### CONSTRUCTION

birthright to be whatever animal they were meant to be.

This stirs some interesting thoughts. There may already be maladjusted animals running loose on our farms, Yorkshires crossed with Poland-Chinas or Herefords bred to Angus, that are balanced on the edge of psychic disintegration, ready to explode.

Somehow though, I don't think these animals, whether 500 or 5000 pounds, are aware of their specieshood or lack of it. But in this somewhat absurd movement I detect a plaintive human whimper. For I don't think it is the animals that are losing their identity. I think the profound identity loss is by our fellow humans inhabiting the planet's cities and suburbs. After all, the animal which has had to adapt the most rapidly to new environments and new circumstances is not the farm animal, but the human animal. Eighty years ago the vast majority of Americans lived on farms, and the space of twenty square miles of small towns and farmland would often envelope a person's entire world. Now, that has changed. But urban America still retains a mystic connection, a sense of lost identity to an idealized farm life. They don't particularly want to do anything to insure the family farm's survival, but they want to believe that there always will be happy, hard-working farm families tending a few chickens in a country paradise that never existed. This protest against high-tech hybridization of animals may be a way of protecting their fantasy of farm life from the realities of modern agriculture. After all, I suppose it's just as hard to imagine Grandma down on the farm slopping a hog the size of a 47 Studebaker, as it is to think that she owes half a million dollars on the place. This idyllic conception of rural life would not be harmful if it was a city-dweller's private tragedy to mourn while sitting in the traffic fumes. Unfortunately it affects farmers. In many ways, it is the urbanite's belief that fresh air and nice sunrises are all that farmers need to live that disrupts our message about the need for positive farm reform. We know it's a far different world on the farm now, filled with much harsher realities than what our city brethren believe. There have to be technical changes to make us more productive and economic changes to keep us alive. It's a new age. If the farmer is to survive and the rest of the world to eat we're all going to have to adapt to the fact that things have changed down on the farm.

#### **COURAGEOUS COGITATOR**

There is so much to worry about in this world-keeping your health, keeping your job, keeping the world from being blown apart, keeping static cling out of your socks-that the time certain people devote to feeling abject horror over relatively insignificant things astounds me.

A case in point: a recent national news report centered on whether farm animals whose genetic makeup is altered to make them bigger or grow faster suffer psychological cruelty.

Geneticists using advanced techniques can now inject genes of human growth hormone into animal embyros that will produce and elephant-sized cow that gives three times more milk than a typical animal, or a steer that grows to maturity in only six months.

Genetic alteration has been going on since the dawn of history. We've always selectively crossed different breeds of cows, pigs or horses to obtain better livestock. But gene splices are like a breeder's dream come true-a chance to speed the hybridization work leading to better animals that could take hundreds or thousands of years with present methods.

Of couse there are dangers in fiddling with the natural order of things. Thinking back to Dr. Frankenstein, it's terrifying to contemplate the unintentional melding of a body the size of a panel truck with the brain of any one of several criminally deviant cows or pigs I have known personally.

However, I don't think the commentator was as concerned about the physical perils as the psychological effects of animal high-tech hybridization.

He argued that the unfortunate results of these experiments would be that the hybrid animals would lose an essential part of their identification with their species; their cowhood or pighood, if you will. In effect, by manipulating their genetic pattern and disrupting their sense of oneness with their genetic compatriots, we would steal their



Among the many programs and changes mandated by HB 72 was one concerning tutorial services. It dictated that any student failing a course or an element of a course be provided with a tutorial program at least twice a week. ## Book Tells History Of Historical Markers

The people who helped heritage shape Texas were as varied and as colorful as the wildflowers that sweep the state. Take, for example, Belle Boyd, beautiful the Confederate spy who used her feminine wiles to lure information from Union soldiers. Or how about "Choctaw Bill" Robinson, a Baptist minister who came to Texas in 1848 and preached with a gun beside his Bible until his death at the age to 89. These figures and many others are brought to life in a new book published by the **Texas Historical Commission** entitled Shadows on the Land, Anthology of Texas an Historical Marker Stories. The book is a compilation of more than 50 stories written from research information available through the THC's Marker

Department. The stories first appeared in the newspapers across the state, where they generated widespread interest in the state's historical marker program. Each story includes the location of the historical marker discussed, and 14 photographs illustrate the tales.

With more than 9,000 historical markers in Texas, the THC's marker program is an ongoing reminder of the people's history, acting as a reflection of the state's rich

cultura and diversity. In addition, the markers chronicle the history of the architecture, events and archeology that helped determine the development of modern-day Texas.

The book is written by Myra Hargrave Mcllvain, an Austin freelance writer and public speaker. She is the author of 6 Central Texas Auto Tours and Texas Auto Trails: The Southeast

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

blisters that usually begin to dry out and crust over after five days. A funny feeling or sharp pain can precede the rash, but pain more often occurs during or after the rash.

Normally, the pain will gradually go away as the rash disappears, and recovery follows. But this is not always the case.

Older people can experience pain for months or even years after the rash clears up. The rash can involve almost any part of the body and can lead to blindness if it occurs near the eyes and is left untreated. The virus that causes shingles remains dormant in the body because the virus is never totally eliminated after a person recovers from chicken pox. 

gains the upper hand, and an infection occurs again, this time as shingles. Generally the infection is restricted to the group of nerves containing the virus and to the skin served by those nerves. The

result is pain and a rash. Most cases of shingles clear up naturally, but serious cases may require drugs such as amitriptyling, carbamazepine, interferon, or acyclovir to control the symptoms.

Estimates are that up to half of all people who reach 85 have suffered a case of shingles. Fortunately, only about one-tenth of a percent have a second attack by that





## Use Proper Gun For Deer Hunting

What kind of gun is legal for deer hunting in Texas?

This is a question which often bounces around bunting camps and sporting goods houses this time of year when thousands of Texas hunters are heading for the deer lease. Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials said the regulations are fairly liberal but there are some types of guns and other devices which

are prohibited for deer hunting. "Probably the most-asked question is can I use a .22-caliber rifle to hunt deer," said Capt. Harold Oates, inland game and fish law enforcement supervisor. "The answer is that only firearms utilizing centerfire ammunition can be used, therefore, rimfire .22s are definitely prohibited." Another frequent question

involves automatic weapons. "Semi-automatic rifles or shotguns which require the trigger to be pulled and released for each shot are legal, but true automatic guns of the machine-gun type are not," Oates said. There is no restriction on number of cartridges or shells loaded in firearms for deer hunting. Shotguns are limited in

range but they can be used for deer hunting in all counties, loaded either with buckshot or rifled slugs. They are especially popular in thick East Texas woods where shots generally are close and telescopic sights are not as effective.

"Handguns are legal for taking deer as long as they use centerfire cartridges," Oates added. However, as with archery, a hunter should not attempt to hunt deer with a pistol unless he or she has practiced enough to be an accomplished shooter.

Archery provides fodder for more confusion among hunters. A long bow and arrow may be used both during the archery only deer season and the general gun season. During the archery only season archers may take antlerless deer without an anterless deer hunting permit, but during the general gun season archers must obtain anterless permits in counties where they are required, Oates explained.

Crossbows are prohibited for taking all game species. For further information on hunting and fishing regulations, consult the various hunting regulations booklets now available at department offices and license outlets across the state.



## **Heart Disease Deaths Down**

For the first time since 1952, deaths from heart disease in 1983 accounted for less than 45 percent of all deaths in Texas.

In the last 29 years, the percent of all deaths attributable to heart disease slowly rose, peaked in the early sixties and then slowly low. Over half of all deaths were caused by heart disease as recently at 1966.

The American Heart Accosiation credits this dramatic turnaround to improvement in lifestyle and related cardiovascular risk factor levels, increased efforts in prevention, and innovations in diagnosis and treatment. However, it is not possible to determine whether the declines in heart death reflect a reduction in the frequency of attacks, an improvement in life expectancy after an attack, or both.

**American Heart Association** computations using Texas Department of Health vital statistics show that 51,416 people died of heart and blood vessel diseases in 1983.



into 9 interceptions, and the Indians had 11 steals. David Adams had four of the team's six assists to lead in that area.


In the first quarter, the Indians completed 3 of 11 field goals, in the second quarter, the Haskell team had 4 of 12 shots completed from the field.



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## **Texas Property Taxes Near \$7.2 Billion**

Property taxes totaling nearly \$7.2 billion were levied in Texas during 1983 by some 3,118 local taxing units, according to the State Tax Board's Property (SPTB's) annual report for the

1983 tax year. As Ron Patterson, SPTB's executive director, pointed out, "The property tax continues to be the primary revenue source for school districts, cities, counties and special districts such as junior colleges, utility districts, etc." Overall, the statewide property tax levy rose by more than \$637 million from the \$6.5 billion in property

taxes levied in 1982, representing a 9.72 percent rate of increase. That rate of increase, however, is down from the 14.4 percent increase in levies from 1981 to 1982. "During 1983," Patterson said, "50.15 percent of all property taxes in the state were levied by school districts, while the city share of the levy was 20.38 percent. Counties levied 17.95 percent of the taxes, while special districts

accounted for 11.52 percent of the 1983 levy.' The reported property tax levy per capita in Texas for fiscal year 1983 was \$416.86, compared to \$376.61 in 1982. However, when adjusted to a base year of 1970 for changes in the consumer price index

(CPI), the real per capita levy for 1983 falls to \$162,47, compared to \$151.50 in 1982 and \$129.27 in 1970.

Patterson noted that the property tax accounted for 41.54 percent of the total state and local tax burden in 1983, compared to 38.06 percent in the previous year. "Revenues from some state taxes, mainly the sales and oil production taxes, dropped in 1983," he explained, "and resulted in the property tax representing a larger portion of the total state and local taxes."

Using levy information reported by school districts, SPTB calculated the distribution of the 1983 school tax levy among the various classes of taxable property. The figures indicated that

business taxpayers including mineral producers paid just over 52 percent of the school taxes in 1983, while owners of single-family residences paid slightly over 30 percent. Farm properties, including rural acreage, were allocated less than eight percent of the school tax burden while other classes of property together paid over nine percent of the levy.

reappraisals help ensure that the appraisal roll meets the constitutional requirements that values be equal and uniform, and that all property be appraised in accordance with market value.

'When local taxing units reduce their tax rates in proportion to the increase in values, a reappraisal will not produce an overall increase in tax revenues. Rather, it serves to equalize taxes among the various property categories,' he said.

He added that the relationship between appraised values and tax rates is maintained by the state's "truth-in-taxation' statute contained in the Property Tax Code.

truth-in-taxation The provisions require all taxing units to calculate and publicize an effective tax rate before adopting their actual tax rate. The effective tax rate produces the previous year's revenue for maintenance and operations, using current values of property that was taxable in both the previous year and the current year. It also includes the tax rate needed to pay the taxing unit's debt obligations for the upcoming fiscal year.

"Closely tied to truth in taxation are the rollback provisions of the Property Tax Code," said Patterson. "These provisions give taxpayers an opportunity to limit tax increases in all taxing units."

In all units except school districts, the rollback process can be used in the same tax year to reduce a tax increase to only eight percent over the calculated effective tax rate. In school districts the tax increase limitation is implemented in the following

vear. SPTB figures show 1983 tax increases were challenged in nine tax rollback elections which were held in early 1984. Voters approved rollbacks in six of these elections and rejected them in three others. Elections were held in four

The above stats were taken from information obtained for MADD from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration and the National Safety Council.

Sixty percent of all of the high school seniors in this country drink at least once a month, and twenty five percent of all seniors have been found to take a drink as

On June 28 of this year, President Ronald Reagan signed into law House Resolution 4616, which raised the legal drinking age to 21.

The new law, which will become effective in two years, upholds the 21 year old drinking age by witholding 5 percent of the state's federal highway funds (not including their highway safety fund) in fiscal 1987 and by witholding 10 percent of their highway funds in fiscal 1988. Those funds could be restored if the state subsequently raised its legal drinking age to 21.

Additionally, the new law could also add a state sponsored program to combat driving while under the influence of a drug to the criteria under which states could receive incentive grants under Public Law 97-364 to combat drunk driving.

And, it also provides incentive grants, up to five percent of current highway safety funds, for states that enacted mandatory minimum sentences for persons convicted for drunk driving offenses. 

**Clean Chimneys To Prevent Fires** 

Chimneys with heavy creosote deposits are a leading cause of home fires in the United States each year. Chimneys should be

inspected annually for creosote build-up, and now is a good time to do so, says Dr. Gary Nelson, safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas

Cresosote is produced when wood burns. It escapes from a stove or fireplace in the form of smoke and condenses on the inside of the chimney. Creosote is highly flammable, and deposits one-fourth of an inch deep or more should be removed, emphasizes Nelson. Once ignited, creosote can burn at temperatures up to 3,000 degrees F. The strong upward draft caused by high-temperature chimney fires can lift burning creosote out of the chimney and onto the roof, possibly spreading the fire to the rest of the house, or even neighboring houses.

Chimney cleaning is a messy and sometimes dangerous task which may require climbing onto the roof. Although chemical cleaners are available, most have been proven ineffective.

Nelson suggest steel brushes to clean a chimney, using extension rods to reach the entire length of the flue. To avoid getting soot all over the house, fasten a sheet over the opening of the fireplace.



#### **MORE THAN 50% REQUIRED**

An important provision in the 1984 Tax Reform Act concerns property used partly for business and partly for personal use. Such property must now be used more than 50% for business, or no investment credit or accelerated depreciation deductions will be allowed.

Therefore, computers, boats, airplanes, automobiles, trucks, and other property used partly for business and partly for personal entertainment or recreation will be subject to this

You may be wondering how the IRS will know if you use a boat or computer 40% or 75% for business. The burden of proof, beginning in 1985, will be on the taxpayer. You are required to keep adequate "contemporaneous records" to substantiate your business usage.

If a taxpayer doesn't have adequate contemporaneous records-that is, records kept currently during the year as the business usage occurs-no credit or deductions will be allowed for the item. If a taxpayer claims credits or deductions without adequate records to support them, he will be subject to negligence penalties.

The contemporaneous records must state the business use of the property as well as the business purpose.

Where business usage of equipment is more than 50% in the first year but decreases in later years, recapture of investment credit and deductions is required.

Tax return preparers will be required to advise taxpayers of the rules and get from their clients written certification that the taxpayer has kept adequate records. If you haven't already done so, you will want to check with your accountant for assistance in making this recordkeeping requirement as simple as possible, while still complying with the law so as not to lose your deductions.
