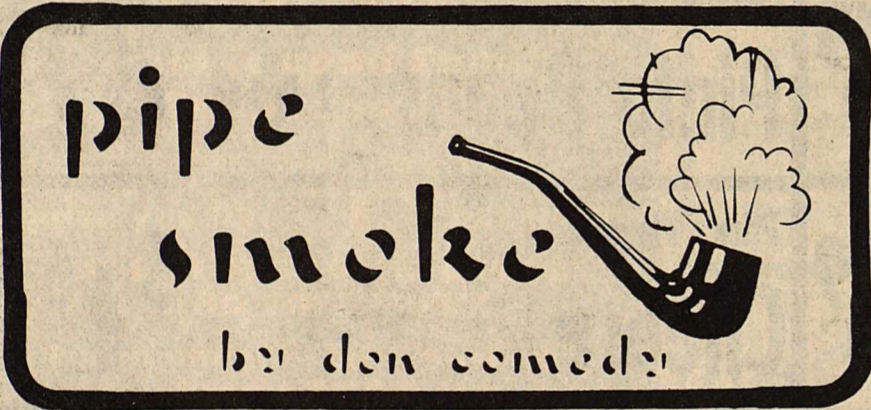

Reading Program To Begin Monday

It's Texas Reading Club time again! Mrs. Elsie McGee, librarian of the Haskell County Library, announces commencement of the Summer Reading Club on June 1.

That day, and on through the summer months children of kindergarten age on up are invited

to come in, sign your record logs and enjoy a summer of reading. 250,000 children will be enrolled in the club this year in Texas.

Theme of this year's program is "Monster Madness" and it promises to be a very entertaining year, introducing children to monsters in fact and fiction. At the end of summer, those having read and recorded a minimum of 10 books will receive his or her reading log and an attractive certificate with full credentials for framing.

Educational Testing Services have shown that an eight-year-old child will read more books at that age

than at any other time in life. Maybe this is why between the ages of eight and ten a child acquires 70% of his adult vocabulary. Another 20% is added by the time he reaches the twenties.

Since youngsters are such vigorous readers, get them good books. They will remember more words from reading (and unconsciously aid in spelling) than they will remember from watching television or listening to the radio.

So again, Mrs. McGee urges all who like to read, come to the library for books and magazines; you'll meet your friends there.

Haskell City Park Commissioner Franciene Johnson has announced plans for the continuation of a summer recreation program for Haskell youth.

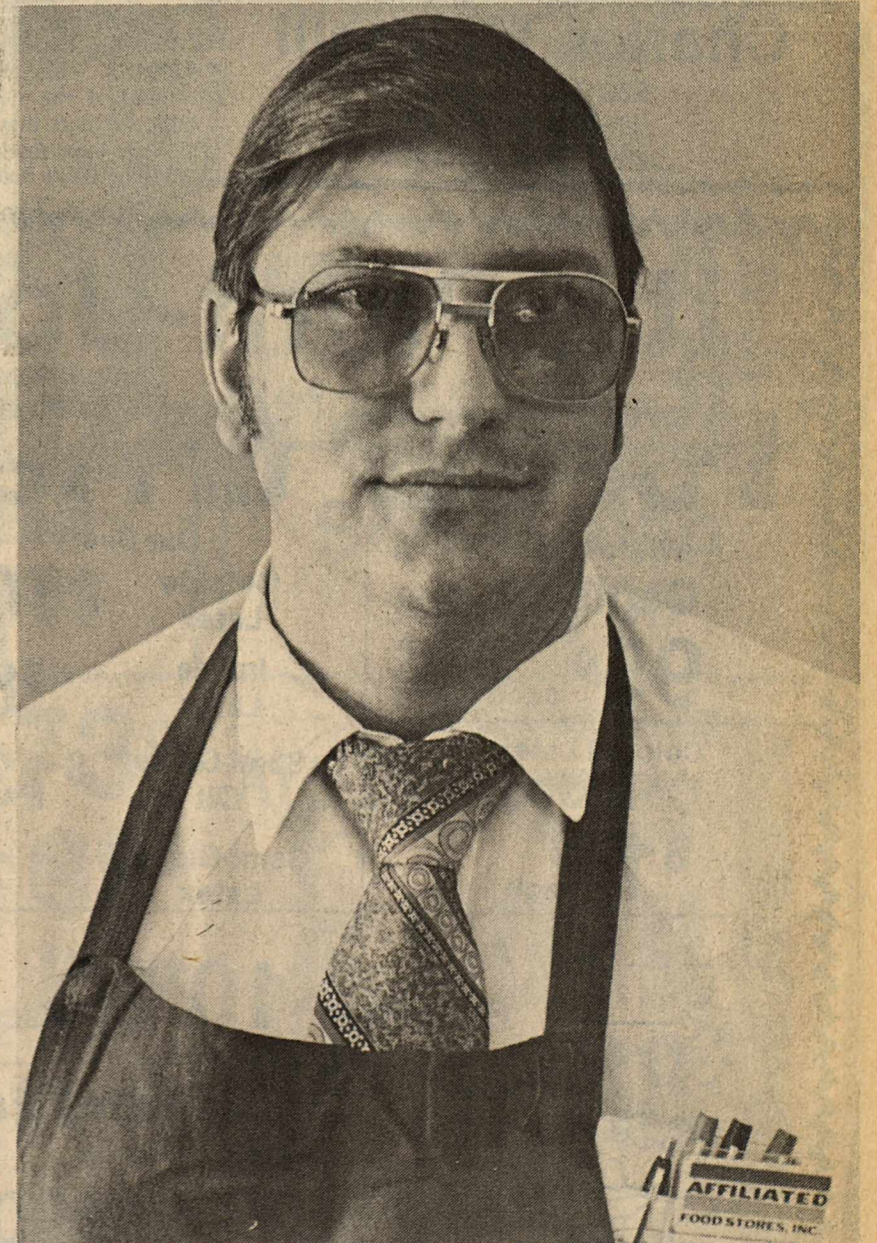
The program will begin Monday with registration and refreshments from 9 a.m. to noon in the City park.

Superintendent's Views

I will return to describing our extra-curricular program in this column.

I would like to feature the band program in this column. We have 3 bands plus a stage band in our program. The beginner band or 6th grade band usually has between 20 and 30 students. It is here the students learn the basics of band music. They practice once a day for about 45 minutes. The emphasis at this level is simply learning the basics. Some years, this band participates in an elementary festival. They usually play a school concert for the Elementary School and always play at the Spring Concert.

The Junior High Band consists of 7th and 8th graders. It usually numbers from 40 to 60 members. It is at this level that twirlers and a drum major are added. The emphasis remains on the basics but sight reading is added. The Junior High Band plays at Junior High pep rallies in the Fall. They also participate in the Christmas Concert. During the Spring they compete in the Cisco Festival. Here they strive for a Sweepstakes Award or two "1's". This means they are judged by a critic judge in both sight reading and concert. They can receive a rating of 1 to 5. Two 1's constitute a sweepstakes. The students are also introduced to solo and ensemble contest for the first time. Later in Spring, the Junior High Band participates in the Spring Concert.

The High School Band is our highest band. It usually has from 65 to 80 members. This band plays at all High School pep rallies and football games.

Marching is added to the program for the first time. During the Fall, the band participates in a Regional Marching contest where they are rated on a scale of 1 to 5. In the Spring, they participate in a sight reading and concert contest. Again, they are rated on a scale of 1 to 5. Three 1's constitute a UIL Sweepstakes. The band members are also offered an opportunity to enter solo and ensemble contests. Division 1's in these contests allows the participant to advance to the next level of competition. The band members can also tryout for the all District, all Regional, and all State band if they desire. During the Spring, the band plays a Spring concert and also competes in a major festival such as Six Flags, Carlsbad, etc.

The Stage Band is a volunteer group modeled after the big band sound of the 1940's. They practice a great deal of the time at night. Some years they also enter a stage band festival.

The Band Boosters contrib-

ute a great deal of support to the band. They contribute financially and physically with their presence.

Our bands have been very successful in the past and are continuing this success under the able leadership of Berry Crudgington.

USDA Soli Conservation Service

Conservation Viewpoints

At least 75 plants grown in Texas are poisonous and can cause death, illness, or extreme discomfort to people, a local conservation leader warned this week.

J. C. Yeary, district conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture, at Haskell, said parents should be concerned because many of the plants are common in flower and vegetable gardens; in ornamental landscaping; and in range, pasture, or forest lands. Bulbs, roots, seeds, leaves, beans, stems or berries may contain poison, depending on the species of the plant.

"Chewing, swallowing or otherwise contacting the toxic parts of these plants, trees, and shrubs takes a heavy toll," Yeary said. "Each year health services report that about 12,000 children are poisoned or injured by these

sources. "In fact, we have already heard of two children in Texas ages 2½ and 3, who ate deadly silverleaf nightshade berries earlier this year," Yeary continued. "Thanks to a concerned parent who took the plant to an SCS office for identification, a doctor was alerted and he treated the children successfully."

Yeary said the beautiful oleander bush is one of the most poisonous plants in Texas and is grown all over the state. It contains a deadly heart stimulant similar to the drug digitalis that is so strong that a single leaf can kill a child. People have died merely from eating steaks speared on oleander twigs and roasted over a fire.

Jimsonweed, sometimes called thorn apple and stinkweed, grows almost everywhere and causes many poisonings. Growing from 2 to

5 feet tall, it has large leaves and white funnel-shaped flowers. All parts are poisonous, especially seeds and leaves. Diefenbachia, or dumb cane, is a beautiful house plant grown in millions of homes, but merely biting its stalk can cause swelling of the mouth and tongue that can be deadly. It is called dumb cane because of its power to strike its victims speechless. The stalks contain needlelike crystals of calcium oxalate that become imbedded in the tissue of the mouth and tongue causing severe swelling and pain.

Castor bean seeds are also deadly. Each seed contains enough ricin, a powerful blood poison, to kill a child.

Mescalbean, or mountain laurel, is also dangerous. It has a poison bean with a hard coat. If it swallowed whole there may be no ill effects, but if chewed or crushed it can be

lethal. Other common plants in Texas that have poisonous parts include poinsettia, mistletoe, elephant ear, larspur, asaleas, lantana, canana, yew, oaks, water hemlock, poison hemlock, poison ivy, poison oak and poison sumac.

"More detailed information on these and other plants can be secured from health and plant authorities," Yeary said. "However, SCS offices in our state's 201 Soil and Water Conservation Districts are trying to cooperate fully with the National Safety Council in keeping the public alerted to poisonous plants."

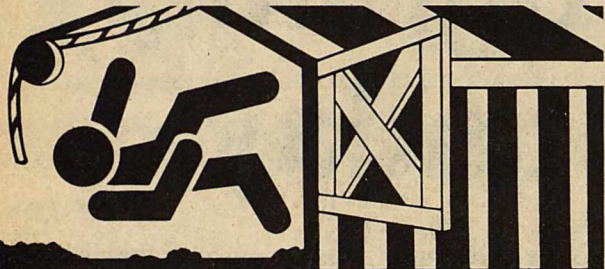

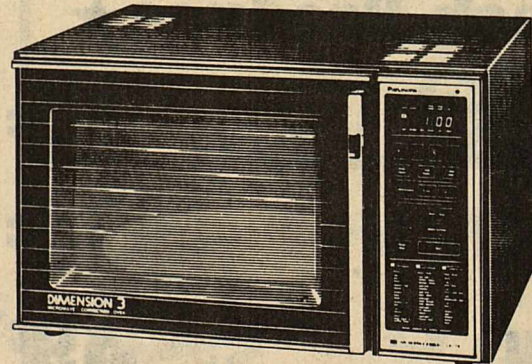

Funny or Unfunny

Miami, which once held the promise of peaceful paradise, now, among large U.S. cities, has the most murders and robberies per capita.

The influx of refugees, Cuban and otherwise, into Miami has largely caused the devastating rise in crime in 1980, when murders jumped by 60 percent and robberies increased by 80 percent.

CASTRO FLUSHES

So, it was into this already worsening sewer situation that "Fidel Castro flushed his toilets," as Miami Mayor Maurice Ferre put it, bluntly, if indelicately.

Violent crime, already in crisis proportions and soaring, surged even more with the sudden influx. The official figure of Cubans boatlifted from Mariel since May is 125,000. But no one really knows how many illegal aliens have been pouring in from Haiti, Nicaragua, Jamaica and other places in the Caribbean. Nor does anyone know how many are absorbed into the crime underworld.

The 1980 Miami murder rate is up 70 percent, up 60 percent in unincorporated Dade County. The first eight months of this year, Dade police listed more than 360 homicides. That's more than one a day. There have been a half-dozen in a 24-hour period.

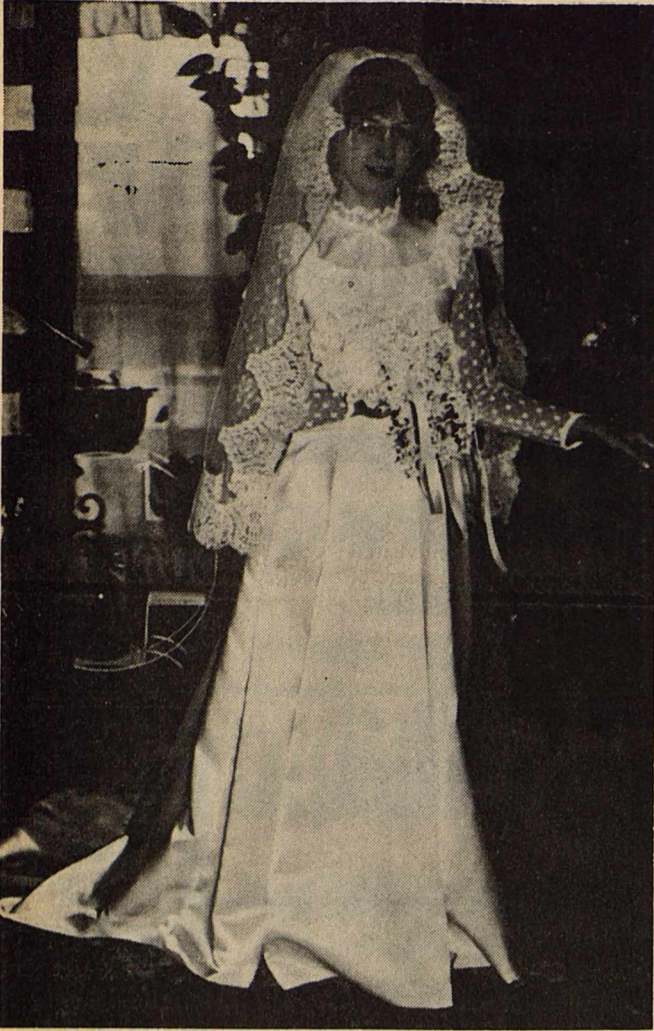
