At the end of the evening, Alice Stone won the drawing for the wicker plant stand and the tulip centerpieces were sold to attendees.






Motions to adopt testbooks as presented, approve the student handbook changes for band for the 1998-99 school year, approve the new professional approve the new professional contract, approve the new job descriptions for nurse, athletic director, coach and band director, all passed unanimously.

Motions to approve the 1998-99 athletic budget, the 1998-99 band budget and the technology plan also passed unanimously.

A motion passed to adopt the resolution to tax automobiles in 1998 passed.

The board cast ballots for Education Service Center Board of Directors.

The board voted unanimously to table the high school graduation.

Brozek made a motion to table the supplemental pay for bus driving duties for contractual personnel.

Jamerson seconded and the motion passeed unanimously.

No action was taken on a plaque for the new adminstration building but the board did pass a motion to put a plaque on the field house.

A motion passed to buy one hundred seats and back covers for the auditorium

The board passed a motion to allow the Little Dribbers Association the authority to use the concession stand during their games.

Owen made a motion to approve recommendations for teacher contracts as presented. The motion passed six to one. Voting for were Owen, Beauchamp, Steelman, Brozek, Jamerson and Kerby. Voting against was Ortiz.

SHE WROTE ARTICLES for the newspaper for 43 years, but she didn't care a hoot about major news stories. She cared about the TURN" people, their events, their joys and sorrows, their kids and

grandkids.

And she knew them all... Carol Ellis everyone in Parmer County and just about everyone in

the surrounding counties. She knew where they were from, what their occupations were, how long they had lived here, which of their kids were from the first or second marriage, and how to spell all their names correctly. We're going to miss her a lot.

June Floyd died this week, on Wednesday. She knew better than to die on us on a Thursday, which is "press day," because that would throw the whole staff into a panic.

She started out as the old time "country correspondent" in 1955 and endured about eight or nine different editors of the Star before Bill Ellis took it over in 1962 and the Blade in 1971. A few years ago she made the comment that she had done just about every job there is to do around a newspaper office and printing plant except to run the presses.

At one time, the three newspapers in Parmer County were

connected to an offset printing plant in Friona, "Plains Publishers," with a staff of about 30 people, which was only the second of such plants in the state of Texas at that time. This company printed papers as far away as Denver and Albuquerque; military base papers from Roswell, Clovis and Altus; and many of the area weekly papers....Olton, Vega, Hart, Happy, etc. And June was a big part of it all; setting type, meeting deadlines, running the addressing machine, even chasing the train down the tracks while throwing

bundles of newspapers onto the train.

June was born in Beckham County Oklahoma, the second in a family of seven children. Her family moved about quite a bit and she attended schools in New Mexico, Texas and Oklahoma, graduating from Dimmitt High School in 1932. She furthered her education by working at secretarial jobs in

Amarillo while attending night school.

She believed mightily in education, accuracy in reporting, strong family values, a healthy life style, and the goodness of her fellow human beings. In the 36 years that I knew June Floyd, I never heard her say a derogatory word about anyone. If you had a problem of any kind, June was always there wanting to lend a hand.

Her very most favorite thing to do, was to spend quality time with her nine grandchildren, and recently her first great-grandchild. She also loved needlework, quilting, gardening, outdoor exercise, and canning her home grown food. For several years after she and husband Glenn moved into town, June walked just about everywhere she went, no matter what the weather. She especially loved walking in the snow. She didn't rely on electronic gadgets for her entertainment. This unique lady was the only person I've ever known who didn't own a television set and didn't want one.

Goodbye, June. You will never be forgotten.

Weevil Zone Open

The Texas Department of Agriculture is accepting public comment until April 13 on a proposal to create a new, smaller boll weevil eradication zone from the existing statutory Northern High Plains zone.

The proposed zone, the Nothwest Plains Boll Weevil Eradication Zone, would consist of about 450,000 acres of cotton in five counties: Bailey, Castro, Deaf Smith, Lamb and Parmer.

WHIP Is USDA's Latest Program

centives Program (WHIP) is the U.S. Department of Agriculture's newest wildlife program and it's for people who want to restore degraded native wildlife habitat on private lands.
"WHIP is a voluntary

program which provides both technical assistance and costsharing to restore degraded native habitat on private land," explained Thomas Reed, Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District conservationist, with the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS).

"Participants who own or control land agree to prepare and implement a wildlife habitat development plan which contains wildlife habitat practices to be installed on the land. In addition, if the landowner agrees, wildlife agencies like the Texas Department of Wildlife and Fisheries, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Services and Wildlife S life Service, or private organizations like Ducks Unlimited may also provide expertise or additional funding to help complete a project."

The wildlife habitat

development plan is prepared in consultation with the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District. The plan describes the land-

The Wildlife Habitat In- owner's goals for improving wildlife habitat, includes a list of practices and schedule for installing them, and details the steps necessary to restore and maintain the habitat for the life of the agreement.

"USDA and the participant enter into a cost-share agreement to restore the degraded native habitat," said Reed. "The agreement generally lasts five-ten years from the date the contract is signed. The landowner agrees to maintain the cost-shared practices and allow USDA access to monitor the effectiveness of the practices."

The NRCS agrees to provide technical assistance and

pay up to 75 per cent of the cost of installing the wildlife habitat practices. Land is not eligible for WHIP if it's currently enrolled in the Water Bank Program, Conservation Reserve Program and the Wetlands Reserve
