

Speed And Alcohol Cause Most Holiday Accidents

"Traditionally, excessive speed and alcohol are the leading violations that cause holiday traffic accidents," said Major C. W. Bell, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety, Region 5. Because of this, special emphasis will be placed on these violators during the holiday season and all DPS personnel will make a special effort to try and reduce this needless waste of lives.

Courthouse **To Close**

Offices in the Haskell County Courthouse will be closed December 24, 25 and January 1 for holidays. All persons are asked to make note of this and schedule business around these days.

Major Bell noted that Texas is running 6% above last year in traffic fatilities, and a new record was set last year when 4,524 persons were killed. Last year in Texas he

stated someone died in a traffic accident on an average of one each hour and 59 minutes, and someone was injured every 2 minutes and 50 seconds. "There is no excuse for this waste of human lives and human suffering," he stated.

This time of year should be a happy and joyous time. For most people it will be-but for others it will be a tragic time because of an accident.

Major Bell concluded by saying, "Most of these tragic traffic deaths

could be prevented if the motorist would use good judgment and obey traffic laws.'


Because of my experience I want to share with you that God does exist and looks over us all. His helping hand is always there to guide us and give comfort to those who need Him most.



State Drug Laws To Change

Two new state laws will allow the substitution of generic drugs for brand-name drugs in many cases, and will require physicians prescribing certain narcotics to fill out a new form. The form is designed to discourage both the diversion of prescription drugs to street use, particularly by drug users pretending generic drug--but only if the to be ill, and the possibility of abuse in prescription writing. In approving the genericdrug law, the Texas Legislature's stated intent is to save patients money on prescriptions. The legislation allows pharmacists, with the physibrand-name drug. The law says pharmacists should pass costs to the consumer.

Each year, as many as 1.8 million children disappear from their families. The ensuing ordeal is a nightmare for distraught parents, grandparents and friends. All too often, the child is found dead, sometimes hundreds of miles away, or never found at all.

Yet, there is no systematic national communications system to help trace these children. In contrast, when a car, firearm, or even a refrigerator is reported stolen, law enforcement officers all over the nation are notified almost immediately so that they can lend their assistance in the

To remedy this gap in our law enforcement system, and to help find missing children wherever they are, I am cosponsoring the "Missing Child Act." This bill would establish a national computer information network, and increase the number of names and identifying information in the FBI's computer system.

The bill also would establish for the first time a national computerized clearing house for information about bodies found without evidence to identify them.

In addition, the attorney general would collect and maintain information -- from federal, state and local officials, and from parents or relatives -- which could assist in locating a missing child. This would be true of all cases, including runaways and victims of parental kidnapping, and would not impose a minimum length of time the child must be missing before action is taken.

A significant difference in current law would be a provision to allow parents to list a child on the computer, though only law enforcement officials could retrieve the information.

This is the sort of program the federal government should institute. The federal government would not be taking over any state or local function, but rather would be providing information exchange which it is in a unique position to do.

I know my fellow Texans share my concern for families which have suffered the agonies of a missing child.

"I can think of nothing more heartbreaking than the plight of a helpless child, followed closely by the distress of anyone who has lost a child to unknown circumstances. As a parent, grandparent and teacher, I would give every ounce of energy and every possible moment of time to the reuniting of those who love and are loved," a Denton man said in a letter to me.

"It is unthinkable that there is no way to trace children that have disappeared or children whose bodies have been found but cannot be identified," a Pickton woman said.

The FBI currently maintains a nationwide file on information sent to it from the 47 states which submit computerized information they collect on missing persons. However, statistics indicate that records are entered into statewide computers for only 10 percent of all missing persons. I might add that the overwhelming majority of missing persons are children.

I hope that the Congress will act in 1982 to institute this potentially valuable service.

This nation, so advanced in technology and mass communication, must be able to provide an effective national network of information on our lost children. We must do everything we can to relieve the horror parents face when they do not know whether their children are safe or in danger, living or dead.



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

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Thornton, widely considered one of the most imaginative and intelligent business executives of the last half-century, was a practical visionary will be at 11 a.m. Wednesday whose companies were always at the leading edge of the advance into the electronics

> Yet despite Thornton's devotion to and understanding of high technology, his basic talent was for inspiring, organizing and leading other

human beings.

"People," he once remarked in summing up his credo, "are more important than things."

Despite recent illness, Thornton remained active in the Beverly Hills-based Litton empire, which he founded in 1953. He served as both chairman of the board and is chief executive officer almost until his death although he had shared responsibilities with Fred W. O'Green, Litton's president since Oct.

Litton, which began with a dream and a \$1.5-million loan, achieved its highest earnings during the 1981 fiscal year-\$311.6 million as compared to \$275.2 million the year before.

The conglomerate, with more than 75,000 employees and 175 plants and research laboratories around the world, registered \$4.94 billion in sales during the fiscal year.

Litton companies produce everything from abrasive disc wheels to X-ray machines. Among its major fields are

advanced electronics systems, business systems and equipment, marine engineering, paper, printing and publish-

Thornton was born in the little north Texas farm town of Haskell on July 22, 1913. His father, W.A. Thornton, also known as Tex, was famous for his daring and pioneering work as an oil field firefighter using nitroglycerin to blow out well blazes.

The elder Thornton's adventurous spirit and wandering ways did not make for a stable home life, and eventually he deserted his wife and son. But the boy's mother, Sara Bates Thornton, was a determined and ambitious woman. She supervised her son closely, and pushed him

hard. It was she who encouraged him to invest his nickel-anddime odd-job earnings-includ-

owned a gas station and a car dealership, which he sold out to go to Texas Technological College. At first he majored in engineering, later switched to dropped out in his junior year to go to Washington, D.C., to take a \$1,440 a year clerkship in the Interior Department. He finished his college education at nights.

A report Thornton wrote as a clerk on the financing of low-cost federal housing-"a minor masterpiece of clarity and vision," according to a later assessment-brought the young Texan to the attention of a rising bureaucrat, Robert Lovett.

Lovett, then assistant secretary of war for air, convinced Thornton that it was his duty to enter the Army Air Corps during the hectic period just before World War II, when the small force was first organizing itself. Thornton's role was to establish training programs and set up various manage-

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

AUSTIN-With the holiday season nearing, it is unfortunate that some individuals will try to take unscrupulous advantage of the spirit of giving to profit for themselves.

During the Christmas season, many consumers are asked to contribute to charities either through the mail or by door to door solicitations. It is suggested that before contributing, consumers make sure they are contributing to a worthy cause. Make a careful check of the organization before a financial commitment is made. Legitimate charities

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will be glad to answer questions you might have regarding their methods of operation.

There have been instances where some charitable organizations have used solicitation methods that are not only annoying to consumers but are also illegal. Such groups are known to send unordered merchandise through the mail and then demand payment. If this happens to be the case, the consumer may either return the unordered merchandise or

is keep it. es Consumers also should be aware of possible misrepresentations by groups that portray themselves as employers for the disadvantaged and disabled. If you are thinking of donating to such a group, inquire as to what percentage of their employees are either disadvantaged or disabled; and what percentage of your

donation will go to help these individuals. The following guidelines may help you decide whether you are interested in contributing to the particular organization.

-Where are the central and local offices of the organi-

zation and who heads such a group?

How is money solicited for the organization?
Are the organization's goals realistic and worthwhile?
Are funds received from the United Way or some other fund raising group?

-Is the organization willing to send you literature regarding their charity?

-How long has the organization been in operation?

Many charity organizations have been in operation for a period of time, and you may be familiar with some of their functions and methods of operation, but in the event that you feel you are being solicited by an organization using deceptive methods or misrepresentations, contact your local Better Business Bureau and the Attorney General's Office.

By Robert L. Haney **TAES** Science Writer

" The developing water crisis in Texas and the Southwest will be the severest in the U. S. unless we plan now for ways to alleviate it, according ter Dr. Jack Runkles, Director of/the Texas Water Resources Institute.

- A growing population, burgeoning industry, and an increasingly thirsty agriculture are the main factors contributing to the developing problem.

"We must find ways to cut water usage in cities, in industry and in agriculture," Runkles says. In an earlier interview,

Runkles discussed at length the expanded research being done by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in basic and urban water conservation.

"Our food supply will be the first sector to be imperiled by water shortages since both industry and urban areas can outbid agriculture for water,' Runkles says.

'But if industry and cities can cut their use of water, and our research is designed to help them do this, then our research can be even more effective in the agricultural sector.

New irrigation technology is needed to stretch existing water supplies. The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station (TAES) is developing this technology through research on many problems by scientists located across the State. At Lubbock, TAES will develop a moving truss irrigation system capable of precision application of the full complement of agricultural chemicals along with lowenergy precision application of water.

The unit will save energy, water and labor and provide High Plains producers with the opportunity to stretch their existing Ogallala groundwater



Energy Efficient Homes Could Make You Sick

Some homes are so energy efficient they could make you sick, says a Texas A&M University architect.

The problem is indoor pollution resulting from a build-up of dangerous chemicals and gases trapped inside buildings constructed with air infiltration barriers. The barriers reduce the rate air inside the building is exchanged with outside air, said Larry Degelman, professor of architecture and building construction.

Barriers, not to be confused with insulation such as polyethylene sheeting, can be placed in walls and urethane foam can be sprayed around the 2×4 's that form the base of houses built on concrete slabs. These barriers, which can reduce heating costs up to 25 percent, make it more difficult for the house to "breathe."

Degelman said dangerous gases like carbon monoxide and the radioactive gas radon (which is released naturally from soil and some building materials) can build up in these tight houses and pose a problem to the occupants.

A reminder from this newspaper and the Troopers of the Texas Department of Public Safety State Trespassing Law Undergo Changes

With the approach of hunting season in Texas, both property owners and sportsmen should be aware of recent changes in state law regarding trespassing, the Texas Farmers Union states.

A person has committed criminal trespass if he has entered or remains on property or in a building and was notified that entry was forbidden or received notice and failed to leave the premises. The law states the notice can be any oral or written communication from the property owner or a person who is acting under the owner's authority. Also, any fence which is designed to contain livestock is described under Texas law as a notice to a potential

trespasser. Signs which are posted on property or a building indicating trespassing is not allowed is sufficient notice of a violation.

Persons who violate the trespassing law are subject

to a Class B misdemeanor if found guilty. However, if a person carries a deadly weapon in his possession and found guilty of trespassing, that violation is elevated to a Class A misdemeanor.

These changes in the trespassing law became effective September 1, 1981.




