



I made an amazing discov- prevent warping. Stretched ery when I began teaching. This was that people need to express themselves. They need to record their environment so there can be communication between the artist and the canvas. This creative urge does not change, whether it be on canvas, soft materials or sculpture. There is hope for all of us-there was Grandma Moses, Churchill, Eisenhower and others—so let's have fun and try it!

We must remove the mystique from painting. There is nothing mysterious as many believe. Painting is exciting, fun and gives pleasure to those who pursue it. Don't be discouraged, let's give it a try!

This column is planned to be helpful to area artists in solving problems. I will try to give one solution but must stress that all teachers approach problems differently. You can use your self-expression and choose the solution you like best.

Q. HOW DOES ONE START TO PAINT A LAND-

A. Using a small brush and turps or painting medium, draw the composition on to the canvas. Draw as accurately as possible for your finished painting is no better than your original drawing. I believe the basic forms should be drawn before you start to paint. There must be a relative proportion of things, determine if mountains are too close or too far away, a house or tree should not be centered in the middle of the canvasnow is the time to make any changes for the better painting. When you are satisfied with the composition, start painting.

First, paint that part of the picture that is in the distance. Therefore, start with the sky, then the middle ground, then the foreground.

Q. WHAT FOUNDATION SHOULD I USE FOR A PAINTING?

A. There are three basic materials used for oil painting. Stretched canvas, canvas boards and masonite panels. These can be purchased from standard frames. is spoiled because it smells "funny." That's your clue to throw it out, to avoid the dangers of food poisoning.

However, sometimes you can't tell. Germs that cause food poisoning often don't change the taste, odor or appearance of food. To help you know what to watch out for, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Food Quality Inspection Service has a new booklet. For your free copy of Food Safety, write to Consumer Information Center, Dept. 653J, Pueblo, Colorado

Poultry preparation requires special care. If you prepare the bird the day before you plan to cook it, store the stuffing in a separate container in the refrigerator. Don't leave it in the bird, or it can get contaminated. Right before roasting, stuff the bird loosely enough to allow the heat to penetrate. Refrigerate leftover poultry and stuffing in separate dishes-within two hours after serving.

When you shop for canned foods, don't buy or use food from containers that leak, bulge or are severly dented or damaged. Don't buy or use jars that are cracked or have loose or bulging lids. Don't taste or use food that has a foul odor or any food that spurts liquid when the can is opened. These foods could contain botulism, a rare but often fatal toxin. Home-canned foods improperly prepared cause most incidents of botulism. So, if you can your own vegetables, meat or poultry, always use a pressure

an oven, a steamer, or an open days may be safely refrozen. kettle will not heat low-acid foods enough to kill the bacteria that cause botulism. Always follow canning directions carefully, and take each step in order. Do not take shortcuts. Make sure your equipment is in good working

And what can you do when your freezer fails? If your freezer will be fixed within two days or if the power will go back on within that period of time, you'll probably be able to save your stored food. Keep the freezer door closed-don't keep opening and closing it to check on the food. A fully loaded freezer will keep food frozen for 2 days. A half-full freezer will only keep food cold for a day. And, meats that still contain ice crystals or have been maintained at 5 degrees Celsius (40 degrees Fahrenheit) for less than 2

Some quality may be lost, but the product is still edible. But, throw out any food that has an unusual color or odor. Never refreeze ice cream because it could be contaminated.

If it looks like your freezer will be off for more than two days, use dry ice. Place 25 pounds of dry ice in the freezer soon after the power goes off. A half-full freezer should stay cold enough to keep food for 2 to 3 days, and a full freezer should keep food frozen for 3 or 4 days.



Proper Lawn Care Aids In Conservation

Don't just turn on your lawn sprinkler when hot, dry weather arrives and gripe about your high water bill. By watering, fertilizing and mowing your lawn properly, you can reduce your water bill as much as 40 percent during the summer months.

'Conservation by the homeowner provides the only solution to high water bills and excessive water demands during our hot and usually dry Texas summers," points out Dr. Richard Duble, turfgrass specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University

In small cities where industrial demand for water is low, lawn watering may account for as much as half of all the water used during summer months. Even in larger cities, lawns get 30 to 40 percent of all the water supplied by municipalities, notes Duble.

He adds that most Texas summer and that most of this usually comes from irrigation.

"The first thing is to water your lawn only when grass starts to show signs of drought stress," explains the specialist. "Look for discoloration and wilting. If leaves roll up in the late afternoon and footprints remain after walking within 24 hours.

"Once you've decided that your lawn needs watering, do it right," emphasizes Duble. "Most homeowners don't water their lawns properly. They either water too often, causing grass to develop shallow roots and making it a prime target for insects, diseases and temperature extremes, or they water too infrequently and apply too much water at one time, resulting in a lot of runoff."

When watering, soak the soil to a depth of 4 to 6 inches, recommends the specialist. In heavy clay soils, watering for lawns need about 2 inches of 15 to 20-minute periods may water per week during the be necessary to prevent excessive runoff.

Exactly what can a home- fertilization can also reduce owner do to reduce his watering," says Duble. "Applying fertilizer in the spring and fall will generally keep your lawn healthy. Fertilizing during the summer, especially with nitrogen fertilizer, will

Disposal Of Assets Is Changed

After March 1, 1981, a person may no longer give or sell, at a reduced price, property or other resources in order to become eligible for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments.

A new provision of the SSI law requires that when a person either gives or sells, at less than fair market value, property which would otherwise disqualify the person, that person will be charged as still retaining an interest in the property or money. The value of their retained interest is determined by subtracting the amount received from the transaction from the fair market value of the property. This will continue to be counted as a resource for 24 months after the transfer of

The resource limits for the SSI program are \$1500 for an individual and \$2,250 for a couple. For example, under this new provision if a person (who was otherwise eligible) owned ten acres of non-home property and decided to sell this property to his children for \$500, when its fair market value is \$5,000, that person would be charged as having \$4,500 resource and would not be eligible for 24 months after the month of the sale.

The new law is designed to encourage people to use their available resources to provide for themselves rather than transfer the resources to relatives or friends in order to get on the SSI rolls.



It was 1867 before the first U.S. patent for barbed wire was issued to a New Jersey man. Years of litigation followed with many claims of prior use. However, some alleged inventors remained in the background and did not press their claims because barbed wire had such a bad reputation. The idea of using a fence with sharp projections that might harm livestock other than one's own was simply inexcusable. It took men like John Warne "Bet-A-Million" Gates (one of the founders of present Texaco) and H.B. Sanborn to change the minds of cattlemen across the country. Gates, a poor boy from Illinois who made his first million by his twenty-fifth birthday due to his amazing sales ability, built a barbed wire fence around wild cattle

The fence corralled the beasts so effectively that Gate's company could no fill all the

H.B. Sanborn erected model fences in the 1870s and 80s including one around his own 120,000-acre Frying Pan Ranch. Later, Sanborn laid out the present city of Amarillo on his ranch land.

Barbed wire, when finally accepted, saved the cattle industry because it gave own herds.

The Texas Historical Commission has placed an OFFICIAL TEXAS HISTORICAL MARKER honoring the Grinninger Fence on the west bank of Waller Creek, north side of Town Lake, Austin. The National Register of Historic Places, archeological investigations, and museum services are other programs administered by the Texas Historical Commission.

AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.) -Living in the clean air and less congested areas of rural Texas makes you healthier than city folks. Right? Wrong, says a University of Texas faculty member.

Dr. Mary Walker, who directs the Texas Rural 19099. Health Field Services Program, says the mental and physical health of rural Texans is markedly worse than that of city dwellers.

Few health professionals, facilities or services exist where populations are sparse, says Dr. Walker, who has found rural Texans are less educated, poorer and likely to die sooner than urban Texans. It is her belief that if "health" is defined in terms of environmental, physical, mental and social factors, it is inaccurate to say rural residents are receiving health care.

The President has won some important battles in his fight to bring the federal budget under control, winning crucial votes recently in both houses of Congress that will pave the way for his budget reforms.

Questions have been raised, however, about the effect a combined program of tax and spending cuts will have on cattlemen control over their our goal of a balanced budget. I'd like to show, in the limited space available, how these programs will bring about a balanced budget and how they fit in the President's overall economic program.

These tax and spending cuts do represent integral parts of the President's program. The Federal Reserve, as another part of the program, must not permit inflationary expansion of the money supply, a direction in which the independent Fed seems to be moving.

The President's proposed tax rate reductions are needed to offset rising tax rates due to the inflationary policies of the past. The tax reductions will be more than paid for, however, (1) by reductions in spending, (2) by additional revenue generated from faster economic growth and (3) by higher levels of private saving.

As to balancing the budget, that will be impossible without the tax reductions. It has become clear in recent years that the budget cannot be balanced simply by taxing at higher and higher levels.

No, what is needed is less government spending and increased production in the private sector which the tax cuts will generate. Without the tax cuts, the economy will continue to stagnate.

This continuing stagnation will increase pressure for spending on welfare programs at the same time that tax receipts are beginning to fall because of reduced work and

On the other hand, if tax rates are cut, the incentives mentioned earlier will stimulate additional work. Unemployment and welfare spending will fall. Tax receipts clude on Sunday when will rise. More goods will be produced, easing pressure on

> Reduced inflation will ease government spending, as cost-of-living adjustments become smaller. Interest rates will also fall, lowering the burden of financing and the national debt, all leading toward a balanced budget and less inflation. Indeed, without such a program there is little hope of ever balancing the budget.


> It is true that deficits will continue for the next two or three years. This is simply unavoidable given the fantastic growth in government spending programs which has occured in the past few years.

> To end the deficits any sooner than the President's economic program projects would require the absolute abolition of many essential programs, including some in the defense field.

> The solution today, then, is to cut taxes and stimulate work, investment and saving. If enough saving occurs, and it is believed that it will, then the temporary governmental deficits will be financed from that saving rather than through the inflationary process of Federal Reserve money



If you are one of the many who decide to purchase a used car, take a few precautions when shopping so you will end up with one you can be satisfied with, one that won't cause any unpleasant sur-

prises when you get it home. Why should the purchase of a used car so often lead to misunderstandings? Well. primarily, because the typical consumer doesn't enter the market often enough to know what to look for, and what to avoid If the consumer does his "homework". he will know how to shop for an automobile.

Our Consumer Protection and Antitrust Division attorneys recommend the following steps when buying a car: Select several established dealers and shop carefully. Reputable dealers will not object to comparisons with competitors.

Remember that every used car you look at has a history. and it's your job to find out what it is. One step is to copy the Vehicle Identification Number from the engine block or dashboard, the license plate number, the number from the inspection sticker, and the

Then call the Motor Vehicle Division of the Department of Public Safety in Austin (512-475-7611) and give them the VIN and license plate number, and ask for the name and address of the title owner of the car. (Usually the used car dealer won't have the title

in his name.) Call or write the owner and ask for information about the car, the mileage when sold, the selling price, and any problems he might have had with the car. Then compare what he tells you with the information given by the used car


