The parade will be led by Hardin-Simmons University's Six White Horses, with Sharon Gray of Haskell being one of the young ladies that rides with the group in rodeos and parades throughout the

The rodeo will begin Thursday and continue Friday and Saturday night at 8 p.m. each night.

Haskell merchants will be holding

a giant sidewalk sale, Saturday, June 7 in conjunction with the Frontier Days celebration. Many, many bargains will be offered to the shoppers of the Haskell area.

An open "Flea Market" will also be held Saturday on the square, with free spaces available to any and all on a first come, first serve basis. Those wishing to have spaces must provide their own tables.

The rodeo has been under the sponsorship of the Haskell County Jaycees for quite a number of years, and they are promising another thrilling rodeo again this year. Contestants in all events have been calling to get entered for the big show which will feature the major contests of all rodeos.

The rodeo had its beginning on July 4, 1883, in Pecos, Texas, when cowboys from the numerous ranches held a calf roping contest in the main street of the little town. History says that the ranchers and their cowhands were quick to cover bets in the competition, placing their money on one of their own brand.


Since that hot July day almost a hundred years ago, many new competitive events have been added to the rodeo which is recognized as the leading outdoor attraction of the nation.

The bucking horses for the early day rodeos were furnished by the local ranches from their string of stock for regular everyday work on the range, except for a few horses that had "outlawed" on the riders. Again this year the bucking stock for all events will be furnished by the Cordell Rodeo Company of Childress who are certainly no strangers to the Jaycees Frontier Days rodeo in Haskell.

The rodeo arena and grounds are in excellent condition for participants and spectators alike, and all comers have a special invitation to be in the stands when the big show gets underway with the grand entry at 8 p.m. tonight.

All other boxes will be held in their regular places.





Haskell County Oil Production Since 1929 Tops 91 Million Barrels

Haskell County, which has had recorded production since 1929, last year produced 1,393,975 barrels of crude oil and condensate at the rate of 3,819 barrels per day. Production in 1979 boosted Haskell County's production total through the end of the year to 91,897,636 barrels.

In 1979, 22 counties produced more than 10-million barrels of crude oil, a decrease of two counties from 1978; a decrease of four from 1977, and five from 1976.

The following chart shows 1979 production figures for the state's five top producing counties, all with production in excess of 48-million barrels. Yoakum retained its spot as the state's top producing county. Gaines retained second place, while Ector remained in third place for the

County Extension Agent Sets Series On Clothing Care

By Lou Gilly **County Extension Agent**

For the next four weeks, I will have an article concerning clothing care. Care of clothes is a regular happening in most households. Therefore, proper knowledge of care requirements and timesaving and energy saving tips are beneficial to everyone. I hope this article and the articles to follow will be helpful advice.

Saving time on clothing care provides more time for other activities. If you're like many who never seem to have enough hours in the day, consider the following timesaving tips:

· Select garments and accessories to be worn the night before. Quickly check for

need attention. Finding these in advance prevents frustration along with saving time dressing, undressing, replanning and redressing. Also, group similar garments together in your clothes closet to help you coordinate and store clothes more quickly.

• Arrange a once-a-week (or once-a-month) trip to the dry cleaners and/or shoe repairman. Designate a special place for items that need extra attention so there is no big search for items to be dry cleaned or repaired.

• Locate several clothes hampers near your laundry room--one for each commonly sorted wash loads such as towels, lingerie, etc.

· Keep a stain removal guide near your clothes washer. Treat stained clothes as soon as the stain is known. Reward children for identifying stains or rips soon after they occur.

 Keep all laundry supplies near washer and dryer. Also, keep all ironing supplies--

distilled water, iron-together and with the iron and ironing board. If space permits, leave ironing board set up.

· Dovetail clothing care tasks. For example, wash clothes while cooking or fold clothes while watching TV.

• Remove permanent press items from the dryer while they are slightly damp and place on hangers immediately to prevent wrinkling.

• If time allows, fold clothes as you take them from the

· Teach other family members to take responsibility for their own clothing care as soon as possible. Studies show that other family members are increasingly involved in doing laundry but may not fully understand proper proce-

• Mend any rips or tears before laundering clothes to prevent further damage. On ew clothes, finish what the factory did not. For example, fasten loose threads, reinforce buttonholes or secure buttons.

This, too, helps prevent additional damage.

• Throw away ruined items as you go-worn out hose, irreparable garments. This can help limit the need for big closet cleanouts.

• Take seasonal clothes out of storage 6-8 weeks before the season begins to allow time for adjustments, renovation, recycling, or extension through the addition of new garments to make last year's wardrobe look new.





Cong. Charles Stenholm **Announces Poll Results**

Results of the second District-wide poll conducted by Congressman Charles W. Stenholm have been completed and the overall message is a clear one: Cut government spending.

'The thread that ran throughout the responses was a fiscally-conservative viewpoint that I honestly feel my service in Congress has reflected," Stenholm said in reviewing the results.

Respondents strongly favored tighter restrictions for individual eligibility of Food Stamps (61.8 percent), compared to only 2.4 percent favoring a general increase of benefits. A total of 51.1 percent favored the elimination of benefits for individuals on and from Hardin-Simmons strike; 38.2 percent for an increase in benefits for the elderly and disabled; 22 percent for a general reduction in the availability in benefits and 16.2 percent for the elimination of the Food Stamp

Program altogether. 'I was especially pleased to Bridgeport, before coming to hear the overwhelming support for some of these views which, I, personally, have about the Food Stamp Program," Stenholm said.

Some 61.6 percent of those answering the questionnaire felt that a balanced budget and limited government spending would be most beneficial to the private business sector, as opposed to the choices of a limit on Small **Business Administration loans** (11.3 percent favoring); accelerated depreciation for business capital investments (15.2 percent); more Congressional oversight of regulatory agencies (18.3 percent); and the revision of estate tax laws to ease tax burdens on familyowned businesses (35.2 per-

When given choices ranging from increasing foreign aid assistance (only 2 percent favored) to no foreign aid at all (8.3 percent favored), the majority favored reducing

foreign aid and all other bat roles only. programs to help balance the Respondents opposed the

budget (39.2 percent). What might be considered a surprising range of attitudes was evidenced in replies to a question regarding registration for a draft, as more respondents favored the drafting of men and women (40.8 percent) than those favoring drafting men only (36 percent). Most botulism poisoning in this country is associated with improperly processed home-canned, low-acid foods, such as meats and low-acid vegetables, including green beans, corn, spinach or as-

Several warning signs can alert you to possible food spoilage ahead of time, so always do a little "detective work" before you even try the 10-minute boiling step:

· look for cracks in jars, or loose or bulging lids,

• if you notice abnormal odors or spurting liquid when you open the jars, know these are signs of food spoilage,

· always examine and smell "Fortunately, relatively few canned foods for spoilage, are exposed to botulism, a even if you don't notice any of

• remember, even if no signs exist, the threat of food poisoning is still there, including deadly botulism, so be sure to boil all home-canned foods for 10 minutes even before tasting them.

If you do notice any signs of spoilage or off odor, before boiling or during it, dispose of the food out of reach of humans, pets or livestock-that's the safest way.

It's also wise to know the symptoms of botulism, in case of poisoning.

Symptoms can occur within a few hours--or as long as six to eight days after a person eats food containing botulism

Early signs of botulism poisoning may be nausea, blurred vision, vomiting, abdominal cramps and diarrhea. Other symptoms include fatigue, weakness and dizzi-

These are very general symptoms, so they're not always attributed to food poisoning.

However, eventually the toxin paralyzes muscles,

face. Then it moves down to the throat, chest, arms and

Once the paralysis moves to the chest and reaches the diaphragm, suffocation occurs.

Of course, the best place to start in preventing botulism poisoning is in proper home-

canning methods. You must use a steam pressure canner to process low-acid vegetables and meats, and the canner must reach at least 10 pounds pressure (240 degrees F.) and hold that pressure for an appropriate time--depending on the type of food, size of jar and other added ingredients.

No other way is safe, since no other method reaches temperatures that high.

Carefully read the directions that accompany your canning equipment, and be sure to follow high standards of sanitation during the canning process.

Mainly, use the correct equipment and specifically follow the directions for products you are processing.

Yet, the interest is there. The fastest and simplist method of increasing carrying

capacity with tame pastures is a planned fertility program. By applying fertilizer now,

the volume of forage produced is increased thus more animal units can be grazed.

On our irrigated coastal bermudagrass pastures a good sound rule of thumb is to apply between 30-40 pounds per acre of pure nitrogen at intervals between irrigations Clarendon College on West not to exceed every third irrigation application. The first application of fertilizer should have already been A warning is being sent applied. The next application forth now to be on the watch should be applied this week or for hordes of grasshoppers next. With the normal irrigato 12 days, an application of fertilizer should be made at 30 to 36 day intervals just prior to irrigation, and should be continued until around September through September 15.

For more detailed data on fertilization and irrigation of tame pastures, contact your local soil conservationist.
