

CONVERTIBLE?

When Tornadoes Come

The tornado warning system in Haskell is a cooperative effort of local law enforcement agencies and the Haskell Fire Department.

Officers from various law enforcement agencies are stationed Taround the city anytime there is threatening weather. In the event any officer spots a tornado, the fire department is notified and the siren at the station is blown for about two minutes. In addition, volunteer firemen drive designated toutes throughout town with sirens.

This warning is activated only upon sighting a tornado and all residents are urged to take shelter immediately when hearing the siren. The key word in taking cover is

'low'. The lowest floor in any buildnig is the safest. Small rooms, such as the bathroom or a closet in the central part of the structure offer the best protection. If this hideout isn't available, taking cover under heavy furniture such as a tipped over couch is advised.

Excellent examples of the large, killer tornadoes are the Lubbock Tornado of May 1970 and the Wichita Falls Tornado of April 1979. It is estimated that some 18,000 persons were in the path of the Wichita Falls Tornado. The survival of 99.8 percent of them was due largely to their knowledge and use of safety rules.

In the open, the best shelter from

a tornado is a ditch, ravine, or culvert. If none is available, move into a field alongside the road. Get down on your knees, as low to the ground as possible, and cover your head with your hands and arms. This is known as the defensive position. Do not remain in a vehicle or try to out-run a tornado. It is difficult to judge either its distance or speed.

In a building, the safest location would be a tornado shelter. Next best would be a basement. Hide under a heavy desk or stairwell. Otherwise, go to a central closet, bathroom, or small hallway on the lowest floor. These rooms are safer when away from chimneys and taller structures that may collapse

on them. They have the advantages of greater reinforcement per unit volume and more walls between the occupants inside and flying debris outside. Flying debris causes most tornado deaths. When you reach the shelter, assume the defensive position.

Avoid areas with large span roofs such as cafeterias, auditoriums, and gymnasiums. They are subject to collapse. Also avoid areas with extensive glass. It is likely to be shattered by the extreme winds and flying debris. Do not waste time opening or closing windows to reduce inside pressure. The pressure change near a tornado (very low pressure) causes little, if any, structural damage. Simply make sure you and the people you are with


Swimming Lessons To Start Monday

NOTE: A news story in Odessa recently prompted James Roberts of the Andrews County News to write the following in his 'Drifting Sands' column:

Members of the Plains, Quanah, and Earth-Springlake track teams spotted two men rummaging around in the Plains bus. A quick check of the bus revealed wrist watches and cash missing.

Team members alerted other competing teams about the burglary in progress and when the two men were spotted again, the athletes gave chase.

One suspect was jumped in the middle of the Odessa High School track field and the other man ran west toward an open street. Two track brothers from Quanah and a trio of tracksters from Plains took in after the man in hot pursuit.

The runners told Odessa police they ran about 20 blocks before the suspect, out of breath and frightened, tried to take refuge in the back of a pickup truck.

The runners surrounded the truck, folded their arms, and waited for the police to arrive. The officers said the tracksters had the situation under control when they arrived. Police took the two men into custody and prepared six burglary cases aginst the pair.

As we stated here last week, the first line of defense against most crimes is a concerned community in which neighbors take a protective interest in the property of their neighbors.



Plan now to be on the square in Downtown Haskell on Sidewalk Saturday, June 5. It's where your friends and neighbors will be!


Pecan Spraying Dates Set

It appears that control measures for the pecan nut casebearer will be needed later than is the case in most years, based on pecan nut casebearer moth emergence.

The most optimum time to spray for the first generation of the pecan nut casebearer has been set for May 30-June 4 for Haskell County. There will probably be more than generation. casebearer one Therefore additional spraying might be needed. Malathion, Sevin, and Zolone can be used to control pecan nut casebearers.

Use these materials according to the information on the labels. Additional information on pecan nut casebearer spraying can be obtained from the County Extension Office.



storage is important to maintain the quality of the fresh potatoes. Stapleton suggests storing the potatoes in complete darkness in moist air at about 60 degrees F. for several weeks. Lower temperatures to 38-40 degrees F. for long-term storage. Colder

tures encourage it. Whatever the storage temperature, keep potatoes in complete darkness. Exposure to light causes freshly dug potatoes to turn green and to develop an undesirable bitter flavor. Digging potatoes at the right time and storing them properly can mean a supply of top quality potatoes for some time, adds Stapleton.

Using outside air wisely can or other convenient location so reduce energy use for residential air conditioning. During spring and fall periods when average outside

air temperatures are comfortable (82 degrees F. or below), whole house or attic fans can be used to pull outside air into the home and of air through the room. remove heat, points our Dr. Bill R. tice may not be desirable for those with allergy problems. A whole house fan is usually

that it can pull air through any or all the rooms, notes Stewart. Air flow will depend on having windows or doors that will open in each room to admit air. Then openings must be adjusted to equalize the air flow or to control the velocity

Proper Ventilation Saves Energy

Whole house fans should be rated to provide an air flow of 10 cubic feet per minute (cfm) for each square foot of house area. Thus, a 1000 square foot home would need a whole house fan rated at 10.000 cfm. explains Stewart.

Where fans are installed in the ceiling to exhaust air out through the attic, be sure there is enough attic ventilator outlet. Attic screened vents should have 1.75 square feet of area per 1000 cfm of fan capacity, says the engineer. attic air. These may be gable vents,

When whole house fans are substantially by providing installed in ceilings they about one square inch each of should be covered when central air conditioners are used to prevent excess attic heat from entering the home through the fan openings.

Another method of reducing air conditioning bills during the summer, particularly for those homes with low levels of ceiling insulation, is to provide attic ventilation, says Stewart, since air will try to rise as it is heated.

Attics can be ventilated by providing adequate outlet vents near the peak of the roof along with the same amount of inlet vents at the eave. Both inlets and outlets should be uniformly distributed to provide uniform replacement of

The greater the difference in height between inlets and outlets, the greater will be the ventilation rate. High peaked roofs are easier to ventilate

temperatures can be reduced

than low sloped roofs. Some roofs are not easy to ventilate by gravity systems, so power vents can be used. However, research in the Houston area has indicated no significant saving in energy use when a home had a ceiling insulation level of R-19 (6.5 to 8 inches of insulation).

Attic ventilation is most effective when the ceiling insulation level is below R-11 (less than 4 inches). However, if investing in energy-saving material or equipment, the wisest choice would be to increase the ceiling insulation. level, says Stewart.
