## Write A Letter

# Postal Service Sponsoring National Letter Campaign

Finding fleas on the watchdogs of society is a favorite pastime in America, and it results in literally millions of letters to editors each year, many of which find their way into print.

As it prepared to observe National Letter-Writing Week April 26 through May 2, with emphasis on the contribution letters to editors make in influencing public opinion, the Postal Service noted that such letters often bring native wit out of the closet.

Some years back, for example, a reader wrote to the *New York Post*, "I read your paper every day. I wish your proofreader did, too."

More specific was the reader who reacted to the headline over an article about unemployment in the *Tucson Arizona Star*, which read: "Whom Should Be Laid Off First?"

Chided the reader, "The answer is obvious. Whom wrote the headline? Him should be laid off first."

The barbs aren't all one-sided. Sometimes the editor makes the kill.

Mark Twain, when he edited a newspaper in Missouri, received a letter from a subscriber who said he found a spider in the paper and wanted to know whether this was an omen of good or bad luck.

Twain replied that it was neither.

"The spider was merely looking over our paper to see

which merchant is not advertising so that he can go to that store, spin his web across the door and lead a life of undisturbed peace ever afterward."

Famed *New York Tribune* Editor Horace Greeley was notorious for his poor handwriting.

He was once invited to lecture before a group in Illinois, and responded with this letter, handwritten.

"Dear Sir: I am overworked and growing old. I shall be 60 on next February 3rd. On the whole, it seems I must decline to lecture henceforth, except in this immediate vicinity. If I go at all, I cannot promise to visit Illinois on that errand, certainly not now. Yours Truly, Horace Greeley."

A few days later he received this reply: "Dear Sir: Your acceptance to lecture before our association next winter came to hand this morning. Your penmanship not being the plainest, it took some time to translate it; but we succeeded and would say your time, February 3rd, and the terms, \$60, are entirely satisfactory. As you suggest, we may be able to get you other engagements. Respectfully, M. B. Castle."

Another distinguished editor, George Horace Lorimer, once received a letter from an irate reader who had submitted an article for publication and had it rejected.

She wrote: "Last week you rejected my story. I know that

you did not read it for, as a test, I pasted together pages 15, 16 and 17, and the manuscript came back with the pages still pasted. You are a fraud and you turn down stories without even reading them."

Mr. Lorimer replied: "Madam, at breakfast when I open an egg I don't have to eat the whole egg to know it is bad."

Many letters are written to editors and a few are chosen for publication.

Kalman Seigel, who retired last December as editor of the *New York Times* Letters-to-the-Editor column, reports he received 60,000 letters a year, of which only about 2,700 made it into print.

Because of the constraints of space and the volume of letters received, Seigel said, "Much comment of value must unhappily, even painfully, be bypassed."

But that should not discourage people from writing letters to editors, Seigel observed.

"If the democratic dialogue is to be a reality, then every letter in the mailbox makes its contribution," he said.

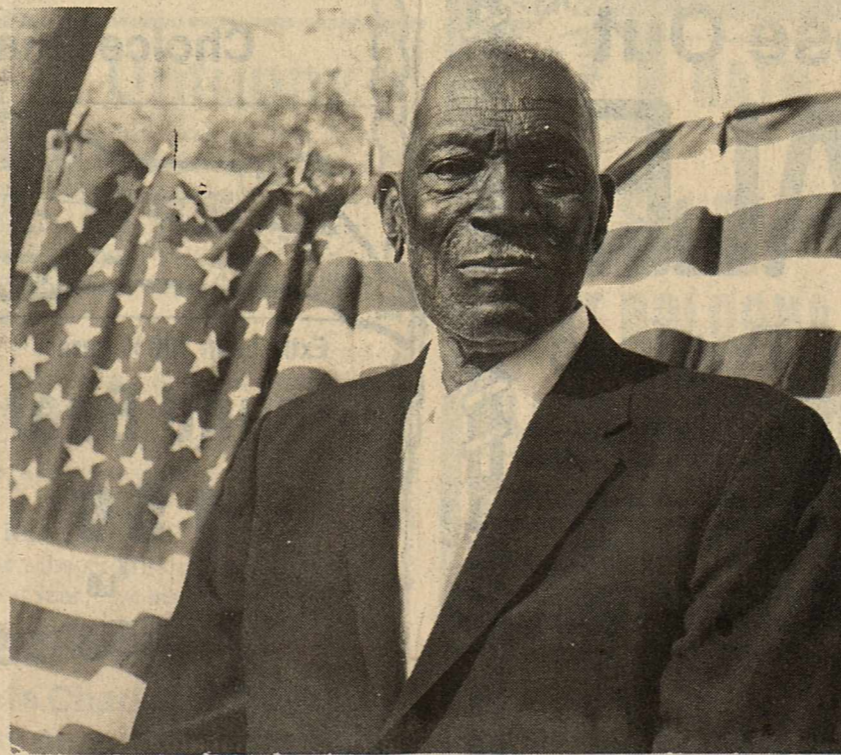

# Stenholm Discusses Issues With Local Club Members

Congressman Charles Stenholm addressed a joint meeting of the Lions, Rotary and Kiwanis Clubs in Haskell last Thursday.

The Congressman discussed issues facing Congress and answered questions during the luncheon meeting.

Discussing tax cuts, the Congressman said that the Congress would probably pass some kind of tax cuts. He added that he felt the need to balance the federal budget was more urgent than adopting tax cuts which could possibly cause more inflation.

A large portion of the meeting was spent discussing farm legislation. Stenholm told the audience that there was no such thing as a free market in agriculture because of foreign government involvement in price supports and purchases.

He emphasized the need for the

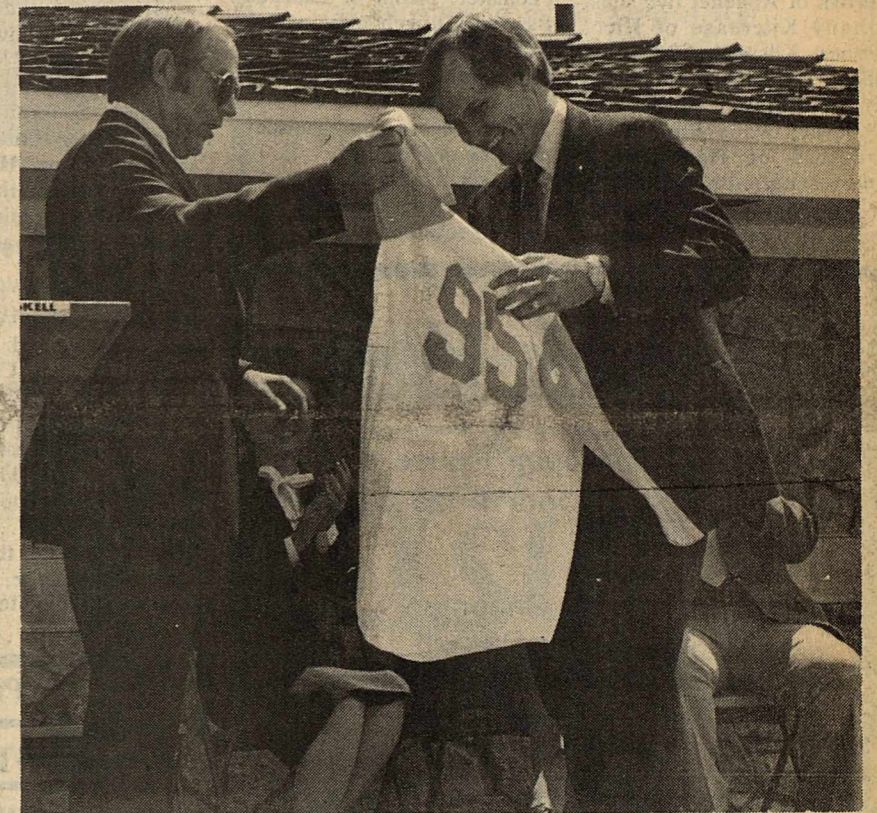
federal government to stop attempting to pay the American farmer for not producing and at the same time penalizing farmers for their efficiency.

He told those present that the cost of production of most agriculture products was higher than the average sale price of the crop and that America is facing a crisis in agriculture products if something is not done.

He compared the present

agriculture situation with the energy situation of the 1950's when President Eisenhower warned of a serious energy shortage.

The Congressman spoke of President Reagan's unpopular decision to decontrol oil and added that although unpopular the decision was in the best interest of the nation. He added that a similar decision would be necessary to prevent similar problems in agriculture.

## Farabee Appointed To Texas 2000 Commission

State Senator Ray Farabee has been appointed by Governor Bill Clements to serve on the newly-created "Texas 2000" Commission.

The Commission was formed to aid in the long-range planning program initiated by the Governor in the "Texas 2000" Project. In an executive order establishing the Commission issued April 10, 1981, Governor Clements sets up nine major areas related to the continued economic growth and development of the State.

Those areas are: population, economy, water, energy, transportation, agriculture, State and local finance, research and development, and future relations with Mexico.

In setting up "Texas 2000," the Governor stated, "One of the things I've noticed since taking office is the lack of any future, long-range data base that would permit us to address critical issues at an early time and thus help us control our own destiny."

Senator Farabee expressed pleasure at his appointment to the Commission, saying, "I am honored that the Governor asked me to participate in 'Texas 2000.' I feel that it is a much-needed program. A long-range planning program such as this will help pin-point the needs of the State and I feel in the end will aid the legislature and other governmental bodies in meeting those needs."

Senator Farabee is one of two senators appointed to the Commission. Senator Grant Jones of Abilene is the other. Other members are drawn from the private sector, the academic community and State agencies.

Dr. Victor Arnold of the L.B.J. School of Public Affairs is in charge of the "Texas 2000" Project. He managed a similar project several years ago in Minnesota.

Senator Farabee will serve a one-year term on the Commission.
