However, statistics show that since July 1, 1981, there has been a gradual increase in blood usage at Regional hospitals and an increase

in the number of replacements made for residents of the area who have been hospitalized "out of Region".

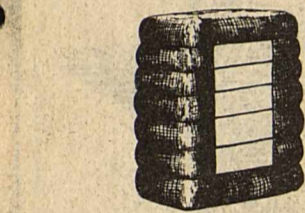
Increased usage and expected Holiday Season decline in collections make it imperative that all residents who have not donated in the past 56 days and those who are eligible, but have never donated,

Mrs. Rueffer is a busy lady always helping out in the field with whatever needs to be done. She raises a garden whenever possible and cans throughout the summer. She is the family seamstress, bookkeeper, errand girl and whatever.

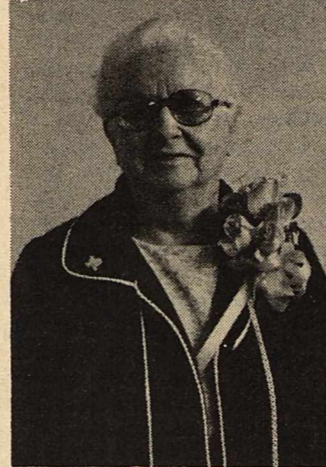

Guy went into partnership in Linden in the sawmill business. It was known as Hampton-Kennedy Lumber Company.

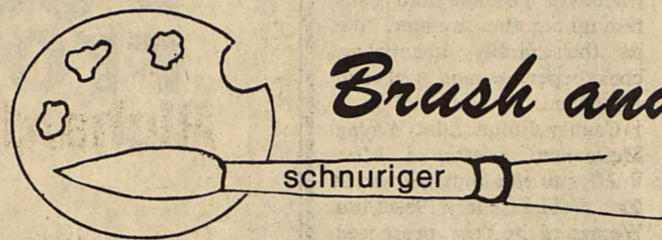
In 1952 they moved their family here to Haskell and bought out Drew Lumber Company.

But an artist's silence does not mean that he is unintelligent, or that cannot explain his work, if he wishes to do so. I have not discovered any short cuts that I could pass on. Most 'named' brands of materials give you plenty of advice with their points. Yes, it does help to draw but I do not believe it a waste of time, if you cannot.

The medium and technique are not major facts in art. They are only tools. When learning, one should try every medium in order to find one which suits you. A competent painter can use any medium and will manage to produce reasonably good work, under any circumstances. We pick our materials out of personal interest or convenience, and this may vary from month to month, or year to year.

Q. Do people still do nature collages?

A. Yes, people of all ages enjoy this form of art, or craft, which consists of natural materials such as leaves, pebbles, sand, etc. Using a rigid panel, the materials are glued on to the surface. Our classes have gone so far as to attach the materials to the panel, cover completely with Gesso, then using oil paints, develop a good piece of art. Let's not forget a generous measure of ingenuity in selection of color, contrast of materials and composition, as in canvas painting.

Q. Are bristle brushes taboo for acrylic painting?

A. No, a brush of any material may be used for acrylic painting. Synthetic brushes are considered by some to be more compatible with acrylics but any brush of your choice will work. Keep your brush wet during the painting process or you will have a disaster with a good brush. Always clean the brushes immediately after painting.

Q. What are the fundamentals of design?

A. There are five: Contrast, Balance, Proportion, Rhythm and Unity.

Q. What precautions should be taken when using fluorescent colors?

A. These colors can be used as freely as desired as they are not toxic. We do not use them in oil painting but some use them with Casein and Guache. The thing that disqualifies them for serious painting is that they are not permanent, will fade and change with age. They are good for decorative purposes.

HINT: Learn to see! This is the ultimate challenge of every artist - today, tomorrow and in the future.

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## Texas A&M Corps Enrollment Increases

COLLEGE STATION — Enrollment in the Corps of Cadets at Texas A&M University for fall 1981 totals 2,374 cadets, a substantial increase for the third consecutive year.

The increase, about 5 percent over last year, means that Texas A&M's uniformed student body is growing at about the same rate as the overall university enrollment.

U.S. Army Col. James R. Woodall, commandant of cadets, attributed the increase to "a lot of intensive recruit-

ing," and "an indication in the change in attitudes of society about the military and national defense."

About 20 percent of all incoming male freshmen students now join the Corps of Cadets, Woodall said, but adds he would like to see Corps strength reach 3,000.

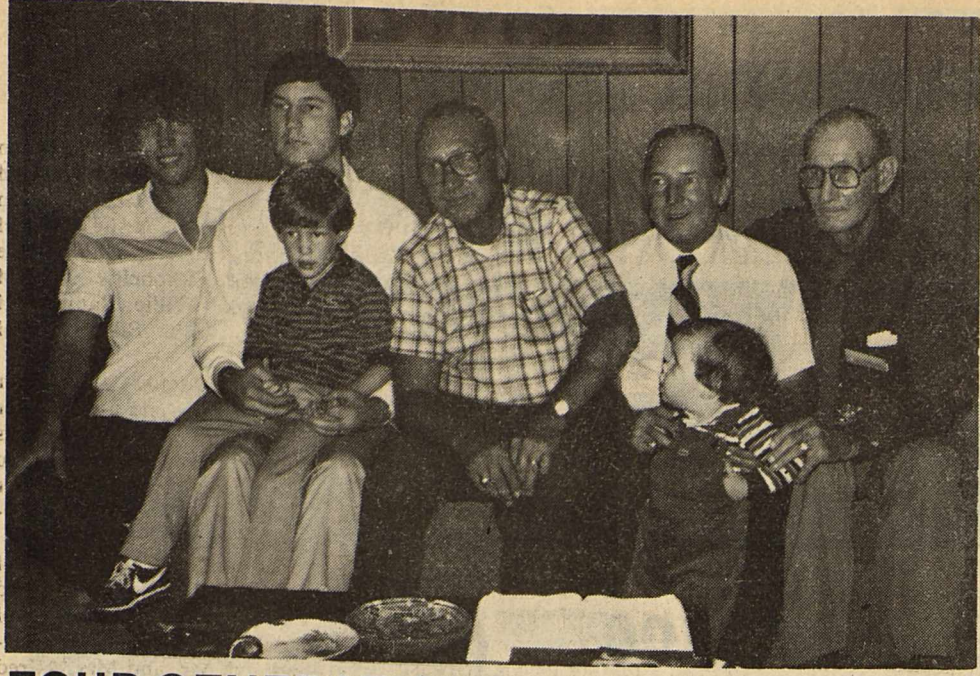

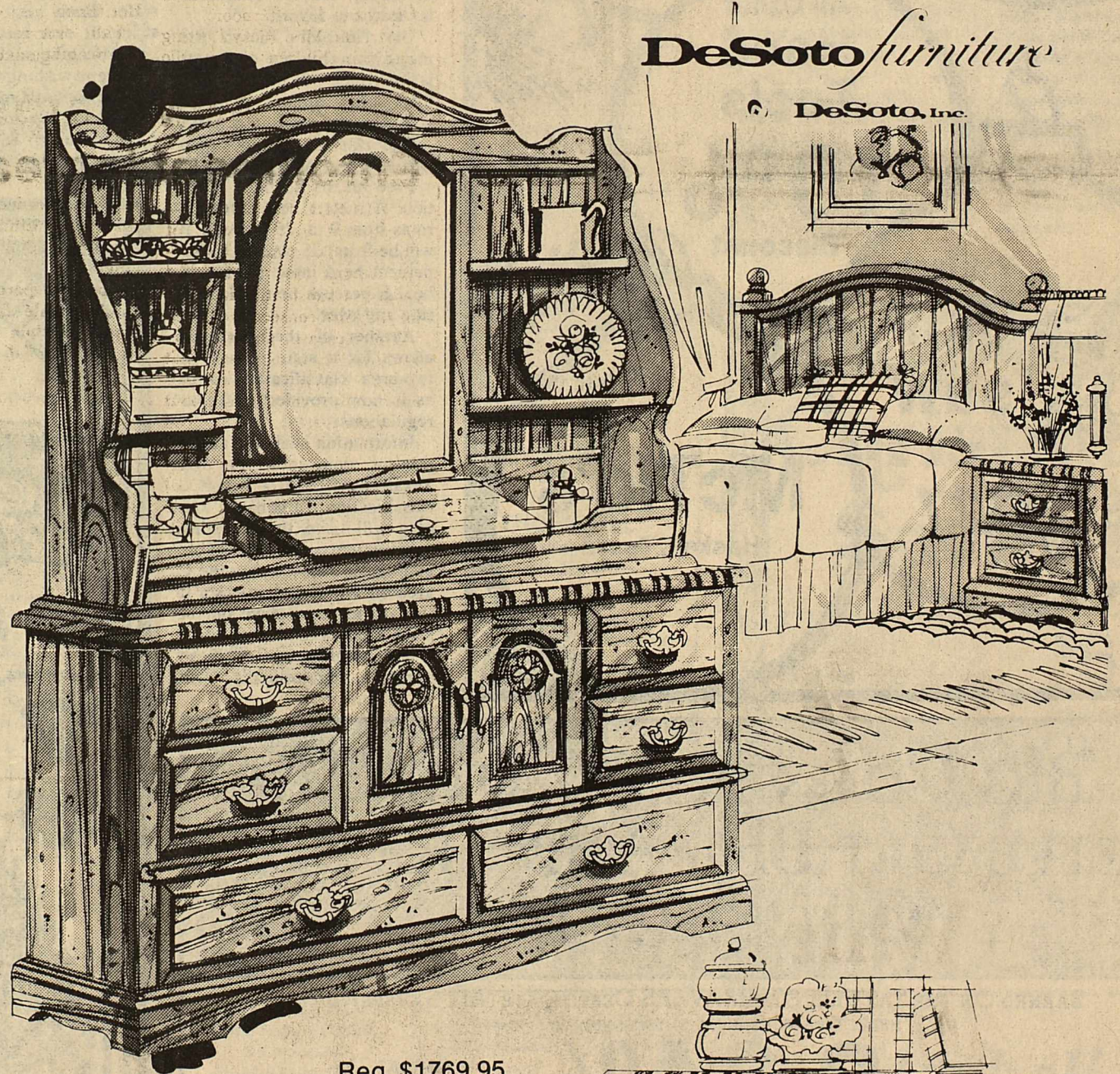

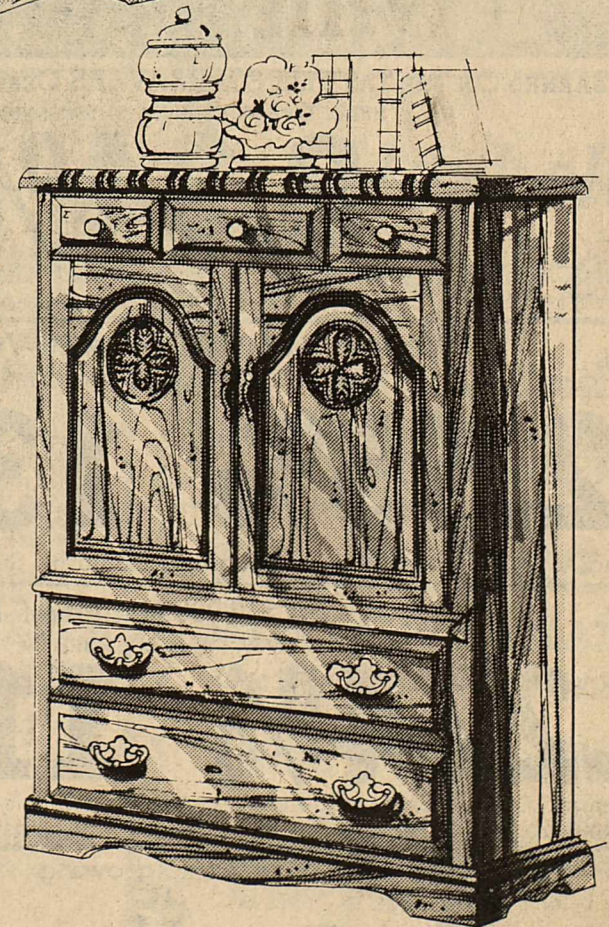

**Conservation Viewpoints**

With cotton harvest nearing the half way mark, activities in many fields are just beginning. Winter months bring on construction of terraces and waterways.

Good progress is being made toward application of parallel terraces cost shared under the Great Plains Conservation Program. Bill Cox of Haskell has completed a parallel terrace system in conjunction with two grassed waterways. These waterways will serve as terrace outlets and prevent soil loss to low lying areas. G.W. Lefevre has completed a parallel terrace

system on his farm at Sagerton and began a new system on another field. Waterways were previously established on both of these fields to serve as terrace outlets. Leroy Casey of Rule is in the process of completing a parallel terrace system. Waterways were previously established to serve as terrace outlets. Jack Gillenland of Haskell recently completed shaping a grassed waterway to better serve a parallel terrace system to be constructed following wheat harvest.

Parallel terrace systems

cost shared under the Long Term Agreement Contracts to be constructed are Tim Burson of Haskell, W.O. Ratliff of Munday, Twain Mickler and Dan Griffith of Paint Creek and Clois Thomas of Haskell.

We know other producers are interested in carrying out conservation work with the assistance of these cost share programs, but due to delayed funding of these cost share programs no applications are being accepted at this time. It is uncertain as to when funds will be available for these programs in 1982.

**Brucellosis Comments Due By December 8**

Dec. 8 is deadline for submitting comments on proposed federal regulations relating to brucellosis, Dr. John W. Holcombe, executive director, Texas Animal Health Commission, said.

"These changes will have an impact on Texas, and producers need to be aware of them," Dr. Holcombe said. If approved, the changes will become a part of the Uniform Methods and Rules, which are minimum federal standards for states to follow.

Dr. Holcombe noted the major change in the proposals is one which will provide for a four classification system for states or areas within a state. The classification designation is: Free, A, B, and C.

Free means no herd infection. A means herd infection rates from 0 to .25 percent; B will be from .25 percent to 1.5 percent herd infection; C will be 1.5 percent herd infection rate and over.

Another of the proposals allows for a state to have a two-area classification, such as is now provided in Texas regulations.

Information available at the present time indicates that Texas could be in a B and C classification. In general, a C area will have these testing requirements: A test-eligible animal can move within the C area on one negative test; If the animal is to move out of state or out of the C area into a B area within the state, these general requirements will

apply; A vaccinated animal can move on one negative test with retest at destination; A non-vaccinated animal will require two negative tests 60 days apart, with the second test within 30 days prior to movement, and retest at destination; Certified free herds may move without test but must have certificate; An entry permit is required from the receiving state.

The proposed regulations affecting movement across state lines is the most stringent ever recommended, Dr. Holcombe said.

**Electricity tenderizes Texas beef**

COLLEGE STATION — The tender steaks you've been buying at the meat counter or ordering in restaurants probably got that way because they were jolted with more than 500 volts of electricity, says a Texas A&M University researcher.

Meat packing plants across the country now routinely stimulate beef carcasses electrically, a procedure developed at Texas A&M that produces tender meat without chemicals.

"The process of electrical stimulation to tenderize steaks and make them more tasty has gained rapid popularity among meat packing plants," said Dr. Jeff Savell, an animal scientist in Texas A&M's College of Agriculture.

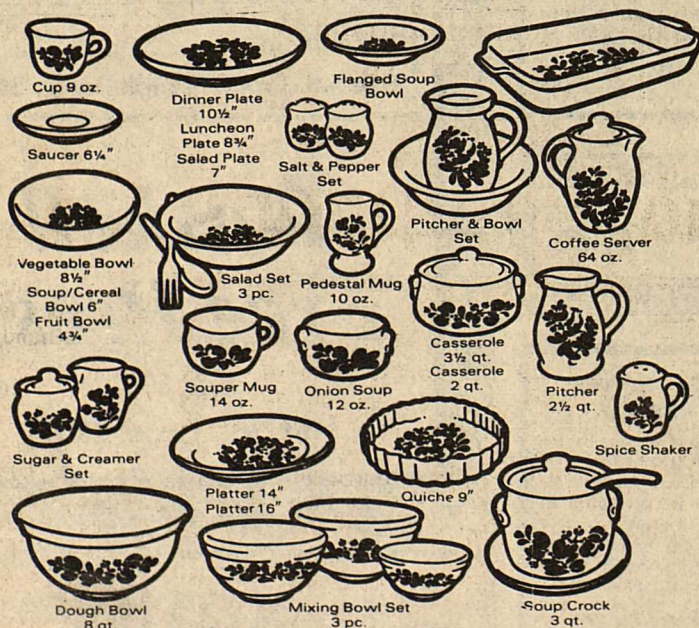

## Proper Pecan Storage Hints

It would be a shame to lose your pecans now. They are hard to grow during hot, dry summers, like the one we just experienced. Proper storage is

very important to retain their naturally good quality and taste.

Pecans are semi-perishable and unless properly cared for

may become inedible due to mold, off flavor, discoloration or insect damage. These detrimental characteristics can be prevented if proper

storage practices are employed. Several of the more important factors to consider include: adequate drying, proper packaging and refrigeration.

According to County Extension Agent Max Stapleton, it is imperative to start with a high quality nut since proper storage conditions will not improve quality, only maintain it at or near post-harvest cured conditions.

High oil content and the fact that the oil is 93 percent unsaturated is one of the most important factors affecting the storability of pecans. Nutritionists say that an unsaturated oil is healthier, but this type oil shortens the shelf life of pecan products because of increased susceptibility to rancidity.

Stapleton says that homeowners should store pecans in a polyethylene bag, either in shell or shelled, and place them in the refrigerator of the deep freeze, depending on how long they want to store them. At room temperature the shelf life is 4 months in the shell and 3 months shelled. In the refrigerator the pecans will hold good quality for 19 months in the shell or 12 months shelled. Pecans can be held in the deep freeze near 0°F for two years with very little adverse effect on the kernel quality.

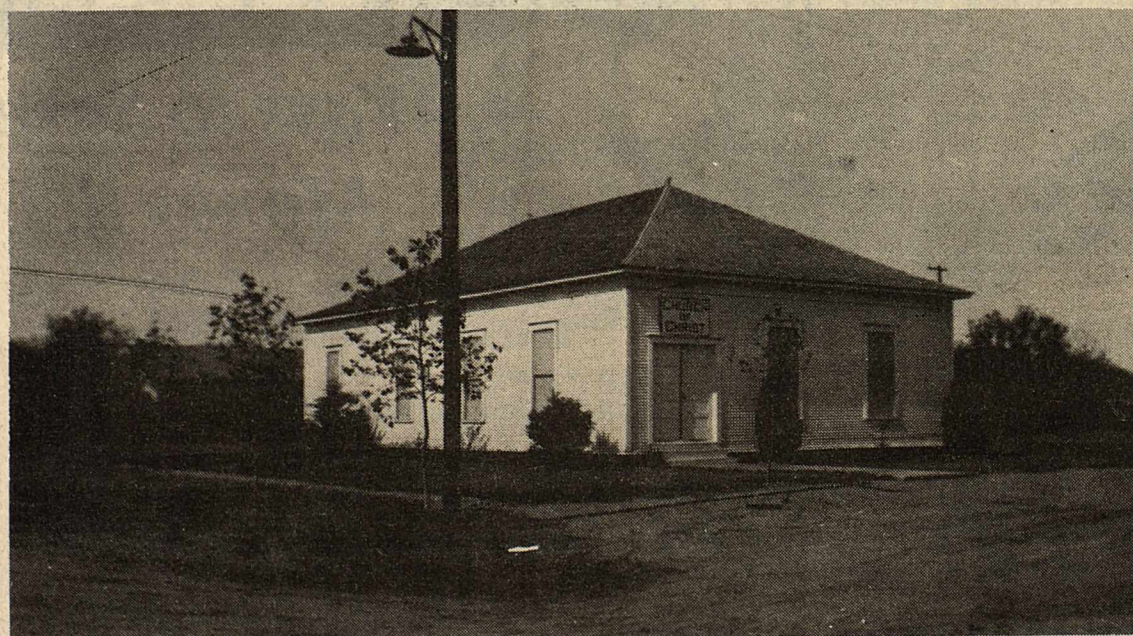

## Use Of Toxic Chemicals Cuts Livestock Loss From Predators

Predators continue to inflict heavy losses to livestock, poultry and other wildlife, pointing to the need for an effective remedy.

That remedy could come in the use of toxic chemicals, but use of such materials, particularly Compound 1080, is not yet sanctioned by the Environmental Protection Agency.

However, some inroads are being made toward legalizing the use of these chemicals, points out Dr. Dale Wade, a wildlife specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Information presented at recent informal hearings may warrant the EPA to open formal hearings before an administrative law judge.

"If such hearings do come about, they would include information on the use of the 1080 toxic collar to protect sheep and goats as well as possible use of 1080-treated baits," notes Wade.

While such hearings might finally lead to an effective predator control technique for ranchers, they likely would not be completed in time to allow use of toxic chemicals during the coming winter season, adds the specialist.

"Coyotes continue to cause the heaviest losses to livestock and poultry, and their populations are increasing," says

Wade. "They have been a problem to sheep and goat producers for many years, but now they also are causing increased losses in cattle. And the problem is no longer confined to western states; several eastern states now report increased coyote populations and significant livestock losses."

In addition to preying on livestock and poultry, coyotes also have inflicted heavy losses in pronghorn antelope, mule deer and other wild species in recent years, adds Wade. This has led some state wildlife agencies to support the use of toxic agents against predators.

"With ranchers currently operating at low profit margins or even losses due to poor prices, livestock losses to predators are a major concern," points out Wade. "Furthermore, these losses

will ultimately be reflected in reduced meat supplies at higher prices."

An added factor is the loss of agricultural land to other uses when small operators can

no longer survive production and predator costs. When this happens, producers, consumers and the whole nation suffers, contends the specialist.

# School Playground Safety Reduces Injuries To Students

A 6-year-old girl's skull is fractured when she runs into a moving playground swing. A 9-year-old boy suffers a concussion when he is pushed off the top of a slide. A

10-year-old develops an infection from a cut on a piece of broken glass on the playground.

These are but three of what is estimated at more than

125,000 injuries treated in hospital emergency rooms every year as a result of playground accidents—at school, in parks and at home. Nearly half occur in schools,

with most of the victims being between 5 and 10 years old.

With the new school year under way, safety researchers at the Combined American Insurance Company urge increased vigilance against playground accidents. They note that while most of these mishaps are not as serious as those on the playing fields or the highways, they keep school nurses, doctors and hospitals busier than they need be.

Combined Insurance reports that research indicates that the highest incidence of playground accidents involves swings. Slides are second. Most of the mishaps are the result of carelessness on the part of the children or a lack of adult supervision.

Those who provide playground equipment, whether they be schools, park departments or parents, have a responsibility for keeping it in good condition, well anchored and properly located, the safety experts say. The providers are also responsible for seeing that children are properly supervised and controlled when at play.

Playground equipment should never be installed on hard surfaces, such as blacktop or concrete. It should be checked regularly for the tightness of nuts, bolts and clamps and the replacement or painting of rusty parts. Lighter, safer plastic should be substituted for wooden swing

seats, which can inflict deadly blows.

Children should be required to observe some rules, too, according to the Combined Insurance playground watchers. Here are a few: Never engage in rough play in or near playground equipment. That means no shoving, pushing or fighting. Always

sit in the center of a swing, never to one side. Do not swing too high and do not twist swing chains so you can see how fast you can spin while sitting. Never swing while someone is standing on the swing with you, making the seat go dangerously ever higher and higher. Never swing an empty seat or walk in the area of a moving swing. When using a slide, wait your turn and let the person ahead of you get to the bottom and walk away before you go down. Sit, do not stand on a slide and never go down head first. Make sure the supervisor knows when there is broken glass or other potentially dangerous debris on the playground so it can be removed. Keep you shoelaces tied to avoid tripping. Do not wear loose clothing, such as a scarf, which can become caught in the apparatus. Do not carry sharp objects, such as

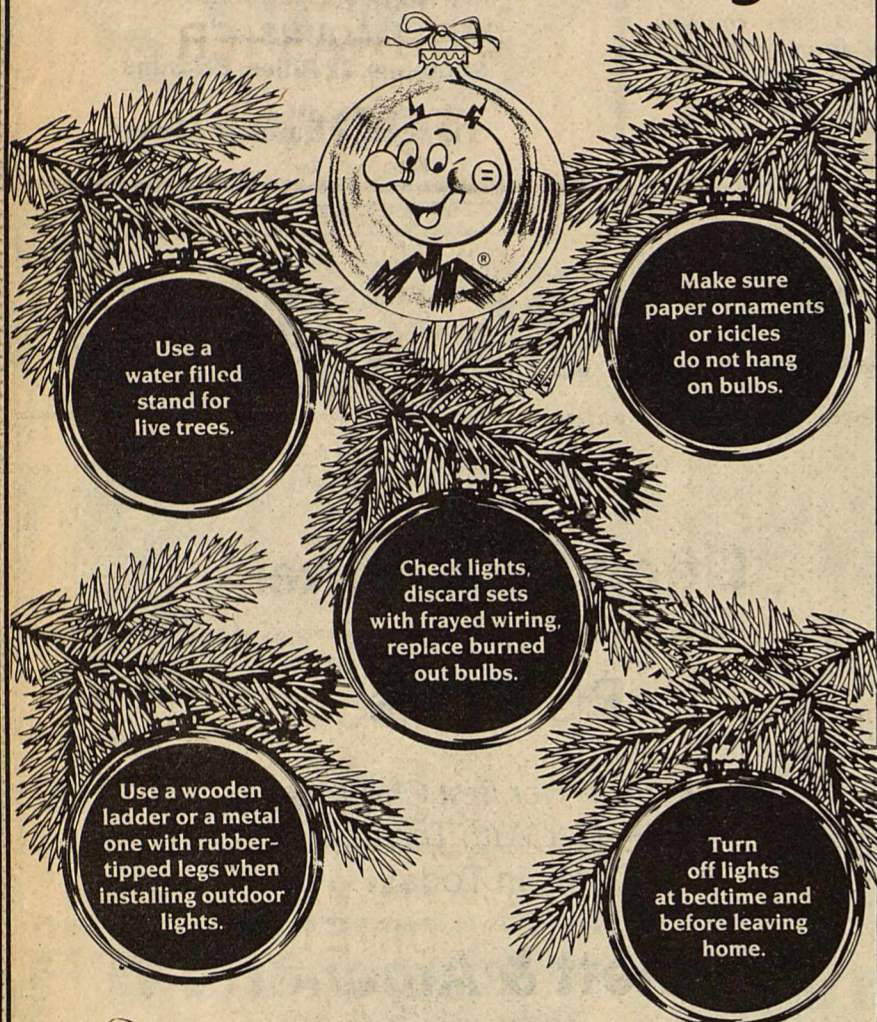
pens or pencils, in your pocket lest you are stabbed in a fall.

The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, playground organizations and safety groups are constantly seeking improved standards for the production of safer playground equipment, but

they emphasize that in the last analysis a swing, a slide or a jungle gym is really only as safe as the user makes it. Says a Combined Insurance adviser:

"The safest game or toy or equipment can be the deadliest if it is used incorrectly."

## Cotton Classing

Local cotton prices continue to trade at 2 to 2½ cents above the Government loan support, for the week ending November 27, according to B.B. Manly of the USDA Cotton Marketing Services Office, Abilene. Grade 42, staple 32 cotton miking 35 to 49 sold for 47 to 48.50 cents per pound. Lubbock Spot Quotations closed November 27 at 52.40 cents for grade 51, staple 34, mike 35 through 49, which was 14 points below loan prices and down 300 points from a week ago. Trading was slow to moderate.

Cottonseed prices paid farmers were unchanged at 75 to 90 dollars per ton.

Cotton sample receipts continued heavy as the harvest continues in its peak. About 60,000 samples were classed last week, which brought the season total to 307,000 samples classed.

The quality of cotton classed during the week showed little change from a week earlier. Grade 42 comprised 51 percent; grade 32 was 15 percent; grade 41 was 13 percent; and grade 52 was 12 percent. Staple length 31 was 48 percent; staple 32 was 35 percent; and staple 30 was 11 percent. Micronaire readings were 93 percent within the 35 to 49 range. Fiber strength averaged 22 grams per tex for the week and also for the season. About 6 percent of the samples were reduced on account of Bark, and one percent on account of Grass.

# Bootleg Seafood Not Certified By Health Dept.

You may see them throughout Texas — along highways, in parking lots or near shopping centers. They're oyster bootleggers who may be doing business from the back of a pickup

truck or camper or directly from their boats on the coast.

The present economic crunch is providing support for illegal or "bootleg" shellfish activities in the

state, reports the Shellfish Sanitation Control Division of the Texas Department of Health.

During the past few years, as oyster prices have soared, the bootleg operators have proliferated. A bootleg operation is one that is not under state inspection. The sanitary quality of the product could be highly questionable since such operations do not have the necessary facilities to process shellfish under conditions which will produce a safe product.

In addition, the shellfish may have been taken illegally from polluted shellfish growing areas and stored or handled under insanitary conditions.

"Normally," said Richard E. Thompson, chief sanitarian in the Shellfish Sanitation Control Division, "such products are sold in glass 'mayonnaise type' jars with no seals, numbers or identification relative to who packed the oysters. These oysters are usually cheaper than the oysters processed by certified dealers. The certified dealers have an investment in buildings, equipment and containers to produce safe oysters."

Anyone who purchases oysters from unknown sources faces the prospect of becoming ill, said Thompson. "The Texas Department of Health makes every effort to properly classify growing waters, certify and inspect processors, and eliminate bootleg operations, but the consumer is the ultimate decision maker."

Various illnesses can be caused by eating oysters taken from polluted waters, including cholera, hepatitis, dysentery, typhoid and several types of gastroenteritis.

While cholera isn't identified too often, cases stemming from contaminated oysters were reported in Florida in the past two years, according to Neil B. Travis, Director of the Shellfish Sanitation Control Division. Cholera has been confirmed in Jefferson County in two persons this year and 12 workers on a drilling rig off the Texas-Louisiana Coast.

Hepatitis remains a serious threat in oysters taken from unapproved waters. In an outbreak in 1973 in Houston, a total of 268 cases was confirmed in one incident. Cause of the outbreak was traced to an out-of-state shipment of oysters, which were found to have been "bootlegged" from a polluted water area.

A number of private citizens and public officials in 21 states recently filed a lawsuit against the state.

vomiting after eating oysters bought from a bootleg dealer last year.

"As long as some people continue to buy oysters from people driving around in a truck, or parked down the street or in a parking lot, without demanding a certified product, these operations will continue and people will continue to get sick," said Thompson.

## ANIMAL RABIES APPEARS ON WANE

Animal rabies in Texas appears to be on the wane for at least this year, reports Dr. Foy V. McCasland, Chief of the Bureau of Veterinary Public Health of the Texas Department of Health.

Dr. McCasland said 35 cases of rabies were reported during October to bring the year's total to 622 cases. This compares to 52 cases in October a year ago, when the 1980 total stood at 853 animal rabies cases through the first 10 months of the year.

During the month of October, Texas Department of Health laboratories examined 955 animal heads for rabies, he said. "Even though the number of laboratory confirmed rabies cases through October 1981 is 231 less than the same period of October 1980, rabies continues to be a real threat to animals and man in Texas."

Rabies was reported from 30 counties during October. Skunks led the list of rabid animals with 24 confirmed cases, followed by bats with seven cases, foxes with two cases and dogs and cattle with one case each.

Dr. McCasland warned hunters to be wary of any wild animal which appears to have lost its fear of man or

exhibits any uncharacteristic behavior. For instance, he said, a skunk normally moves about and feeds at night. One which appears during daylight may be rabid, he said.

## DALLAS EMS

The Dallas Fire Department's Emergency Medical Services, winner of the highest national award for excellence, has been honored by the Texas Board of Health for its exceptional services in emergency care.

Dr. Robert Bernstein, Commissioner of the Texas Department of Health, presented the resolution to Chief Bobby Moore of the Dallas Fire Department (DFD) EMS Division, at a meeting of the Texas EMS Advisory Council. The resolution was signed by William J. Foran, Chairman of the Texas Board of Health.

The Dallas system is the first large-city emergency medical service to receive the national recognition in the three years the award has been given.

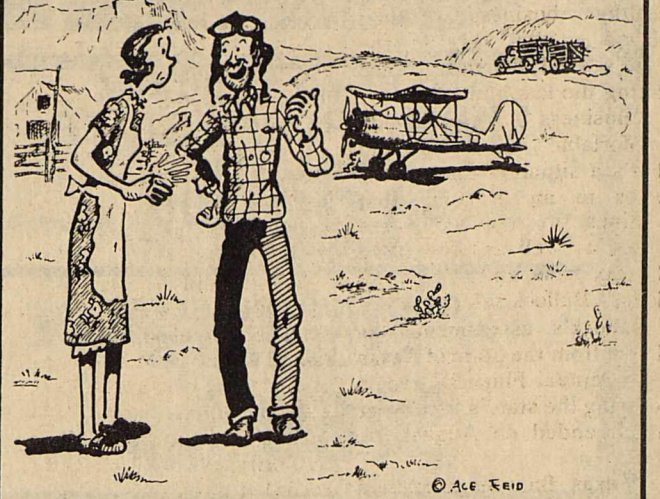
In making the presentation to Moore, Dr. Bernstein noted that the Dallas EMS was incorporated into its fire department in 1972 with assistance from the Texas Department of Health in the planning stages. "We are proud to have contributed a small part in this program which continued to expand and upgrade to the present advanced life support level of care," said Dr. Bernstein. He commended city officials and the firemen "who accepted this responsibility of pre-hospital emergency care for their tireless efforts and great sacrifices in making the Dallas EMS the best in the nation."

In reply, Moore said the accomplishment was an effort of many people in Dallas.

The Board of Health resolution noted that the DFD system started in 1972 with 16 emergency medical technician units. "In the past nine years the system has progressed into a fully functional and highly sophisticated operation with 18 mobile intensive care units operating from fire stations throughout the City of Dallas and responding to an average of 140 calls a day from the public for emergency medical assistance. Paramedics are capable of providing advanced life support through direct radio and bio-medical telemetry communication with physicians at Parkland Hospital," stated the resolution.

# Texas Business Boom Aids In State's Financial Stability

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday said Texas' prospering economy and healthy business climate played a vital role in the state's solid financial record during the last budget year.

"Business is welcome and comfortable in Texas and that's a situation that contributes to an economy that continues to outpace other states as well as strengthen the tax base and tax collections," Bullock said.

Bullock's assessment was drawn from the State of Texas 1981 Annual Financial report covering the state's fiscal year which ended on August 31, 1981.

"Texas finances remained sound," Bullock said in the report's transmittal letter to Governor Bill Clements.

Bullock noted that the Texas economy fared well in 1980, which is generally considered a recession year nationally, and that growth in population, personal income and jobs had a direct positive effect on state revenues and taxes.

The ability of Texas to absorb a high population growth while maintaining relatively high levels of employment and per capita income has been the key to the strong posture of the Texas economy, the report said.

The annual report showed that the state gained more than 300,000 jobs in the past year, and that this economic growth was instrumental in an

increase of per capita income for Texans.

Texas income grew at an average annual rate of 4.6 percent between 1977 and 1980, compared to U.S. income over the same period of 3.2 percent.

The report showed that total revenue and beginning cash balances of \$16.05 billion financed net expenditures of \$13.19 billion.

Bullock said the state ended up with a possible "cash surplus" of about \$230 million—a General Revenue fund ending cash balance of \$676.3 million, minus about \$440 million in existing spending authority and obligations not recorded or paid.

Bullock said the ending cash balance in the General Revenue Fund was less than one percent off the figure that he predicted in a Revenue Estimate to the Legislature last January.

Improved data collection and economic analysis continue to improve the state's ability to monitor its financial transactions, he said.

"The state's financial health is tied directly to the strength of the state's economy and is part and parcel to the government's financial well-being," Bullock said.

Energy production, because of higher prices, pushed oil and gas production taxes to record levels—\$2.19 billion in 1981—but still well behind state sales tax which produced

\$2.9 billion.

Oil, gas and sales tax collections were responsible for 81 percent of the 62 percent increase in tax collections, Bullock said.

Motor fuels, franchise, business, alcohol, motor vehicle, insurance, and miscellaneous taxes totaled about \$2.1 billion.

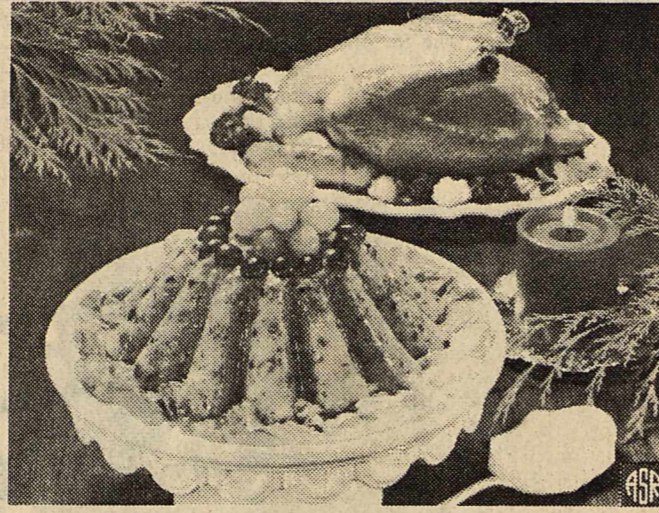
State expenditures during the year increased about 11 percent over 1980. Educational outlays claimed about

half of the increase, followed by increases in welfare and highway spending.

Support for state and local education totaled \$5.1 billion. Welfare expenditures reached \$1.8 billion and outlays for highway maintenance and construction totaled \$1.6 billion.

Texas received \$2.88 billion in federal funds during 1981 and this money accounted for 21.4 percent of the state's total net revenue.

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# San Antonio Is The Place For Christmas In Texas

The huge cyprus trees glitter with twinkling lights, carolers sing from barges on the river and the Paseo del Rio, the famed river walk, is a Christmas card scene—that's December in San Antonio.

All month long the trees are lighted and the barges, loaded with church and school choirs, ply the horseshoe bend of the river delighting onlookers with a variety of carols. The singing starts at dark and continues for a couple of hours, longer on weekends.

with Fiesta de las Luminarias, Dec. 11-13, and Las Posadas, Dec. 13. For the Fiesta weekend, luminarias (candles in paper bags) line the river walk adding another dimension to the already beautiful scene. The luminarias symbolize lighting the way for the Holy family.

Then, on Sunday night at six, Las Posadas, the reenactment of the Holy Family's search of an inn, begins. Starting riverside at La Mansion Hotel, a candlelit procession of carolers walks the Paseo del Rio to La Villita, where

the infant Jesus is placed in the creche. Piñata parties for the children follow in the plaza of La Villita. Sponsored by the San Antonio Conservation Society, Las Posadas is open to the public and visitors are encouraged to participate. Candles are furnished and there is no charge. Even a Scrooge would have difficulty resisting such an event.

The river is the centerpiece for Christmas activities in San Antonio, but there is much more. Dec. 5 and 6 the Garden Center presents its 28th annual Christmas Pilgrimage. Five homes, all lavishly decorated, are featured on the Pilgrimage tour. A Merry Mart bazaar features Christmas trees decorated with handmade ornaments and home-baked holi-

day goods and crafts are for sale. "A Christmas Carol" is presented on the stage of San Antonio's Church Theater, Dec. 3-6, 10-13, 17-20 and 25-27. Sunday performances are matinee, the others evening.

A few blocks from the river, in El Mercado, the Mexican market, Fiesta Navidena, Dec. 11-13, complements Fiesta de las Luminarias with a variety of daytime events. In the market there is dancing, drama, music and traditional Mexican holiday foods. Highlights include piñata parties for the children and blessing of the pets. Again, there is no admission charge.

The San Antonio Ballet Company adds to the holiday spirit

with performances of "Nutcracker Suite" Dec. 11-13 in the Theater of the Performing Arts.

And finally on the San Antonio Christmas calendar there is Los Pastores. This is a centuries-old Christmas miracle play that depicts the devil trying to keep the shepherds and other pilgrims from finding the Christ child. Sponsored by the Conservation Society, the play follows evening mass Dec. 26 and 27 in historic Mission San José.

San Antonio's hotels also get in the Christmas spirit with special

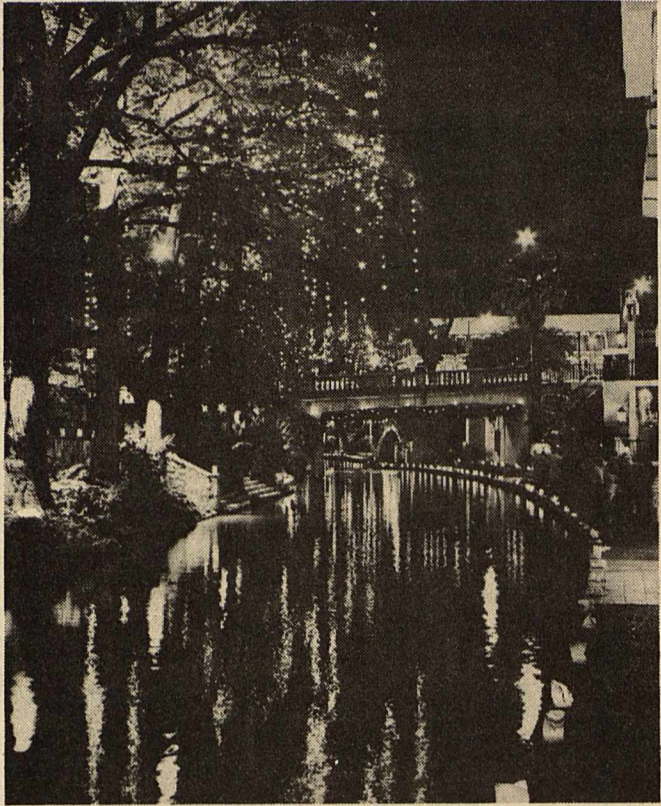

# Living Bible Paraphrased On Commuter Train

Even in these days of inflation when people deal in millions, 25-million of anything is a huge amount. And, when it comes to Bibles, the sales of 25-million copies in just ten years is almost unbelievable, but that's just what the Living Bible has done.

Actually, the Living Bible got its start in 1956 when a resident of Wheaton, Illinois commuted back and forth to Chicago, and

began paraphrasing the letters of Paul into contemporary English so that Americans who think and speak colloquial English could better understand what they were reading. As Kenneth N. Taylor—the man on the commuter train—later explained, "... what people were missing out on was the meaning of the Scriptures. The words the older versions used weren't the only words available

to express God's meaning." Apparently Taylor was right, because at least 25-million people now have a better understanding of the Bible because of his work.

The road wasn't easy for Taylor, however. The Bible was published in portions to begin with, and at first sales weren't all that encouraging. Living Letters was published at Taylor's own expense because even the publishing house he then worked for rejected the manuscript. In 1962 only 800 copies sold. Then Billy Graham came across a copy of Living Letters, liked it, and contacted Taylor. In fact, Graham was so impressed he ordered 50-thousand copies to be used as giveaways on his telecast. Within a year, Living Letters was a best seller.

Taylor began a small publishing company in his garage and named it "Tyndale House" for William Tyndale who was burned at the stake for translating the Bible from Latin into English

some three centuries earlier. Taylor kept on paraphrasing until he had completed the Living New Testament, which was an instant success.

Fourteen years later in 1971 Taylor had completed paraphrasing the entire Bible. A few copies came off the presses just before Christmas 1971 and book dealers began crying for more copies. The typically conservative Taylor had far outordered on the first printing. 1971 was a banner year for Tyndale House. Even through 1972 back orders were usually on hand awaiting delivery from the printing house.

Taylor never intended, from the very first, to make any profit for himself out of his paraphrased Scriptures. He said that "The Bible is God's word, not mine. He just allowed me to make it a little more readable and understandable."

Taylor decided to put all of what would normally be considered the author's royalties into a

foundation. This foundation would fund, along with the donations of private individuals, Living Bibles International, an organization that would paraphrase the Bible into the contemporary languages of the people in many other countries. Currently this work is going on in over 100 other languages around the world, with 31 New Testaments and 5 entire Bibles now completed. This pleases Taylor because he believes people can better live out their faith when they better understand what God is communicating to them through His word. Each time a Living Bible is sold, more funds go into the work of paraphrasing the Bible into other languages.

Because it was new, the Living Bible was the best selling book of any kind (fiction, non-fiction,

Christian or secular) in both years of 1971 and 1972. This is an unmatched record in itself in the publishing business. This is one of the reasons Taylor was recently presented the annual Gutenberg Award by the Chicago Bible Society. He now joins the ranks of other Gutenberg awardees such as Billy Graham, Herbert Hoover and Fulton Sheen.

Still now—ten years later—the Living Bible sells over 1-million copies every year. And as for Tyndale House, it is still growing and currently has over 400 Christian titles in publication.

And, Taylor still marvels remembering 1956 when he began paraphrasing the Bible on a scratchpad while riding a dingy, crowded Chicago and Northwestern commuter train.

## Texas May Become A Major Wine Producing State

AUSTIN--Texas: Big money, beef cattle, oil rigs, J. R. Ewing, cowboys, gleaming cities, border towns, blue mountains. Now there is something new to add. Wine.

"Though it may not conform to the state's stereotyped image, a fledgling wine industry has sprung up and is already garnering some praise," Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown announced.

Though production is limited, keeping most Texans from their first sip of native wine, the history of grape cultivation in the state goes back to the early 1700's when Spanish missionaries grew the fruit for fermenting. In 1883 the state's first winery was established in Del Rio, a small Southwest Texas town on the Mexican border. Called Val Verde Winery, it is still run by the family that began it, the Qualias. Val Verde relies on Lenoir or Black Spanish and Herbermont varieties, the mainstay of the tiny Texas industry until the 1970's. In the last decade, however, something of a boom occurred. People began experimenting with French and American hybrids and vitis vinifera, the European wine grape used in the world's best-known wines. At that point, Texans seriously began to "think wine."

Six small wineries, including Val Verde, are operating in different parts of the state with a seventh scheduled to open. All but one process their own grapes, and some press grapes from other vineyards as well as their own. With the exception of Llano Estacado, which is located on the High Plains near Lubbock, vineyards at the wineries grow mainly hybrid grapes, not the highly praised vitifera that French and California wines are made from. Several of these wines, however, are considered good, a few select. Among

them are Rayon d'Or from La Buena Vida, which won vintner Dr. Bobby Smith a gold medal in the Eastern United States Wine Judging Competition. Two other wines of Smith's have also excelled in this contest.

"Small wineries that do an excellent job will be able to make an acceptable wine that will sell," contends Dr. William Lipe, director of grape research in Lubbock for the Texas A&M Experiment Station. But for most high quality table wines, he and others believe vitis vinifera will determine Texas's place in the United States wine industry.

Llano Estacado manager and winemaker Kim McPherson believes name recognition makes wine from vitifera grapes highly marketable. "You're not going to sell (wine made from) hybrids in this state," he asserted. "We're too far west. We have California tastes."

Though several small vitifera vineyards have been planted in West Texas, the University of Texas has made the biggest commitment in terms of land and money thus far. Ten years ago, Billy Carr, surface land manager of the university's 2.1 million acres in West Texas, convinced the board of regents that growing grapes might be one way to make the land more profitable. The success of experimental wine from vineyards near Bakersfield, Fort Stockton and Van Horn encouraged the regents to approve 160 acres of chenin blanc and colombarid for commercial production, the first phase of a 1,000-acre vineyard.

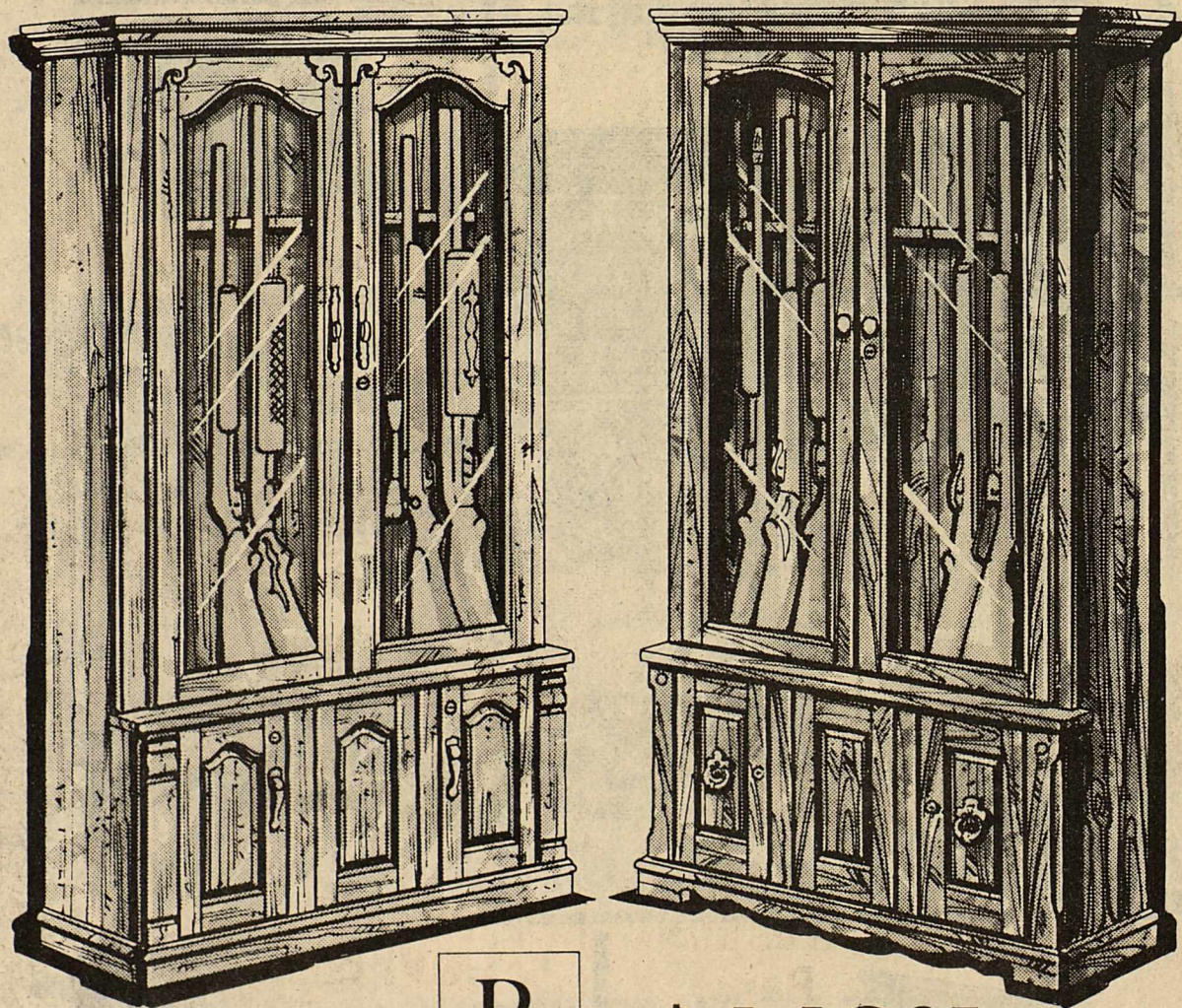
