

City Council Discusses Taxes

Taxes and the Haskell County Tax Appraisal District were the major topic during the regular meeting of the Haskell City Council meeting Tuesday night.

Council members discussed a state law which requires that all values be placed at 100% of market value during 1981. City values are currently at 33 1/3% and the tax rate has been \$1.50 per \$100.00 value.

Council members agreed to triple the value of property and reduce the rate to 50%. This move would meet state requirements and enable the city to collect the same amount of taxes. City Attorney John Fouts was asked to prepare an ordinance effecting the change to be adopted at a later meeting.

Council members also discussed the Haskell County Tax Appraisal District with chief appraiser Kyle Wilfong.

Mayor Royce Williams reported on the receipt of room occupancy tax in the amount of \$716.72 and

WTU franchise tax in the amount of \$9,121.09.

In other action, council members set the City Election for April 4 and also agreed to advertise for bids on an oil lease at the airport.

Two Injured In Accident

Two Haskell County residents were injured Tuesday in a truck accident six miles south of Old Glory.

Ricki Russell and Merle Ledbetter were both admitted to Stamford Memorial Hospital following the accident.

Both were reported in satisfactory condition Tuesday afternoon.

The two were in an oil field service truck when the accident occurred.

Public School Week Activities Announced

Members of the Haskell School Board approved students' plans for a trip to Washington D.C. Tuesday night during their regular meeting. The board also agreed to furnish transportation for the group to and from DFW airport.

Board members set open house dates for Tuesday, March 3 at the elementary school and Thursday, March 5 at the Junior High and High School.

School Board elections were set for April 4 at the Community Center with Norman Nanny as Election Judge and Charlene Therwanger serving as Absentee Clerk.

Also during the meeting, board members adopted the new 1981-1982 calendar.

Due to Spring Break, March 9-13, the date for the next meeting of the School Board has been changed to March 6.

Grand Opening Set At ECC

The grand opening of the newly completed Haskell County Experienced Citizens Center will be held February 15 at 2:30 p.m.

The new facility was completed recently and has been in use since November.

The building, located at 1404 South First, was furnished and equipped with donations from groups and individuals in Haskell County.

The facility is open to all residents of the County over 55 years of age.

In addition to the arts, crafts and games sponsored at the center, a nutrition program is also conducted.

The nutrition program includes a balanced lunch served every Monday, Wednesday and Friday free to everyone over 60. Persons under 60 may eat for \$2.00 each and donations are also accepted.

The nutrition program is currently serving about 100 meals.

In the arts, crafts and games

portion of the program there are approximately 325 persons enrolled.

The center is open Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. and is staffed by about 20 persons including volunteers.

A van has also been acquired and schedules are being planned to provide transportation to the center from all parts of the county.

Persons who do not have transportation and would like to participate in activities at the center are asked to contact Marsha Whittemore, director, at 864-3875.

Donations to complete furnishings at the center are still being accepted and may be given at the center or at Haskell National Bank.

This week, the United Methodist Women of First United Methodist Church in Haskell will hold one of their most important annual observances—the Call to Prayer and Self-Denial. The program will be held at 3 o'clock on Feb. 15, 1981, in Fellowship Hall. Major events of the observance include the Quiet Day and descriptions of the

mission projects for which a special offering is given.

The Women's Division of the General Board of Global Ministries of the United Methodist Church sponsors the Call to Prayer and Self-Denial.

"Children: Advocacy and Ministry" is the theme for giving this year. In the United States, the offering may be used for projects such as a center for abused and neglected children and their parents, a special weekend day care center in a women's prison where inmates may care for their own children at that time, an integrated day care center and community resource exchange in Mississippi, a school for Lakota (Sioux) children which teaches their cultural values as well as the "three R's," a United Methodist hospital which

specializes in pediatrics in a poverty-stricken Hispanic border community, or a project for the early detection and prevention of developmental retardation among children.

Examples of projects from other countries which may receive support include a training program for deaf children in Hong Kong, new facilities for mentally retarded children in Chile, community mental health projects in Nigeria, "rescue centers"

About 1.5 million women in 33,000 local units in all 50 states will join in the observance. Last year, the offering totaled \$829,209, an increase of \$14,048 over the previous year.

CAPITOL UPDATE

During the past few decades, we Americans have witnessed the steady, painful growth of our federal government. It has curtailed our freedoms, wreaked havoc on our economy and changed many aspects of the way we conduct our lives both at work and at home.

President Reagan has gotten off to a fast start, and I applaud his moves to show that he is serious in his efforts to put government in its place.

Within minutes of taking the oath of office, he has imposed a tough federal hiring freeze.

He has ordered cuts in government spending on travel and ended the constant round of office redecorating that always seems to be underway in Washington.

And he has vowed to attack federal red tape by naming Vice President George Bush to head a task force to study ways we can thin out federal regulations on businesses and individuals.

This new hiring freeze shows promise of being more effective than those imposed in the past, which often fell victim to the momentum that has built up within the federal bureaucracy. The new Administration's hiring freeze could reduce the number of federal workers by 6 percent a year.

And the President's efforts to trim government spending on travel and the use of outside consultants could create an additional savings to the taxpayers of up to \$300 million in this year alone.

Along with the growth of the federal bureaucracy has come a corresponding growth in federal regulations and the President made the dramatic decision to halt action on all pending federal regulations for 60 days.

There is a clear and urgent need for such a move, especially in light of bushels of last-minute regulations promulgated in the last days before the arrival of a new Administration.

This freeze on implementing new regulations will allow the Administration to take a careful look at what needs to be trimmed.

I also believe we can expect a rejection of past attempts at regulatory reform through the addition of even more paperwork that accompanies the establishment of agencies created to review other agencies.

And I expect a new approach to be taken in analyzing new regulations. I hope that the current system will be replaced by one that will limit new regulations on those where benefits exceed the costs. At the very least agencies should be able to prove a reasonable relationship between the costs they impose and the benefits they anticipate.

Superintendent's Views

Haskell ISD is in the process of giving the TABS test to students in Grades, 3, 5 and 9. This is a state wide test mandated by the 1978 legislature. The testing instrument is designed to test minimum competencies in language arts, math and writing. Approximately 700,000 students will be given the test between February 2nd and February 20th. We will receive state results, local results, regional results, and individual results. These will be available to the public in May or June.

Last year, the TABS was given to the 5th and 9th grades. Haskell students did quite well on the test. They were well above the state average and one of the higher schools in the regional. We showed an especially high level in math.

However, before we go overboard in patting ourselves on the back and becoming smug concerning our program, we must consider what the test really covers. When the test is referred to as a test of minimum competencies, it is definitely referring to "minimum." While there is a

definite correlation between our other achievement tests and the TABS on an individual basis, the other tests are much more comprehensive.

We can use the test results to identify certain minimum competencies that we are not addressing sufficiently, but I, for one, do not believe we should be satisfied with just the minimum standard. Our students, I believe, deserve more than just the minimum.

Also, the TABS ignores such curriculum areas as social studies, science, career, etc. It is good that we have a guideline to check our work in instruction. It certainly helps

Proper Planning Aids In Growing Garden

You probably have a good reason for wanting to grow a garden. Maybe it's because you like to be outdoors next to the good earth and let the fertile soil run through your fingers. Maybe it's because you like the taste of fresh vegetables right out of the garden. Or maybe it's because you dropped \$100 on your last trip to the supermarket.

Regardless of the reason, you want to grow a garden. So where do you start? Certainly not with your hands in your pockets looking at pretty seed packets at the local garden center or nursery. You've got to do it right. Think. Plan.

First, make sure you have room for a garden. You won't need a lot of space if you are a beginner with an average size family. Perhaps your garden might only be 20 feet by 20 feet, or maybe even less.

Whatever the size garden you have, think in terms of four basic requirements. First of all, you need sunlight because all vegetables need some sunlight. And, believe it or not, most vegetables must have full sunlight for highest yields of quality produce. Unless you are concentrating on leaf or bulb crops like broccoli, collards, spinach or onions, your crops need every ray of sunshine that is available.

The next thing to consider is closeness of your garden. Put it as near to the back door as possible. Make bringing home the fruits of your labor a

pleasant and enjoyable chore. The out-of-sight, out-of-mind principle applies here. A garden does not demand constant care and attention, but it will thrive and do better if you visit it about once a day. If you do not check it regularly, many insects and diseases which are a problem in Haskell County or maybe even lack of water can destroy your garden in a short period of time. So put the garden close to the house where watching it will not be a hassle.

Next, consider the soil. Realistically, there is not much you can do about changing the type of soil you have in your yard. But, ideally, the soil should be fertile and easy to till, with just the right texture—a loose, well-drained, loamy soil. If your backyard soil does not meet these specifications 100 percent—and let's face it, not many soils in Haskell County do—don't panic. You can work it into shape without breaking your back.

Avoid areas heavily infested with Johnsongrass, nutgrass and other weeds. Don't put your garden on a rocky ledge or in a poorly drained area. All of these things make gardening more difficult.

The next thing to consider is availability of water. Your garden should be near a spigot or at least easily reached with a garden hose. It's no poor reflection on Mother Nature, but unfortunately, it doesn't

always rain in Haskell County when it's needed. In a typical year, your garden will need watering about once a week.

After considering all of these things and you still want to grow a garden, now you are ready for the planning stage.

The first step in planning is selecting vegetables you want to grow. Plant vegetables you like to eat. Avoid those that your family doesn't usually buy on trips to the local grocery store. With a few exceptions, you can plant almost anything in your garden you want.

After you have made the decisions in step one, then step two is the tough part, but it's worth it. Make a rough diagram or drawing of your garden. Indicate the number of rows and vegetables you wish to plant. Also show the desired location of each crop in your garden, number of plants or feet of row you want to plant, and the best time to plant.

You will find the plan will help you make deadlines you would otherwise put off until it's too late, help you make decisions on what you need to buy at the local garden center or nursery, and put some order into your expected gardening activities.

Marriage Tax Under Attack

A federal tax on marriage? Not exactly, but Congressman Jim Collins of Texas has introduced a bill that would repeal the so-called "marriage tax" which now penalizes working couples by making them pay more federal income tax solely because they are married.

"The time has come when this marriage tax should be repealed. I have introduced my bill to give equal treatment to married couples. It makes no sense for the federal government to punish marriage," Collins said.

According to the Texas congressman, under the current IRS system, a married couple earning \$12,000 each

annually must pay \$566 more in taxes yearly than if they were single (and only living together). If each spouse makes \$18,000 per year, they must pay \$1,301 in additional federal taxes simply because they are married.

Another aspect of the "marriage tax" that most negatively affects newly-married couples is that they must pay the higher tax rate for an entire year even if they were single part of the year.

"Let's say two working people—one earning \$12,000 a year, the other earning \$18,000 a year—were married at the end of December. All through the year, while they were single and working, they had federal taxes withheld at the applicable rate for single people. But when they file their tax return they must pay an additional \$779 because they got married during that calendar year—they are penalized with the full "marriage

tax" for an entire year even if they got married on Dec. 31st," Collins said.

He noted that the "marriage tax" is a disincentive to marriage and penalizes many two-income families who are also battling high inflation

rates. "We already have more taxes than the American people can afford to pay, but that the systems has such a built-in inequity is too unfair and should be corrected by Congress immediately," Collins said.



Sen. Farabee Files Two War On Drug Bills

Senator Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls has filed two bills developed by H. Ross Perot and the Texans' War on Drugs Committee. The filing of the bills was announced Wednesday, February 4, at a capitol news conference.

Senator Farabee said, "The bills we filed Wednesday are aimed at stopping the multi-million dollar drug trafficking which is taking place all over Texas, all of the time."

Senate Bill 393 will provide for stiffer penalties for drug traffickers dealing in large quantities of illegal drugs. This is designed to facilitate the apprehension of the large scale operators of the drug trade. Currently it is virtually impossible to apprehend these

major conspirators because they operate through a chain of subordinate dealers. This bill clearly defines the offenses of trafficking in addictive drugs and marijuana and the offense of financing of or investment of funds derived from illegal trafficking. It also provides means for the State to confiscate funds obtained in illegal drug sales. Persons convicted of dealing in large amounts of drugs will actually serve jail sentences.

The other bill, S.B. 394, requires triplicate prescriptions for such drugs as morphine, amphetamines, methamphetamine and methaqualone (Quaaludes). Three copies of such prescriptions will be made, one going to the prescribing physician, one to the pharmacist, and one to the Department of Public Safety. A strict system of security will be programmed into the DPS computer where prescription records are stored to protect legitimate patients. Perot points out that this procedure is currently in effect in four states, where it has substantially eliminated prescription forgeries and significantly reduced the diversion of legal, but commonly abused prescription drugs to the illegal market.

Three other bills are included in the Texans' War on Drugs package. Senator Bill Meier of Euleus is sponsoring a bill calling for a mandatory five-year minimum sentence for any drug dealer 21 years

Fishing Calendars Offered By TP&WD

For which fish species does February feature excellent fishing?

Certainly, largemouth bass and white bass come to mind. News of hot fishing action for these two species has been filling space in outdoors reports for the past couple of weeks.

But other varieties of finfish can be expected to produce above-average fishing opportunity during the month. In freshwater, February is a good month for crappie,

striped bass, rainbow trout and walleye, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's "Update Your Fishing" calendar.

In saltwater, the month rates near the top for catching black drum, sheepshead and redfish, according to the saltwater version of the calendar.

Compiled by department biologists and displayed in the table form, the saltwater and freshwater calendars illustrate

the availability of the different species and the periods when best catches usually can be made.







The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN—On March 6 the University of Texas Medical School at Houston Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Science and our office will sponsor a public symposium entitled, "A PLACE TO COME HOME." The purpose of the symposium is to provide a forum for discussing new programs and methods of caring for our growing elderly population, especially those who are in nursing homes.

Approximately four percent of the elderly reside in nursing homes and the number is growing. For example, right now there are more than 25 million citizens in this country who are defined as "elderly"—those 65 years of age and older. This is approximately eleven percent of the population. Because of continuing improvements in medical care and nutrition, the number of elderly citizens is expected to increase over the next fifty years so that by the year 2035, twenty percent of the population of this country—55 million people—will be elderly.

The participants in the symposium program include experts from a number of disciplines: medical, legal, social and the nursing home industry. The symposium will draw from each of these disciplines in order to help insure that present and future elderly citizens encounter their younger years.

This theme is well reflected in comments made by some of the participants about the concerns they will address in the upcoming symposium:

Dr. Louis A. Faillace, professor and chairman of psychiatry and behavioral sciences, UT Medical School at Houston, explains the need for an interdisciplinary approach: "Though an elderly person may reside in a nursing home, this does not mean that the spiritual, fiscal, legal and educational aspects of his life disappear. Excepting their more intense medical needs, nursing home residents have the same concerns and needs as anyone else."

Dr. Guy Shuttlesworth, associate professor of social work, UT Austin, says about community involvement in nursing homes: "It is very

important to create a natural environment in nursing homes, to put as much of the community into the home as possible through such programs as area volunteers, 'grandparent adoption', and transportation to places outside the home, such as special events and continuing education."

Dell Hagan, president of the American College of Nursing Home Administrators, describes the pressing need to recruit and retain nurses in long-term care facilities: "Nursing and medical students should do an internship or clinical rotation in a nursing home or other long-term care facility. We must realize that there are more nursing home beds in this country than there are hospital beds."

Dr. Robert Bernstein, Commissioner, Texas Department of Health, says the role of the physician in the care of the elderly is very important: "The more physician involvement there is, the less overmedication and hospitalization of nursing home residents."

Other participants in the symposium include: Dr. Kenneth Chafin, pastor of South Main Baptist Church in Houston, will speak on "Moral Responsibilities, ethical obligations;" Dr. Larry Kimsey, associate professor at UT Medical School, Houston, will provide an overview of neglect in nursing homes; Dr. Arthur Tarbox, assistant professor at UT Medical School, Houston, will define categories of neglect; and Betty Dunn, R. N., will discuss nursing homes as a therapeutic environment.

Our office will be represented by David Bragg, Chief of the Consumer Protection and Antitrust Division.

The symposium, which is open to the public, will be held March 6, 1981, at the L.B.J. Conda O. Richards, Brian C. Richards and Garland H. Richards will host the Chadbourne Ranch Chianina production in Bronte Friday, April 24, 1981.

A special feature will be a Genesis heifer named "Rehab 1," with all proceeds of this animal being donated to the West Texas Rehabilitation Center for Crippled Children. The Rehab Center maintains campuses in Abilene, San Angelo, and Snyder.

Rehab 1 was sired by Maranatha IG. Maranatha IG and Maranatha 2G are the only producing daughters of Ivrea. The owner of Ivrea was offered \$100,000 and he turned it down.

Maranatha IG is a full sister to Micheangelo and Blue Sky Mark IV. Both have sired several champions. Genesis' bloodlines are also impressive.

Other offerings in the April 24 sale of Chianina include Miss Exterminator 4HFL, Marantha G1, Miss Fadino CR8, and the bull, Shad.

Richards' interest in Chianina, and his fellow Chianina breeders, has led him to two years as president of the American Chianina Association, and he is now on the board of directors of the Southwest Chianina Association, which comprises Texas, Oklahoma, and New Mexico.

Chadbourne Ranch is a Richards family operation. C.O. and sons Brian, who run the livestock operation; Garland R., who manages the farming; and daughter Sallie, Mrs. Tom Boeching, whose husband runs the Richards

bank in Ballinger; and daughter-in-law Linda Richards. Sallie and Linda handle the paperwork such as keeping records on the registered Chianina, doing the advertising for the ranch and cattle and closing the books.

The Chadbourne Ranch tie with the West Texas Rehabilitation Center goes back 22 years. Conda Richards' grandfather, the late Conda Wylie, is the father of the Cattleman's Round-Up for Crippled Children.

The story goes that Mr. Wylie came to WTRC executive director Shelley V. Smith and asked: "If I cut out some cattle for you when I round up this fall, do you think you can get some other fellows to go along with me in using part of our fall round-up to help toward the operational expenses of the Center?"

Almost spontaneously the CRCC was born and now raises near one quarter million dollars annually.

The Chadbourne Ranch runs about 2,200 animal units, including around 1,800 mother cows of which some 1,400 are commercial cattle, and produces about 1,200 calves each year. An 8-pasture rotation system is used to maintain peak grass production, and to take advantage of moisture variations from one end to the other of the sprawling ranch stretching on both sides of Highway 377 for several miles.


