# Mills-Whorton In Sheriff's Run-off

Johnny Mills and Jack Whorton earned spots in a run-off election for Haskell County Sheriff last Saturday in the Democratic Primary.

Other challengers in the sheriff's race and their County vote totals were, Phil Coleman, 487; Truman Therwhanger, 279 and E. (Bud) LeFevre, 226.

Mills received 1263 votes or 45.6% of the vote and Whorton

received 513 votes or 18.5%.

Precinct one voters elected challenger T.C. (Tim) Burson, 987, to the County Commissioners post over incumbent C.E. (Chunky) Tidwell, 625.

Rick Perry, of Haskell, won the three man race for the 64th District State Representative seat being vacated by Joe Hanna of Breckenridge. Perry carried Haskell County 2149 votes to Kenneth F. Neighbours, 207, and Sam Newcomb, 192. Newcomb had withdrawn from the race about two weeks ago but was still listed on the ballots.

The district includes eight counties stretching from Haskell to Mineral Wells, south to Granbury and west to Clyde. Perry carried each of the counties and received 58.8% of the total vote.

In the 39th Judicial District race, challenger John Fouts defeated incumbent Joseph Thigpen. In Haskell County Fouts received 1799 votes to Thigpen's 953.

Congressman Charles Stenholm steamrolled challenger Noel Cowling 2420 to 285 to get about 90% of the Haskell County vote in his bid for re-election to the 17th Congressional District.

Precinct one Constable Jack Speer received 1170 votes in his bid for re-election over challenger Happy Hendrix who received 628.

Troy Brown received 186 votes to lead the ballot in the Precinct 5

Constable race over Gregg Hearn with 95 votes and Sam Basden with 72.

In the Precinct 6 Constable race incumbent Sonny Pittcock received 260 votes over challenger W.A. Beard with 86.

71.4% of Haskell County voters supported Congressman Kent Hance in his bid for the U.S. Senate seat being vacated by John Tower. Hance received 1833 votes while Bob Krueger received 398 and Lloyd Doggett received 228.

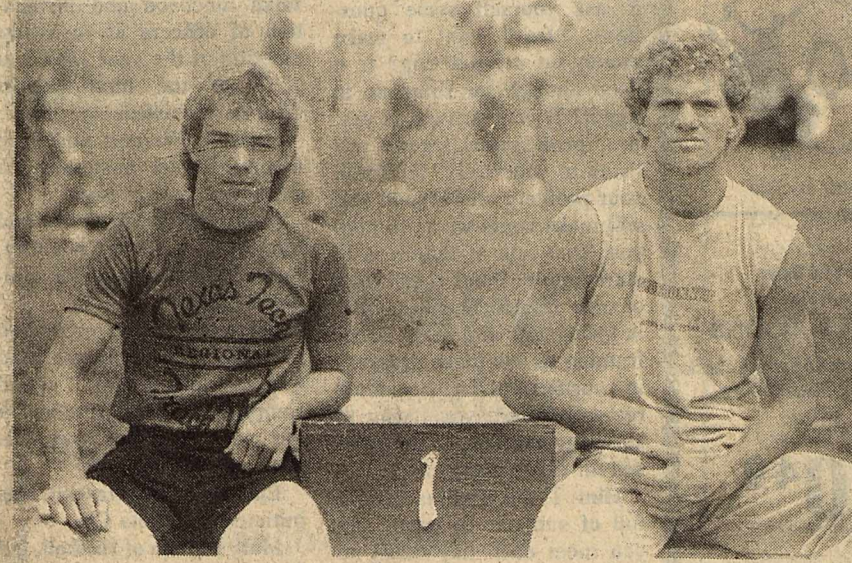
"During the last visit of the bloodmobile, we fell short of our goal and I hope we can make up part of that loss", said Harvey.

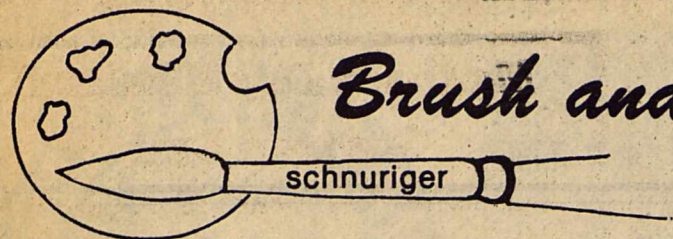
## State Sales Tax Up By Over 12 Percent

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$98.5 million in local sales tax payments to the 988 cities that levy the one-percent city sales tax.

"These payments are running 12.5 percent ahead of last year," Bullock said. "And for the first time this year, we can say that virtually all of this increase came from growth in tax collections and not from the changes in our bookkeeping the Legislature made when they moved up due dates for the sales tax last year."

Houston received the largest check—for \$17.9 million for a 1984 total of \$63.7 million, up





## Brush and Palette

Stalking nature with a camera can be done by anyone of almost any age. It doesn't matter if the camera is the least expensive or the most professional setup available. What counts is the subject matter, and appreciation of what can be found. At this time of year there is so much to be seen and with the camera you can record some fascinating subject to be used next fall and winter when there is not so much color. One tip, if you are not an experienced photographer, is to photograph flowers, because they stay in one place while you focus and compose your photograph. Delicately

tinged buds, just beginning to open, or full-blown blossoms at their peak make beautiful photos, especially if your camera has a close-up lens. Large masses also make an impact. Find an angle with a dark background, since this tends to make the flower appear as vibrant as it really is. Pink flowers against a white sky or beige field tend to fade into their background. Take pictures, arrange your own composition and set up a file for all the photos you plan to use in your pictures.

Q. I understand there is controversy concerning the sealing of the back of a framed oil painting, could you explain

what is proper?

A. I cannot say which is proper. The reason for sealing an oil painting is to prevent dust, moths, etc., from resting on the canvas. The reason NOT to seal the back of a canvas is to allow it to breathe and allow the air to circulate and keep the canvas from mildew or mold. Many painters, after covering the back of a framed picture with canvas, cut a rectangle into the paper to allow circulation.

Q. Should I do my own framing? It costs so much to have it done professionally and as a beginner, I don't have that extra money to spend on frames.

A. Stop and think! You have to ask yourself some questions. "Do I want to make money on my painting? Is it good enough for someone to buy it? If your answer is yes, your professional framer will listen to your story, tell them your problem and a good one will make suggestions to help you. One rule of thumb is to start simple. Don't over invest or over frame. You will grow in knowledge and learn about framing as you make progress in your field of art. You must remember, are you trying to sell your painting or trying to sell an expensive frame?"

Hint: There remains a world full of subjects to paint, can you meet each day ready to seek the challenge it presents?

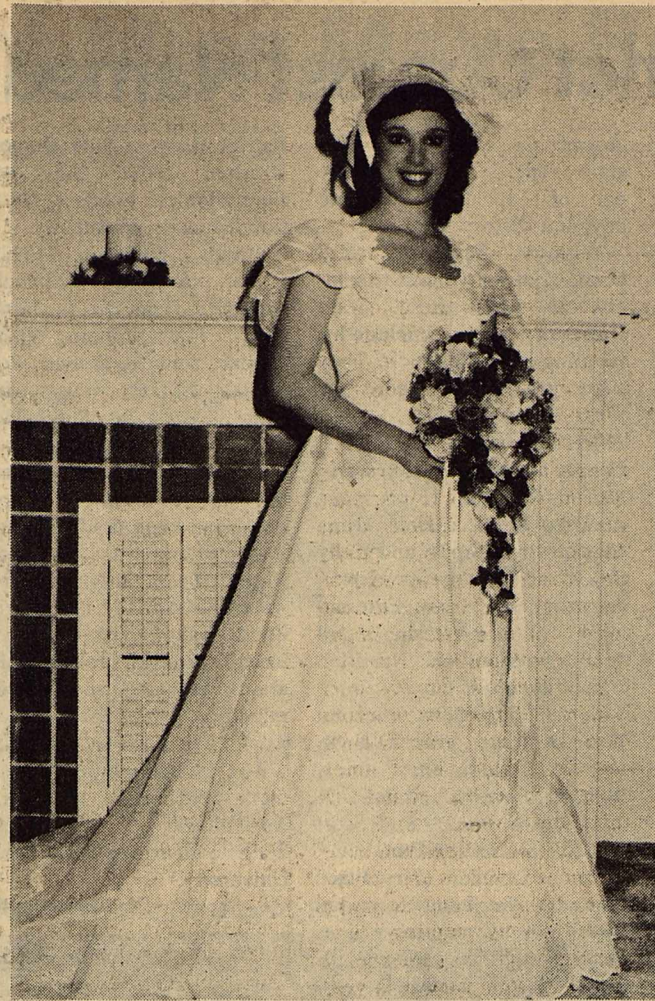

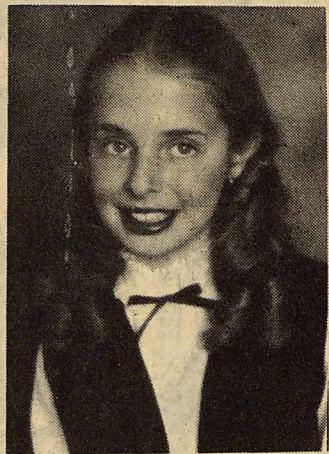

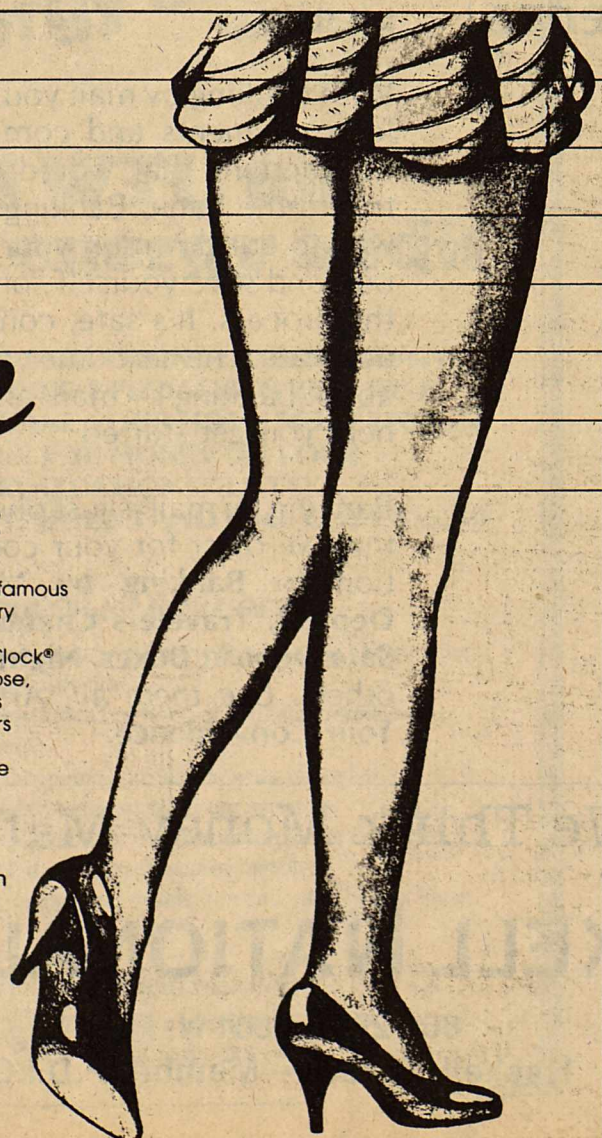

Almost 300 boys and girls from the 21 counties of the Rolling Plains Extension District competed in Wichita Falls Saturday, April 28, for the right to represent the district in the state 4-H Roundup June 5-6 in College Station.

Winners in more than 30 events for the senior division, ages 14-19, will advance to the state competition. Only first and second place teams or individuals qualify for the state event. Juniors, under the age of 14, don't compete beyond district level.

Winners Saturday were honored at an awards assembly at Midwestern State University which concluded a morning of competition. They were presented ribbons by West Texas Utilities.

Senior Division- (Second Place Awards) Traci O'Neal, Debbie Quade, Kim Jones, Richard Shaver, Chad Ballard, John Mark Wyatt, and Scott O'Neal, Share-The-Fun.

Junior Division- (First Place Awards) Stephen Holt and

Patrick Burson, Pork Demonstration; Dalyn Gilly and Penny Peden, Foods & Nutrition Educational Activity.

Junior Division- (Third Place Awards) Michelle Scoggins, Janet Quade, James Wyatt, Faye Mullino, Wayne Hester, Jennifer Shaver, Ross Shaver, Sammy Wyatt, and Mindy Ballard, Share-The-Fun.

Prior to Saturday, three other rounds of district competition had been held. The 4-H Food Show was held last winter. Team judging events were held April 11 at Guthrie. Range and pasture grass identification and range evaluation winners were determined at a tri-district contest April 24 at Roaring Springs.

4-H is the youth development program of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, an arm of Texas A&M University.

Agricultural groups testified favorably today on a bill to simplify and standardize federal farm programs.

The House Agriculture Committee heard testimony from more than a dozen witnesses who praised the concept of the bill, introduced by Congressman Charles W. Stenholm (D-Stamford).

The National Association of Wheat Growers said Stenholm's bill "lays important groundwork for the design of new farm program authority." The Texas-headquartered Grain Sorghum Producers Association said the bill "would free both farmers and administrators from much of the year-to-year uncertainty which accompanies the present system."

The legislation will simplify and standardize the way acreage bases and yields are assigned to producers.

An acreage base is assigned to farmers who wish to take part in federal farm programs. A yield measures how many bushels or pounds per acre the farmer produces. Both bases and yields are important when farmers decide whether to participate in the programs.

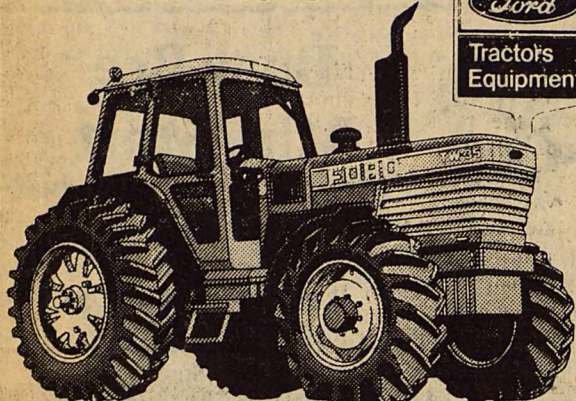

# Surprise Birthday Party Honors Miss Maye Bell Taylor

Cards came pouring in for three days; then, on Friday, May 4th, Miss Maye Bell Taylor celebrated her birthday with a Surprise Party given for her by member of Haskell First Baptist Church.

A native born Texan, born in El Dorado, she moved with her parents and family to Haskell as a child in 1909. Maye Bell finished Haskell

High School in 1923. Afterwards, she attended Baylor University and Hardin-Simmons University from which she was graduated in 1929. Over a period of six years she taught in public schools in Haskell, Eastland and Albany. She attended Southern Baptist Seminary in Louisville, Kentucky, finishing in 1936. While waiting for

an assignment by the foreign Mission Board, she taught school in Gladewater. Through this association she became a member of First Baptist Church in Gladewater. Upon her appointment to Brazil as a Foreign Missionary in 1938, the Gladewater church "adopted" Maye Bell as their missionary and supported her in many ways through her years of work and service in Brazil. A close bond and personal ties of love still exist between her and the church.

After language study in Rio de Janeiro, Maye Bell traveled to Recife, a coastal city in the northeast sector of the large nation where she was the Assistant Director of the Woman's Missionary Union Training School. In later years she became Director of the school. Working with a fellow missionary, Mildred Cox, the two women were instrumental in the construction of a building to house the school facilities and students. Fifteen years of her life poured into the school and its work and witness.

Later, she was assigned to a Primary School in Aracajue where she worked eighteen years with students and, again, led out in the establish-

ment of a permanent building for the institution.

Also, Friendship House, a house in which she enlisted

local physicians to tend the basic health needs of the very

poor of the city and lead in Bible School, manual arts skills and handicrafts, took many hours of work and dedication during these years in Aracajue.

Before her return to the United States in 1973, she was invited to appear before the magistrates of the city where she received the equivalent of the "key to the city" and was made an honorary citizen of Aracajue. Such an award had never been presented to a woman nor to any American citizen before.

Maye Bell returned to Brazil in 1981 to work and witness during the Centennial Celebration of Southern Baptist work in Brazil. While there she was honored in Recife as the newly remodeled building, which she and Mildred Cox Means had worked so faithfully to see built, was officially named the Cox-Taylor Hall.

Baptists of her own state honored her in 1975 when she received the Distinguished Alumni Award from Hardin-Simmons University.

To have such a special life of service and faith in the community of Haskell is a privilege rare.

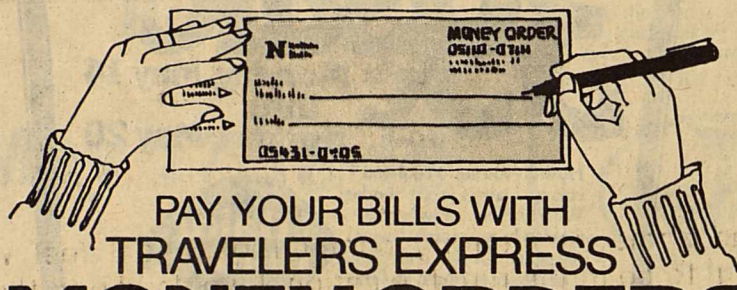

Regenia is the daughter of Bill and Joyce Rogers. She is a Senior and has been involved in tennis, annual staff, news-

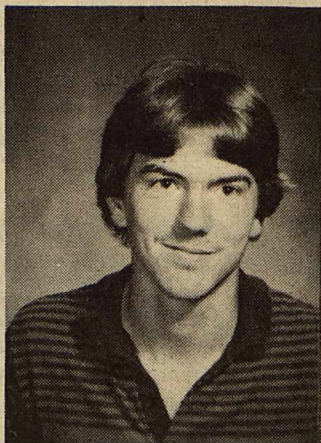

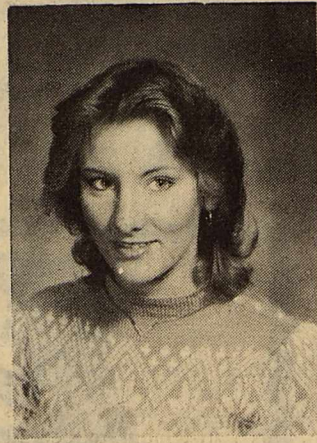

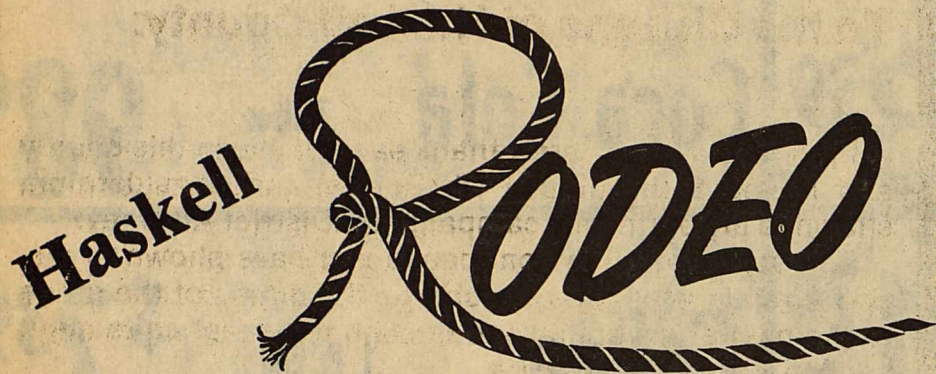

# Guard To Report Marijuana Fields

The Department of Public Safety and the Texas National Guard have signed an agreement which will allow Guard pilots to report sightings of marijuana fields while on routine training flights. The memorandum of understanding was signed by Major General Willie Scott, adjutant general of the National Guard and by Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director.

"This agreement permits the Guard pilots to gather drug-related intelligence information and provide it to DPS narcotics investigators. It reflects a cooperative effort to help reduce the number of marijuana growing farms which are frequently found throughout the state," said Jim Adams, DPS director.

"This pact between the Guard and DPS was reached after Governor White urged the use of all possible resources to combat the burgeoning problem of domestic marijuana growing," said Adams. "It is his desire to eradicate these illegal marijuana farms and he has given his full support to the cooperative program."

The program will involve over 100 Guard pilots who will be trained by the DPS to spot growing marijuana farms from the air while on their training flights. Guard personnel will not be involved directly in the law enforcement function. However, they will report their sightings to the DPS Narcotics Service.

"Military forces in 16 other states have signed similar written agreements," Adams said. "With these additional trained personnel, our ability to detect domestic marijuana growers will increase without added costs."

DPS narcotics agents will conduct classroom training for the Guard pilots beginning in May and the training will be expanded as the program progresses.

# Views From City Hall

Haskell's water sure does taste good compared to what we used to have! Miller Creek Reservoir is supplying us with excellent quality water and plenty of it. We all tend to think that if the water tastes all right everything is OK with the water system. Not True.

Several years ago it appeared that Haskell's growth would be toward the North and Northwest. The city's long range plans took this into account when the water tower was constructed on the North side of town.

Although we did have growth to the North, our new residential areas started developing on the East and West sides of town. This growth further aggravated the water pressure to the South.

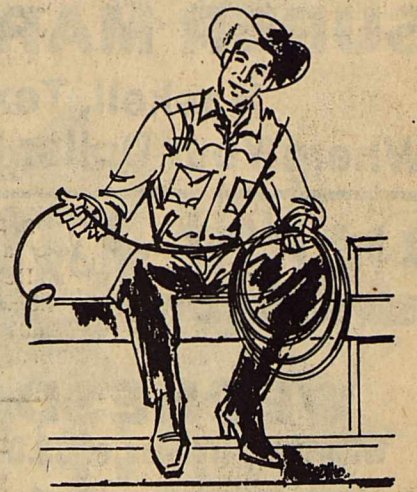
In the past when a new house was built in an undeveloped area, the city ran a small line to make the service. This was fine for one or two houses, but as the area developed more and more taps were made off that original small line and the water pressure got less and less.

The water pressure in several parts of town is totally inadequate. Of course some would say, "no big deal, so it takes a little longer to take a shower". That is not the real problem, although it is certainly an inconvenience. The real problem is the pressure needed to fight a fire. Tests have been conducted at several fire hydrants and the results for the East and the West ends of town are extremely alarming.

We, as a community, need to address this problem immediately. We have four inch lines feeding six inch lines, dead end lines, and some that are just old and clogged. As anyone knows it's ridiculous to have to turn the water off the whole town just to repair a main line or fire hydrant.

Well, I pointed out some of the problems, now we need to find some solutions. We have retained engineers to see exactly what the city needs,

## TAX PLANNING

### An IRS Victory (Interest Free Loans)

Making interest free demand loans to family members has long been a tax saving technique. Typically, a parent in a high tax bracket lends money to a child in a lower or zero-tax bracket. The child then invests the money and pays no income tax or less tax on the earnings than the parent would have to pay. The overall tax bill for the family has been decreased, and the parent can "demand" repayment of the loan at any time.

The U.S. Supreme Court, in its recent Dickman decision, has ruled that such interest free loans are "transfers of property by gift" and are subject to the gift tax. The amount of the gift is the current market interest rate on the loan, not the principal of the loan (which presumably will be repaid). The IRS plans to apply the Dickman decision retroactively; therefore, anyone who has made an interest free loan may be liable for gift taxes.

The decision does not eliminate the benefit of interest free loans entirely. The \$10,000 annual gift tax exclusion still permits a taxpayer/lender to gift up to \$10,000 (\$20,000 on joint gifts) to any individual each year. Sizeable loans can therefore be made before gift tax liability is incurred. Furthermore, even if the loans are so large that the "gifted" interest would exceed the annual exclusion, the taxpayer's "unified credit" may still keep him from having to pay gift tax. The current unified credit allows \$325,000 to be transferred tax-free; this amount increases in increments to \$600,000 by 1987.

Pending legislation may also change the income tax consequences of these interest free loans. Keep in touch with your tax adviser to see how both the Dickman case and any new legislation might affect you.

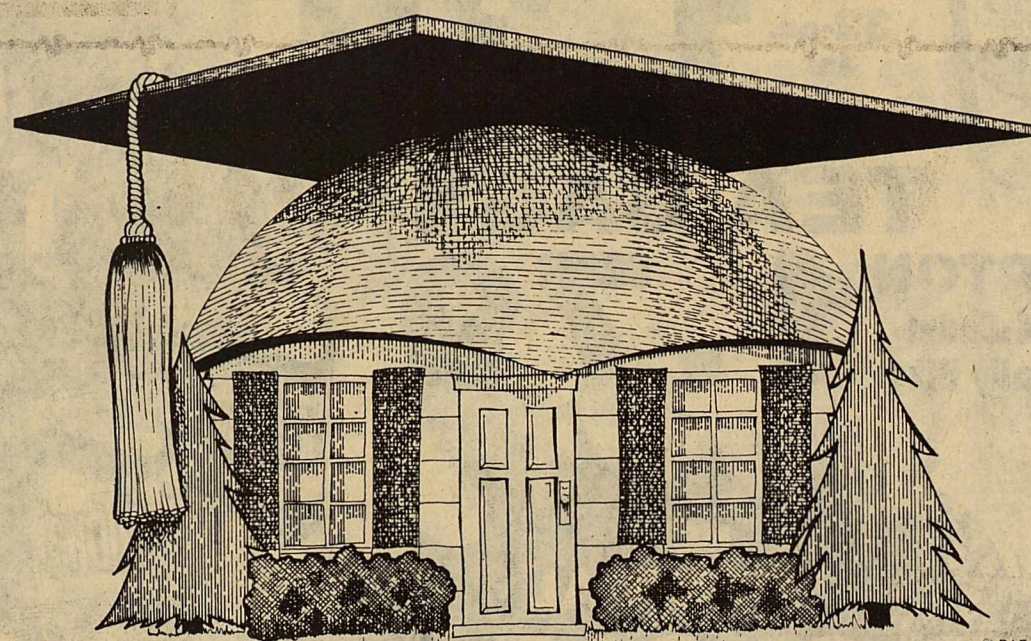



# Superintendent's Views

Chapter 75 has mandated that certain courses must be offered by the school and students are required to take certain courses. All schools may offer courses beyond the required courses. Schools must offer English I, II, III, IV of Correlated Language Arts I, II, III, or IV. In mathematics courses, schools must offer include Fundamentals of Mathematics, Consumer Mathematics, Pre-Algebra, Algebra I, Algebra II, Geometry, Pre-Calculus or two of the following, Trigonometry, Elementary Analysis, Analytic Geometry. Science courses must include Biology I, Chemistry I, Physics I, Physical Science and Introduction to Biology. Social Studies must include United States History, World History and United States Government. We must offer Economics with emphasis on the free enterprise system. Physical Education I and II must be available along with Health I. Two different fine arts must be offered from Art, Music, or Theater Arts. In business education we must offer Typing, Accounting or Record Keeping and Personal Business Management. We must have two vocational programs and two levels of another language. A computer science course also must be taught. Students must take at least 4 English courses from above, three math courses, two science courses, all the social studies, economics, 1 1/2 physical education, and 1/2 unit of health. They can complete their programs from the other courses as electives. We require 23 units to graduate from Haskell Secondary Schools. In Haskell, our other language will be Spanish because we have a certified teacher on staff. Our 2 vocational programs will include Vocational Agriculture and Home Economics. We already have all three fine arts in place. The only new courses we must
