Ten students have become charter members of the International Thespian Society.

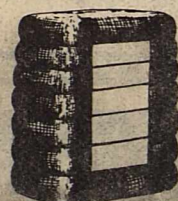

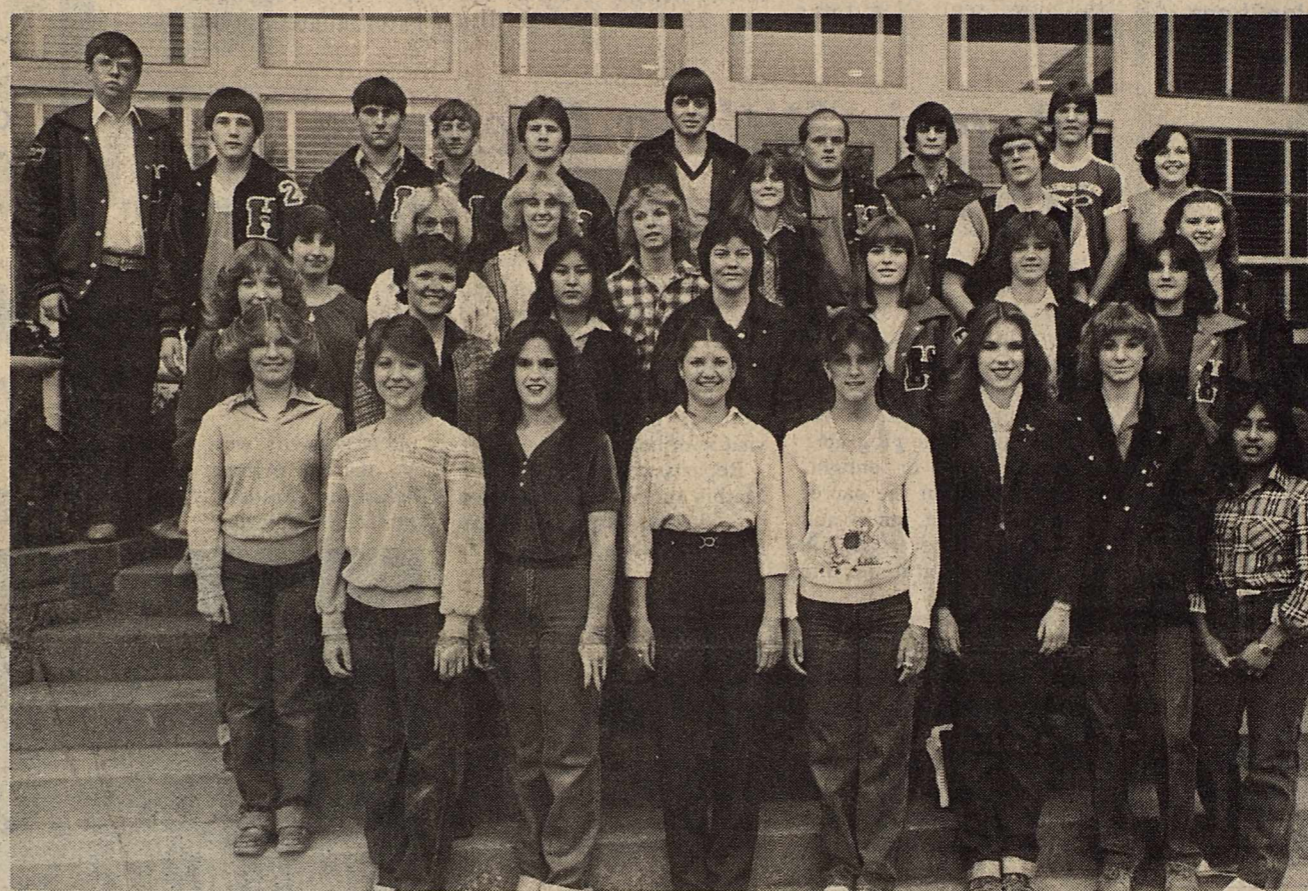

Rent-A-Student Services Offered



Students Available

Washing windows, baby sitting and leaf raking are just a few of the many jobs students can be "rented" to do for local citizens.

The "rent-a-student" service is a fund raising project for juniors and seniors who will be participating in a tour of Washington D.C. March 23-26.

The students may be "rented" for work needed to be done at homes and businesses in the community. Anyone interested in hiring a student should contact one of the students in the picture.

The forty-one students are members of Miss Anne Middleton's world history or civics classes, and this trip will be a "government-in-action" learning experience for them.

The four day tour will include the Capitol, the White House, a day at the Smithsonian Institute, Arlington National Cemetery and many other historical monuments in the city.

"I am so pleased that the school is allowing these students to take this journey in such an exciting political year. Not only will we be able to see the working government first hand, but we will also experience the history behind today's government," said Miss Middleton.

County Appraisal District Beginning New Operation

The Haskell County Appraisal District is an agency created by virtue of voter action on a proposed constitutional amendment in 1979 and the subsequent enabling legislation approved by the Texas Legislature.

The local appraisal district is governed by both the state laws that dictate the duties and functions of such districts and by board of directors elected by the various taxing entities. Members of the local board are Donald Griffis, Delbert LeFevre, W. M. Reid, with Billy Middlebrook serving as secretary, and Pat Hale serving as chairman.

The Haskell County Appraisal District began operations on

November 1, 1980 when the board of directors appointed Kyle G. Wilfong as Chief Appraiser and adopted a budget for 1981 of \$167,500.00.

The District's purpose is to consolidate all of the taxing jurisdictions in each county to provide an equal appraisal of all property. The District is also responsible for providing the 1982 tax roll to each taxing jurisdiction in the county.

The taxing jurisdictions included are the independent school districts of Haskell, Paint Creek, Rochester, Rule and Weinert; the cities of Haskell, O'Brien, Rochester, Rule and Weinert; the North Central

Texas Municipal Water Authority and the Weinert Water District; Haskell County and Haskell Memorial Hospital.

The appraisal district is mandated by state law to bring all values up within 10 percent of market value for every class of property. But because the individual taxing jurisdictions will still have control of the tax rate, the higher values will not necessarily result in higher taxes.

The appraisal district staff is currently in the process of getting the records from the individual taxing jurisdictions and updating these records to meet new state standards. In the coming months, the staff will be visiting all property in the county to verify the information that is being received from the jurisdictions.

The staff, which includes Kyle Wilfong, Charlene Brothers, Becky Gordy, Brenda Turner, and Jamie Weaver, is also in the process of buying supplies and setting up an office.

The district will be writing several articles in the next few months to inform the public of the progress of the office and any changes affecting the taxes of the county.

New Crop Insurance Program Announced

With a new government subsidy that pays up to 30 percent of the cost of carrying crop insurance, the best buy in farming today may be the few dollars an acre (tax deductible) that it costs to insure all the other dollars invested in producing a crop.

This advice comes from Ben A. Jordan, Jr., Regional Director of the recently expanded Federal Crop Insurance Corporation.

Jordan suggests that there are no fewer than five sound reasons farmers should consider insurance this year, even if they have never protected their crop investments in the past.

First, the new policies offer more protection. Policyholders can insure up to 75 percent of average yields, which in most cases should fully cover the investment in the insured crop plus the cost of the insurance.

They can also select, from several choices, the amount they want to be paid for each bushel or pound their crop

falls short of the guaranteed production.

Second, the new federal subsidy can reduce the per acre cost of carrying all-risk insurance by as much as 30 percent. The combination of the subsidy and the tax deduction allowed for insurance premiums means the after-tax cost is only a small fraction of the protection provided.

Third, rising production costs mean the dollars and cents risks of crop production this Spring will be sharply higher than a year ago. In the event of crop losses, such as many farmers experienced in 1980, the financial consequences could be disastrous. Many farmers who have felt they could afford to farm without some amount of insurance in the past are now wisely reappraising the risks involved, Jordan said.

Fourth, the USDA disaster payments program, which some farmers have looked to as a solution for insurance,

will end after this crop year. Farmers who elect to carry FCIC insurance in 1981 rather than participate in the disaster payment will be eligible for the 30 percent discount plus, if they do not incur a crop loss, an additional 5 percent premium discount in 1982.

Fifth, farmers who insure their crop investment will have an advantage, Jordan predicts, in competing for credit in this Spring's tight money market. The cash flow guaranteed by the policy assures a source of funds for timely loan repayment even in the event of a total crop loss. Moreover, at the option of the policyholder, FCIC policies can be pledged as loan collateral.

Taxpayer Assistance Available From IRS

January is traditionally a time of beginnings and the Internal Revenue Service is beginning its taxpayer assistance program for the new filing period.

"With relatively few changes in the tax forms this year, we expect that taxpayers may find the forms a bit less challenging," said Robert Fonck, IRS Director's Representative for Wichita Falls.

"Nevertheless, our taxpayer assistance program will be operational from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. each weekday to help taxpayers with their tax questions." To call IRS toll-free, dial 1-800-492-4830.

Taxpayers who require walk-in assistance may wish to stop by the IRS office located in the Triad Building, 2910 Kemp Street, Suite 200. Or they may wish to take advantage of the free tax preparation service offered by the Volunteer Income Tax Assis-

tance (VITA) Program. Community volunteers including members of Community Action Program, Beacon Light House for the Blind, Sacred Heart Catholic Church, and IRS employees will assist low income, disadvantaged, and handicapped taxpayers at libraries, post offices and other convenient neighborhood locations.

Taxpayers who are age 60 and older can avail themselves of the Tax Counseling for the

Elderly Program sponsored by the American Association of Retired Persons/National Retired Teachers Association (AARP/NTRA). AARP members, who have been trained in the special tax concerns of the elderly, will prepare tax returns free of charge throughout the filing period.

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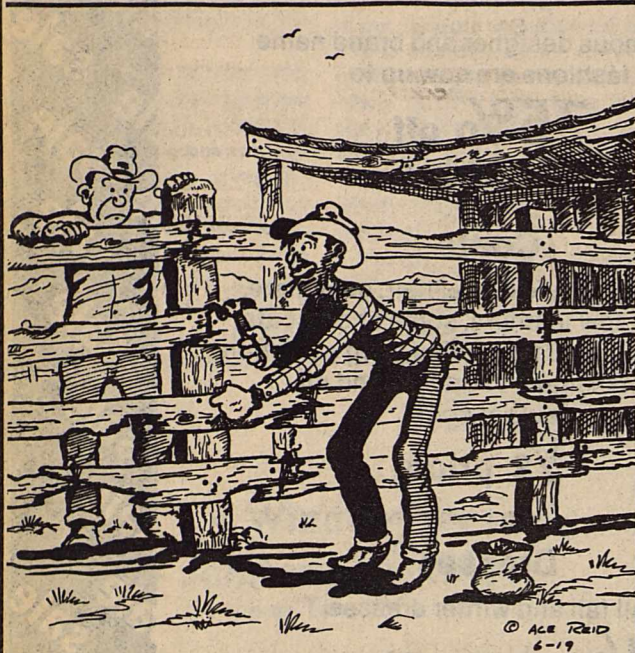

Study reports, homes could cost \$134,000 by 1990

COLLEGE STATION — A study prepared by the Texas Real Estate Research Center at Texas A&M University reports the average Texas home could cost \$134,000 by 1990, more foreign investors will be snapping up Texas real estate and despite rising costs the single-family, detached home is here to stay.

Compiled by university researchers, the figures show the average sale price of a single-family home in Texas at the beginning of 1980 was \$54,900. This is a 12 percent per year increase since 1976 when compounded annually. The average Texas home four years ago sold for \$34,700.

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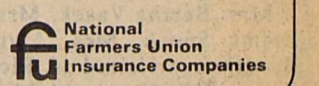
