New Dumpsters In Place

Haskell will soon be changing to a new system of garbage collection, which will insure a more sanitary means of collection, as well as save the taxpayers money, in the long run.

The Emco dumpster system will be installed in the near future, as the new Emco truck arrived in Haskell shortly after 9 a.m. on Thursday, January 24.

The cost of the new truck alone was around \$56,000, and the city also bought a back-up truck for \$3500. The total cost of the dumpsters (780) units is approximately \$150,000.

The old trash barrels will be hauled away at the citizens request by the city, City Manager Robert Baker said Thursday.

Many of the reasons for the change to this system of garbage collection were that the old system trucks were worn out and the replacement cost was prohibitive.

Another reason was that the new system is automated, and will employ only one fulltime operator and one part-time operator, whereas the old type system was employing five people and was more costly in man-power. need of servicing, and we feel that this will be an added plus to the citizens of Haskell by being able to use more people to repair the streets and fewer on the garbage collection area,'' commented Baker.

"We are also looking at the tremendous cost savings to the citizens of Haskell and to the City of Haskell in the next years with this system as we will be paying out less workman's compensation due to job-related injuries, and we will also save money on workers salaries," Baker concluded.

This system is more sanitary, as well, due to the fact that there will be fewer animals to get into the trash receptacles, and this system will also be less costly in the number of runs made to the dump, as the new truck will be able to hold more refuse, and make fewer runs.

"This truck holds 30 cubic yards of trash, whereas the old trucks only held 15 cubic yards," remarked Baker.

remarked Baker. The new truck has a diesel engine, and this will be a fuel saver for the city and the taxpayers. Looking at the new dumpsters, they will have plastic lids which are easier to lift to load in the garbage. These are not like the old type dumpster, which were all steel, with the heavy lids. Additionally, the city is expecting to purchase approximately 100 special dumpster units which will be, more or less, portable, made on a roller system, which will be made available to the handicapped and the elderly.

Robert Baker said that prior to the city's purchasing this system, he sought out information, and advise, from several cities which already had this system installed, and Baker said, "The answers were always the same, that those cities were super happy with this system of collection."

This system will be in full implementation in 6-8 weeks, says Dave Miller, the sanitation supervisor with the City.

However, the Sanitation Dept. is asking citizens to help them with this project by cutting back any overhanging trees, and clearing their alleyways, if possible.

"We will have to have 14 foot vertical clearance to be able to lift these dumpster units to dump them, so these overhanging trees and branches will have to be cut back.

The next afternoon, Thursday, a call was received at Rice Springs Care Home about 2:30 p.m. with the caller announcing that a bomb was in the building.

About 80 patients were evacuated to the hospital and to the Experienced Citizens Center and the bomb team from Dyess was called back. After an extensive search during which nothing was found, the patients were moved back.

During both ordeals, one thought was foremost in the minds of local law enforcement officials. Following a check with authorities in Baylor County, it was confirmed that over 1,200 pounds of plastic explosive and over 200 detonators had been stolen recently.


What about MY FREEDOMS?

Second, don't use openflame heat sources to thaw pipes, she cautions. The pipes could be damaged and dry or flammable pipe is frozen. This works materials near the pipe may ignite.

If Rate Period Specific Billing were not in effect, the entire call would have been billed at the higher day rate. Calls which extend from the evening rate period (25% discount) to the night and weekend rate period (40% discount) or from the night and weekend rate period (40% discount) to the day rate period (no discount) would also be billed according to the actual minutes of use during each rate period.

AT&T Communications anticipates a minimal increase of approximately .02% in its revenues or approximately \$250,000 annually.


Players can advance their playing piece or receive cash bonuses by knowing Aggie traditions.






