Rain-Snow Hit Area

According to Sam Herren, Haskell's local weather watcher, this has been the second wettest December on record. It was exceeded only by the winter of 1932, in which Haskell received 5.6 inches of precipitation.

The temperature for the past month rose to 75 for the high (Dec. 28) and dipped to 22 (on Christmas morning) for the low.

Rainfall for the month was at 4.54 inches with the norm being 1.07 inches. The normal precipitation to date is 24.14 inches, and the total precipitation for the year is 23.69 inches.

Thus far, Haskell has only seen a trace of snow and sleet, according to Herren.

Snow covered the ground on Tuesday afternoon and evening, but the exact amount was not indicated in Herren's report.

Tips For Handling Child's Negative Behavior

about children's behavior is that the same discipline problems often come back in different forms at different times.

Parents who recognize these behavior patterns and know some ways to deal with them have a head start in keeping the family peace, according to Growing Child, the monthly child development newsletter. The following basic principles may help.

Principle #1: Don't reward negative behaviors

Most experts agree that behaviors that are consistently rewarded are the very ones which tend to become "built-in"—that is, they become part of the child's behavior pattern. Parents often unthinkingly MR. AND MRS. JESSE DEAN are proud to announce the reward negative behaviors. Principle #2: Ignore negative behaviors as much as possible

At times it is necessary to punish negative spanking or other direct action. If you ignore negative behaviors, most often they will simply go away. Why? Because you have taken away the reward simply by not paying attention. You can get a lot of mileage out of Grilled Cheese Sandwiches this principle if you learn how to use it.

Principle #3: Avoid confrontation

Try not to get into fights with your child when he is behaving negatively. After all, you are smarter than he

Principle #4: Reward positive behaviors

Social Security Benefits Due Eligible Dependents

Surviving dependents of a deceased worker should apply for Social Security benefits as soon as possible following the worker's death, Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said recently.

Applying promptly will allow benefits to start in the shortest possible time. In addition, Hammons said, some benefits cannot be paid more than a month before the application if filed.

Social Security benefits can be paid to these survivors:

•Unmarried children under 18, or under 19 if a full-time high school student. Unmarried children over

18 who were disabled before 22 and remain disabled. •A surviving widow or

widower of any age caring for a child under 16 or disabled who gets benefits.

•Widow or widower 60 or answer any questions.

•Disabled

widower 50-60. •Dependent parent 62 or

Benefits can also be paid to a surviving divorced spouse if the marriage to the deceased worker lasted 10 years or more. Grandchildren can get benefits on a grandparent's under record circumstances.

Before any benefits can be paid, the worker must have had credit for a certain amount of work covered by Social Security. In 1984, the amount ranges from 11/2 to 81/4 years depending on the worker's age at death.



Texas A&M Boasts First Confirmed Case Of A Fertile Mule

News accounts from Nebraska reporting the first documented case of a fertile mule overlook the 60-year-old story of Old Beck — a footnote to Texas A&M University history.

Old Beck, whose blood was tested by the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research and found to be that of a true mule, gave birth to two foals in the early 1920s, the latter under the watchful eye of Texas A&M faculty including the deans of veterinary medicine and agri-

Old Beck's first foal, a female, was reportedly born on a Texas farm. When Texas A&M agricultural faculty heard about it, they arranged to bring the mule to Texas A&M, where she was studied and later bred to a stallion. As a result, a male foal was born, closely observed by animal husbandry and veterinary medi-

ly gave birth to a foal, has been one more time in 1924, but trumpeted as being the first aborted very soon afterwards. She never again was successfully bred, nor was her mare offspring.

However, said the Journal of Heredity article, her stallion offspring was bred to a mare and produced a male foal, which reportedly grew to 14 hands and showed remarkable intelligence except for a dislike, of crossing ditches or streams said to be typical mule be-

Texas A&M develops software to teach high school science

COLLEGE STATION — Bio-Systems, a Houston-based medical technology firm and subsidiary of Healthdyne Inc. of Marietta, Ga., has awarded a contract to Texas A&M University to develop high school science lessons that can be used with Texas Instruments, IBM

or Apple computers. "The programs will be used pupils in grades 9-12," said Texas A&M researcher Dr. Jon Hunter, project coor-

Unlike other self-paced computer programs for learning, the Bio-Systems lessons feature of scientific principles and stepby-step procedures for performing laboratory experiments, he said.

In addition, students use a variety of sensors and a computer interface module - developed at Texas A&M and sold by Bio-Systems — to obtain results from their projects, exprofessor of bioengineering and veterinary physiology/ pharmacology.

Bio-Systems has been active in supporting a number of Texas A&M science training programs, including a summer session that draws participants from across America and from other countries, noted Hunter.

Texas A&M, IBM developing programs to teach statistics

COLLEGE STATION -Two divisions of The Texas A&M University System have entered into a \$220,000 research and development effort with IBM to develop "user friendly" programs for teaching basic statistics to college students on the IBM Personal Computer.

Under terms of the contract, IBM will supply \$100,000 in direct support and equipment valued at \$120,000.

Texas A&M's Statistics Department and the Computer Technology Division of the **Texas Engineering Experiment** Station (TEES) will perform a prototype software package that students could use to learn statistics on IBM Personal Computers.

TEES is the engineering research arm of The Texas A&M University System.



THE C.O.D. FRAUD GAME

My Consumer Protection Division has asked me to warn consumers about c.o.d. fraud, which is sweeping the

THE SCAM

Victims of c.o.d. fraud have reported that they first received a phone call from a California company, in which they were offered a prize or a precious gem. All they had to do in order to win the valuable prize was order the company's product.

When the c.o.d. package arrived, the consumers paid about \$39 and found nothing inside the package. In some cases, the consumers found a note that told them to send in another \$50 in order to receive the prize. In other cases the product was sent but turned out to be nearly worthless.

Some of the products offered through these boiler room operations include an "executive" pen and pencil set, a so-called personalized calendar, and a supposed home health guide. The pen and pencil set are worth about \$3, not the \$33 claimed. The calendar is a small cardboard calendar with pasteon label and the home health guide is a piece of cardboard with a few health

Another company offers consumers a Timex computer for \$50. But the caller fails to mention that you can get the same product for \$45 through

WHAT TO DO

If you receive a call from an unknown company, ask for a copy of their catalogue-if you are interested in the product. Don't be fooled by any statement like "this offer is good today

Although the post office is re-quired to deliver all c.o.d. packages, the consumer is not required to accept

If you think you have been taken by a c.o.d. company, you may report it to the Consumer Protection Division

Plant oils not practical substitute for diesel fuel

COLLEGE STATION -The value of substituting plant oils for diesel fuel has been laid to rest by Texas A&M University agricultural economists unless the price of diesel skyrockets.

Recent articles in popular farming literature have called attention to the possibilities of using plant oils such as sunflower, soybean and peanut for diesel fuel as a potentially inexpensive energy source. But an energy report written by the economists and published by Texas A&M's Center for Energy and Mineral Resources indicates plant oils are not economical as substitutes for the fossil

Even under the most optimistic conditions, No. 2 diesel from plant oils will cost from 80 cents to \$1.20 more than regular diesel, according to the report by Drs. Ronald Griffin, Ronald Lacewell, Glenn Collins and Hao-Chun Chang.






