Unemployment Comp Opposed By Perry

The State Senate this week gave final legislative approval and sent to the Governor a bill which extends unemployment compensation to virtually all farm workers in the state. The measure, which passed the House last week, was opposed by Rep. Rick Perry (D-Haskell).

The legislative action came about as the result of a lawsuit filed on behalf of farm workers. Under previous law, most farmers were exempt from paying unemployment taxes on their employees, most of whom were ineligible for unemployment benefits. A Federal judge ruled that the existing law was unconstitutional, and ordered reforms to be made. The Attorney General's office, which had been defending the law, has not yet appealed the case.

Rep. Perry has several objections to the new law. "For one thing," he said, "I believe any action by the Legislature is premature until the matter has been fully pursued in the courts. One judge's ruling should not be the end of the litigation."

Another of his objections is based on principle. Noting that much of the work on farms is short-lived, Perry said, "I don't think that a

fully knowing that it will be only temporary, should be eligible for unemployment compensation. The law should make a distinction between that type of seasonal unemployment and the unexpected unemployment of someone who loses what he thought was a permanent position. It isn't right that someone should be able to work half a year, and then draw unemployment for the other half."

The freshman lawmaker outlined another problem which he sees in the new law. "It seems to me that now is not the time to be burdening family farmers with additional taxes. If this change is needed, it should contain broader exemptions for smaller farmers who can least afford this type of financial drain." Perry noted that under the new bill, by 1987, even farmers who employ as few as three workers will have to pay unemployment taxes on those

Rep. Perry expressed disappointment that some of his fellow farm area legislators did not vote against this bill. "I believe this legislation will be very detrimental to farmers. It is unfortunate that lawmakers who are familar with the problems of farmers could not stick together

With the building already up, there is need now to finish the interior work, such as the insulation, walls, partitions, kitchen, restrooms, stage, stage curtains, and furnishings.

Couch said that they had received some \$167,000 in gifts and had gotten \$20,000 in pledges turned in.

Hoping to generate more money, the organizers of the Civic Center will sponsor a benefit, set for May

Donations of \$10 per person will

be accepted, and "Country Caravan" from South Plains College, in Levelland, will provide the entertainment.

The supper, which will be held in conjunction with the benefit, will be hosted by various civic organizations in Haskell.

On the menu for the evening's meal will be fried fish, prepared by the Haskell Fire Dept., and Haskell VFD Auxiliary and barbequed brisket, prepared by the Kiwanis Club, with the Rotary Club providing the beans, the Lions Club responsible for the tea, bread, pickles, and onions, the Chamber of Commerce preparing the potato

salad, and the Extension Homemakers Club doing the coleslaw. Desserts will be prepared by the ladies who are directors and spouses of the directors of the Civic Center.

While this will generate some money, this will not be enough to pay for the completion of the center, Couch said. So, a "Show of Shows' is set for June, with Chamber of Commerce Manager, Wanda Dulaney, in charge of that.

When completed, the Civic Center will be one of the show places of Haskell.

However, there is a need for the citizens of Haskell to show their civic responsibility, and help out.

While it might not be financially feasible for some to donate money to the Civic Center, anyone who can hammer a nail can offer to volunteer their time.

In fact, the Civic Center is in need of volunteers to do carpentry work. No past experience is necessary, says Couch, as there are other carpenters on the location who will assist the novices.

The Civic Center complex measures 160 feet by 80 feet.

If as little as \$25 per foot were donated, it would be finished in no time, with money left over.

Shane Hadaway Ends Career With All State Recognition

A decade of playing basketball culminated for Shane Hadaway, a senior at Haskell High School, when he was chosen to the first team All-State Basketball Team by the Texas Sports Writers

An All-State award is the highest recognition a high school athlete can receive. Not only is this a first for Hadaway but also the first time in the history of HHS that a basketball player has received this

"Hadaway is every coaches" dream player. He has a good attitude, is well-disciplined and considerate of his fellow teammates.'

"As a coach I know I can put him in any situation and he'll meet the challenge."

"He's a team player, and we'll miss him a lot," said Coach Jim Raughton, reflecting about returning to the gym next year without Hadaway.

Besides the All-State award, Hadaway has been named first team All-Area (made up of A-AAA schools), first team All-Region, plus he was a unanimous choice for All-District and the districts Most Valuable Player-all his senior year.

In tournament action, he was named to the All Tournament team at Seymour and received Most Valuable Player honors at the

Haskell tournament.

At the All Sports Banquet Saturday night, he received the prestigious Dick Gaines Award. usually given to a football player (he played football before breaking his collarbone), this is a combination award for character, sportsmanship, scholarship and athletic achievement.

This year Hadaway 28.7 points on the court and has accumulated an A average in the classroom. He's had a scholarship

He was an All-Tournament choice in junior high, and as a sophomore in high school he began receiving All-District recognition.

By his junior year, he had made first team All-District, 2nd team All-Region as well as the All-Regional Tournament Team and the Tournament teams at Haskell and

"With his talent, intelligence and attitude, Hadaway maybe leaving Haskell High, but no matter where he goes he'll have a bright future," Coach Raughton concluded.
