Election Set October 11 For Conservation Director

An election for a director to serve in Zone 4 on the Haskell Soil and Water Conservation District Board is scheduled for October 11 at the Sagerton Community Center announced R.V. Earles, chairman of the board. The election will be held at 7:30 p.m.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director's election, a person must own agricultural land within the subdivision where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 18 years old.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone he represents, be 18 years of age and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district.

Zone 4 of the district is an area including Rule to the South West portion of Haskell County; from Rule to Sagerton and taking in the following area: Plainview Communities back to Stamford.

Current members of the board of directors of the Haskell SWCD are Mr. R.V. Earles, chairman, of Paint Creek; Mr. M.W. Phemister, vice-chairman, of Weinert; Mr. F.A.

Ulmer, sec.-treasurer, of Sagerton; Mr. Dan Wadzeck, member, of Rochester; and Mr. Johnny Wheatley, member, of Haskell.

The purpose of the Haskell SWCD, with headquarters in Haskell is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property

rights of landowners.

The district board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.



Brush and Palette



The wind is playing again, the dry leaves are dancing along the driveway - now quickly tapping - now quiet - waiting for the breeze to energize them. Leaves require the wind to propel them along, but it often seems that a leaf has its own ideas about its actions. Picture - one large leaf tumbling briskly down the middle of the highway. No need to honk at it; it won't pay any attention. A newly separated leaf floats hesitatingly toward the ground, almost seeming to look for the exact area in which to settle. A capricious gang of leaves decided to shift along the edge of the bricked flowerbed, hurrying and settling and hurrying again. The steady rustle of leaves in one spot means that the squirrel has need of the nut he burried there, and he is scratching to locate it. Several holes in the leaf cover show that he is

having difficulty finding the nut. Those beautiful colored leaves! Let's plan to capture some of the colors on canvas by having a 'paint-out'. Q. Is a beginner usually capable of "making up" his own pictures in a short time? A. Almost always no. One simply must train himself to see, to analyze and then memorize a great many facts about form, color, perspective, and composition before he can paint his childhood home from memory, for example. A beginner painter wants to start painting too soon, the result is usually naive and primitive looking - altogether unsatisfactory. Another mistake novices make is trying to change things too much in a composition. Someone will say, "Oh, I thought I'd put a tree here and a path coming down this way," without knowing how to paint or draw a tree in

perspective and without the slightest idea of how to paint a believable path. The idea may be good but putting it there is something else. I am of the opinion that a beginner should pick a composition in which he can stick absolutely to facts, whether from a snapshot or an outdoor sketch. A beginner needs to learn how to draw, color theory is important and most of all he must learn to "see". Once he has learned the rudiments he can put his imagination to work without frustration and loss of time. HINT: "All artists first must conceive their work mentally and then create it." - Wilson Hurley

PRICING A BUSINESS

No one knows what the value of a business should be. He who thinks so is only giving you his "opinion." If you ask ten business people including accountants, attorneys, bankers, insurance agents and real estate salespeople to value a given business for you, you would probably get ten or possibly twenty different answers.

There are a number of factors that enter into the value of any business, such as location, products sold, and age of the business.

There are several acceptable ways to "help" determine the value of a business.

The "book value" is simply the cost of the various assets less depreciation and the outstanding debt. Since this is not a true indication of the worth of the business, it is seldom used to determine a sales price.

The second method is the "asset replacement value." This method is not valid since it does not take into consideration the earning capacity of the assets.

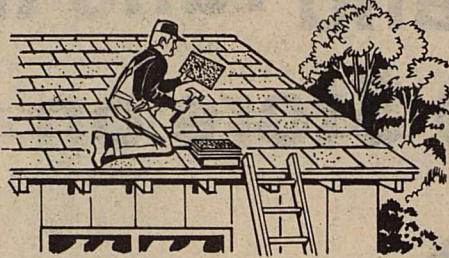
Another is "liquidation value." This is the fair market value (auction value) of the various assets minus the debt owed against them. This value is the lowest any seller should accept since he could simply hold an auction and realize this amount.

The most common method of valuing a business is determined by the "right to future income." This figure is arrived at by some multiple of earnings. You may have heard it said that a business is worth four times net earnings, or eight times net earnings, or whatever. The multiple of earnings you pay is determined in part by the industry and nature of the business and by what percentage of return you are looking for on your investment.

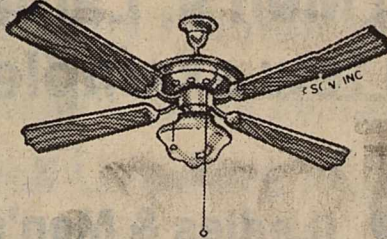

School Bus Safety Week

The week of October 3-9, 1982 has been designated National School Bus Safety Week. Busing has been a source of great controversy the past few years due to the justice system's ruling concerning forced busing to facilitate integration. However, this has not always been the public's feeling toward transportation to and from school. I strongly suspect that our fore-fathers who trudged miles on foot, horseback, or in buggies to attend school look with envy on the yellow monsters as they move over hill and dale through townships, and cities moving youngsters safely and efficiently to their classrooms.

School buses are especially important in states like Texas with its vast reaches and scattered towns. With the closing of one and two room school houses throughout the state, the necessity of moving students from place to place created the transportation system. 
