A stack of bills almost as tall as my four year old daughter have already been introduced to "fine tune" H.B. 72.

Some of the bills seem to be good ones, but they are scarce.

A recent bill by State Senator Hector Uribe of Brownsville, would force the consolidation of all schools with an average daily attendance of less than 250 students. Apparently, the State (either State Board of Education or the Texas Education Agency) would tell the small schools when and with whom they would consolidate leaving no voice whatsoever to the local folks.

At first indication the bill appeared to be just something to get attention but it now seems that some of the powers that be in Austin are giving the bill serious consideration. Simply from a money saving aspect if nothing else. The consolidation would save the State several million dollars a year and with the tight budget in Austin, any savings of more than \$11.89 will be looked at closely.

To address this and other education related issues, a group of citizens from Haskell, Knox and Baylor counties have chartered a bus from Abilene to Austin next Monday afternoon. The group will visit with as many Representatives and Senators as possible Tuesday and return home Tuesday afternoon. Seats are still available and further information is available at the Free Press or by calling Munday. (Names and phone numbers are printed in a letter to the editor on page 4.)

TAX PLANNING

OWNERS OF DIESEL VEHICLES

The '84 Tax Act increases the tax on diesel fuel for use in a highway vehicle from 9 cents per gallon to 15 cents per gallon, effective August 1, 1984. However, Congress did not want the 6 cents per gallon increase to be borne by purchasers of diesel fuel used in vehicles of 10,000 pounds or less. To offset the 6 cent increase, purchasers and current owners of light weight diesel vehicles will receive one-time payments generally in the form of income tax credits.

The credit is available only to the following:

1. The original purchaser of a qualified vehicle purchased after January 1, 1985 and before January 1, 1988.

2. The holder as of January 1, 1985 of such a vehicle purchased before that date.

The amount of the payment depends upon the model year of the vehicle, and on the vehicle type i.e., truck or car.

A qualified vehicle is any diesel-powered highway vehicle which-

(A) has at least 4 wheels

(B) has a gross vehicle weight rating of 10,000 pounds or less

(C) and is registered for highway use under the laws of any State.

Existing owners of qualified vehicles, as well as others who purchase their vehicles this year, are treated as if they purchased the vehicle on December 31, 1984 and will claim the credit on the return covering that date.

If you have a light weight diesel vehicle be sure and notify your tax preparer. He will need this information in the preparation of your 1984 Tax Return.



Delinquent Taxpayers Owe \$810 Million

owe counties, cities, school districts and other taxing units across Texas at least \$810 million, according to a report to the legislature made this week by the State Property Tax Board (SPTB).

About three-fourths of the state's 3,119 taxing units responded to a survey which the legislature directed SPTB to conduct. SPTB estimates that if all taxing units were able to report all their delinquent penalties and taxes, interest, the total would pass the \$1 billion mark.

The \$810 million in reported delinquencies equals almost 14 percent of the 1983 property taxes levied statewide. These delinquent taxes are contained in 12.1 million accounts, which represents a very large recordkeeping burden for local taxing

units. The \$810 million figure may not be completely reliable. Throughout the survey, many taxing units indicated their delinquent tax records were in such poor shape that they could not answer many of the survey questions with confidence.

The report concludes that the condition of tax records is perhaps the most significant obstacle to delinquent tax collections. Only in recent years have some taxing units engaged in a serious effort to organize and automate tax records.





Computer Stress

Computers may be a wonder, but they can also be a stress factor at work, school and home. Too much time interacting with a computer can create problems. Research now indicates that continuous computer interaction changes the user's time sense. Computers are fast and efficient in responding. So individuals who interact constantly with computers, tend to expect all things to occur with the same speed and efficiency-including their dealings with other people. As a result they may experience more frustration and stress than those spend less time interacting with the machines.

METER TAMPERING NOW A FELONY

The State of Texas has recently adopted an amendment to the State Penal Code making meter tampering a third degree felony. A third degree felony comes with a punishment of confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for a term of not more than 10 or less than 2 years. In addition to imprisonment, an individual adjudged guilty of a third degree felony may be punished by a fine not to exceed \$5,000.

Before the amendment of the new law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unless the loss of service was more than \$200. Under the new law, any meter tampering regardless of the amount of loss is now a felony of the third degree.

- Meter tampering consists of, but is not limited to:
- (1) Diverting electricity from passing through the meter device.
- (2) Preventing electric service from being correctly registered by a meter device.
- (3) Unauthorized activation of electric service.

As a special note to our members, it will also be considered meter tampering if a meter is reset and electrical service is restored by anyone other than a Cooperative employee.

All Cooperative meters are sealed. This seal should not be cut or broken without special authorization. In cases where the seal must be cut for emergencies the Cooperative should be notified as soon as possible so that the meter can be resealed.
