## Citizens Help Requested For New Ambulance Service Equipt.

About two-thirds of the required funds have been donated for a new cardiac defibrillator for the Haskell County Emergency Ambulance Service.

Total cost of the defibrillator is about \$3,300.00 and almost \$2,200.00 has been donated to date.

The equipment will be used on the ambulance in conjunction with a cardiac monitor which was purchased several years ago.

Paramedics with the local ambulance service, Don Glandon and Casey Caldwell, have both been trained in the use of the monitor/defibrillator and will receive further training from local doctors after the equipment arrives.

Glandon, supervisor of the local service, expressed special thanks to

the local M-System supermarket for donating \$500.00 in groceries to be given away in a special drawing. The drawing will be held next Wednesday and the two winners will be announced at that time.

In addition to the drawing and special donations, the Ambulance Service has also started accepting memorials to be placed in the equipment fund. All memorials received will be acknowledged with

a card sent to the family. Ambulance personnel are hopeful that the necessary funds will be available soon and that equipment will be in service within the next few weeks.

## Creek Easements Needed For Flood Control Project

Members of the Haskell City Council Tuesday night approved a resolution to secure easements to private property along Rice Springs Creek through town.

The easement process will enable the city to begin work on a federal grant to address flooding problems

along the creek. The resolution calls for the purchase of easements from property owners which will allow the city to do shaping and bridge work along the creek.

The easements are currently being prepared by the city attorney and upon completion will be ready for property owners to sign.

The resolution allocates about \$26,000.00 for the purchase of easements from the total grant of \$500,000.00.

Following the granting of all easements, the entire creek project plan will be submitted to government officials for final approval.

Work on the project will include shaping the creek banks, leveling the creek bed to prevent water from standing and widening bridges or installing low water crossings. Project engineer Ken Martin of

Abilene has stated that adequate funds are not available to completely prevent flooding along the creek such as occurred during the Aug. 3 and 4, 1978 flood. He cited an earlier study which estimated costs at several million dollars to prevent all flooding. He explained that this project should prevent repeated flooding which has occurred several times during the past few years.

In other action, council members accepted a bid for the purchase of a Texas Instruments computer. The computer will be used for billing, bookkeeping and recordkeeping in the city.

Council members also agreed to pay a salary of \$100.00 per month for an assistant for the city judge.

A request for a rate increase submitted by West Texas Utilities was discussed and tabled until July 10 for final action.

The Paramedic arriving from Haskell found me "out". They, Don and Casey refused to give up on me, therefore saved my life there in Rule. After reviving me and getting me to the Haskell Hospital, I was under the capable hand of Dr. Joe Thigpen. He again is credited with

saving my life.

I do not remember from May 8 until the evening on Mother's Day when I was brought to West Texas Medical in Abilene, but from what my family has told me ALL of you, Dr. Joe, the nurses, and you Paramedics definitely went the extra mile to save my life, and thank you from the bottom of my heart. God used each of you as an instrument to achieve his purpose thank my God for you being willing to give of yourselves.

I would also like to thank all the churches in Haskell and Weimar who supported me with their prayers. May God bless each one of you for your prayers and for going beyond the call of duty.

I am now at my daughter's home recovering and have been for a week. I have come a long way with the Lord's help. Keep me on your prayer list.

## Brush and Palette

Sometimes I wish I could be six people. No doubt I could keep all six happy doing different kinds of activities. One could do household chores and one could travel, one could visit and do church work, two or three could paint in different media, another could paint and write. Well, the good Lord didn't plan it that way, so it can't be. So I undertake too many things sometimes and don't do some of them as well as I'd like because I'm pushing too hard. Thinking along the same lines—I see people trying too

hard with their painting. Anything less than perfect worries them. My feeling is that you are reaching toward perfection but never really expect to attain it. Nor should you want to, because when you have reached the zenith, there is no place to go. A teacher I had once said, "Plan your picture, know what mood you want to create, have in mind pretty well what you want to say about your subject, and then sort of let it happen." This is not saying that you should dabble aimlessly and just push paint

around. You should plan, compose and think—but you should be enjoying every minute of it. Sheer joy of painting reads clean and loud in every piece of work you have had fun doing.

Q. Foregrounds are a pain. Could you give me some ideas to help?

A. As I pointed out in a recent column, middle grounds and foregrounds should be laid in with a flat general color—but establish value as you put the paint down. Thus you will have it greyer and cooler and often lighter in the middle ground, while the foreground it will be stronger, warmer and more detailed. Put in lights and shadows, so when you start grasses and flowers, put in rocks or roads, then you will have an underpainting of basic ground color or vegetation color to work into instead of a white canvas. Always let some soil show through and in this Big Country, there is plenty of sand color to use.

Q. What kind of greens do you use?

A. There are many, many mixtures to use when making greens. I mix them as little as possible. The only greens I have on my palette are Winsor Newton Olive and Sap—all others I mix. You know that a mixture of blue and yellow make green—try yellow and black, raw umber and yellow.

# Former Haskell Resident Graduates At 75

About six or seven years ago Joe John Short, Kilgore realtor and insurance man, stated taking night courses at Kilgore College. When he graduated from Haskell High School in 1929, just before the big depression hit, he didn't have an opportunity to attend college. So at an age of about 70, he decided to expand his horizons. Joe John kept plugging along with various courses, never intending to get a degree. But one day his counselor, Joyce Odom, mentioned that he was accumulating enough credits to get within striking distance of a diploma. Joe laughed about the idea then, but later, encouraged especially by Mrs.

Odom and one of his teachers, Margaret Squier, he got serious. May 17, 1984 Joe John, clad in cap and gown, walked across the stage at Kilgore College graduation exercises to receive a degree in general business. Looking on proudly were his high school English teacher of 55 years ago, Mrs. Elaine Mills Kinsey, now of San Angelo; his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Bobby Nelson of Houston, and

his granddaughter, Laura Nelson, a senior at UT-Austin. Dr. Stewart McLaurin, KC president, praised Joe John who, at the age of 75, became the oldest person ever to receive a degree from Kilgore College. And when he walked off the stage, with tears barely on hold, the class of 318 gave him a standing ovation.

Commencement speakers usually tell graduates that their careers are just beginning, that they are going out into a world filled with opportunities limited only by one's courage, convictions and determination. The world is in a mess, caused by us in the older generation, they are told, but fresh young graduates now have the chance to straighten things out. The aging generations, graduates

are told, may believe that everything has been invented, written or done that can possibly be done, but that they shouldn't believe it. There are always new discoveries to be made, new knowledge to be gained. Joe John's commencement is not exactly the same as that of the other graduates, but he has put new meaning into the word—'commence' at any age. Joe says jokingly that you can now call him "Dr. Short." And as for that published age of 75, Joe says newspapers are always making mistakes. The numbers were just transposed!

# Stenholm Announces Small Business Committee Regional Hearings

District 17 Representative Charles W. Stenholm has announced that the Small Business Committee will hold two field hearings in Dallas-Fort Worth and Abilene in July. The meetings will be held to

gain input into specific problems facing today's small businessman, Stenholm said. "We are trying to form an agenda of the problems facing small businessmen in our region and in our nation. We'll then use the information,

ideas and criticisms from these hearings in preparation for the 99th Congress."

Stenholm (D-Stamford) will be joined at the hearings by Cong. Tom Vandergriff (D-Arlington) and Ike Skelton (D-Missouri). The DFW hearing will be conducted by the Export Opportunities and Special Small Business Problems Subcommittee. The meeting will be from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. July 10 at the DFW Regional Airport in the boardroom of the Administration Building. The building is located on East Airport Drive at the south entrance of the airport.

The DFW hearing is entitled "Export Opportunities: An Untapped Resource for Small Business." Interested parties should bring several copies of their testimony for the com-

mittee, Stenholm said. "We want witnesses," he said, "and we want to emphasize these meetings are for small businesses and their problems."

"In the 17th District alone," Stenholm said, "we have over 8,000 small businessmen and more than 12,000 operating farms and ranches. This totals to almost 13.7 percent of the 17th District as being self-employed. That's almost twice the national average."

"I'd like to know the problems facing these men and women and hear their ideas for correcting them," the West Texas said. "If they're having problems with their government, then we want to find out what ails them and what the solution is."

The Abilene meeting will be

held from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. July 11, in the River Oaks Room of the Kiva Inn on West Highway 80. This hearing will be conducted by the Subcommittee on Energy, Environment and Safety Issues Affecting Small Business, Stenholm said. "We expect to deal with current issues such as Small Business Administration loans and procedures exports, the Chapter 11 bankruptcy act,

telephone access charges, energy industry concerns, and OSHA safety standards for grain elevators and feed mills at both hearings, but we are open for any other problems our businessmen are facing."

The Abilene Radio Control Society will host the next contest on July 29.



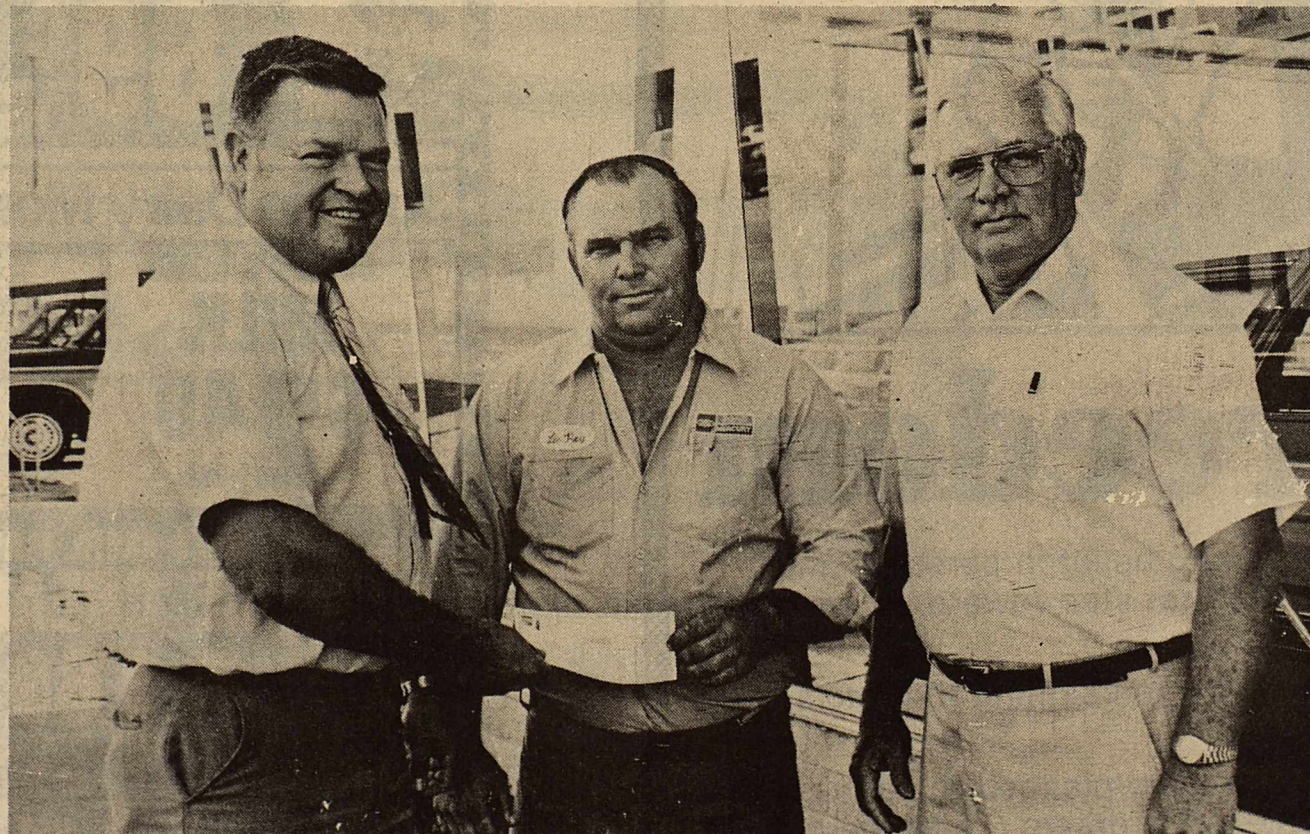
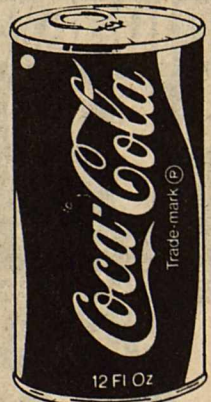

Dear Editor:

In January of this year, the State was awarded the working interest in the 14,720 acre state mineral lease on the Duval County ranch as settlement of its longstanding lawsuit against Mobil Oil Corporation. Because of the significance of this settlement to your readers, I want to take this opportunity to update you on the status of events involving the operation of the lease. We are now moving on to the second phase of the settlement which is finding an acceptable buyer for the lease.

Under the court approved settlement, Mobil returned to the State all of its interests in the 14,720 acres lease. This included all future production from approximately 9,000 acres formerly operated by Mobil, as well as that company's partial interest on approximately 5,700 acres operated by various other companies. The court also appointed Wally Scott to serve as the State's trustee, with responsibility for managing the lease. As you know, Mr. Scott is a very reputable member of the oil and gas industry. He has hired Manfred Production Company of Corpus Christi to operate the lease on a day-to-day basis.

I am pleased to report that Mr. Scott and Manfred Production Company have worked extremely hard to manage State lease 17036 in an efficient manner. Because of their efforts, production at this lease has increased significantly since last January. Some 6,129 barrels of oil were produced from the lease last month, compared to 4,605 barrels last January. Total production from the lease during the last five months amounts to 26,284 barrels of oil, valued at \$786,633. Although a portion of these revenues have been used to operate the lease, \$366,000 are available for deposit to the Permanent School Fund. To

contrast, approximately \$43,701. would have been deposited had the settlement not occurred.

As part of the court approved settlement, the lease trustee and operator are required to abide by lease 17036's development provision that a new well be drilled every 90 days. Mr. Scott and Manfred Production Company have taken the necessary steps to comply with this provision. Manfred Production Company completed a 2,300 foot well on the lease on April 16, 1984. This well is producing around ten barrels of oil a day, and has an expected pay-out of eight to ten months. The Permanent School Fund will receive approximately \$9,000. more each month once the pay-out is complete.

In order to remain in compliance with the development terms of the lease, Mr. Scott and the operating company have taken initial steps to drill another well as we are approaching the end of the second 90 day period.

Finally, you can be certain that selling State lease 17036 at a market value price to a private company is a high priority at the General Land Office. Our efforts to date have been somewhat hampered by the current slump in the oil and gas industry. I am certain, however, this lease will be sold in the very near future because of its significant reserves.

I will keep you informed on our progress. Please don't hesitate to contact me if you have any questions.

# Chocolate Blamed For Pet's Death

Chocolate has been blamed for many things over the years from obesity to acne, from hyperactivity to infertility, and now pet death.

In a report from the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory (TVMDL) published in a recent Texas Veterinary Medical Journal, chocolate was reported to be the cause of death in a Springer Spaniel dog. The dog died in seizures one day after eating two pounds of chocolate chips.

The ingredient in chocolate toxic to dogs is theobromine, a caffeine-related stimulant. The stimulant is cleared from

the blood at a much slower rate in dogs than in man.

Agitation and loss of bladder control can be symptoms of theobromine poisoning in dogs when seen after they have eaten a large amount of chocolate.

Also reported by TVMDL the toxicity associated with ingestion of excessive amounts of raw or cooked onions in dogs.

Veterinarians caution pet owners to avoid feeding onions and chocolate treats to dogs, and to keep chocolate in a safe place as a dog's sweet tooth can be just as powerful as any "chocoholic's".

# USDA Seeking Comments On 1985 Upland Cotton Program

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is seeking public comments on some aspects of the 1985 upland cotton program prior to making decisions on the program, a USDA official said today.

Everett Rank, administrator of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said decisions on 1985 program provisions will be based on the public's recommendations, the most current data on U.S. and world crop conditions and supply and demand.

Specifically, he said, USDA is asking for comments on the following:

—the loan rate for the basic grade of upland cotton (strict low middling 1-1/16 inch, micronaire 3.5 through 4.9) at average U.S. location. This base loan rate—which by law cannot be less than 55 cents per pound—will be determined according to a statutory formula using domestic and world price data.

—the established target price, which by law cannot be less than 81 cents per pound.

—whether USDA should establish an acreage reduction program and, if so, the level of reduction and how acreage

bases for the acreage reduction program would be established.

—the appropriate national

program acreage and voluntary reduction percentage if no acreage reduction program is announced.

—whether USDA should establish a paid land diversion program and if so, the percentage of the diversion and level of payment.

—whether to require offsetting compliance if an acreage reduction program is established.

—whether to permit haying and grazing of acreage conservation reserve land if an acreage reduction program is established.

—whether binding contracts should be required for producers participating in any acreage reduction program.

—the loan rate for seed cotton.

Rank said current law requires USDA to implement at least a 5 percent land diversion program if U.S. cotton stocks on July 31, 1985 are projected to exceed 3.7 million bales. If a land diversion program is in effect, and acreage reduction program of not more than 20 percent may be established.

If a combined diversion program and acreage reduction program is implemented,

any reduction above 25 percent must be under the land diversion program.

Further details concerning the 1985 upland cotton program are scheduled to appear in the June 6 Federal Register.

# Some LPG Water Heaters Dangerous

The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission in cooperation with Robertshaw Controls Company announced today that Robertshaw has offered to pay \$150 to consumers who replace certain old liquid propane gas water-heating systems with new LP gas water-heating units.

Robertshaw indicated that because of their age, critical parts of the safety control on some older systems can ultimately wear out, leading to a potentially dangerous condition. These controls have been involved in explosions and fires in which there have been

deaths, personal injuries, and property damage.

Robertshaw is engaging in this program in an effort to remove the controls from service. Consumers will have to replace the entire water heater in order to be compensated.

Known as the Unitrol A-1 series, the safety controls were manufactured between 1946 and 1955 and last distributed in 1960. The firm reports that 475,000 LP-type controls were produced. The company has records of 24 incidents involving 33 injuries and 7 deaths occurring during the thirty-eight year period

from 1946 to the present.

Fewer than 1,000 controls of the 475,000 LP-type controls produced are believed to remain in service. Control valves used in water heaters fueled by natural gas are not involved in this program.

The Unitrol A-1 series was produced in several styles. Most feature two dials and may carry the name "Unitrol" and "Robertshaw-Grayson," or the name "RUDD". The controls are approximately 3" wide, 3" deep and 5 1/2" long. The dials may vary in shape and size and may be painted, chrome-plated, or a combination of these. They can be seen

from outside the water heater and can be easily identified by consumers and/or LP suppliers.

Because replacement controls are no longer available, Robertshaw is reimbursing consumers presently using these controls \$150 to help defray the cost of purchasing a new water-heating system.

Robertshaw also is undertaking a consumer and trade advertising program to further assist owners in the identification of affected valves.

Consumers who find that they are using one of these controls should have a new water-heating system installed immediately by their LP gas distributor, dealer or other authorized representative.

# Tips To Conserve Water This Summer

The summer fun of swimming, cool drinks and even car-washing, all require an ample water supply that we often take for granted.

By now, most Texans should know that our ground-water supplies are being depleted faster than they can be renewed. That means

everybody needs to do their part to conserve water.

Lou Gilly, Haskell county Extension home economist has some suggestions for how to reduce the amount of water we casually waste at home:

- \*Keep a thermos of cool water on the kitchen cabinet or a jug of water in the

refrigerator. Running the tap to wait for cooler water sends about five gallons of water per minute down the drain.

- \*Take a quick shower. Every inch of water in tub represents about 4 1/2 gallons of water and a shower without a water-saving device typically uses 5-10 gallons per minute.
- \*Use full loads of laundry to clean those summer clothes. Washing machines can use 40-60 gallons of water per load.
- \*Resist using the toilet for a trash basket. Every flush uses 4-7 gallons of water.
- \*Watch out for water hoses with the water left running. A water hose can deliver several hundred gallons of water in an hour. For that reason, it's probably better to fill the kids' wading pool than let them play with the hose.
- \*You can save water as you wash your car too. After you wet the car down, turn the water off or use a hose with a shut-off nozzle. Use buckets of soapy water to wash it and then give the car a final rinse with the hose.

**HOME LOANS**  
(Cut Interest in Half)

If you're a homeowner, here's a procedure you might want to use to avoid half or more of the interest cost on your home loan.

Suppose you have a \$50,000 loan on your house, payable over 30 years at 12% interest. The mortgage company has given you an amortization schedule showing a monthly payment of \$514.31. Those monthly payments over 30 years will add up to \$185,151.60 of which \$135,151.60 will be interest.

Pay the loan off quick by making additional principal payments every month. Here's how it works.

Your amortization schedule will show the first month's principal payment at \$14.31, and the second month's principal will be \$14.45.

When you make your first month's payment, add the \$14.45 for a total payment of \$528.76. Your second month's payment will put you at payment number three on the amortization schedule since you've already paid the second month's principal. To this monthly payment, add the fourth month's principal of \$17.74, making the second payment total \$529.05.

By making every other payment on the amortization schedule and adding the next month's principal, you will save the amount of the next month's interest. In other words, after making the first two payments, you will have paid four months of scheduled principal but only two months of interest.

By doing this each month, you will pay your loan off in not 30 years as scheduled, but in half that time. And in doing so, you will cut the loan's total interest cost from \$135,151.60 to about half that figure. You will have noticeably larger principal additions as the years go by; however, inflation should assist with the larger payments.

To make this technique work, your loan must permit prepayment without penalty and cannot use the so-called "Rule of 78" for the prepayment. It's also a good idea to let your lender know what you're doing if you decide to use this approach.

# Prevent Fire Hazards During Holiday Screening Services Set In Area Towns

Texas residents should be conscious of the threat of fire at all times. But, according to the Building Advisory Council of Texas, certain times of the year are especially hazardous in residential areas. The upcoming July 4th weekend is one.

"If you live in neighborhoods with homes and apartments roofed with readily combustible wood shingles, you should be even more alert over this holiday weekend," says H.V. "Corky" Moss, President of the BAC. "Such roofing can easily be ignited by sparks or embers from

other fires," adds Moss. The BAC recommends that all residential roofing materials meet a UL Class A fire rating.

Although many city ordinances in Texas prohibit the sale of fireworks, people can and do find a source for fireworks during the July 4th holiday. The BAC suggests that fireworks enthusiasts enjoy the holiday by attending a public fireworks display in their area.

Regardless of what type roofing material you have on your home, you should still be especially cautious over this holiday weekend. The Building Advisory Council of Texas offers the following advice:

\* Cut dead foliage from last winter's freeze around your home. If you live in an apartment, request that the

maintenance people do this. This will eliminate a potentially combustible source of fire near your home.

\* Do not burn trash without first checking with your local fire department. Many Texas cities have ordinances prohibiting your doing this. They also would have a central dump or special trash pick-up service you could use.

\* If your lawn is dry, water it well. This will eliminate a potentially combustible source

for fire near your home by moistening the grass' root system to create a "buffer fire zone" around your home.

\* Do not pile or store combustible material such as grass cuttings near the house. Bags of dried grass clippings piled against the house or underneath an outside stairway are a definite fire hazard.

\* Do not leave outdoor charcoal or gas burners unattended. If you cook with charcoal, submerge the re-

maining coals in water after you finish. A slight wind blowing into the air intake section of the cooker can rekindle a flame in those supposedly "dead coals."

\* Do not use gasoline or kerosene to ignite charcoal when cooking outdoors. Special charcoal starter fuels are produced with a low flash point for safer use. And once the coals are burning, do not become impatient and add more starter. A stream of charcoal starter pouring from a container can flame immediately upon contacting the already hot charcoal and instantly burn back up the stream engulfing your hand and flames.

\* Do not throw any "supposedly" extinguished cigarette onto the ground. Dispose of them in an ashtray or ground them into the pavement with your foot.

The Building Advisory Council of Texas is an organization committed to the use of non-combustible materials in building construction.

## USDA Announces Wheat Program

Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block announced June 14 provisions of the 1985 wheat program, including a 20 percent acreage reduction and a 10 percent paid land diversion.

Signup for the program will be Oct. 15 through March 1. The cash land diversion payment will be \$2.70 per bushel with 50 percent available at signup. The program also includes a \$3.30 per bushel national average loan rate and a \$4.38 per bushel target price.

To be eligible for program benefits, producers must limit 1985 wheat acreage to no more than 70 percent of the farm's wheat base. They must also dedicate a certain amount of their eligible cropland to an acreage conservation reserve. The amount to be placed in this reserve must be equal to at least 28.57 percent of the farm's 1985 planted wheat acreage plus 10 percent of the farm's wheat base.

Land designated for an acreage conservation reserve must have been devoted to a row crop or small grains in two of the last three years except for a summer fallow farm. The summer fallow rules will be the same as those in effect for the 1984 programs. Those rules provide that the acreage must have been devoted to row crops or small grains in one of the last two crop years.

The 1985 acreage base will be the average of the acreage planted and considered planted to wheat in 1983 and 1984.

Haying will not be permitted on acreage conservation reserve land. However, the acreage may be grazed except during the six principal growing months as designated by state ASCS officials. Block said he has also approved a standby measure authorizing, in the event of a natural disaster, implementation of

emergency haying and grazing privileges. Approval of the emergency privileges would be made as needed on a county-by-county basis.

Offsetting and cross compliance will not apply to the 1985 wheat program.

USDA intends to review the size of the farmer-owned reserve before regular price support loans for the 1985 crop reach maturity. At that time it will be determined whether entry into the reserve will be permitted.

Program contracts signed by participants will be binding and will provide for liquidated damages for failure to comply with program requirements.
