodity he does not want through another man he does not know with money he does not have in hope of selling that commodity (whose value is determined by factors over which he does not have control) to another man who does not want it either. The greatest catastrophe occurs when the purchaser cannot find anyone who doesn't want his commodity enough to pay him well for it and so is forced to sell it cheap to someone who actually wants it.

NOW is this or is this not

madness?

Antlerless Deer Targeted By New Regulations

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission, meeting in Austin Friday (April 18) adopted far-reaching regulations aimed at increasing the annual harvest of antlerless deer across most of the state's deer range.

Two of the regulations—a buck permit system and an early 16-day antlerless only season—represent extensions of management programs in effect in some South Texas counties last hunting season.

A new regulation, however, establishes an either-sex white-tailed deer season for a wide area of Central Texas. The change does away with the antlerless deer permit system, and allows hunters to harvest three deer of either sex, but no more than two bucks.

Hunters in these counties will not be required to obtain antlerless deer permits from landowners, but rather will attach antlerless deer tags from their hunting licenses to the carcasses of does taken during the season.

Commission members stressed that landowners still would retain the right to control the numbers and sex of deer taken from their property

under the either-sex plan. However, persons planning to hunt in these counties this fall should be aware that some of the county commissioners courts have authority to approve or disapprove proposed department regulations. These regulations will go into effect prior to the start of the 1980-81 hunting season.

Either-sex counties were selected based on the following criteria: (1) less than 50 percent of the antlerless deer permits were utilized the previous hunting season; (2) less than 20 percent of the total deer population is being harvested; (3) antlerless deer permits have been available for the past three years; and (4) as determined by deer and hunter surveys, there are at least four deer per hunter.

Counties selected for the change are: Atascosa, Bandera, Bell, Bexar, Blanco, Burnet, Coke, Comal, Concho, Crockett, Edwards, Gillespie, Hays, Irion, Kendall, Kerr, Kimble, Kinney, Lampasas, Llano, Mason, McCulloch, Medina, Menard, Mitchell, Mills, Nolan, Real, San Saba, Schleicher, Sterling, Sutton, Tom Green, Uvalde, Val Verde (east of the Pecos River) and Williamson. The season will be Nov. 15, 1980 through Jan. 4, 1981.

Wildlife Division officials are confident that the either-sex season will not adversely increase the number of antlerless deer taken during the hunting season, since traditionally less than half the allotted antlerless deer permits are utilized by hunters in these counties. However, the change is expected to cut red tape and expense for both the department and landowners. Antlerless permit issuance rates are based on the concept that all permits will be utilized.

A similar either-sex white-tailed deer season was adopted for Jeff Davis, Pecos, Terrell and Val Verde (west of the Pecos River). The season

will be Nov. 28, 1980, through Jan. 4, 1981, and the limit will be three deer, either sex, no more than two bucks. Antlerless mule deer continue to be legal only by permit.

The buck permit change expands the Webb County experiment to five additional South Texas counties. They are Dimmit, Frio, Maverick, Zapata and Zavala.

Wildlife Division Director Ted Clark said the contiguous area will form a "Quality Deer Management Unit," in which buck permits would be utilized with three major aims: (1) to enable landowners to manage their deer herds without neighboring exploitation, (2) to maintain 30 percent of the buck harvest at 4½ year or

older age classes, and (3) to shift additional hunting pressure to the antlerless segment of the population, which aids in controlling overpopulation of the deer range.

Clark said the buck permits will be required only for fork-antlered bucks, and the permits will be issued the first year on an unlimited basis in the five new counties. Buck permits in Webb County will be issued at the same rate as for the 1979-80 hunting season, with all landowners receiving at least one permit.

Buck permits are issued to landowners at the same time they receive their antlerless deer permits. Hunters are required to fill out and attach the buck permit to the antler of any fork-antlered buck taken

in those counties. There will be no check stations in any of the buck permit program counties.

Clark told the commission that experience with buck permits in Webb County showed that the permit system failed to make noticeable improvement in overall deer body and antler quality within age classes, but it appeared to shift some of the hunting pressure to the doe segment and improved the age composition of the buck population.

The Webb County deer herd has doubled in the past 10 years, causing a decline in the general quality of the herd, he said. Buck permits in Webb County did improve the age structure of the herd by per-

mitting more deer to reach maturity, Clark added.

Three additional counties were added to the special 16-day early antlerless deer season in South Texas. The early season, designed to increase the harvest of antlerless deer, was conducted for the first time in 1979 in Dimmit, Maverick and Webb Counties. They early season will be continued in these counties in 1980, and Frio, Zapata and Zavala Counties will be added.

It was stressed that increasing the percentage of mature bucks through the use of buck permits and reducing the doe population by means of the early antlerless-only season are considered a management package. Both control of the buck harvest and the overall deer population must be achieved to expect an improvement in deer quality, Clark said.

A change affecting archery hunting for deer and turkey will start the season in all regulatory counties on the first Saturday in October (Oct. 4, 1980), for 30 consecutive days, rather than Oct. 1-31 as in the past for most counties. This change was designed to guarantee five weekends of hunting. It will allow increased opportunity but not impact by archers. In general, archery regulations such as season length and bag limits have been no more liberal than the gun season regulations in a given county.

Some counties in the North Central Texas area will have a reduction in the buck bag limit, from three deer, no more than two bucks, to three deer, no more than one buck (antlerless by permit, if warranted). Also in the

counties of Borden, Crosby, Fisher, Garza, Haskell, Howard, Jones, Kent, Knox, Scurry and Stonewall, the limit will be reduced from three deer, no more than two bucks, to two deer, no more than one buck. This proposal stems from the low deer population in these areas.

The department also will continue the special either-sex deer season for Bosque, Erath and Tyler Counties during the four-day Thanksgiving weekend, which was initiated for the 1979 deer season. Polk County officials told the commission they wished to discontinue the special season in their county. During that season, white-tailed deer of either sex may be taken without an antlerless deer permit. Antlerless deer taken

during the special season must be checked at department check stations.

The general season for white-tailed deer in most regulatory counties will continue to be as in the past, starting this year on Nov. 15, 1980, and extending through Jan. 4, 1981. However, exceptions to these and other regulations occur in many counties throughout the state, and hunters should contact local game wardens, department offices or the 1980-81 Guide to Texas Hunting, Fishing and Trapping Regulations booklet which will be published in August for specific county regulations. Additional information also may be obtained by calling the department's statewide toll-free telephone number, 1-800-252-9327.

Transportation Week Focuses On Energy

Texans often have been accused of indulging in a love affair with their cars, pickups and even big old 18-wheel cattle trucks.

Now comes Governor Bill Clements, asking them to leave their beloved conveyances home for one day, during National Transportation Week, May 11-17.

The idea is to dramatize the role transportation plays in everything Texans do—and to save precious energy.

"We must cease to take for granted the vital role which transportation plays in our daily lives," the state's chief executive said in his official memorandum designating the week-long observance.

"The economic and cultural vitality of the State of Texas depends on an efficient and comprehensive transportation system," he said.

"The importance of the transportation system is increasingly apparent as we continue to struggle with energy production and utilization," the governor added.

He urged all citizens to participate in the observance of National Transportation Week by utilizing some means of alternate transportation during the week.

In many urban areas, that could mean giving the bus system a try. Many systems

have been improved in the last few years, with new equipment and better schedules.

Sponsors of the week, among them the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, suggest that many Texans' impressions of transit are out of date. Try it; you might like it, is the idea.

Other alternative means of transportation in areas where there is no transit include carpooling or checking into the possibility of forming van pools. If more people doubled up to ride to work and back, the energy savings would obviously be realized, not to mention reduction of vehicles in the daily streams of peak-hour traffic.

The department is backing its commitment with special urgings to its employees statewide to try transportation alternatives for one day during the week.

There are some indications that a few employees may saddle Old Paint and ride off into the sunrise to the office. Others are considering cycling or skating. Some fanatical highway and transportation hands may even (gasp!) walk.

Also participating in National Transportation Week observances in Texas are local chapters of Traffic Clubs International, made up of transportation officials in the private enterprise sector.

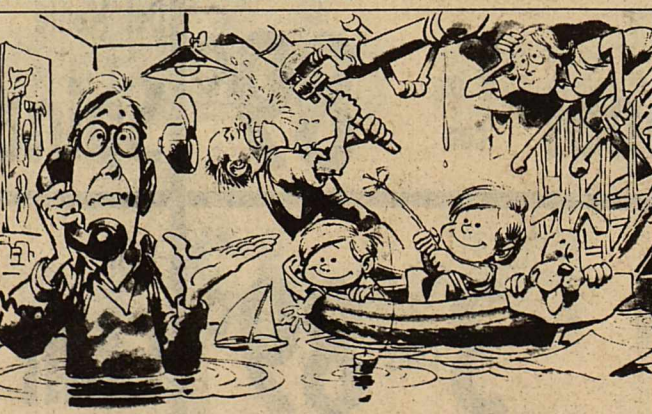

Rhonda Moeller Makes Statement To Voters

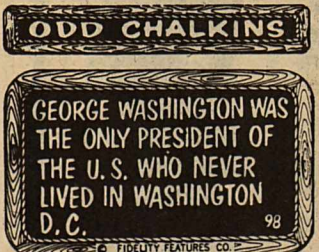
I would like to take this opportunity to make a statement to the voters of Haskell County and to ask for your vote on May 3rd.

Conservation Viewpoints

USDA Soil Conservation Service

Conservation Tillage Gaining Wider Acceptance: Controls Erosion, Improves Water Quality, Saves Energy.

Conservation tillage is a system of farming that leaves protective amounts of residue mulch on the surface of the soil throughout the year.

Properly managed, the system has the potential to substantially reduce water and wind erosion, and to conserve energy on cropland in most areas of the United States and is cost-effective.

Estimates indicate that conservation tillage will be practiced on 88.7 million acres this year, up from less than 30 million acres in 1972. It is estimated that another 226 million acres of cropland will be conventionally tilled in 1980.

The term conservation tillage incorporates several types of tillage practices formerly identified by other names. No-till, slot planting, or zero tillage describe practices where the seedbed and planting are completed in one pass over the field. Less than 10 percent of the soil surface is disturbed. A protective cover of crop residue is left on 90 percent of the surface.

The protective cover formed by the residue on the surface

of the soil acts as a deterrent to wind and water erosion. The cover increases water infiltration and reduces losses of water, pesticides and herbicides in overland runoff or through evaporation.

The timely application of herbicides to control weed growth is critical to the success of conservation tillage. Standard conservation practices such as terraces, diversions, and waterways, where needed, provide an added level of soil protection.

It should be noted that conservation tillage does not work equally well for all crops, on all soil types, or in every part of the country. Farmers should seek advice and assistance through the Haskell Soil and Water Conservation District. It is too late for this spring plantings, but not too late to start planning the initiation of such a tillage program this summer following small grain harvest.

It is estimated that between 130,000 acres and 150,000 acres of Haskell County land was damaged during the past three to five months. Extremely high winds, very little rainfall, and many other factors combined to cause our problem. Many acres of winter small grains were completely destroyed by blowing soil particles. This could have been eliminated with the practice of conservation tillage.

In 1977, savings for farmers on diesel fuel alone would have amounted to \$438 million. At today's prices the dollar savings could top \$1 billion. Isn't it worth a try? Soil Conservation Service technicians will be glad to help you plan a conservation tillage program that will fit your farm, farming operations, and soil types.

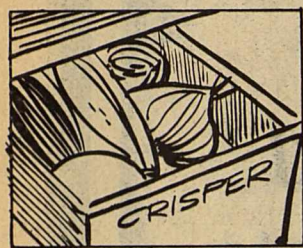

Congressional Comment

WASHINGTON, D.C. — One of the most demoralizing battles being fought today in homes of the elderly in every corner of our nation is the tug-of-war between the Social Security check and rising costs of daily necessities caused by inflation.

There is no doubt that our elderly citizens and others living on fixed incomes are taking the cruelest blows as they see their small incomes stretched closer and closer to the breaking point.

It is far easier to raise questions concerning the direction of our Social Security program than to hit upon perfect solutions:

Was Social Security originally designed as a complete retirement plan or as supplemental income for retirees?

How do benefit totals compare to the actual amount of money paid in by the individual during his or her years of work? Is this type of comparison, in light of today's inflation, fair?

Everyone agrees that all senior citizens ideally should spend their latter years in dignity and financial comfort. But can we ignore the young worker, struggling to raise a family and facing the same inflationary woes, who is seeing more and more of his earnings funneled away to the Social Security program?

With a built-in cost-of-living increase, tied to the Consumer Price Index, can Social Security payments realistically keep up with inflation without the entire system breaking down at some point?

I could easily add to the list of questions regarding this issue, but sifting through the facts — historical, present and predicted — of the Social Security dilemma, I find the answers are illusive.

Federal Insurance Contributions Action (FICA) Program deductions total 6.13 percent of the workers' paycheck and a like amount from his

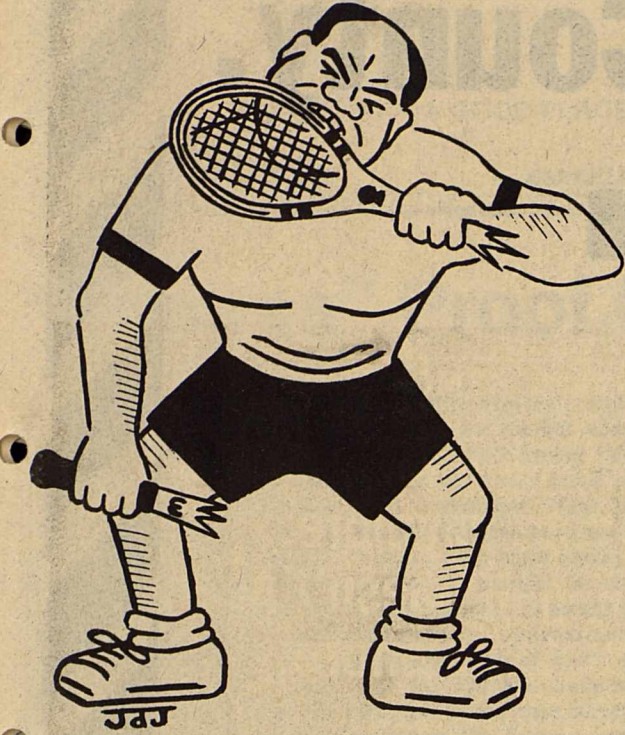
employer. At the same time, payments to those eligible are to increase by 14.3 percent in July. It doesn't take a calculator to deduce the imbalance between the two. The message is simple: to pay out more, you must take in more.

How did we get to this point and, more importantly, where, when and how will the upward spiral end?

In the weeks ahead, Congressional Comment will be investigating the Social Security

Program, delving into the history of the program in an attempt to illuminate its purpose, as well as presenting a current assessment and reviewing some of the changes that have been proposed.

I make no claims to having all of the answers, but rather am asking the questions in an attempt to clarify misunderstandings about Social Security and to formulate my own course on this sensitive issue.

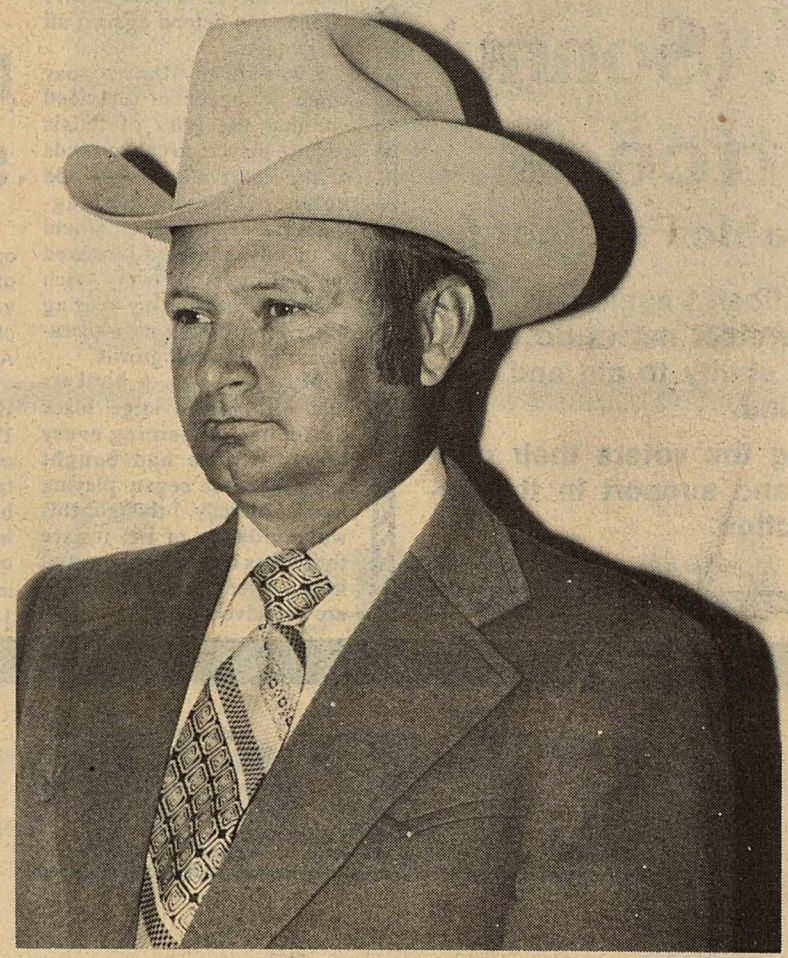
