# Oil And Gas Production Boost County Income By \$31 Million

HASKELL, TEXAS 79521, DECEMBER 31, 1981

The sale of crude oil and natural gas from Haskell County wells in 1980 boosted the county economy and accounted for \$31.2-million of the \$31.2 billion value placed on Texas production last year.

**VOLUME NINETY-FIVE** 

In a report on the economic impact of oil and gas industry operations in the top producing counties of Texas, Dallas-based Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association said the county ranked 141st among Texas' 254 counties on the basis of the value of its marketed petroleum production. This includes condensate and casinghead gas.

The county's wells produced 1.4-million barrels of crude oil, valued at \$30.5-million, and 424,235 Mcfs of natural gas, valued at \$630,838. Owners of royalty in the county received \$3.9-million as their share of the output, the Association said.

gas production in Texas declined slightly last year from 1979 levels, we in the industry are encouraged by the fact that drilling starts in 1980 were up 16-percent over the previous year," said the Association's chairman, Avery Rush, Jr., of Amarillo. "Since petroleum remains the cornerstone of our state's economy and its tax base, Texas must continue to encourage the development of its energy resources," Rush added.

In addition to paying local, county, and state property taxes, producers in the county also supported state government through production tax payments estimated at \$1.5-million, according to the Association. Crude oil taxes amounted to \$1.4-million while natural gas levies totalled \$47,313.

Based on Texas Employment Commission figures, some 100 oil and gas industry employees in the county received wages of about \$1.4-million in 1980.

In the search for new petroleum reserves in the county, oil and gas operators spent a reported \$8.6-million in the drilling of 99 wells, including 29 wildcat, or exploratory, wells. This effort resulted in the completion of 38 oil wells, although some \$4.4-million was lost in the drilling of 61 dry holes. As of March 1, 1981, there were 454 producing oil wells in the county.

# Extra Caution Urged For Safe Holiday Driving

The Department of Public Safety has estimated that as many as 89 persons may perish on Texas streets and highways during the Christmas and New Year's holidays.

Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director, asked Texas drivers to make this holiday season the safest in recent years.

"Nothing would please us more than to get through these holidays with far fewer fatalities than we project," Adams said. "We can reduce the number of fatalities if more drivers will moderate their speed, refrain from using alcohol or drugs if they plan to drive and make sure everyone in the vehicle wears a seat belt."

The DPS estimated that 51 persons would die in motor vehicle accidents during the Christmas holiday weekend and another 38 people would be killed during the New Year holiday weekend. Both holiday periods are 78 hours long.

Adams said 64 persons died in traffic crashes during the Christmas holiday period last year. Motor vehicle accidents claimed 58 lives over the New Year's holiday weekend.

During the first nine months of this year, 151,261 persons received injuries in Texas traffic accidents.

"That's an increase of slightly over 10 per cent compared to the same period in 1980," Adams said. "More than 19,000 of those people received serious, incapacitating injuries."

Traffic deaths over the same period totaled 3,378, an increase of almost six percent compared to the first nine months of last year.

The DPS director said that during the first six months of 1981, more than 98 per cent of the persons killed in passenger vehicles were not wearing seat belts.

"A head-on crash at only 30 mph hurls a person's body forward with the same force as a fall from a third story window," Adams pointed out. "A buckled seat belt keeps passengers from striking their head or another part of their body and

prevents serious injury."

Adams also recommended that

before traveling, children under four years of age or weighing less than 40 pounds should be strapped into an approved child restraint

"This would be a very sensible and perhaps lifesaving gift for an infant or small child from a caring parent or grandparent," he said.

The DPS director said all available troopers would be on patrol duty during the fatality counting periods. For Christmas, the count will begin at 6 p.m. Thursday, December 24 and end at midnight Sunday, December 27. The New Year's period starts at 6



This has been a beautiful Christmas filled with blessings and joy. We look forward to the New Year with much enthusiasm. Make resolutions to paint more, to be increasingly original and to participate in our ever-growing art circles. The greater number of artists we have, the more interesting it will be-

This is the last column of 1981! It has been my pleasure to communicate with artists in the area and so many have expressed "thank you" for the information. Many have set up note books for reference, which pleases me so much. God gave me this talent and I must share it with you. Remember, this is your column. Now, we go on to the New Year of 1982 and more 'Brush and Palette' news will be coming your way. Let ne hear from you.

Q. What blocking-out devices are used in watercolor?

A. Watercolor has been said to be a 'bag of tricks'. Retaining the white surface of the paper is one of the important tricks. Various methods can be employed to block out portions and the most popular is a liquid frisket. When the painting is dry, simply remove the frisket by rubbing your fingers gently over the coated area. Then continue to retouch that area or leave it white.

Another liquid frisket is rubber cement thinned enough to make it flow freely. This has a tendency to stain the paper so determine where you can use a stained area.

Paper masking tape makes good blocking-out device if the area is to retain a simple shape. Using scissors or razor, cut the shapes and if necessary piece together the larger or more intricate ones. The painting procedure is the same as with liquid frisket.

the technical aspect of a subject. Remember, the design and color are far more

important considerations. Q. Are brushes not made so well these days. Mine wears out quickly.

A. Watercolor brushes should not wear out so quickly since they are used on paper. I do not find that good quality brushes have changed much over the years. The materials and I will call or write to you. and methods of assembling are still about the same. We should respect brushes as fine every day". delicate tools. We should not scrub with them, especially sables. Another way to ruin brushes is improper cleaning. and if you cannot wash them, your letters.

Don't concentrate unduly on let them stand in a container of kerosene that has a plastic chore girl in the bottom. I use a mesh vegetable sack rolled and secured with a rubber band in the bottom of my cleaning tank. Denatured alcohol is good to clean acrylic brushes - even nylon ones. I still use soap and water. We have discussed cleaning brushes in a previous column, If you missed it let me know

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

# **Farabee Appointed To** Committee

'This will help my work as Chairman of the Agricultural Subcommittee of the Texas 2000 Commission," Farabee explained. "Many cities and towns are threatened by a limit on their available water supply, but the most pressing immediate need is for agricul-

tural water". The other members of the subcommittee are the Chairman, Josiah Wheat, State Senator Ed Howard, Speaker Clayton, George McCleskey, Hobby McCall, Ray Hutchison, Don Howell, John B. Clayton, III, and Catherine Perrine.



# Winter Wildfires Could Be A Problem

olem in Texas this winter, if Texans and the weather don't

Lush vegetative growth -stimulated by ample summer precipitation -- constitutes a significant fire hazard this winter, says Pat Ebarb. Ebarb is head of the Texas Forest Service Fire Control Depart-

"How hot a winter fire season state firefighters will have depends greatly on how fire prevention minded Texans are and on how dry a winter we have," says Ebarb. "The fuel load is there."

According to the TFS fire control chief, many people don't realize how quickly vegitation can dry and become highly flammable during the winter months.

'A few days of dry, windy weather can quickly dry light, flashy fuels such as grass and leaves," he said. "The ground may still be damp, yet grass and leaves will often be dry enough to carry a fire."

Ebarb reported that TFS crews have fought some 1,900 fires which have burned almost 25,000 acres this year. Some 1,260 fires burned over 19,000 acres during the first three months of the year, a fact which Ebarb said points out the potential danger of the winter months. The presence of dead and dormant vegetation causes a general rise in fire danger during winter months, he added.

Higher fire danger doesn't have to translate into more wildfires. A look at TFS statistics reveals why.

Last year 48 percent of the wildfires TFS crews fought were attributed to careless trash and brush burning; another 11 percent to smoking and camping combined.

The number of wildfires in Texas can be reduced dramatically if all Texans will simply observe some fire precautions suggested by the TFS spokes-

Hypothermia occurs when the body cannot produce enough body heat, and body temperature drops lower than it should, says Judith L. Warren, a family life education specialist in aging.

Persons with impaired circulation, specific diseases of veins and arteries, hypothyroidism or those taking phenothiazines (used to treat anxiety, depression and nausea) should be particularly cautious, the specialist warns.

Temperatures can be as high as 60-65° for hypothermia to occur, and anyone can be affected, she continues. Warren is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Ser-

FOREIGNERS READ YOUR MAIL

Seventy-two members of the Senate have allowed agents of a foreign government to comb through mail sent to them by their constituents.

This revelation by Marvin Rappaport, associate director of the Washington office of the Anti-Defamation League (ADL), further confirms the SPOTLIGHT's previous reports that the ADL—an unregistered agent of the government of Israel-often wields more power over the Congress than do the American people.


Rappaport, speaking at the B'nai Israel Jewish Community Center in Rockville, Maryland, made it clear to his sympathetic audience that the senators had not just provided simple data on the contents of pro-AWACS mail, but had actually given the ADL privileged access to the letters in order for the ADL operatives to sniff out anti-Israel (so-called "anti-Semitic") comments which may have been made by the letter writers.

Rappaport did not say whether the ADL had obtained the names and addresses of the American First letter writers. But he did reveal that approximately 32 percent of the mail spoke unfavorably of Israeli interference in U.S. foreign-policy making, while nearly 7 percent contained "anti-Semitic" references. It was, of course, the ADL which made the final determination of which letters were simply against Israeli interference and which were, in the ADL's view, "Anti-Semitic."


