Farmers Union Meeting Set

National Farmers Union Insurance Company will hold a meeting at the Stamford VIP Community Center Tuesday night August 4th, beginning at 8:00 p.m. The purpose of the meeting will be to explain to area farmers and ranchers the Multi-Peril Crop Insurance for 1982 wheat. Terrell Pinkston of Stanton will moderate the program and explain the benefits to be derived from this protection, and to rule out several misconceptions about this all-risk crop insurance.

All Haskell County farmers and ranchers are urged to attend this meeting and have this program explained. The primary purpose of this coverage is to have a guaranteed yield for the 1982 wheat crop, and to protect the farm income, against many causes of crop loss, such as drought, flood, insects, wind, hail, disease, and other causes of crop failure.

The school was attended by about 2,000 students, 400 instructors and 500 visitors. Students represented about 25 states and seven foreign countries making the school one of the largest in the world.

Cockerell and Stocks both participated in a Basic Firefighting Course and Lane was a student in a Basic Fire Prevention Course. Chief Watson served as an Instructor in Hose Loads and Comedy served as an Instructor in Public Relations.

Attending the school as special guests from Haskell were: Fire Commissioner Joe Cortez, Councilmen Hugh Horton and Archie Jones; City Secretary Desmond Dulaney and Fireman Sam Watson. The special guests attended the Wednesday night

banquet and fire demonstration.

By having at least two firemen and a fire marshal participate in the school the City of Haskell retains a 5% fire insurance credit for all property in the city limits.

Students participating in the school are given 30 hours of intensive training which may be applied toward certification as a basic, intermediate or advanced firefighter.

To receive basic certification as a volunteer firefighter requires completion of 160 hours of training in specified categories.

The Haskell Volunteer Fire Department currently has about 20 firemen who have completed basic certification in the 35 member department.

Acreage Reports Due August 3 At ASCS

Haskell County farmers who have not filed an acreage report with the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) have until August 3rd to do so, according to Glenn R. Brzozowski, County Executive Director.

Since there are no set-aside requirements or normal crop limitations, all farmers who report their spring seeded program crops (grain sorghum, corn and cotton) accurately will be eligible for disaster benefits, deficiency payments and price support loans. All farm operators must also sign an application for payment by the final certification date of August 3rd.

farmers should report accurately. Acreage is subject to random checks to verify reports. Also, irrigated and dryland grain sorghum and corn must be certified separately this year and will be spot-checked separately.

If producers are not sure of their acreage, they should insure it with measurement service. The cost averages about \$20.00 per farm and it's accuracy is guaranteed.

School Board Accepts Four Resignations

Members of the Board of Trustees of the Haskell Independent School District met in a called session Tuesday night and accepted the resignations of four employees.

Submitting resignations were: Camin Pitman; Elementary P.E. Teacher Viola Sims; Social Studies Teacher Ann Middleton; and Head Coach, Jim Baldwin.

Board members agreed to hire Jeannine Comedy as Elementary P.E. Teacher and interviewed Coy Payne and Blue Holt for the position of Head Coach.

Following the interviews, members of the Board went into Executive Session and following the session agreed to meet again Thursday evening to further discuss the Head Coach position and other teacher openings.

Coach Baldwin submitted his resignation last Thursday to take a position as Assistant Coach in Plains.

Gary Lewis Sentenced To 20 Years

Gary Lee Lewis pled guilty to aggravated rape July 18 in Stonewall County and received a twenty year prison sentence.

Lewis entered the plea before District Judge Joe Williams who issued the sentence.

Lewis was charged in connection with the March 13 rape of a 16 year old Aspermont woman. He was represented by Fort Worth attorney, Danny D. Burns.

District Attorney Joseph Thigpen said that a term of the plea was that Lewis waive the right to appeal.

Lewis was transported to the Texas Department of Corrections last week.

Thigpen said that he agreed to the plea bargain for three reasons: 1. To avoid the victim from having to relive the traumatic experience in open court; 2. To be assured that the defendant would be punished by confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections; and 3. To prevent the long and uncertain appeal process.

Lewis was found guilty of aggravated assault in December 1979 and has been out on appeal since that time.


He is a 1972 graduate of Abilene Christian University with a degree in Agriculture Economics and a graduate of the Colorado School of Banking.


Fair Catalogs Available

Plans for the 75th West Texas Fair & Rodeo are well on the way with the release of the catalogs for various Fair activities. The Modern Living Mall and Livestock Premium Catalogs are now available through the Fair Office at the Taylor County Expo Center, P.O. Box 5527, Abilene, Texas 79608.

The catalogs outline the rules and requirements for the activities in both divisions. Deadline for all livestock entries is August 21st. Entries for the Modern Living Mall departments will be Tuesday, September 8th and Wednesday, the 9th, except for perishable foods (Sat., Sept. 19th) and Youth Clothing (Tues., Sept. 15th).

In addition, Fair Manager John Emmons announced that there remains unlimited outdoor display booth space as well as some 70 inside booths in the Exhibit and Display Buildings. The fee for display booths is \$200 for 10' x 10' interior space which includes a name banner and professional drapes. Outdoor space rents for \$12 per front foot. However, Emmons pointed out that all permanent concession space has been rented.

This is your column. I am pleased to have the opportunity to discuss problems in painting with you. One of the questions most often asked is "What color should be used for flowers, fruit, bottles, etc. Below are suggestions for flower colors."

What is color? Color begins with and is derived from light-artificial or natural. The rays of light are projected through the prism to give us the spectrum of colors. Webster's New World Dictionary takes approximately two inches to define color, starting with, "...differing qualities of the light reflected or emitted by them." And ending, "...with flying colors." How could those in our "brightly pigmented" world make out without color? What a boring world we'd all face with the absence of color! Colors have been classified by their four chief qualities, hue, value, chroma and temperature. Hue is what we usually call color by name—red, blue, whatever. Value means the degree of darkness or lightness, regardless of color; a pastel yellow is light in value

and Burnt Umber is dark in value. Chroma is a term for a color's intensity, or saturation, its degree of vividness. Temperature is the degree of warmth or coldness from an aesthetic point of view. The distinction between "warm" and "cool" is purely artistic and has no physical basis. The warm colors are colors of fire and the cool colors are those of ice and water, which is the way I remember them. Color systems are widely used today. Do you have a color wheel?

COLOR COMBINATIONS FOR FLOWERS

VIOLETS: Blue: white plus small amount of Prussian Blue. Purple: White plus Shiva Violet Deep. White: White plus Thalo Yellow Green and Raw Sienna.

CHRYSANTHEMUMS: White: White plus Yellow Light; Thalo yellow Green plus Naples Yellow and Raw Sienna. Crimson: Cadmium Orange plus Geranium Lake plus Cadmium Red light and Burnt Sienna. Golden: Raw Sienna plus Cadmium Yellow Medium plus Orange and Burnt Sienna.

SUNFLOWERS: (Warm) Base: Cadmium Yellow Medium plus Lemon Yellow. Shade: Burnt Sienna plus Burnt Umber. Highlight: White. (Cool) Base: Lemon Yellow. Shade: Burnt Umber plus Sap Green. Highlight: White.

POPPIES: Base: Cadmium Red Light. Shade: Alizarin Crimson. Highlight: White and Yellow. Leaves: Prussian Blue plus Cadmium Yellow Medium. Shades of leaves: Burnt Umber plus Prussian Blue. Note: By using Cadmium Yellow Medium mixed with Prussian Blue, a more yellow-green leaf can be painted.

IRIS: Make a special pink mixture with Yellow-green plus a mixture of Black and White, for a soft gray.

DAISIES: Yellow: Burnt Sienna plus Cadmium Red Light in equal parts for undercoat for petals, pull over Cadmium Yellow Medium and a little white. White: Use Olive Green and Burnt Sienna for shade on petals. Center of Daisies: Burnt Sienna and Burnt Umber. Greens used for leaves: Sap, Olive and Thalo Green.

97 Register At 8th Biannual Ratliff Reunion

The descendants of Marquis Lafayette and Narcissa Jane (Beasley) Ratliff held their 8th biannual reunion at the Falconhead Country Club, located 18 miles south of Ardmore, Oklahoma on Route 32 on July 18-19, 1981. The first reunion was held in 1967 at Greenshores near Austin.

Members of the family came from as far away as Long Beach, California and Cottage Grove, Minnesota. Others in attendance came from Arizona, Louisiana, Mississippi, Oklahoma and Texas. A total of 97 was registered.

Marquis Lafayette and Narcissa J. Ratliff were natives of Hickman County, Tennessee. They came to Texas in 1892 and settled in Cooke County; in 1909 they

moved to Glasscock County, where they lived until 1912, when they moved to Jones Creek, about 3 miles south of Stamford. They reared ten children, 7 sons and 3 daughters. Mrs. Ratliff passed away in 1918, and Mr. Ratliff died in 1937. They are both buried in Highland Cemetery near Stamford.

The only surviving child of this family of ten is Mrs. J.E. (Eva) Jeffress of Amarillo who is now 93 years old. She was among those attending the reunion and kept those present amused by her tales of her childhood and her brothers and sisters, as well as many characteristics of her mother and father she remembers yet.

As is the custom with the Ratliff families, on Sunday morning a worship service was held with James Ratliff Arledge in charge of the service. Following this worship service, a business meeting was held. Following are the results of the election of officers: James Ratliff Arledge, Dallas, president; David W. Ratliff, Stamford, vice president; Mrs. W.D. (Marie) Bradford, Lewisville, secretary-treasurer; and Mrs. W.B. (Edith) Gunn, Amarillo, continuing as historian, with authority to appoint her committee.

Plans are to hold another reunion at the same location in 1983. All in attendance remarked that it was a renewal of fellowship and relatives long to be remembered.






Originally part of a national society founded in New York in 1840, Hermann Sons in Texas became autonomous in 1921. Headquarters are located

All these services are provided free to the congressman, at taxpayers' expense.

Male members and aides can get a haircut at the Capitol Barbershop for the unheard-of price of \$3.50. Female members and aides enjoy a complete range of beauty services at comparably low costs.

Meals are provided at reduced rates in private dining rooms—with no sales tax.

If they want to make recordings for political use back home, congressmen use the low-rate radio and TV studios conveniently maintained at public expense.

These lawmakers have not only reserved parking space at the Capitol, but also in preferred locations at National and Dulles airports. They need parking places there because they do a lot of air travel. They have virtually unlimited opportunity for overseas and domestic travel—official business, of course. And they also get plenty of time off for vacations and campaigning.

And the benefits keep coming after they leave office. Congressmen qualify for liberal retirement benefits after five years' service. Top pension after 32 years in office is \$48,530.


