

Friends and well wishers gathered in the 39th District Court room Monday, June 4th to witness the formal swearing in of Art Williams as a member of the State Bar of Texas. The oath was administered by his father, Joe Williams, State Judge of the 39th Judicial District.

Art is a 1975 graduate of Haskell High School. In 1978 he received his bachelor of Arts Degree in Philosophy, with honors, from the University of Texas at Austin, and was twice named to the Dean's Honor List.

He earned the Doctor of Jurisprudence Degree from the Texas Tech University School of Law at Lubbock in 1983. While a student at the law school he was the recipient of the American Jurisprudence Award for Excellent Achievement in the Study of Evidence and participated in mock trial competition.

Welcome Rains Fall Over Much Of Haskell County

Rainfall of over two inches fell on Haskell County Tuesday night. In some instances the amount received Tuesday almost doubled the total rain received for the year.

Across the County rainfall reports ranged from about one-half inch to almost two and one-half inches.

In addition to rain, pea to marble size hail fell across much of the

County but no damage reports were received early Wednesday morning. Members of the Haskell Volunteer Fire Department responded to a fire at an oil tank

battery about 9:45 p.m. Tuesday night. The fire apparently started when lightening struck a pair of oil tanks. One tank was empty and apparently exploded. The other tank was nearly full but was

extinguished with little problem. The tank batteries were on the Manford Reid place southeast of Rochester. Damage estimates were not available Wednesday.

Rainfall reports ranged from onehalf inch on the Tiffen Mayfield farm at Weinert to 2.4 inches on the Doug Lefevre farm south of Haskell. Wallar Overton at Paint Creek reported 1.6 inches with pea

As a result of the sting of you go to the World's Fair, certain insects, oak trees develop little round, nut-like swellings called galls or gall-nuts. These gall-nuts contain tannic and gallic acids which can be soaked out of the dried galls with water. The solution is clear and substantially colorless; but if it is mixed with a solution of an iron salt, a purplish-black compound is produced at once, and the ink becomes still blacker with age. Some of the salts first produced by this mixture are colorless but turn black with oxidation. To bind this black color securely, some

gum arabic must be added to the ink. You will need to experiment to determine the amount of gum arabic to add. Q. Some of my teachers use

Van Dyke Brown but I have been told by others not to use it. What is your opinion?

A. Not my opinion but the art dictionaries explain the use of the color as fugitive. Because of its tarry and bituminous nature, it is a fugitive pigment. It fades on exposure to strong light and develops a cold, gray tone. In oil, however, it is more permanent than in watercolor.

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IRS AUDITS (How to Handle Them)

A voluntary tax system such as ours uses the audit as a means of achieving compliance with tax laws. Only a small percentage of the millions of returns that are filed are selected for audit. Using a complex scoring system, the IRS computers make the initial selection. A review of these returns by IRS personnel determines which returns will actually be audited.

The most frequent audit is the "correspondence audit" where the IRS asks for clarification or documentation for some item on your return. The "office interview audit" requests that the taxpayer bring supporting documents to an IRS office for review by an agent.

A "field audit," usually used for business returns and more complex individual returns, is conducted on the taxpayer's premises.

Some basic rules to follow to get through any audit as quickly and painlessly as possible include:

1. Be cooperative and business like. Provide the information requested promptly, but do not volunteer other information.

2. Remember the agent is just doing his job. Don't harangue him with your views on taxes, and never offer him a "gift."

3. If your return was properly prepared, don't be intimidated into paying taxes that you do not feel you owe. Be reasonable, however; there may be points not worth your time and money to argue.

If the audit leaves some issues unsettled, you do have various rights of appeal. You may even take your case to court.

It is advisable to engage professional assistance. You will feel more comfortable knowing that you have an expert on your side, and any fees you pay will be deductible on a later tax return.
