Man's Identity **Not Known**

The badly decomposed body of a man was found last Wednesday in the southern part of Haskell County.

A preliminary report indicated that the man, who has not been positively identified, died from exposure.

The autopsy also showed that the man had been dead for four to six weeks. Investigators are currently

attempting to positively identify the man through fingerprints.

He was found about one mile north of Stamford just off Highway 6 in a pasture.

When one bystander told Mikeanna he'd won a bet because 'Tar Baby' was chosen the winner, she laughed. "I'm glad you had that much faith that we'd win. I wasn't all that sure."

On Friday, a crowd of about 700 filled the main floor of the Coliseum Arena. With flags flying and the

band playing, San Antonio Schlitz Beer Distributor, Jim Williams paid a record \$28,000 for 'Tar Baby'.

Williams said he plans to donate the steer to an educational scholarship fund.

A portion of the money earned is used by the Girl Scout Council to finance and maintain Council properties.


Cookies will sell for \$1.50 a box with 12 boxes to a case. Flavors include: Peanut Butter Sandwich.



Are we wasting food? If so, we're wasting our own money, too, while some of the nation's families don't have enough food, says Mary K. Sweeten, a food and nutrition specialist.

National statistics say many of the nation's families are wasting food--almost half of all the food we buy, the specialist reports.

Mrs. Sweeten is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Results of a 1977-78 national survey show that about 2,900 kilocalories enter a household every day, but only 1,800-1,900 kilocalories actually are consumed.
