Chamber Directors Finalize Plans For Dove Shoot

Directors of the Haskell Chamber of Commerce met Tuesday the giant dove shoot this weekend.

The two day event will begin with registration from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on the northwest corner of the square on Saturday and shooting will begin at 3 p.m. each day.

Hunters will compete for cash prizes which will be given away for the top hunter Saturday, the top hunter Sunday and the top hunter for the two days.

A portion of each entry fee of

\$30.00 will be paid back to the hunters in the form of cash prizes afternoon to discuss final plans for and the more hunters, the bigger the

> Approximately 5,000 acres of land has been leased by the Chamber of Commerce and all hunters will hunt on this land. Maps of the property will be provided to hunters and Chamber personnel will also be on hand to assist hunters.

- 1. Contestants will be required to shoot in groups of two or more and are responsible for judging each other in their group.
- 2. Judging sheets will be provided to each group and must be completed to qualify for prizes.
- 3. All State and Federal Game Laws will be enforced.
- 4. All dove must be flying when shot.
- 5. All hulls and trash must be picked up. 6. Shooting will commence no earlier than 3 p.m. each day.
- Contestants may hunt only on property designated on maps.
- 8. Dove killed but not recovered will not be counted. 9. Contestants are responsible for finding their own hunting
- locations on the designated property.
- 10. Contestants shall not interfere with other contestants. 11. All contestants are responsible for any and all damages.
- 12. All ties for prizes will be divided.
- 13. All contestants agree to undergo polygraph test.
- 14. Any contestant violating rules will be automatically disqualified.
- 15. All decisions of the judges are final.
- 16. Dove must be presented for count when contestant checks in. (All dove will be returned to contestant).

Local Game Warden Seeks Cooperation

Alton Chapman, local Warden with the Texas Department of Parks and Wildlife, has asked for the cooperation of all local hunters and residents during hunting seasons.

With the opening of dove season September 1, Chapman told the Free Press that hunters need to brush up on their awareness of game

Several new laws were passed by the legislature this year and were effective September 1.

Ambulance Board Hires Strickland

Board members of the Haskell Ambulance Service have hired Wes Strickland as a full time attendant and Darrell Hanks part time effective September 1.

Both Strickland and Hanks are Emergency Medical Technicians and have completed over 100 hours of emergency medical training.

In addition to these personnel, several trained volunteers will also be used and an emergency care attendant class will be taught in the near future to secure more volunteers.

All persons interested in the 40 hour ECA class are asked to contact Strickland or Don Comedy for further information.

The Ambulance Service is subsidized by the City, County and Hospital and the board is composed of members of the governing bodies of these entities as well as other local residents.

One new law which Chapman says will affect many local varmit hunters was passed which completely stops spotlighting from roads.

For dove hunters Chapman said there were several changes in hunting laws this year including increasing the limit to 12 dove per day and 24 in possession.

The state trespass law was also changed to include penalties of up to 180 days in the County Jail and or \$1,000.00 fine for persons guilty of trespassing without a firearm. Persons found guilty of trespassing with firearm in their possession may be punished by up to one year in the County Jail and or a fine of up to \$2,000.00.

Chapman asked that local hunters also consider these laws which commonly result in a large portion of violations.

The Haskell Swimming Pool will remain open Labor Day weekend from 1 to 5 p.m. Saturday and Monday and 1:30 to 5 Sunday. If enough interest is shown the pool will remain open as long as the weather permits.

Dove season opens 30 minutes before sunrise and closes at sunset; hunting over a baited area is unlawful; birds killed by several hunters may not be pooled; no hunter may transport more than 24

Hunters may not shoot from a vehicle or shoot across, along or from a public road; all shotguns must be plugged to accept no more than three shells; each bird is a separate offense and weapons or violators may be confiscated and held until final disposition of the

Chapman rates this year's dove crop as the best in the past four years and advises that hunters should be successful in hunting around sunflowers, maize or wheat stubble or stock tanks.

Scientist conducts herbicide study on campus rooftop


COLLEGE STATION -Early findings from 32 artificial streams built on a Texas A&M University rooftop indicate exposure of stream algae to atrazine, the active ingredient in the herbicide Aatrex, can all but destroy the photosynthesis of the single-celled organisms.

Algae are vital in any creek ecosystem because they add dissolved oxygen to the water through photosynthesis, a process that can be destroyed or temporarily blocked by some herbicides, said Texas A&M biologist Dr. Robert

Other preliminary tests suggest that another herbicide nown as trifluralin found in the cotton-farming chemical Treflan, poses few problems for algae, said Kosinski, chief scientist on the unique Environmental Protection Agencyfunded project.

Superintendent's Views

Superintendent Haskell ISD

Each Thursday, the administrative staff consisting of the principals and myself and sometimes, the business manager meet for discussion of common problems and for communication. The purpose of these weekly meetings is to keep each other informed of what is going on in the various elements of our school system. At this time we can discuss together any common pro-

One of the chief items on our agenda last Thursday was the problem of declining student enrollment. At the end of the first week of school, we had a rather bleak picture. At the end of the 1979-1980 school term, we had 730 students enrolled. At the end of the first week of this term we had 704 students enrolled. Thus, the trend of declining population prevails. This trend has gone on for at least

What problems does this decline present? The first one is financial. Much of the state foundation program is based on ADA (average daily attendance). As ADA declines, so does our staff aid. However, this loss of revenue is difficult to reflect in our school program simply because we still are required to maintain a basic program regardless of numbers. This basic program requires faculty. Approximately 80% of our budget is consumed in salaries. This is a rather flexible figure. What offset this decline in school can the administration do to help remedy this situation? Each time a teacher resigns or retires, we are forced to take a hard serious look at absorbing their assignments without replacement. When we hire replacements, we must strive to hire people with as diverse a background as possible.

What can you as parents do

to help this situation? You can encourage your students to be in school each and every day. It is important for a student to be in school each day for his or her education development. This attendance is also all important to the school. We have consistently been around the 95% of attendance the last few years. An increase of 2% would help considerably. We would encourage you as parents to assist us in keeping our students in school first for their educational development and, second, to help the school population.

University System. They're a wise choice for homesewers whose budgets won't stretch to cover the cost of a new machine, Saunders

They're ideal for people who just do simple sewing or repairs, and they're a cautious choice for beginners or "returners" to sewing who aren't sure how much or what they'll be sewing, the specialist adds.

FINDING A MACHINE Used sewing machines are are available at retail stores that sell reclaimed or trade-in machines as well as new ones. Household auctions, garage sales or want ads are other sources, Saunders suggests.

A reconditioned sewing machine purchased from a retail dealer should carry a warranty, she says.



Think twice before accepting insurance that "will pay off a loan" in case of death, advises Bonnie Piernot, a family resource management specialist.

This kind of insurance credit-life insurance—pays off the debt if the debtor dies before the loan has been paid

However, if you have other life insurance, you probably do not need the credit-life insurance, the specialist says.

Piernot is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agriculture Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System.

CREDIT-LIFE COSTS In most cases, credit-life insurance is a needless expense, and it is rarely a good buy, Piernot says.



For the letter "B," use .10-that stands for 10 percent inflation rate between now and when you retire. (Of course, if the inflation rate levels off at five percent, you would want to re-figure this using .05 for "B.")

The letter "n" stands for the number of years between now and when you retire.

Then just do the arithmetic.

'X''-and it's the annual amount of income you will need for your first year of retirement.

Here's an example of what your figures might look like:

Let's say your one-year of retirement budget totals \$22,652 (A). Remember, that's your retirement budget based on today's prices. Then, let's say the rate of inflation is .10 (B), and say it will be 15 years (n) until you retire.

So, your formula would look like this: \$22,652 X (1+.10)15. Your answer: \$94,623.03.

In other words, when you retire, your retirement income for your first year of retirement should be \$94,623.03. You will need to account for inflation for each year there-

Another method for estimating your retirementmoney needs is simply to plan for 65-75 percent of your pre-retirement annual income each year of your retirement years, compounded for inflation if you plan to maintain your present standard of



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CHEESE STUFFED **BEEF BALLS**

1/4 teaspoon salt

in 6 cubes

1 can (10 3/4 ounces) Campbell's Condensed Tomato Soup

11/2 pounds ground beef 2/3 cup Italian flavored fine dry breadcrumbs 2/3 cup chopped onion 1 egg

4 ozs. mozarella cheese, cut

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
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
