## Dancing Storms Demand Local Observers Attention

Electrical storms accompanied by hail, high winds and heavy rains danced across the Haskell area last week and many residents let their little feet beat a path for the cellar.

At least three times during the past 10 days, tornados have been confirmed in the Haskell area. Heavy damage occurred at the J.R. Perry farm when winds destroyed several pieces of equipment and at least one building. Other damage has been reported on the south side of Lake Stamford and southeast Haskell County.

Local law enforcement officers and volunteers from the Haskell Fire Department have been stationed outside town to watch for threatening weather but so far, the worst of the storms have missed Haskell.

At the Martin Coleman farm, located 9 miles south of Haskell just off Highway 277, they had 5 1/4 inches of rain in the past seven to ten days, and had some hail, but did not receive any damage.

In a report from Bob Brandon, who lives toward Rule, they received 3 inches or so of rain, but sustained no damage to their wheat crop. Although there was light hail at the farm, Brandon said that they were not hurt by the weather. He also said, however, that they did

have water still standing in the terraces.

At the Harlan Weinert farm, reports indicated that they received 2.1 inches of rain last week, and about 1.15 inches Sunday. Mrs. Weinert said that they had received some hail both times. She was not sure if there had been wheat damage, but did say that they experienced high winds and hard rain on Sunday.

In the Rule area, W.L. Norman reports that he had received one and four tenths inches at his farm across the river, and then had .8 on another place, but there was no report of hail at either of the locations. Norman did say that there was high winds.

Around the Rochester area, Manford Reid reported that his farm received about 2 1/2 inches of rain, accompanied by hail and high winds. But, there was no apparent damage.

At the Gene Fischer residence, which is located three miles west of the Paint Creek School, Mrs. Fischer said that they received .8 of an inch in the last few days, and had had five inches altogether.

She also said that they had received some hail and very high winds in which part of their antenna to their radio was damaged.

#### Fluoride—How It Protects Our Teeth

Here's some toothsome news for everyone. Communities with inadequate amounts of fluoride in their public water supply can protect their children's teeth by adjusting the fluoride content to the recommended level. This effective public health measure costs pennies per person, per year. Fluoride is the most effective agent available in preventing tooth decay. There are several ways children can get its benefits.

Research shows that one part fluoride per one million parts of water prevents up to 60 percent of tooth decay that would ordinarily occur in children's teeth.

When community water fluoridation is not possible, schools that have an independent water supply can fluoridate it by installing the necessary equipment.

Fluoride tablets and drops are supplements that can be prescribed by a physician or dentist when fluoridated water is not available. Generally, fluoride drops are recommended for infants from birth until they are able to consume fluoride tablets. Fluoride tablets are prescribed for children up through at least 14 years of age.

How do fluorides work? Ingested fluoride is rapidly absorbed in the small intestine and circulates in the blood and other fluids of the body



to reach bones and developing teeth. Fluoride ions are readily absorbed into developing tooth enamel where they replace the calcium phosphate complex that forms the mineral constituent of enamel. When applied topically, fluorides provide additional protection. When applied directly to teeth in the mouth, fluoride helps still more to resist attacks by acids. In addition, fluoride facilitates the repair of enamel previously dissolved by bacterial acids. This is called remineralization.

Topical fluorides include those in toothpaste and mouth rinses, and those applied professionally.

### TIPS ON MAIL-ORDER BUYING

Catalogue shopping can be a rewarding experience for the careful shopper. For the unwary impulse buyer it can be very frustrating.

#### BUYING TIPS

If you've decided to enhance your wardrobe through catalogue sales, here are some tips to remember:

1) Learn to read between the lines. For example, if you see a skirt advertised as "wool gabardine with shiny, black belt, kick pleat," you will know that the skirt is not lined. That's because the catalogue would be sure to mention it if the skirt were lined.

2) Learn the language of catalogue sales. One fashion writer has warned that "body-conscious" may mean too tight, while "easy-cut" can well mean shapeless. "Faux" means fake, and there's no guarantee it will look real.

3) Be a comparison shopper. Talk to friends who do catalogue shopping and find out which are the most reliable. Then, look through several catalogues before making a decision on what you want. Start with items like gloves and purses if you're not sure about the company.

Remember, some catalogue companies will sell you fancy words for a high price, while others may sell you the same item, perhaps described differently, for a lower price.

#### WAITING FOR THE MAIL

Some companies are more prompt than others in sending merchandise. If the company does not tell you how long it will take, it is required to send your items within 30 days. If the company cannot ship your order within the time it has promised, it is required to notify you and ask whether you prefer to cancel your order.

A reputable mail order house will be prompt and courteous if you ask for a refund on merchandise you don't like. If you don't like what came in the mail, write to the company as soon as possible. If you haven't dealt with the company before, or if you have other reason to doubt its honesty, you should consider keeping the merchandise until you hear that you are going to receive a refund.

#### PROBLEMS

If you are unable to get the company to give you a refund, our Consumer Protection Division mediation service will help you. It's always better to avoid these problems, of course, by dealing only with reputable companies. If you have a question about a particular company, call the Better Business Bureau or the Attorney General's Office nearest you.



# Time Alone Is Important For Older Children

"Please do not disturb!" The big sign on the bedroom door may make parents wonder if this is a new form of rebellion—a barricade to keep them out.

It is not unusual for grade school children to seek some time to be alone, according to Growing Up, the child development newsletter for school age children. In fact, it is a healthy sign. This time of solitude serves many purposes.

**Information Overload**  
There is such a wealth of new information being passed on to a child in school that some time is needed to integrate all of it.

A child whose mind has been bombarded with new information needs periods of quiet to make those things her own. Otherwise, new knowledge remains superficial and may soon be forgotten.

**Emotional Stability**  
Preteens and teenagers, especially, are pulled in

many different directions by their emotions. At one moment they think they can handle the responsibilities of adulthood. The next moment they do something that reminds them they are still children. They need time to fit both parts of their personalities together.

**Self-identity**  
"Who am I?" A young

person needs solitude to ponder her own individual strengths and weaknesses. She also needs time to dream new dreams about who she might become.

**Personal Pride**  
Every young person needs time alone to do whatever she enjoys doing. It may be practicing a particular athletic skill or playing the piano. Too

often parents rush in to give their applause or "show off" their child to friends. The child, however, may prefer to be alone to enjoy the self-satisfaction she gains from her own efforts.

**The Lonely Child**  
There is, of course, the extreme of always wanting to be alone that may be a sign of loneliness. Frequently this problem of withdrawn behavior may not be detected in school, since the quiet child rarely gets the teacher's attention. If the child chooses to sit alone in the school cafeteria every day, no one may notice.

## Tips To Minimize Charge Card Risks

Credit card fraud is reaching epidemic proportions. Legislations has been proposed to stiffen penalties for credit card crimes. But it's still up to individual consumers to minimize their risk of loss, theft or counterfeiting of personal credit cards.

Minimize your charge card risk by taking the following actions:

- Ask for and destroy the carbons of credit charge slips.
- Give out your card number over the phone only for specific purchases and only when you know the party you are dealing with.
- Watch the sales clerk imprint your card. Make sure they imprint only one sales slip. Don't leave your card with a sales clerk or attendant while you do

other things, such as pump gas.

- Carry only the cards you plan to use. Keep the others in a safe place.
- Keep a list of all your cards and the account numbers separate from the cards. Also keep a list of emergency phone numbers to call in case of billing problem or card loss.
- Keep the receipts together and check them against the monthly statement.
- Report unauthorized charges, lost cards and other card problems immediately.

The yearly billion dollar cost of credit card abuse is ultimately passed on to all credit card users. Monthly and annual fees for credit cards have been rising in recent years, mainly due to the misuse and abuse of some consumers. Consumers need to know!







## May 1 Deadline Here For Acreage Reporting

May 1, 1985, is the final date for Haskell County producers to report wheat, barley, oats and rye acreage for the 1985 crop year.

All Small Grain acreage must be reported timely, by May 1st, to maintain program eligibility and history credit. Acres must be reported for grain, hay Acreage Conservation Reserve (ACR-Set-aside acres), and cotton diversion acreage or whatever the use. Producers are reminded that acreage that is allowed to reach hard dough stage will be considered acreage for grain. The State ASCS

Committee has established May 1st for Haskell County as the disposition date that acreage must be destroyed or substantially grazed out, where it will not be considered grain.

Producers are reminded that they must also file requests for the special hay and grazing of small grain on ACR acreage by May 1st and have the acreage substantially grazed out or baled by this date.

Acreage certification will be done in separate fields or plots as in past years. Irrigated and dry land acreage of the same crop must be reported separately this year.

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, hereby gives notice of the Company's intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas, effective May 6, 1985, unless otherwise determined by the Commission. The Public Utility Commission of Texas has received the application as Docket 6200.

While proposals as to specific rates vary, it is expected that the requested rate schedule will furnish a 10.5 percent increase in the Company's unadjusted test year intrastate revenues or a 9.7 percent increase in test year revenues as adjusted for test year customer growth and annualization of test year rate increases. The rate application seeks an annual increase of \$323.9 million in revenues. All customers and classes of customers of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company within Texas will be affected by the proposed changes.

Most rates proposed for increase would increase by about 18.5 percent, including local exchange rates. However, there are some exceptions. For example, those customers residing in cities that will be reclassified into larger rate groups will experience local exchange rate increases greater than 18.5 percent. Also, the rate increases proposed for private line services in El Paso, due to a proposal to restructure such rates, are greater than 18.5 percent.

A complete copy of the new rate schedule is on file with the Public Utility Commission at Austin, Texas and with each affected incorporated municipality served by Southwestern Bell Telephone Company. The Commission staff has contended in the past that all rates are subject to change as a result of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company's rate application. This filing includes, but is not limited to, proposals to increase rates for local exchange service, intraLATA long distance, intraLATA interexchange private line service (which includes foreign exchange service) and to decrease certain access service rates.

**Notice to Customers of Other Telephone Companies**

This filing includes, but is not limited to, proposals to increase rates for intraLATA long distance and for intraLATA, interexchange private line service (which includes foreign exchange service) and to decrease certain access service rates. Changes in such rates would also affect customers of other telephone companies because such companies provide certain services in accordance with rates specified in Southwestern Bell Telephone Company's tariffs.

## Specialist Urges Checking Savings Bonds Maturity

Series H Bonds bought before January 1957 reach final maturity in 29 years, 8 months, so any Series H bond bought before August 1955 is not drawing interest now.

Granovsky encourages those who have older U.S. Savings Bonds to review

their holdings, recording the date of issue of each, and determine whether they have passed maturity, or are currently or will soon stop earning interest.

"To make your money work for you, it's important to take time to review your bonds," says Granovsky. "Keeping them when they are not gaining in value is like putting your money in a mattress. Not only do you lose the interest on something that's not making money, but you're actually losing buying power on the face value due to inflation."

Your bank can provide the term to maturity on Series E Bonds issued after April 1952 and Series H Bonds issued after January 1957, adds the specialist.

## Reporting Service To Begin Calls For Inventory
