




**WEATHER RADAR**

reporting outlets, received the largest check-\$18.4 million, bringing the city's total 1983 payments to \$60.4 million, 9.7 percent below last May. The Dallas check totaled \$11 million from almost 33,000 outlets, up almost 10 percent from the May 1982 rebate. San Antonio's payment of \$5.2 million showed an increase of more than 5 percent from May 1982. Austin received a \$3.4 million rebate to bring its 1983 total to \$11.8 million, up more than 13 percent over last year.

The May checks were for taxes collected on sales made in March and reported to the Comptroller by the end of April.



A. This is a wooden strip applied to the back of a canvas or panel painting to prevent it from warping with changes of humidity. It also reinforces a larger painting, particularly a watercolor with glass, which A. Using parchment paper, makes a very heavy structure. This reinforcing is usually attached in the center but may be attached both lengthwise and crosswise. A good framer will do this for you.

Q. What is a mahlstick? Can they be made?

A. A mahlstick is a light stick or rod of wood, with a soft leather or rubber ball at the end. The purpose is to rest and support the painting hand. The ball end rests against the easel or sometimes against the edge of the canvas to steady the hand. This is a great help to those of us with 'shaky' hands. The working hand is rested on the stick itself while the opposite end is held by the hand which holds the palette. It is sometimes called a 'rest stick'.

Yes, you can make a mahlstick by using a onefourth dowel and attaching a rubber ball to the end or wrapping the end with tape. Try it, it is a great support!

from a recent survey of 1400 Extension home economists from across the country. The survey was conducted for Hamilton Beach Division/ Scovill Inc. by the Opinion and Marketing Research Department of Zigman-Joseph-Skeen. "Extension home econo-

mists generally have a good feel for these trends because they respond to public demands for information and programming on foods and nutrition, appliance selection, consumer information, and budgeting," says Nancy Granovsky, a family resource management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Seventy-nine percent also agree that in making kitchen purchases, working women are primarily interested in convenience so they can use their time more efficiently. Home economists forsee a trend toward consumers doing their grocery shopping less frequently, but buying a greater quantities. They think women who work will not spend as much time in food preparation as they did a decade ago. But they don't believe interest in nutrition has suffered.

Family Members Are Sharing Kitchen Duty

When it comes to choosing appliances for consumers starting their own households, Extension home economists chose time-saving appliances as the most useful. The microwave oven was chosen by 66 percent, the food processor by 49 percent, the hand mixer by 40 percent, and the toaster-oven by 39 percent. Traditional appliances

fryer and stand mixer are predicted to have minimal use or become obsolete within ten

years, according to the study. Along with time-saving appliances, Extension home economists believe consumers will make greater use of pre-packaged mixes, freezer foods and foods with longer shelf-life in the future. They also believe that consumers

will be interested in saving

> the "Band School" in 1934, there were 40 students from elementary through college age in attendance. Students were housed in homes near the campus, and tuition for the six-week camp was \$10 for those students below college

The next year, enrollment doubled, tuition rose to \$15, and a second band was added to be of service to younger players.

By 1940, there were 230 students enrolled in three bands, students stayed in dorms on the campus, and a special guest conductor was brought in.

The war years brought enrollment back down, but the camp remained in operation and continued to build. Several experiments were later tried, including an attempt at two separate two-week camps for junior and senior high students in the early 1960's, and an allinclusive Youth Camp, with band, orchestra, choir, keyboard and dance students, later in the 1960's.

The Band Camp, as it had become by then, stabilized

high students attending simul-When D.O. Wiley started taneously when Dean Killion

took over the reins in 1969. 'The Camp really didn't begin to blossom until Killion took it over," said Anna Whitlock, Band Camp Secretary. Killion started out with about 500 students in three bands, and by the next year had expended to six bands.

The Camp had to limit enrollment starting in 1972, when there were 900 students in eight bands. Growth progressed steadily to the present level of 12 bands in 1974, with 1300 students in attendance that year. Since 1979, the Camp has consistently reached its projected limit of 1400 students each year.

"Most of the growth has been due to a unique combination of recreation, supervision and quality instruction," Whitlock explained.

One of the recreational events in store for this year's campers will be a birthday party for the 50-year-old Camp. Other events include the usual dances, talent shows, movies and banquet.

Twelve bands are again planned, along with six jazz bands. The top group will be

Electives include various small ensembles, drum majoring, electronic music, improvisation, marching, twirling, and music literature and

The documents you submit as evidence must be the original document or a certified copy. We cannot accept uncertified or notorized photocopies as evidence. If you have never had a Social Security number before, you can obtain the application at your local Social Security Office. In addition, you will need to submit evidence of both age and identity. "We (the department) started the buck permit system in Webb County nine years ago, with the other counties coming under the program later," Clark said. "I think we have enough data to

Clark said in spite of liberal regulations enacted to encourage an adequate annual harvest of antlerless deer and spike bucks, high deer populations are countinuing to place too much pressure on the habitat. 

## First Aid Tips For **Rashes Offered**

**County Extension Agent** Rashes can be painful and annoying. Signs and symptoms of rashes include redness, blotchy skin, severe itching, scaliness, and dryness

of the skin. Ninety percent of all rashes are heat-related. Sun and hot temperatures make people more susceptible to rashes.

Rashes can also be allergyrelated. If blotchy skin develops shortly after eating a food for the first time, you probably have a sensitivity to the food and should avoid it.

Wearing clothes made of wool produces another common allergic reaction in the form of severe itchy skin.

If you develop a rash, try to determine the cause. Consider how long you have been in the sun, whether you have had a reaction to the sun before, what foods you have eaten for first time, and what

have come in contact with.

First Aid For Rashes To treat a rash, do the

\*Clean the immediately with soap and water, especially if the rash is from poison ivy or some other plant.

\*Avoid lotion. It may irritate the rash and worsen \* Keep the area dry and cool

to prevent the rash from \* Apply first aid cream only if the area is bleeding due to

excessive scratching. \* Use an over-the-counter cream to relieve itching from poison ivy or other itching

The first place a rash usually appears is on the abdomen, but it can spread and cover the entire body. This is called a systemic rash and when it occurs you should

immediately.


If you know you have an allergic reaction, stay away from the cause. If you come in contact with something that causes a rash, follow the first aid hints. See you doctor if the rash persists.







#### **Ranchers Roundup Set** August 1-5 In San Angelo

several countries are expected in San Angelo August 1-5 when the 3rd Annual International Ranchers Roundup convenes in this West Texas ranching hub.

Recognized as the largest, most comprehensive educational function ever organized for southwestern ranchers, the IRR will feature general sessions of interest to all ranchers and landowners, plus three days of intensified concurrent sessions in beef cattle, sheep and goats, grazing management, wildlife, marketing, business management for the ranch family, and a computer workshop.







#### The Consumer Alert

by Jim Mattox **Attorney General** 

AUSTIN-Today in the atmosphere of greater awareness for the needs of the handicapped, there have been state tax exemptions declared for orthopedically handicapped motorists. These exemptions come into play in the sale of vehicles equipped with specialized equipment needed to accommodate a handicapped driver or passenger.

The first consideration to be made is whether the person seeking the exemption comes within the definition of "orthopedically handicapped." The definition is broad. Any person who has limited movement of body extremities or loss of physical functions to the extent that the person is unable to drive or be driven in a motor vehicle without special modifications is considered orthopedically handicapped.

The law previously provided for a sales tax exemption for only those people who were handicapped drivers. However, the exemption has since been expanded to benefit people who transport the orthopedically handicapped. In addition, if specially modified vehicles are bought by partnerships, corporations or other business associations, an exemption may be obtained.

To qualify for an exemption from the four percent (4%) motor vehicle sales tax, three requirements must be met:

(1) the vehicle must be driven for or by an orthopedically handicapped person;

(2) the vehicle must require modification of conventional foot brakes, accelerator pedal or steering wheel to facilitate driving by an orthopedically handicapped person; or

(3) the vehicle must require some other device such as a wheelchair lift, hoist, or ramp, or special seat restraints, without which the orthopedically handicapped person could not reasonably enter the vehicle, drive or ride as a

Claiming the exemption is relatively simple. A handicapped person wishing to claim the sales tax exemption on a

vehicle that he or she will operate must present the county tax assessor-collector with either a restricted Texas Driver's License showing the person to be so physically impaired as to be unable to drive an unmodified vehicle, or an invoice from the installer of the special equipment showing the vehicle had been modified so the handicapped drive may enter the vehicle.

If the person seeking the exemption is someone who transports an orthopedically handicapped person, then he or she must present to the county tax assessor-collector an invoice or other document from the installer of the special equipment which includes a description of the equipment and the vehicle being modified.

In the event the vehicle had not been modified prior to registration, a sworn statement on the application for Texas Certificate of Title may be made describing the planned modification, as well as naming the person who is to make the modification.

There are other benefits available to the disabled person, including special license tags, insignia designating the vehicle as belonging to a disabled person, and special license plates for qualified veterans. #### **Tips For Identifying Color Blindness**

Only a very few people are completely color blind-that is, seeing everything in just black and white.

The most common color deficiency is red-color blindness, according to Growing Child, the monthly child development newsletter. It affects about one out of every 20 boys but only about one out of every 200 girls.

In red-green color blindness, a person has difficulty telling the difference between green and red. Red and orange may appear as only slightly different shades from green. Sometimes a difference in brightness will be seen, or green and yellow will look very similiar to red. But blues are usually easy to distinguish from each other and from reds and greens.

If a child, especially a boy. tends to confuse reds and

green with each other but not vision is probably normal, blues and yellows, he may very well have a red-green color deficiency, particularly if there are cases of color blindness on his mother's side of the family.

To test a child's color discrimination, gather a number of small objects having the colors red, green, and blue. Then ask the child to put objects together in the same pile of they have the same

You may have to give the child two things to begin with and ask him if they are the same color. Place them together or separately according to his answer, then ask if a third object is the same color as one of the piles. Continue this way until all the objects have been sorted.

If the child clearly makes three different piles, his color

even if he has difficulty remembering the names of colors or using them correctly. If he makes only two piles or has three or more piles of mixed colors, he may have some degree of color blindness. An optometrist or opthomologist can make a

more complete diagnosis. If a child is color blind, what then? Unfortunately, there is no treatment or cure for color blindness. It is just something that has to be lived with.

Simply being aware of the fact of color-blindness can save some frustration when a child shows confusion of colors he would normally be expect-

If his teacher knows of the color difficulty she will be able to make allowance for him during color activities. In adulthood, it will be best for a

color-blind person to avoid occupations involving electricity or electronics, where color-coded wires could be Fortunately, occupations that require good color discrimination are fairly





'It costs money to produce electricity," Welch said. "If one customer manages to get some of it free, the other customers have to make up the difference.'

The State Legislature amended the criminal mischief statute in 1981 to make diversion of any utility service a third degree felony with a possible punishment of a maximum fine of \$5,000 and from two to ten years in prison. The law also allows authorities to make the assumption that the person in whose name the service was last billed is the responsible

Convictions have been obtained in several Texas cities since the law was passed, and WTU recently filed charges which resulted in a felony indictment being issued against a customer.

Welch said that meter tampering not only is a serious crime which is becoming more easy to detect, but that it is extremely dangerous.

"Many people do not understand the danger involv-ed," he said. "Property damage, serious injury, or even death can result.'


