## Test Results Show Improvement Over '79

Results of the second Texas Assessment of Basic Skills (TABSS) test has been received by Haskell school superintendent James Lanier.

The tests were given to all third, fifth and ninth grade students in Haskell schools in February.

According to Lanier, the students tested showed slight improvement over the same groups which were tested last year.

Following the testing last year, Haskell was rated first in the region and above the state norm.

Regional and State comparisons have not been released at the present time and no comparisons are

available.

Lanier said that the results of the tests give school administrators an indicator of possible strengths and weaknesses in a school's curriculum.

An average of about 80% of the third and fifth grade students were scored proficient on the tests, which included math, reading and writing.

The tests given to ninth grade students was of a different type and about 75% of the Haskell students scored proficient on that exam.

Each portion of the tests were broken down into categories allowing administrators to

determine exactly which aspects may need attention.

Lanier said that when regional and state comparisons were available they would be made public.

## Frazier Is Appointed New County Clerk

Members of the Haskell County Commissioners Court voted unanimously to appoint Woody Frazier to fill the unexpired term as County Clerk during their regular meeting Monday.

Frazier is a native of Haskell County and for 27 years was the owner-operator of Woody's across from the High School. He also served as manager of the local Dairy Queen for about seven years.

He is a graduate of Haskell High School and is a member of the First Presbyterian Church in Haskell.

His wife, Nellie Kate, is a native of Weinert. They have one daughter, Mrs. Jimmy (Joan) Strickland of Rochester and three grandchildren, Amanda Carol, Brandy Alaine, and James Loyd.

The decision to appoint Frazier came following a 40-minute executive session during which members of the Court discussed seven persons who had submitted applications for the position.

Prior to the closed session, County Judge John Wayne McDermott announced that applications had been received from: Frances Macias, Melba Howard, Charlene Therwanger, Frazier, Mary Francis Lowe, Patricia Ann Sams and Betty Berry.

Joe Clark addressed the Court and asked that Frances Macias be considered for the position. He told members of the Court that he had been selected as a representative of

the Sagerton Community to make the request and added that she was well respected in the community.

Following the closed session, each applicant's name was read by County Judge John Wayne McDermott and a motion to nominate the individual was asked for. Commissioner C. A. (Bud) Turnbow made a motion to appoint Frances Macias and the motion died without a second. Frazier was the only other name to be nominated.

Rhonda Moeller, who had served as County Clerk for the past two years, submitted her resignation to the Court June 23 to devote her full time to a new daughter.

At the time of her resignation, she stated that Frances Macias had expressed a desire to fill the vacancy. Mrs. Moeller told members of the Court that Miss Macias had served as Chief Deputy in the office for approximately two years and was well qualified to fill the office.

Commissioners agreed to postpone the appointment until the July 13 meeting to allow applications to be accepted. Frances Macias and Vicki Medford announced Tuesday that they were resigning as Chief Deputy and Deputy in the County Clerk's office.

In a joint statement to the *Free Press*, the two expressed their reasons for resigning their positions in the County Clerk's office.

"The appointment of a person to fill the vacancy in the office of the County Clerk was made by the Commissioners of Haskell County apparently without regard to qualifications.

Our resignations have no reflection on the individual appointed. We simply feel that filling the vacancy in such a manner does not serve in the best interest of the people of Haskell County.

The decision to resign was a difficult one for both of us. We have enjoyed the work and have tried to serve the people of Haskell County to the best of our ability."

Commissioners were scheduled to reconvene Wednesday morning at 10 a.m. to administer the oath of office to Frazier and approve his bond to hold the office.

In other Court action Monday, members of the Court held a lengthy discussion on the possibility of placing Haskell County under the Texas Herbicide Law as a regulated County.

Several farmers from the Matteson Community attended the session to discuss possible actions which could prevent the repeat of a recent misapplication of herbicide which has damaged many acres of cotton in the Northeast portion of the County. The incident apparently occurred when an aerial applicator sprayed to kill mesquites and wind carried the poison to the crops.

Commissioners agreed to appoint a committee to study all possibilities and discuss options at a later date.

Ronald Bertrand, Supervisor with the Texas Department of Agriculture, told those present that to become regulated a public hearing in October, November or December would be required and following the hearing, members of the Court could vote for or against the regulation.

Commissioners also appointed Judges for General and Special Elections in Haskell County. The Judges and their Precincts are as follows: Norman Nanny, 1; Callie Robison, 2; Glenn Merchant, 3; Coyt Hix, 4; C. W. Dunnam, 5; Susan Turner, 6; A. A. Cox, 7; Joyce Hager, 8; Wayne Peiser, 9; Joe Clark, 10; and C. O. Holt, 11.

## City Council Approves 81-82 Budget

Members of the Haskell City Council approved the 1981-82 budget during their regular meeting Tuesday night.

The budget calls for estimated expenditures of \$755,661.78 during the next fiscal year.

In other action members of the Council approved the rezoning of Lot 7 Block 1 of the Cottage Lawn Addition to allow placement of a mobile home.

Reports were presented in conjunction with the seal coating at the airport, Avenue A Paving Project and softball field lighting. All three projects are nearing completion.

Receipts of \$5,708.00 in revenue sharing and \$1,189.00 in fines were also reported at the meeting.

Also in attendance were several children, grand children, great grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild.

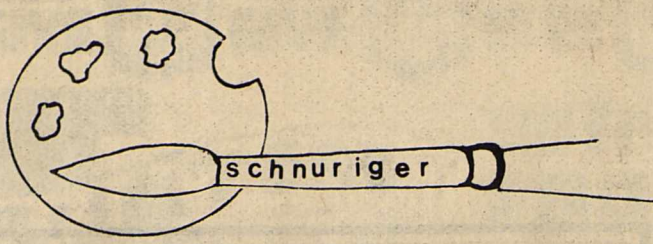
The two days were spent visiting, getting reacquainted, picture taking and playing games.

## BRUSH and PALETTE



This column is intended to help you with your painting problems. If you do not get anything from it but one suggestion—that is—you must learn to see. Are you aware of the forms in trees, the twist of a limb, the comparison of the size of a limb to the trunk of the tree? See, compare and make mental notations of these. To be a landscape artist one must get in tune with nature. Sit under the tree, sit on the river bank or on the hilltop over-looking a valley. Imagine that you are right there. A good landscape has three definite criteria. One, where is the light source, sun, moon candle or lamp. Two, what time of day is it, the shadows will determine this. Three, what time of year is it. Trees are darker from mid-summer to fall, grass and flowers reflect the time of year. Remember, bluebonnets do not bloom when the maples

are red. See, express what you see and feel, then put it on the canvas. Learn to see!!!

Q. What colors should I put on my palette?

A. Starting with the warm and cool of each of the primary colors with the addition of earth colors, greens and Payne's Gray and white is my palette. Warm colors are reds and yellows, cool colors are blues and greens. The earth colors are Payne's Gray, Burnt Umber, Raw Sienna and Burnt Sienna. The warm colors are Alizarin Crimson, Cadmium Red Light, Cadmium Yellow Light, (no orange as I prefer to make my own) and Yellow Ochre. The cool colors are Ultramarine Blue, Cerulean Blue, Olive Green and Sap Green. Of course, you need plenty of white. I start at the lower left side of the palette and go to the top with the earth colors, then across the top are the warm colors and down the right side are the cool colors and white. Why don't you try laying out your palette this way and see how you like it? It really does not matter what format you use, but I do suggest you lay out your colors the same way each time. You will be able to locate the desired color automatically. I recommend this.

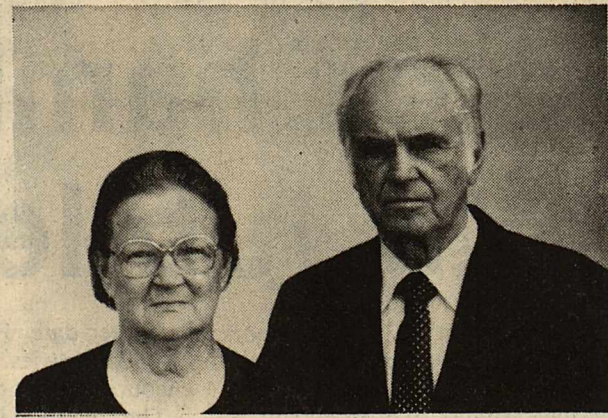

# Cattle Raisers Express Thanks For Aid

The nine Texas Democrats who "put country ahead of party" in the recent budget battle in Washington got a personal thanks in the form of a resolution passed by members of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association board of directors at their meeting in San Angelo, June 26-27. TSCRA telegraphed its members'

thanks only hours after the lawmakers helped Republicans defeat an attempt by the Democratic leadership to derail President Reagan's budget and tax proposals.

TSCRA is a non-profit livestock producer group with more than 14,000 members in Texas, Oklahoma and surrounding states.

John S. Cargile, TSCRA

president from San Angelo, said, "TSCRA feels that President Reagan's budget and tax proposals will result in lower inflation, lower interest rates, lower deficits and in accelerated economic growth. The defeat of his budget proposal would have been a blow to the working people and ranchers of this country who have been forgotten in the rush to big government and higher taxes."

The nine Texas Democrats recognized were Congressmen Jack Hightower of Vernon, Charles Wilson of Lufkin, Marvin Leath of Waco, Charles Stenholm of Stamford, Phil Gramm of Bryan, Sam Hall of Marshall, Ralph Hall of Rockwall, Kent Hance of Lubbock and Richard White of El Paso.

The group's board also endorsed the principle of deregulating the livestock marketing industry to the extent that the auction markets could work in free and open competition yet in an environment that protects the industry and the producer. The resolution was in re-

sponse to proposed legislation that would streamline portions of the Packers and Stockyards Act of 1921.

Texas has new and tougher trespass and game laws passed this year that affect ranchers and other landowners. Ed Small, TSCRA attorney in Austin, reported that under new laws the penalty for criminal trespass has been increased to a Class B misdemeanor with a maximum fine of \$1,000 and up to one year in jail, or both. If the trespasser carries a deadly weapon, the offense will be a Class A misdemeanor, punishable by a fine up to \$2,000 with the same fine, or both. A fence obviously designed to contain livestock would serve notice that entry was forbidden. Another law would allow county courts in addition to justice courts to hear game law violations. Landowners were advised to report trespassers to the local game warden or sheriff.

Cattlemen were warned that the next 60 to 90 days will have a very critical effect on the market outcome for the

rest of the year by Topper Thorpe, general manager of the marketing arm of the National Cattlemen's Association. Weather will be the big factor and could force non-fed slaughter and increase grain production costs. Under the best conditions, he

said cattle feeders must have 75c to 85c per pound for cattle going to the packer if the rest of the cattle industry is to survive in the long term.

The future is bright, he added, for those cattlemen who recognize that change is upon them and devote time to

planning, managing and marketing.

Cattlemen must learn that beef production is a business and not a way of life, Thorpe said.

Other speakers were Dr. Lauro Cavazos, president of Texas Tech University; Mrs.

Nancy Birdwell with the National Golden Spur Awards Program and Cargile.

More than 350 TSCRA members and their families attended the summer meeting. TSCRA set its fall meeting for Oct. 30-31 in Kerrville.

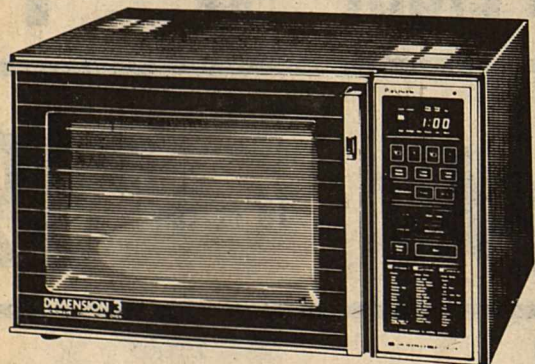

Feel poorer in spite of earning the highest income of your life?

You're not alone—inflation has cut most families' buying power.

And, while inflation has pushed incomes up to higher levels, those wage-hike dollars are taxed at a higher rate than pre-wage-hike dollars.

One solution to this problem is controlling family inflation by carefully managing family resources.

Managing family resources takes three major steps: evaluate family level of living and make necessary changes, extend family's material resources and increase resources.

**Evaluate Living Level**  
Evaluate your level of living—as a family.

You may want to change your lifestyle by learning to live with fewer goods and services.

Most families have closets and attics full of items that are never used—or put away for that someday that never comes.

Sell these items, give them away or discover new uses for them, lessening the desire to constantly purchase new items.

Some families are trying to simplify their lives by learning new ways of "making do"—to keep from doing without.

To simplify and live with fewer material goods does not necessarily mean lowering the quality of life—often less is more.

For example, learn to use the things you already own instead of wanting to buy new things. Also, look to friends and family for entertainment by organizing round-robin dinner parties.

In addition, conserve as much energy as possible to make a positive impact on your budget.

**Extend Material Resources**  
Extend, or expand, the family's material resources by increasing your consumer

skills for maintaining, using, repairing, storing, conserving and recycling.

Learn simple repair skills from books and pamphlets to lessen your dependence on "experts."

Make a habit of reading appliance instruction booklets to learn how you can extend the life of your appliances by caring for them properly.

Consider life expectancy of a product as well as the price before buying.

When buying, learn to be a wise consumer, recognizing quality in goods and services. Shop sales, too, and be sure items meet a real need rather than an imaginary one.

Share a ride with friends or co-workers. Carpool to work, and go shopping with a neighbor.

**Increase Resources**  
Increase family resources

by doing many tasks yourself—sewing or gardening, for example.

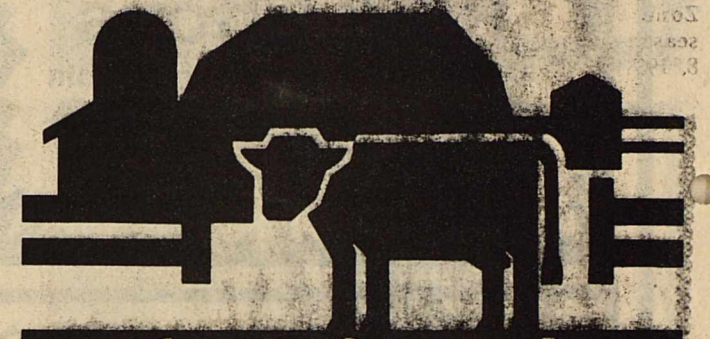
Creative human production, such as the above skills, actually will increase your family's spending power by freeing money formerly spent for clothing or food.

# Dove Proposal To Up Limit From 10 to 12

Only minor changes are anticipated in hunting regulations proposed for mourning and white-winged doves, teal ducks and other "early season" migratory birds this fall. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission will set seasons and bag limits when it convenes in a public hearing in Austin July 23. The public may comment at the hearing or write William C. Brownlee, Migratory Game Bird Program Director, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, 4200 Smith School Road, Austin, Texas 78744.

For dove hunting it is proposed the state be divided into the same North and South Zones as for the 1980-81 dove hunting seasons. The North Zone season for mourning doves is proposed for Sept. 1-Oct. 30, 1981. The South Zone mourning dove split season would be Sept. 26-Nov. 8, 1981, and Jan. 2-17, 1982.

The white-winged dove season for 16 counties is proposed for Sept. 5-6 and 12-13.

In all counties which do not have a whitewing season, shooting hours are one half-hour before sunrise to sunset. In counties having concurrent whitewing and mourning dove hunting, shooting hours would be noon to sunset during the four days of the whitewing season.

Also, in South Zone counties having an open season on white-winged doves, the fall season for mourning doves is proposed to end on Nov. 4, 1981.

One change proposed by the commission for the 1981-82 seasons is a reduction in the number of counties where hunters are required to leave one fully feathered wing attached to the carcass of every dove until it reaches the personal abode of the hunter

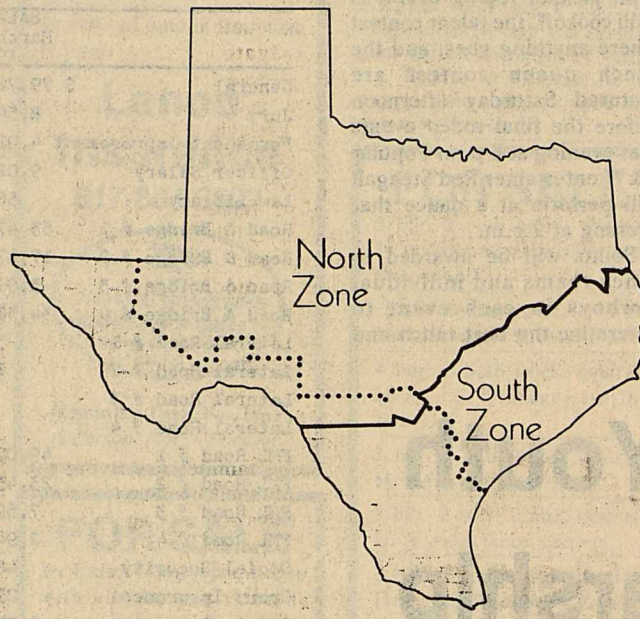
or a commercial preservation facility. This is proposed to be required in 36 counties this season, whereas last season the requirement applied to all of the South Zone.

It is proposed that bag and possession limits for mourning doves be raised from 10 and 20 to 12 and 24. The bag and possession limits for white-winged doves will remain at 10 per day, 20 in possession.

The hunting season for all teal duck species is proposed for Sept. 12-20, 1981. Bag limit would be four per day in the aggregate, possession limit eight in the aggregate.

The season for rails is proposed for Sept. 1-Nov. 9, 1981, with shooting hours from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. Bag limits proposed for large (king and clapper) rails would be 15 in the aggregate per day, possession limit 30 in the aggregate. Bag limit for small (sora and Virginia) rails would be 25 in the aggregate per day, possession limit 25 in the aggregate.

The gallinule season would be Sept. 1-Nov. 9, 1981, with shooting hours from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. Bag limit would be 15 per day, possession limit 30.



### DOVE HUNTING ZONES

The state again will be divided into North and South Zones for the upcoming dove hunting seasons. The heavy black line on the map delineates the two zones. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department proposes to offer a four-day white-winged dove hunting season in the shaded counties. In counties south and west of the dotted line, the department proposes to require hunters to leave one fully-feathered wing attached to the carcass of each dove harvested, until the birds reach the hunter's residence or a processing facility.

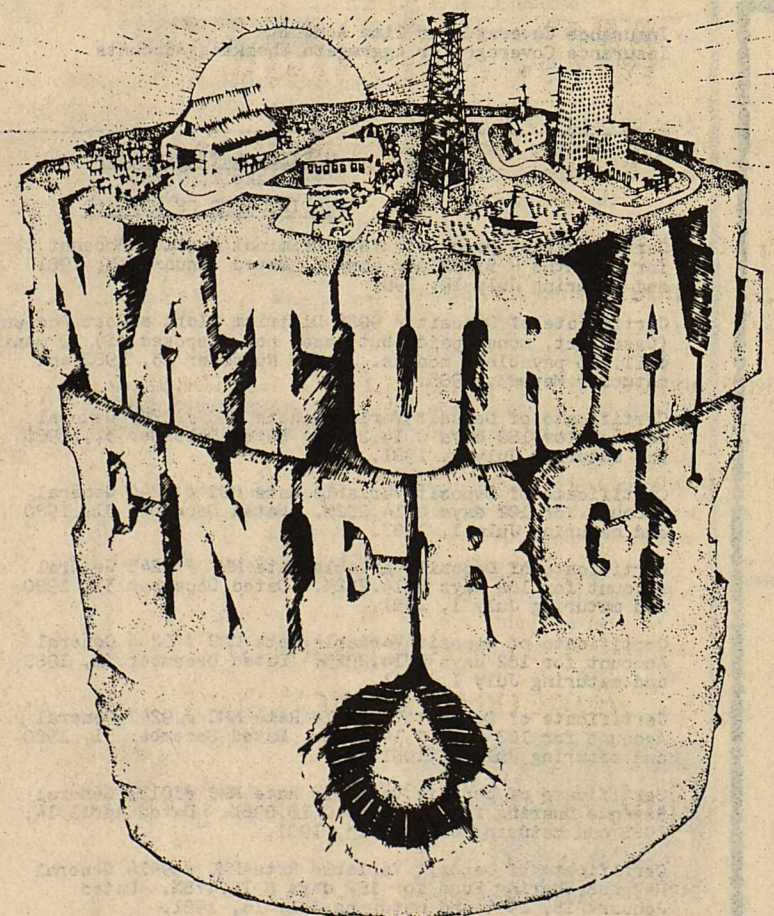

# WTRC To Begin San Angelo Building

Twenty-four hours before the deadline, West Texans have exceeded by \$473,669 a challenge requirement issued to the West Texas Rehabilitation Center by the J.E. and L.E. Mabee Foundation of Tulsa, Oklahoma.

The Foundation announced on April 1, 1981 that it would put \$500,000 into the West Texas Rehabilitation Center San Angelo Building project if the campaign raised \$1,049,540 by July 10.

At noon today, (July 9) Campaign Chairman Lee Pfluger reported to the WTRC Board of Directors that \$1,523,209 has been received in cash and pledges which, combined with the Mabee foundation Grant, not only assures construction of the new Rehabilitation Center but gets well down the road toward furnishing and equipping the new building.

Said Pfluger, "When we formally launched our campaign on March 10, we were talking about raising \$1.5 million—and that was for construction alone; it didn't

include equipment, furnishings, or landscaping. "For me to be able to announce today that we have \$2,023,209 including the Mabee Grant, is testimony to West Texans' tradition of 'neighbor helping neighbor' and their acceptance of WTRC's consistency with that tradition," Pfluger said.

WTRC Vice-President Richard Salmon echoed Pfluger's gratitude and stated that site clearing in preparation for the new Out-Patient Rehabilitation Center for the Handicapped of the Southwest will begin immediately with project completion scheduled June, 1982.

The new facility will be located on 3.5 acres of land at the intersection of Jackson Street and University Avenue which the San Angelo Independent School District donated to the WTRC. It will contain approximately 29,000 sq. ft. of treatment space. Currently, WTRC is housed in a 5,000 sq. ft. building at 128 South Magdalen which cannot be expended.

"In four years, WTRC San Angelo's annual patient admissions have increased from 326 to approximately 1100 and we anticipate continuation of this trend," said WTRC President Jim Polk of Abilene.

"For that reason," Polk added, "We have designed a new facility to meet the Rehabilitation Service needs of the handicapped, both now and for many years to come. We take credit for the design, but I am most sincere when I say that all the credit for making our design a reality belongs to the very kind and caring people of West Texas who have been so generous in their support of this building campaign."

Highlights of the building campaign include contributions from: The Mabee Foundation of Tulsa, Ok., \$500,000; an anonymous ranching couple, \$225,000; The Stringer Family Trust, \$125,000; and anonymous oil person, \$100,000; The Davidson Family trust, \$100,000.

# Ranch Rodeo To Match Rivals

The fabled ranch rivalries of the Old West are being fanned to a hot competitive edge again today.

The question to be settled is which of Texas' biggest ranches owns the braggin' rights in cattle country today—which one is the best.

It'll be settled August 21-22 when real workin' cowboys from the big spreads gather in Wichita Falls for the big shootout—the first annual Budweiser Texas Ranch Roundup.

These won't be urban cowboys. They're the kind whose boots are made for workin', not dancin'. And their wide-brimmed hats show the wear and tear of long, hot days in the saddle, not air-conditioned designer chic.

They'll compete peacefully in rodeo style competition with the spotlight on working ranch skills, a talent contest where anything goes, a ranch queen contest for the ladies, and, naturally, a chili cookoff. After the hard work in the corral, they'll change from ranching gear to polished boots for a dash of dancin' to country/western music.

Participating ranches include the R.A. Brown Ranch, the Cowan & Son Circle Bar Ranch, Lewis Ranches, Pitchfork Land & Cattle Co.,

Scharbauer Cattle Co., Randerbrook-Spade Ranch, Swenson Ranches, Tongue River Ranch, U Lazy S Ranch, U U Hereford Ranch, and W.T. Waggoner Estate.

In combination, these ranches sprawl over nearly two million acres of cattle country, nearly triple the area of Rhode Island.

The Roundup opens Friday evening, August 21, with the first rodeo performance at 8 p.m. Teams of cowboys from each ranch will compete in team roping, saddle bronc riding, team penning, wild cow branding, and wild cow milking. A wild horse race will be a bonus event. A dance at 9 p.m. featuring Mountain Smoke will conclude Friday's events.

On Saturday morning, the ranches will complete in a 9 a.m. jackpot roping event. A chili cookoff, the talent contest where anything goes, and the ranch queen contest are featured Saturday afternoon before the final rodeo events that evening at 8 p.m. Popular C&W entertainer Red Steagall will perform at a dance that evening at 9 p.m.

Points will be awarded to ranch teams and individual cowboys in each event to determine the best ranch and

the top all-round cowboy. The winning ranch will take home a traveling trophy, a bronze sculpture by Lex Graham, and the winning cowboy will receive a hand-tooled saddle. Grand prize for the winner of the chili cookoff will be a trip to the World's Championship Chili Cookoff.

Budweiser Rodeo Six Pack members Jack Ward, T.J. Walter and Bobby Brown will judge the rodeo events.

Rodeo tickets are: box seats, \$6; reserved seats, \$4; general admission, \$3. Tickets to the dances are \$3 per person each evening, and tickets to the Saturday afternoon contests are \$1 general admission. Tickets will be available at the gate or at Wichita Western World, Sears, The Cow Lot and Holt's Sporting Goods in Wichita Falls. Tickets can also be obtained by writing Falls

Distributing Co., 3811 Tarry, Wichita Falls, Texas, 76308. Proceeds from the Budweiser Texas Ranch Roundup will benefit the North Texas Rehabilitation Center, Wichita Falls; the West Texas Rehabilitation, Abilene; and the West Texas Boys Ranch, San Angelo. Plans call for the Budweiser Texas Ranch Roundup to move to a different site each year.

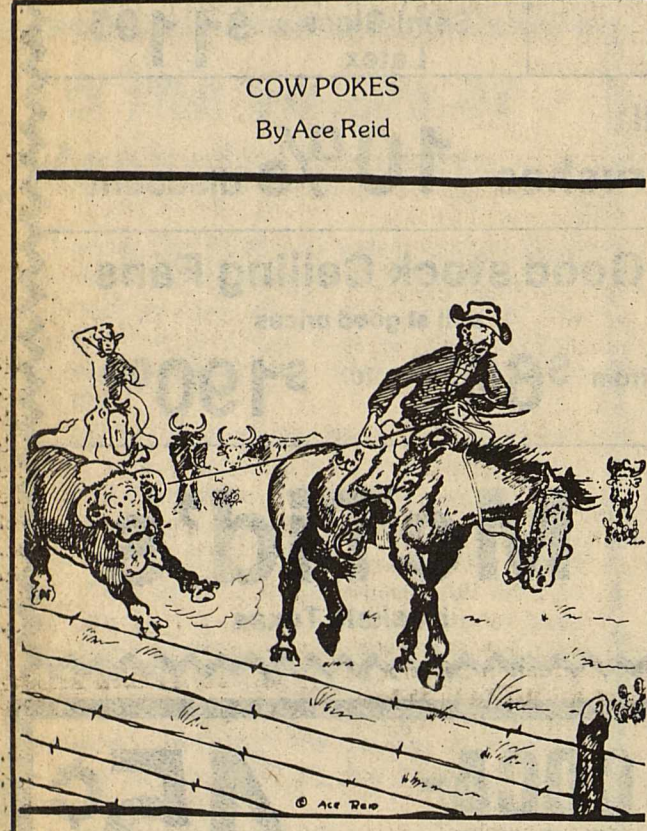

## Carpetcraft

by Jack Cline

### Carpet Seams

It is believed that carpet installation goes back as far as 2000 BC, using what else but wool. Naturally, the method for connecting pieces together was sewing, which continued thru the early 1960's until the advent of Hot Melt Tape. This development revolutionized the industry overnight. Hot melt glue on one side of four inch wide paper about 66 feet long. Run a hot electric iron down it to melt the tape glue and overlap the backing of two pieces of carpet and PRESTO! an invisible seam of remarkable strength.

Seaming Tape, as it is referred to, is manufactured in many grades today, from the inexpensive "economy" grade thru and up to the "premium" item. The use of each type is determined by the type of carpet backing and the individual installation method. And it is here that we in the industry must almost unanimously agree that seams are one of the most critical areas of installation whether direct glue-down or stretched-in.

So, if a seam opens up during or after cleaning, it does not necessarily mean that the installer did a poor job or used inferior tape, or that the cleaner over wet the carpet. Hot melt tape, as with other adhesives, or thread for that matter, have a life-the amount of built in strength before they lose their holding power. Consequently, seams fail and must be repaired to prevent further damage to the carpet. When doing repair work, one should inventory several grades of tape. The individual repair situation dictates the type which will do the best job.

We have only been in Haskell for one month, but are most fortunate in our welcoming. Toni and I would like to thank all of you who allowed us to clean your carpet. We appreciate your business and the opportunity to handle your carpet cleaning needs. Thanks again!!

## Prehistoric Bones Discovered In Cave

COLLEGE STATION — Human bones that may be thousands of years old have been found more than 550 feet underground in the state's deepest cave, which a Texas A&M University researcher described as "a perfect Venus fly trap — once you're in, there's no way to go but down." The remains were found at the bottom of Sorcerer's Cave in rugged Terrell County by a

group of amateur spelunkers from San Antonio, said Dr. Gentry Steele, a physical anthropologist at Texas A&M. The bones may belong to more than one person and are prehistoric in age, said Steele, who is overseeing study of the bones and other animal material recovered from the cave — including a mummified vulture — at Texas A&M.

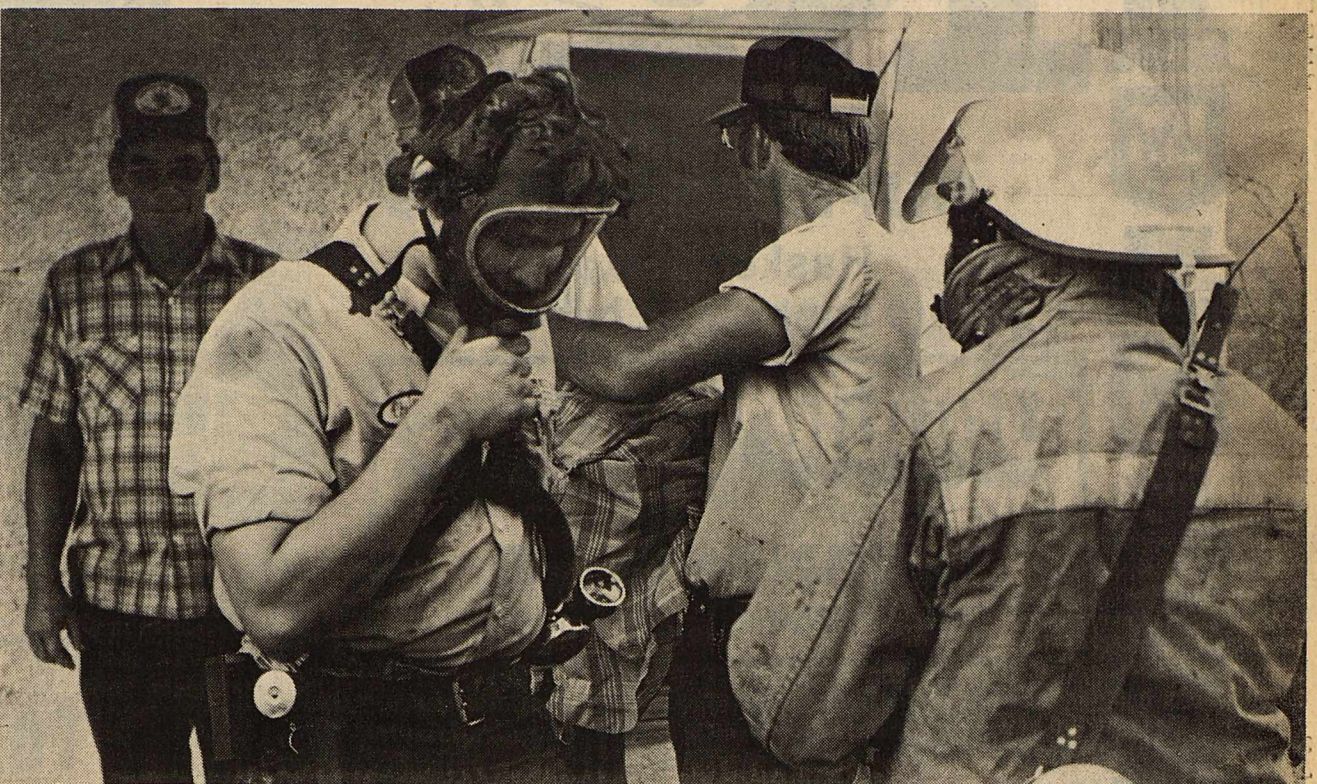
