Charles Chapman Is Appointed New Judge For 39th District

Charles Chapman was appointed district judge of the 39th Judicial District, effective March 18 by Governor Mark White. He is replacing the late Judge Joe Williams, who died February 18.

Chapman was born in Fort Worth, but raised in Haskell. He grew up the son of another district judge, Judge Ben Charlie Chapman, who held the office from 1943-1973.

After graduating from Haskell High School, Chapman attended TCU where he graduated with a Business Bachelors of Administration degree in 1964.

He then attended law school at Baylor, where he graduated in 1971.

He came back to Haskell to join in a partnership law firm with Royce Adkins.

As district judge, he will have to give up his private law practice.

Chapman will be filling the remainder of William's current term, which was for two years. After that time, he will have to seek re-election.

Chapman and his wife, Peggye, are the parents of one son, Davis, who is 13.

The 39 year old Haskell native was one of three persons vying for the position. The others were Joseph Thigpen, a private practice attorney, and Isaac Castro, who is currently the County Attorney in

This week marks the first visable results of a project which is almost three years old around the Free Press office. The project of placing the Free Press mailing list on computer turned out to be much larger than originally expected.

Reading advertisements about mailing list programs, talking to salesmen who have never seen the inside of a newspaper office and trying to write our own program all proved equally futile.

Advertisements all promise the program will do more things than the operator could ever imagine. The problems were not in the things we couldn't imagine but in the things we expected, like putting a subscriber from Colorado in a group with the rest of the Colorado subscribers. Most programs which would group subscribers by city or state were either limited in capacity or took hours to sort the list and print address labels. There were systems which could do the job, but several hundred thousand dollars for a system like Readers Digest uses seemed a bit like overkill.

As we stumbled along looking at possibilities, the opening of the new post office approached and with it the prospect of changing addresses on most Haskell subscribers with box numbers. Making new stencils is a slow process and one none of us was looking forward to.

At about the same time, we received the wonderful news that the stencils used in our addressing machine were no longer made. The only folks who thought the news was wonderful were the ones who had to make the new stencils.

About that time, local computer wizzard and Radio Shack dealer Joe Alves came by the house one evening to talk about a large capacity computer that was on sale and a relatively new program which should meet our requirements.

We took the plunge and a week and a half later, about half of our subscribers will receive, papers (we hope) with white address labels.

During the next couple of weeks we will complete the conversion. During this period there will be some problems and we need to know several things from our subscribers. If your paper is late getting to you, if you miss issues, or have any other problem, please let us know.

The system should improve our service to subscribers, but like anything new, it will take a couple of weeks to get the bugs out and get used to the system.

Workday Set To Dismantle Old Concession Stand Here

The Haskell Indian Band Boosters have set March 30 as a workday, in which the old concession stand will be dismantled, so work can begin on the construction of the new building.

In a meeting which was held Tuesday night, the club went ahead with the okay to hold their workday. They are planning to move all of the salvageable items, such as the major appliances, to another storage area until they can have the new building finished.

The new concession stand will be a metal building, with two new restrooms attached, replacing the old ones at the football field.

It is to measure 30 by 45 feet, which will be half again as large as the existing one. New restrooms will measure 15 by 15 foot, each.

The project will cost an estimated \$15,000, with a portion of the funds coming from the school.

Much of the work to be done on the building will be done by the vocational ag students.

The club will present their bids, specs, and other information to the members of the School Board at the next meeting of the Board, in April, so that they can make the necessary arrangements for their portion of the funding of the building, and so work can continue.

Charles Thornhill is in charge of the project.

In other matters before the Band Booster Club, the members present okayed the purchase of a Dr. Beat, which is an electronic, amplified metronome. It will be used in all of the band classes.

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Special Rules Apply To Door-To-Door Sales

A new set of pots and pans, a Bible, burglar alarm or family photo album may seem like a good idea when a salesperson brings them to your door.

But what if you decide you don't want or can't afford the merchandise you buy from a door-to-door salesperson? You' can cancel your order if you don't delay, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service consumer economics specialist.

A Federal Trade Commission (FTC) ruling allows a three-day "cooling off' period to cancel if the purchase is \$25 or more, says Bonnie L. Piernot. This rule applies only to door-to-door sales and not to in-store sales.

"The salesperson must provide a fully completed contract including the date of the sale, name and address of the seller, and a statement in a large business type explaining the right to cancel within three days by written notice," she advises.

'The salesperson must also give you two copies of separate "notice of cancellation" form, Piernot says. Then when you want to cancel the sale, simply send the notice by certified mail with return receipt requested so you can prove



you canceled it.'

The specialist points out that the contract and notice must be in the same language the salesperson uses in the sales pitch. If the sale was made in Spanish, for example, then the contract-notice must be in Spanish.

If you have made payment, the seller must refund the money within 10 business days of receiving your cancelation notice, Piernot says. And after canceling the sale, you must have the merchandise in the same condition that you received it--available for the salesperson to pick up at your home.

If you agree to ship the item back, the seller must pay the shipping costs. But if the merchandise is not picked up within 20 days, you may keep the goods without obligation," she says.

Piernot emphasizes that the rule does not cover total sales under \$25, sales of insurance and securities, sales of telephone orders and sales made entirely by mail.


6,029.2 crimes per hundred thousand population," said Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director. "The total number of major index crimes reported by law enforcement agencies was 964,014, amounting to an increase of 3.8 percent.

"These are relatively small increases," Adams said. "However, they are disappointing in view of the reductions reported in 1983 and demonstrate the necessity of keeping the pressure on the criminal element through maximum enforcement efforts and increased citizen participation in crime prevention programs. With our continuing population growth in Texas, we must anticipate increases in opportunities for crime and keep working to create the most inhospitable environment for the enforcement criminal.'

TMA Supports Use Of Safety Seat Belts

state

Proposed

legislation to require use of safety belts has received strong support from the Texas Medical Association. "There are two important facts here," said Dr. E.Don Webb, a Houston family physician representing TMA. "First, safety belts save lives and reduce serious injuries. And second, the Texas Poll recently found that 62 percent of Texans support a law requiring the use of safety belts."

"It's time we take action to prevent these needless deaths and injuries," Webb said during a Capitol conference news announcing the legislation on Feb. 26. House Bill 941 is sponsored by Rep. Bill Messer (D-Belton), and Sen. Ted Lyon (D-Mesquite) is the sponsor of Senate Bill 500, the same bill.

The legislation would front-seat require occupants of passenger cars to wear safety belts. Back-seat passengers would not have to wear them. The legislation would not apply to trucks and off-road vehicles.

If passed, the law would take effect on Sept. 1, but the \$25 to \$50 fines would not be issued during a three-month grace period ending Dec. 1. The use or non-use of safety belts could not be admitted as evidence in a civil trial.

Despite Texans' support for safety belt legislation, about 60 percent do not use them, according to TMA. When seat belts are used, the chances of surviving a crash increase by more than 50 percent.




