Timing Important In Control Of Pecan **Nut Casebearer**

The pecan nut casebearer is the most damaging pest of pecans in Haskell County. The first generation pecan nut casebearers causes most of the damage. One larva can often destroy all the nutlets in a cluster.

Timing of control measures for the pecan nut casebearer is very important. The insecticidal application should be made to control the larvae after they hatch and before they have entered the small nutlets. Based on the prediction model, casebearers should be hatching May 30 and the

first nutlet entry is expected on Jun 2. Therefore, pecan trees should be sprayed from May 31-June 4.

Temperatures warmer than usua could cause the hatch to be earlied and the need for an earlier spray date. However, cooler temperature would slow development and delay the need for control measures. To time spray application fo casebearer control on your trees start checking for eggs on a daily basis on May 26. The eggs are found on the tips of nutlets and are about the size of the ball in a ballpoin pen. After eggs are found they should be observed daily. They wil be white when first laid, then turn red over a three-to-five day period After the larva has emerged the egg will be white and transparent.

Apply an insecticide the third day after the first eggs hatch or when the first nut entry is observed. A second spray application will be needed when new casebearer nutlet damage is observed six to seven days afte the first spray application.

Insecticides suggested for contro of casebearer are diazinon malathion, or Commercial pecan producers may want to use Pydrin®. Be sure to read and follow the instruction given on the label when using one o these insecticides.

Funeral Services Held For Prominent Haskell Attorney

Funeral services for William Paul "Bill" Ratliff, 78, of Haskell were held at 4 p.m. Monday, May 21 in First Christian Church with Rogers Durham, former minister of Portland, Indiana and Phillip Harris, minister, officiating. Burial was in Willow Cemetery under the direction of Holden-McCauley Funeral Home.

He died in Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene after an illness of several months.

Mr. Ratliff was born August 19, 1905 in Indian Territory, now Ada, Oklahoma, the son of Mr. and Mrs. L.D. Ratliff. The family lived in Decatur many years and in 1921 Mr. Ratliff moved with his parents and ten brothers and sisters to Haskell. He attended public schools in Decatur and Haskell and later graduated from Cumberland University School of Law in Lebanon, Tennessee. He began his practice of law in 1934, first with his father and later with his brother, Dennis. During his legal career, he served as Haskell County Attorney, District Attorney and as District

Judge of the 39th Judicial District, one of three brothers to serve the State of Texas in that capacity. In 1935 Mr. Ratliff married Margaret Grant of Abilene. He was a member of First Christian Church in Haskell.

Conservation Viewpoints **USDA Soil Conservation Service**

The Haskell Soil and Water Conservation District has announced they will join in the national observance of Soil Stewardship Week to take place on May 27-June 3, 1984 according to an announcement by R.V. Earles, chairman of

the district.

The theme of this year's observance is "Conservation: A Common Commitment". This focus is especially appropriate as each one of us is dependent on water and related resources. Together we must work for the good of all to utilize, conserve and properly manage those resources in our care. Participation in Soil Stewardship Week activities offers an opportunity to reflect on the nation's natural renewable resource problems and consider actions to resolve them or reduce their

impact. The Haskell SWCD was organized in 1977 for the purpose of offering farmers, ranchers, and the local community a voluntary conservation technical assistance program through which individuals could seek and request conservation assistance to meet their individual land's capabilities and needs.

"Basically it is the district's responsibility to provide technical assistance when requested relative to proper soil use and treatment, erosion control practices, solve drainage problems and assist farmers and ranchers with crop, range and pasture-land manage-

ment," said Earles. The National Association of Conservation Districts has sponsored Soil Stewardship Week in the United States since 1955, in cooperation with the nation's nearly 3,000 soil and water conservation districts. Informative material on the Soil Stewardship Week theme each year is distributed through local conservation districts to clergymen, lay leaders, civic and educational organizations and to individuals interested in participating in the celebration.




