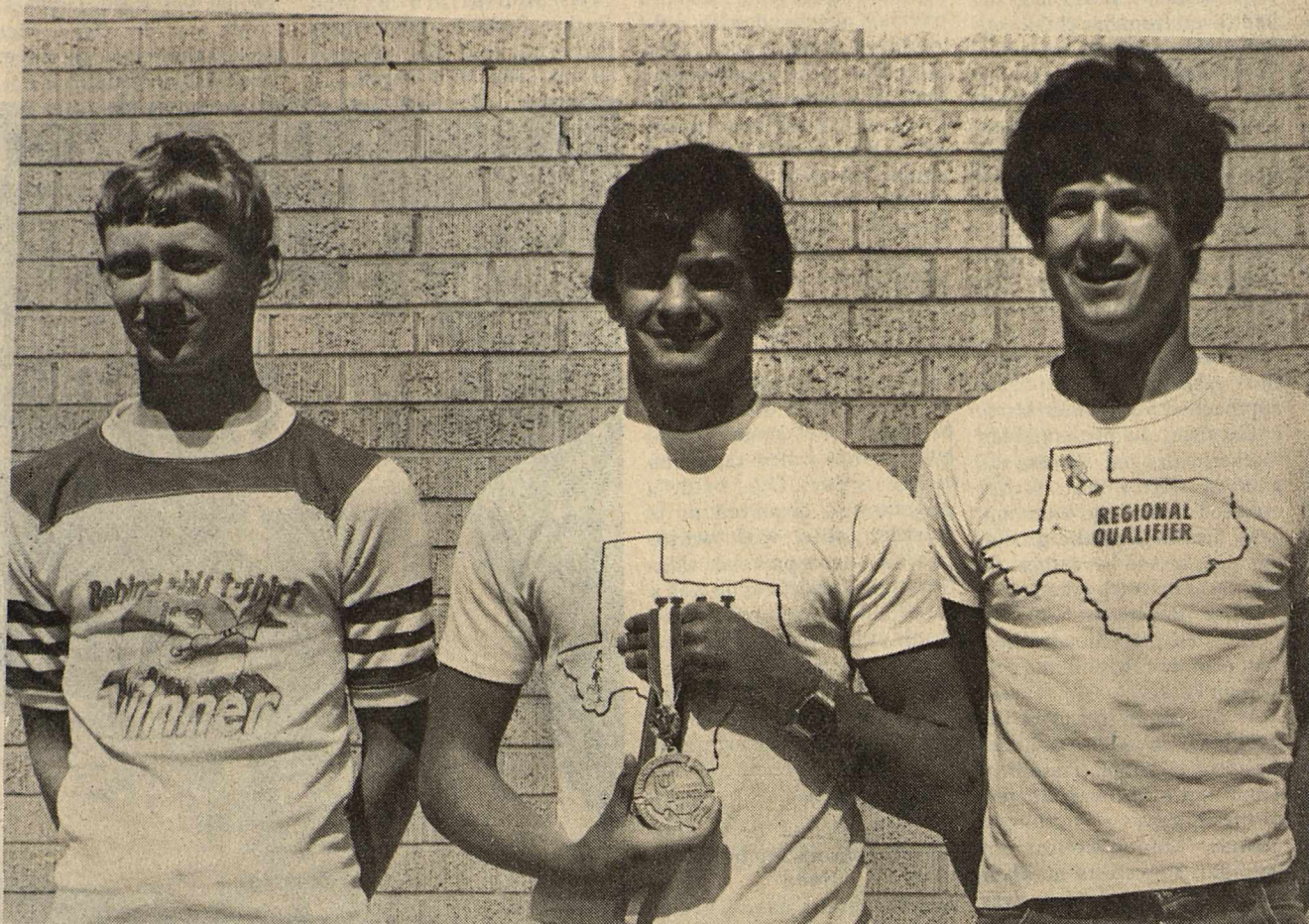

Rice Springs Rodeo Set This Weekend

Haskell will return to the days of the old west this weekend with the staging of the annual Rice Springs Rodeo Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

The week of activities started Tuesday with a giant barbecue and street dance on the east side of the courthouse.

Other activities will include a parade scheduled for 5 p.m. Thursday and three big performances of the rodeo beginning at 8 p.m. each night.

Admission to the rodeo is \$2.50 for adults and \$1.50 for children.

Runt Sloan of Newcastle is producing the rodeo which is

sponsored by the Haskell County Jaycees.

Rodeo events will include bull riding, saddle bronc riding, bare back riding, barrel racing, calf roping, pole bending and steer mugging.

Another giant street dance is scheduled to follow the rodeo on Saturday night. Music will be provided by Wes King and the Stampedes of Abilene. The dance will begin at 9 p.m.

During Thursday's parade a rodeo queen will be judged according to posture and riding ability. The rodeo queen will be named during the rodeo Thursday night.

Memorial Day Begins Summer Driving Season

The Memorial Day weekend marks the end of school and the beginning of the long summer vacation driving season. Summer vacations increase the number of vehicles on our highways.

Major C. W. Bell, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said, "Countless lives are lost each year because of drivers' disregard for their own safety or the safety of others. Carelessness, speed and the drinking driver account for a high percent of all traffic deaths."

The 55 MPH speed limit originally was instigated to conserve fuel, which it has done; but an ever

greater asset has been the saving of lives and the reduction of serious injuries in traffic accidents. Increasing your speed from 45 MPH to 60 MPH doubles your probability of being killed if you are involved in an accident; going from 60 MPH to 70 MPH doubles it again. That little extra speed could cost you your life.

Major Bell stated, "The best way to keep your vacation safe and accident-free is to keep your speed down, wear your seat belt, obey traffic laws and above all, do not drink and drive. Your safety and the safety of all your passengers is in your hands."

Soil Stewardship Week Scheduled For May 24-31

"Society's Pressure Point' is the theme of this year's national observance of Soil Stewardship Week and the Haskell Soil and Water Conservation District will join in the nationwide celebration of the observance scheduled for May 24-31," said R. V. Earles, chairman of the district.

"The purpose of Soil Stewardship Week is to remind all people that soil, water and related renewable resources are gifts from our Creator and that these gifts

warrant our best in creative conservation and considerate management," added Earles who is also one of five directors of the SWCD.

In reflecting on the theme of this year's observance Earles said that conservation districts state and nationwide are concerned about the shrinking resource base of soil and water caused by public pressures on these resources while at the same time contemplating the needs of an expanding world population.

Haskell Track Team Places 8th At State

Joseph Browning, Kerry Therwhanger, and Cary Hannsz earned a total of 16 points at the state track meet last weekend in Austin to earn eighth place for Haskell High School in the state competition.

Browning placed first in the 300 meter intermediate hurdles with a time of 38.5 and fifth in the 110 meter high hurdles with a time of 14.7.

Therwhanger placed fourth in the long jump with a jump of 21'10" and Hannsz placed seventh in the 800 meter run with time of 2:02.

Indian Head Coach Jim Baldwin told the *Free Press* Monday that no school records were kept for many years but that as far as could be determined Browning was the first to win a state title in track and field.

In speaking of the organization and structure of the Haskell SWCD Earles said that the district was organized in 1977 for the purpose of offering farmers, ranchers, and the local community a voluntary conservation technical assistance program through which individuals could seek and request conservation assistance to meet their individual land's capabilities and needs.

Sponsor of the national Soil Stewardship Week observance is the National Association of Soil and Water Conservation District. The organization has sponsored the annual event since 1955 in cooperation with the nation's nearly 3,000 soil and water conservation districts.

Material on the Soil Stewardship Week theme is distributed through local conservation districts to clergyman, lay leaders, civic and educational organizations and to individuals interested in participating in the celebration.

"Information and materials for this year's observance will be

delivered to the churches in the district by the Zone directors, F. A. Ulmer of Sagerton, Dan Wadzeck of Rochester, M. W. Phemister of Weinert, Johnny Wheatley of Haskell, and R. V. Earles of Paint Creek.

Buddy Poppy Sale Saturday

Representatives of Post 9179 Veterans of Foreign Wars will hold their annual Buddy Poppy sale this Saturday.

The Buddy Poppies are made by disabled and needy veterans and are sold annually by VFW members.

The story of the Buddy Poppy comes from the opening lines of the immortal poem by Col. John McCrae "in flanders fields the poppies blow...". The poem is dedicated to the memory of the men who fought and died in France during World War I, and the poppy has since become the true symbol of those who have given their lives in our nations wars.

The poppy has become recognized as the memorial flower in countries throughout the world and is distributed by veterans in America, Europe, and most countries of the British Commonwealth.

Since 1922, the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States has conducted an annual sale of "Buddy" Poppies to raise funds for its charitable programs on behalf of needy and disabled veterans, and the widows and orphans of deceased veterans.

It's Too Late For Bikini Season Dieting

That bikini in the store window would look so good if it weren't for this roll here and that lumpiness there...

A bathing suit and bulges is like a chocolate cake with chicken gravy. Unappetizing. There's just no way that flab and good looks can go together. Yet it's nearly time to put on our swimsuits and bravely parade our winter-white, slightly over-padded selves along the beach and beside the pool. But millions of Americans, determined to look more glamorous, will torture themselves with all sorts of crazy, illogical diets—from periodic starvation to

eating only grapefruit or hot dogs and bananas—in the attempt to lose those extra pounds. Moderation, not starvation, is the key to losing weight and staying healthy, says the Texas Medical Association.

In most cases crash diets lead only to bad nutrition and even vitamin deficiencies. Merely taking vitamin pills won't stop you from developing dangerous vitamin and mineral deficiencies while on a crash diet. Some vitamins must be eaten naturally in food to be effective, and others must be taken in combination with certain foods for the greatest benefit.

Crash diets also can lead to self-pity. After a few days on one of these strict and boring diet, we feel so sorry for ourselves that we blow the diet and go on a binge. Then we go right back to our previous eating patterns. So much for the diet and the bikini.

The reason many people have to go on diets in the first place is simply because they consume too many calories for their body to use each day. Calories not used as energy are stored in the body as fat. Despite what the books and magazines may say, the only sure way to lose that fat safely and keep it off is to get more exercise and to quit eating so much.

The best diet is one which is lower in calories but consists of a conventional mix of the four basic food groups: milk, meat, vegetable and fruit, breads and cereals. Try to select low-calorie fruits and vegetables over higher-calorie red meats, however.

What dieters often don't realize is the essential role of portions in dieting. The overweight person may actually eat more low-calorie foods than the slender one. But the slender person may eat a small salad and be satisfied, whereas the chubby person may eat a whole head of lettuce and a couple of tomatoes and still be hungry. The problem is eating too much.

To lose weight permanently you have to be aware of the number of calories you eat, not only in kinds of foods but in quantities as well.

Train yourself to push away from the table before you get that "filled up" feeling. By that time you're already stuffed, not merely filled. Use a small plate instead of a large one to eat from. A little bit of food will look like a lot more. Even try eating with child-sized utensils to make each mouthful seem like more. Never take seconds—even a salad. Eat five smaller meals each day instead of three big ones. Drink lots of water while dieting. And if you have a lot of weight to lose, remember to see your doctor for a check-up before starting off on the new you.

Most people eat much more than their bodies need. When you cut down on portions, remember not to cut down on the quality of your nutrition. Make every single calorie work for you.

Mr. and Mrs. Bob L. Melton hosted the rehearsal dinner at the Haskell Steak House.

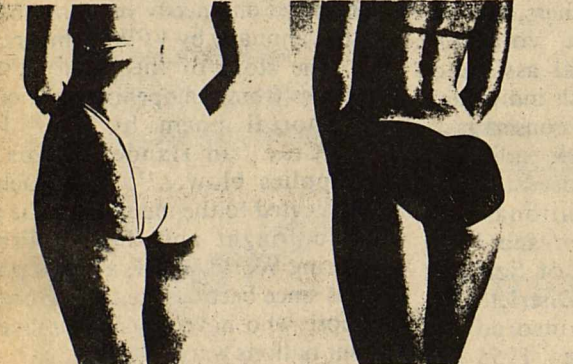

culture.

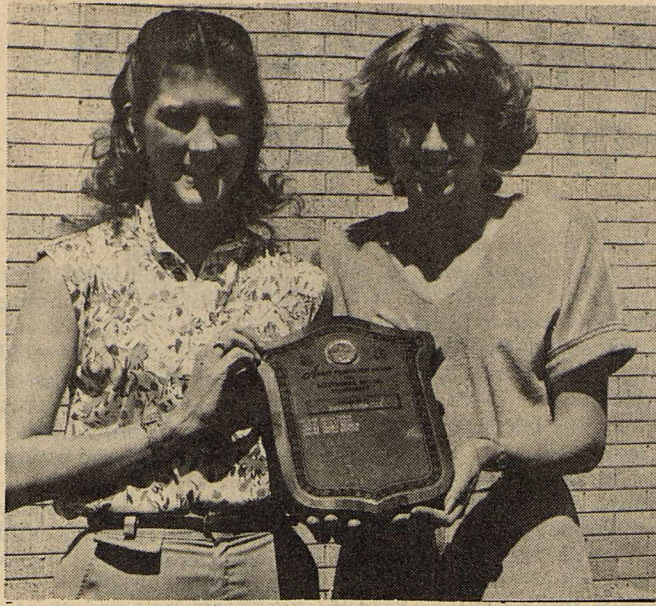
Jenkins, SHS valedictorian, has served as honor society president. He captured the "Bandsman of the Year" honor and also won awards in math, English, Latin and science.

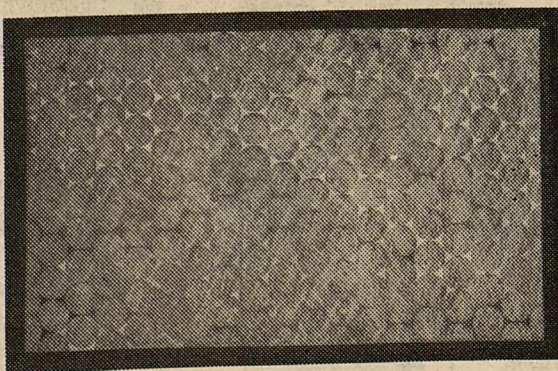

New Education Program Started For Big Country

Threshold, a program of educational enrichment for "Gifted and Talented Youth" of the Big Country, will debut at Hardin-Simmons University July 13-17 and July 20-24. But there won't be any admission tests, any checks of grade point averages, any probing of IQ's to see which fifth-ninth graders are eligible.

Instead, HSU is taking the word of the parents.

"We're shying away from test scores this time because we have just as much research that says that parents are reliable indicators of a child's ability as research that says test are the better indicators," Dr. Bertie Kingore, who is heading up the Threshold program, explained. "No parent who loves a child is going to sign up their kid knowing he'll be at the bottom of the barrel in a program like this."

So, with a parent's recommendation, \$65, and an early enough postmark (the classes are limited and will be filled on a first come-first served basis) students who will be in the fifth through ninth grades this fall can spend a week with a faculty that includes nine professors from HSU and two teachers from the Abilene Independent School District.

"This is a pilot program," Kingore admitted. "But there isn't a bone in my body that doesn't think we'll do it next year. We have an exciting program and some of our faculty members aren't even on campus this summer but are coming out just to teach the hour-and-a-half sessions!"

When Kingore arrived at HSU last fall to head up the university's Gifted and Talented Program, a summer project like this was a primary

concern. "I set up a dream list of courses my experience with gifted and talented told me kids would like," she said. "Then I went to the academic deans and the department heads and asked them to recommend professors who would be interested in teaching the classes."

In most cases she didn't have to look very far—six department heads are in the batch of nine HSU professors that will be teaching.

Dr. Richard Garner, head of the chemistry department, will teach his specialty; Dr. B. W. Aston, chairman of the history department, will teach "International Powers: Contemporary Relations Between Countries"; Billie Martin, head of the Department of Physical Education and Health, will teach aerobic routines; Dr. David Buratti, director of the university's Van Ellis Theatre, will teach "Creative Dramatics for 10-13 Year Olds"; Dr. J. G. Martin, head of the Department of Music Education and Church Music, will teach "Exploring Music"; and Dr. Cynthia Green, head of the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education, will teach "Puppetry Construction and Production."

Other classes will be taught by Dr. Edwin Hewett, associate professor in mathematics ("Daily Projects in Different Broad Math Areas"); Dr. Paul Peslak, associate professor in chemistry and physics ("Astronomy"); and Kingore, assistant professor in education ("Creativity: Developing/Utilizing Creative Potential").

Kathy Aldridge of A.I.S.D. will teach "Brainstretching: Logic, Brainstorming, Reasoning, Etc.," and Mary Laughlin

of A.I.S.D. will assist Hewett in the math class.

Each child will select three topics with classes running 9-10:30 a.m., 10:30-noon and 1-2:30 p.m. The 2:30-4:30 p.m. slot will be reserved for recreational activities such as swimming, bowling, and use of the game-room.

Each session runs Monday through Friday and a child may register for both sessions if the parents want.

The 80 students in the gifted and talented program in the A.I.S.D. have been notified of the program and brochures given to all teachers in the Abilene schools and distributed in all the schools in Region XIV (approximately a 50-mile radius of Abilene).

Anyone who needs more information about the program can call Dr. Kingore at HSU at 677-7281. Pre-enrollment will run through June 1, with other spots being filled (if any are available) up until class time.

The HSU Irvin School of Education will be offering an opportunity for area teachers who are interested in first-hand experiences with gifted and talented students simultaneously with Threshold. A course for elementary and secondary teachers, EDUC 5306, will meet July 10-July 28, 7-10:20 a.m.

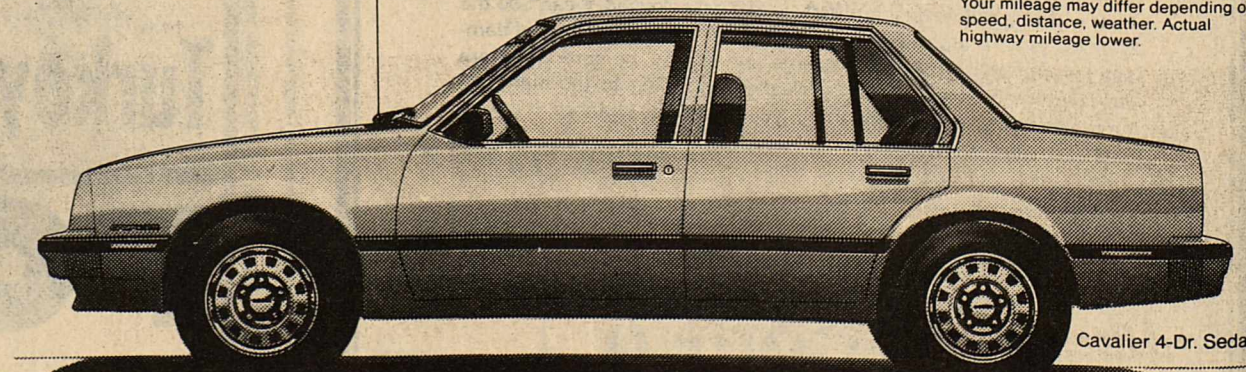

A portion of the cost is contributed by the public through their purchase of V.F.W. Buddy Poppies.

House Adopts County Road Bill

The House of Representatives has passed legislation to provide more money for the maintenance and construction of county roads. Senate Bill 150 was sponsored in the House by Representative Bill Haley, D-Center, and co-sponsored by Representative Bill Heatly, D-Paducah.

This bill increases the money that each county can keep in its Road and Bridge Fund from \$175,000 to a maximum of \$350,000. In addition, the processing fee which the tax assessor-collector's office keeps out of the vehicle license revenue will increase to \$1.50. These increases will be funded by a \$3.50 increase in the cost of licensing all automobiles in the state of Texas.

The \$3.50 increase in license plate fees will generate approximately \$46.6 million per year statewide with \$44.8 million or 96 percent staying in the counties.

As a result of this bill, Baylor County will receive an additional \$66,231 per year, Cottle County will receive \$21,168 more per year, Crosby County — \$83,555, Dickens County — \$30,519, Foard County — \$10,322, Garza County — \$50,338, Hardeman

County — \$76,855, Haskell County — \$105,571, Kent County — \$4,134, King County — \$1,244, Knox County — \$50,301, Shackelford County — \$58,981, Stonewall County — \$19,819, Throckmorton County — \$8,848, and Wilbarger County — \$141,152. These counties will retain 100 percent of the increased fees.


According to information prepared by Rep. Haley, each county in the state will benefit from this bill. Rep. Haley explained that this bill was supported by rural and urban counties in all areas of the state.

"The Legislature cannot maintain and construct county roads. But through this bill, we have provided the resources to enable the county commissioners and judges to improve these roads," commented Rep. Heatly. "Anyone who uses county roads will see the results of this bill when it goes into effect on July 1, 1982. I'm proud to have co-sponsored this bill which fulfills the commitment I made to do something to improve county roads."

Senate Bill 150 now returns to the Senate for approval of the House amendments and then goes to the Governor to be signed into law.





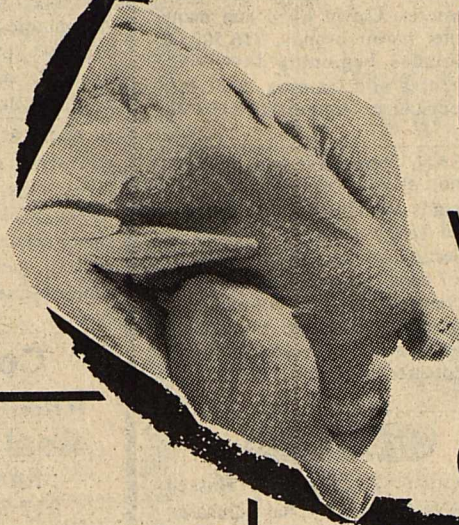
