## Methodist Church To Celebrate 100th Anniversary March 17

A century of worship will be observed by the congregation of the Methodist Church here on March 17 as they will celebrate the church's 100th anniversary.

Among the dignitaries to attend the celebration will be Bishop Louis Schowengerdt, who will deliver the message on Sunday morning.

A luncheon for the congregation will be held in the fellowship hall following the morning worship services.

At 2 p.m., there will be a reception for the congregation to visit with past clergy, friends, and former members of the Haskell church.

The celebration will begin following the fellowship, and will be headed by special music provided by The Bell Twins-June Dement and Jane Park.

Former clergy will give their greetings, and the day will close with a benediction from the District superintendent Weldon McCormick.

The closing hymn for the day of celebration will be "God Be With You".

#### Church History

The Haskell church came into being when a Methodist preacher, named Rev. J.B. Wood, stopped in Haskell in Sept. 1884 and held services in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Mike Tucker. Later the same fall, a Rev. J.H. Wiseman began preaching on a more regular basis. He was from Anson.

It was under the leadership of Wiseman that the charter members of the Haskell Methodist Church were recorded. Those members were: F.G. Alexander, Mary Alexander, Seaton S. Cummings, Mrs. Mary E. Cummings, Mrs. Luella Dewees, Mrs. Mattie Lomax, and Mrs. Mary Smith. The Haskell Church was attached to Jones county as a mission field in the Abilene district by the annual conference.

As part of the church's history relates, church was held in respective members homes until the congregation was too large for the homes to accomodate.

In 1889 the women of the church went to work to see that a proper building be constructed so that the young congregation would have a meeting place of their own.

On June 23, 1909 a contractor by the name of H.C. Wyche got the okay to begin construction of the new Haskell Methodist Church.

Mr. Wyche was the father of Mary Bishophausen.

At 8:30 a.m., July 5, 1909, friends, members of the church, and a number of wellwishers, were on hand for the groundbreaking ceremony which would usher in the age of Methodism in Haskell, Texas.

The cornerstone for the building was laid in January of 1910.

The sanctuary and the Fellowship

The sanctuary and the Fellowship Hall was added at the cost of \$40,000.

The women left the responsibility of the fund raising up to others as they began to concentrate on building a church parsonage.

In 1928, the annex which adjoins the church on the west was built at a cost of \$8,000. Mr. Henry Smith

was the contractor for this project.

About the same time, the pipe organ was purchased for the church, and for fifty years thereafter Mrs. O.E. Patterson was the church's organist. Nelda Lane now occupies that position.

The present parsonage was erected in 1956 and was built for \$25,000

The Children's Building (which includes a meeting place for Troop #36 of the Boy Scouts) was built at the cost of \$20,000, and this addition was the last renovation which the church underwent.

All friends, former members, pastors, and other Methodist are cordially invited to attend the special services connected with the 100th Anniversary celebration.

One hundred years of worship is, indeed, something special to celebrate about!

letter to inform those not still being considered.



Haskell, a hero of the Battle of Goliad, was officially organized in 1885; its towns include the county seat of Haskell, and Rule, Rochester, O'Brien,

"Even one serving of these snacks, assuming you can eat just one, provides a substantial amount of the day's allotment for sodium," says the nutritionist.

Sweeten maintains. She also explains that the researchers found a wide range of sodium levels within some of the individual products they tested, and snacks made by regional and local companies were not tested at all.

Salt, or more correctly sodium (salt is 40 percent sodium), is important to the body, says the nutritionist. However, excessive salt in the diet has been linked with hypertension, or high blood pressure. High blood pressure, in turn, may lead to heart or kidney disease or stroke.



Because this is my column, I suppose that that fact entitles me to state my opinion. Well, I have a very strong opinion on the new, tough eligibility requirements set for our public school students.

These new requirements just went into effect in the past six weeks period, but they will have to be endured by everyone for the entire six weeks.

I think that making a kid ineligible for six weeks because he did not pass all of his classes is insane. It is like prescribing the use of a guillotine to cure a headache...this type of cure is worse than the proverbial disease.

While, I will be the first to admit that absenteeism was. and has always been, a major problem in the public school, feel that suspending a student from all extra-curricular activities is a form of inhumane punishment.

The old argument is: "Kids should attend school to learn, not to be getting out of class all of the time." Yes, I agree, kids should be at school to learn. But, who is to say that learning cannot take place at a track meet, ag show, or band contest? And, who decided what was the most important priority? Is, for example, English any more meaningful to a kid who is a fine tennis player than his tennis period is? Is math more essential for a kid to learn than for him learning what it takes to raise and show a farm animal? Who says geography is more important than music to a student who excells in music?

The basic bottom line is, what good does taking these kids out of these activities do for them or the rest of the kids? The ones who are left have to be burdened with the fact that they are not as good, or competitive, because they have lost their full compliment of competitors due to low

Don't be deceived. This rule does not benefit anyone. It hurts the low achiever and the high achiever alike.

When I was in school (back in the dark ages, before the wisdom and the genius of H. Ross Perot,) we had to be eligible for extra-curricular activities a week at a time. So if grades were down in some subjects for one particular week, there was no participation by those failing students in athletics, band, ag, etc., for that week.

But, as it is now, even the brainiest kids suffer, because they just cannot take up the burden placed on them when others on their team, in their band, or in their other activities, are out because of grades, and they have to take up their slack, as well as pulling their own load.

It is not fair in any sense of the word. One recent example that caught the media's eye was the case of the son of an Abilene lawyer. The young man was a member of the Abilene Cooper baseball team. This kid was making four A's, one B, and a 69 in another course, which I believe they said was geometry. Now, according to the report, the math course was not required at Cooper, since it was upper level, and the student was obviously receiving good grades in all of this other classes, which indicated

that he was certainly not an underachiever. But, the grim reaper of the grades took his toll again, and this would-be Cooper Cougar is now on the bench...outside of the ballpark.

Meanwhile, his teammates, all of whom apparently made their grades, are having to suffer because of their fellow player's absence. They made the grades, but are still

#### **Conservation Viewpoints USDA Soil Conservation Service**

Assisting

Haskell Soil and Water **Conservation District** 

Abundant rainfall this fall and winter have given promise of excellent crop yields for this years harvest. Soil moisture conditions on unprotected fields can cropland contribute to soil erosion. The effect of heavy rains on saturated soils causes severe rill and gully erosion on unprotected fields.

Conservation measures such as contour farming, terraces and waterways can help protect the soil. Waterways play part important controling erosion from concentrated flow areas and are an integral part of parallel terrace systems.

Waterway installation starts with shaping the followed vegetating permanent grass cover. Two grasses have stood the test of time for waterway protection. Bermudagrass and Kleingrass, have been most successful, although westernwheatgrass has been used to some extent.

This spring should be an excellent time to seed or sprig waterways due to

conditions. Kleingrass is established at the rate of 4 pounds pure live seed per acre or sprig 48 bushels of coastal per acre.

Parallel tenace systems should be given serious consideration when replacing old tenaces. Higher construction cost were a disadvantage years ago, but standard tenaces cost about the same today.

For planning and implementing waterways and terraces, technical assistance is available thru the Soil Conservation Service in Haskell. Sign up all conservation practices runs thru March 15, 1985.



## **RRC Okays Change** For Ferguson Pipe Co.

Commission this week approved natural gas contract changes sought by Ferguson Crossing Pipe Line Co., Unit Gas Transmission Co., and El Paso Hydrocarbons Co. which will save their customers almost \$10 million annually.

The largest decreases came in two contracts El between Paso Hydrocarbons and Texas Utilities Fuel Co. Rates will drop to \$3.30 per MMBtu (million British thermal units) from \$3.75 in one contract and \$3.35 in the other. Total estimated annual savings to TUFCO and its affiliated electric generating plants are \$8.2 million. The new rates are effective for bills on and after Jan. 1.

COLLEGE STATION -While most houses built before 1940 don't have the advantages of modern insulation materials, they still may be cheaper to heat and cool, say researchers with the Center for Energy and Mineral Resources (CEMR) at Texas A&M University.

Center researchers report that studies show older houses tend to use less energy for both heating and cooling, and probably require fewer improvements against the weather than people expect.

One of the most universal energy-saving characteristics of old houses is operable windows, researchers report.

In addition, the houses often include rooftop ventilation, skylights, exterior balconies, porches, wide overhangs, awnings and shade trees.




