

### Superintendent's Views

BY JAMES LANIER Superintendent, Haskell ISD

The storms of winter are upon us. In fact, the first storm caught us at the school unprepared with our communications not in order. This column will be devoted to the method used to announce whether school will be opened

First, the decision must be mine as Superintendent as whether to have school or not. After listening to weather reports, I will strive to arise early and drive to examine the road and street conditions. After consultation with as many sources as possible (such as highway department, police elements, bus foreman, etc.), the decision whether to have school or not will be made by 7 o'clock A.M.

If the decision is positivethat is to have schoolno announcements will be made and school will proceed as normal. Students will be expected to attend.

If the decision is negative-that is, not to have schoolthe buses will be stopped and the announcement will be made to the following sources. I will contact the Stamford radio station, KRBC radio in Abilene and KRBC television station (Channel 9) in Abilene. They, in turn, will announce the decision. Remember, if no announcement is made over these sources, school will

proceed as usual.

If everyone will follow this procedure, there will be no need for telephone calls to inquire about school opening. Simply remember the three information sources and tune in to one of them after 7:00

I realize that we have school in session often times under rather adverse conditions. There are several reasons for this. The most important reason is that the state dictates that we have 175 days of school. If we close for weather, those days must be made up. The normal procedure would be to take them out of the holidays in the spring. However, the students and teachers definitely need the revitalization of a break time during this period of the year. Contrary to a popularly held conception, the state will not allow these days to go not made up except in cases of extreme stress, such as a tornado destroying parts of a

Another reason is the hardship that it causes families with elementary children in which both parents work.

Another reason is that older students will probably be out in the weather anyway and place themselves in dangerous traffic situations such as sledding behind a vehicle or sliding in a street area. In the supervised arena of the

school, this, I feel, is less apt to happen. Other than some wild snowball fights (yes, parents, kids still love to throw snowballs), there is little danger once we get the sfudents to school.

We do appreciate the co-operation and help of you as parents, the highway department, and others. I doubt if there is another community anywhere that will co-operate with a school so

Again, I apologize for not having this information to you before the first storm. I simply did not anticipate a snow storm of that magnitude in November. Since I am a native West Texan, I should have realized the freakish nature of our weather.

I hope each of you have a great Thanksgiving holiday!





### Stenholm To Sponsor Legislation

Members of the National Federation of Independent Business have overwhelmingly approved of proposed legislation which would limit the length of time the federal government can require records to be retained to four

The proposal, sponsored by Congressmen Charles W. Stenholm and Jack Hightower, both Texas Democrats, was included in NFIB's latest Mandate vote on issues and was approved by 90 percent of the members responding. Only seven percent opposed the proposal.

Stenholm and Hightower are currently working to obtain additional co-sponsors for the legislation, which will be reintroduced during the upcoming 97th Session of Con-


gress.
"The measure had considerable support during this past session," commented Stenholm, "and with this type of strong backing from NFIB members, we expect to see it move rather quickly through the channels.'

The bill would establish a four-year statute of limitations for businesses on recordkeeping and alleged civil violations of federal rules, regulations or laws. At present, businessmen are required to maintain records indefinitely and are subject to civil penalities without any limita-

"This is one means to cut down the cost of doing business," Stenholm said, 'and chip away a little at the inflation rate. The costs of compiling and maintaining unnecessary records are normally passed along to the end user of the product or service involved if that business is to remain solvent.

"NFIB estimated that, aside from tax records, there are more than 1,100 recordkeeping requirements that are imposed on small businesses each year," he continued. "While our bill would not eliminate any of these regulations, limiting the retention time of required records would alleviate much of the burden on businesses and cut costs significantly.'







installation instructions to the letter. "Above all, don't try to short-cut the manufacturer's directions, don't skimp on clearances from walls and floors, and don't count on word of mouth advice from stove owners." Covering a wall with aluminum foil, for example, does not make it non-combustible.

Making the Stove Pipe a Good Connection

Stove owners should follow detailed instructions, available from the manufacturer or day-the sudden heat could retailer, to be sure that stove pipe dimensions and materials are adequate. Ordinarily, Mann explained, the pipe should not pass through a wall or ceiling. "If you must go through a combustible wall, you'll have to allow an 18 inch clearance all around the pipe. Or, you can use a section of approved factory-built chim-

As for hooking the stove pipe to a masonry chimney, you'll need to extend the connector through the masonry wall of the chimney to the inner face of the flue liner (not beyond), and cement it to the masonry. It's important to use high-temperature cement.

Remember that every stove needs a damper or draft regulator to help control combustion. If yours is automatic, be sure it's installed according to the manufacturer's instruc-

The Chimney

Your chimney should be inspected before installing your stove and annually thereafter. If you are buying a factory-built chimney, be sure it has recognized testing laboratory approval. If you are connecting to an existing fireplace chimney, you must seal off the chimney below the stove pipe's point of entry to prevent toxic gases from coming into the room. Mann added that it's dangerous to connect more than one heating device to a single flue.

As for chimney maintenance, remember that cresote residue accumulates on a relatively cool chimney lining and, when ignited, causes an extremely dangerous fire. To prevent creosote build-up, maintain a moderate fire--hot enough to prevent a cool flue liner, but not so hot that it ignites creosote already form-

Burn only dry, well-seasoned hardwood. (Green wood produces large amounts of creosote and is especially dangerous in an "air-tight" stove; trash is highly flammable and will produce a sudden, hot fire.)

Above all, never start a fire with gasoline, kerosene or other flammable liquids. And don't use artificial logs in your stove. The gases generated could cause an explosion.

To melt small amount of creosote on your flue lining, burn you stove hot once a day,

#### Dec. 1 Last Day **To Ship Citrus Fruit Gift Packs**

AUSTIN- Now is the time to place orders for citrus fruit packs says Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown. And although the idea of giving food as Christmas gifts isn't new, notes Brown, it may solve that dilemma of what to give someone who has everything.

December 1 is the deadline for shipping fruit to many areas of the country. During peak days 10-12

trucks, each carrying 1,400-1,500 gift packages, will leave the Lower Rio Grande Valley bound for 43 central post offices in and out of state. From there the fruit will be delivered fourth class through the mail to its final destination.

Brown said the shipping deadline will be December 10 D.C., New York City and other places where orders are regulations, countless reports would have to be filed—over a required to complete

deliveries. Shipping is coordinated by the Texas Gift Package Shippers Inc., a 27-year-old arm of the Texas Citrus and Vegetable Growers and Shippers. The shipping organization is handling packages this season for 35 growers, most with small acreage. Large producers also ship gift packs, but usually

handle their own mailing. According to Bill Weeks, executive director of the shipping organization, fruit in gift packs is premium quality, large and without blemishes. It is often packed in individual wrappers in boxes filled with colorful shredded cellophane. Packages may be as simple as an eight-pound box of six grapefruit, or as elaborate as a bushel of oranges and grapefruit supplemented with Texas avocados, pecans and a

smoked ham or turkey. Weeks said quarter and half bushels are the most popular sizes. Seventy-pound boxes are also shipped during the holidays, most likely to business people who give citrus as gifts. He said Ruby Red grapefruit is the most popular item, but oranges are also in demand. Star Ruby grapefruit, a cousin to the Ruby Red, gets premium prices because of its relatively small volume of production. Both varieties have deep pink meat and are naturally sweet.

At a time when the price of oil is rising sky-high, it certainly doesn't make sense to adopt useless government regulations on oil production that will drive up the price even more.

Yet, the Environmental Protection Agency has proposed that drilling mud be regulated as a "hazardous waste." This action could more than double the cost of drilling for oil and gas. Drilling mud is a clay used at wells to bring up pieces of rock ground up by the drilling bit. The mud also serves to cool the bit. After use the mud is dumped into pits and allowed to dry.

As a result of this legislation, existing state and federal pro-

next two years, while the EPA focuses its regulatory efforts on wastes that pose more significant hazards. The American people are rightfully concerned about slipshod handling of hazardous substances. The impact of hazardous substances on our lives has generated a widespread sense of urgency

that these compounds must somehow be controlled.
