

Jury Deliberating In Local Murder Trial

In the murder trial of Billy Neely, the eight woman, four man jury was sequestered in an Aspermont motel for the night, Tuesday, after not having been able to come to a decision on the trial.

Deliberations began earlier Tuesday evening, but at 10 p.m. the jurors re-entered the courtroom, only to tell presiding judge, Wayland Holt, that in four votes, they had not yet come to a decision. Holt informed the jurors that at

this point in the trial, he felt that they had not been together long enough to declare it a mistrial. Foreman Burl Medford told the

judge that there had been two 6-6 votes on the case, and two 9-3 votes.

The trial was to have resumed Wednesday morning, in 39th District court, at 10 a.m.

The man being tried was charged with the murder of his brother-inlaw, Clarence Harold "Son" Webb, on Sept. 24, 1984, after the two apparently had a disagreement

concerning a family matter. Webb was shot three times on a rural road about ten miles west of

Rochester. In testimony given by Neely about the shooting, the defendant said that he acted in self-defense, and that shooting his brother-in-law was "the hardest thing I have ever done."

The dispute between the two men arose as a result of problems between Neely's wife and Webb. They had had disputes over their mother's estate.

Neely's wife also testified on Monday that the offer that Webb had extended to her for the estate

was not acceptable. The defendant also told jurors that he had sought the help of law officers on the night he shot Webb, because Webb had made threats on he and his family.

Neely testified that after a nearby house and junked cars had been burned near their home, he suspected that Webb had been trying to harm them.

Webb was shot twice in the abdomen, and once in the head.

District Attorney John Fouts challenged Neely's testimony, asking if he did not stalk his brother-in-law and stay around the community to kill him.

Fouts also questioned Neely that: "If it was self defense, wouldn't a responsible person get help as quickly as possible?'

Neely is being represented by Lubbock attorney Travis Shelton.

State Sales Tax Checks Received

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$109.2 million in local tax payments to the 1,003 cities that levy the onepercent local sales tax.

Houston's check for \$18.3 million was the largest, bringing 1985 payments to \$66.3 million. Dallas received \$13.4 million, pushing payments since January to \$48.9 million. San Antonio's payment was \$6.6 million for a total \$23.9 million this year. Austin received \$5.2 million, increasing 1985 payments to \$18.8 million. Fort Worth's payment of \$3.9 million brought this year's total to \$14.3 million. El Paso's check for \$2.3 million increased 1985 payments to \$8.9 million. Bullock also sent checks totaling \$45.3 million to the state's four Metropolitan Transit Authorities. Houston's MTA check for \$21.4 million pushed 1985 payments to \$76.8 million. Dallas' DART received \$19.1 million for a total \$66.2 million so far this year. San Antonio VIA's payment of \$3.8 million pushed its yearly total to \$13.2 million. Fort Worth's MTA received \$978,954 for 1985 payments of \$3.4 million.

It's possible to eat more but weigh less, if you exercise. That's what Dr. Peter Wood, professor of medi-cine (research) at Stanford University, said at a recent American Heart Association symposium. "Physically active people tend to eat more, maybe several hundred calories more

active people tend to eat more, maybe several hundred calories more per day than sedentary people, and yet they weigh less in the process, he said. The Wood and his colleagues have studied Stanford faculty wives who play at least 10 hours of singles tennis per week, and compared them with sedentary faculty wives of similar age. "The sedentary women were considerably more overweight "When we had both groups record what they were eating, there was a large difference in the recorded intake of calories. The tennis players were definitely not dieting but were lean, while the sedentary women while the sedentary women vere eating very modestly yet were relatively overweight." The Stanford University research-men who agreed to gradually build up their exercise level until they were vaning 13 miles per week. The scientist followed their progress as for two years. Dr. Wood said his findings help Dr. wood said his indings help explain a surprising but little known fact: people who eat more tend to have less coronary heart disease. At least four studies have measured calorie intake and followed individivals over a period of years to see what relationship eating has with de elopment of heart disease. He said: "In all four studies, those

people who developed heart disease

had reported many years earlier a significantly lower calorie intake than those who did not get heart disease. I think the explanation is

that people who eat more are often more physically active." Dr. Wood emphasizes that he is not recommending an increased calorie intake for individuals who are overweight and don't plan to exercise. But for the millions of Americans who have joined the "exercise explo-sion" that began in the 1960s, eating more calories, especially in the form of carbohydrates, won't stop them from staying lean, he concludes.

This is a great plan, and I feel that Haskell does need a facility such as this.


There are many up-and-coming young track participants who would well benefit from having a track. Look at it this way, those great runners from Hamlin did not get that way by running on a football field.







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Check Air Conditioners Now

Few things are worse than a broken air conditioner on a hot, humid day -- except the bill to get it fixed.

Preventative maintenance can help avoid a possible breakdown during the summer months and make an air conditioner run more efficiently, says housing specialist Dr. Peggy Owens. "Since air conditioning

is one of the largest single users of home energy, proper service and maintenance can help consumers hold down electric bills," remarks the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economist. Checking the system for

warning signs is a simple matter, Owens maintains. Put your hand in front of the air supply vents. If the air feels lukewarm, it could fan bearings, if not

Through these aggressive management tactics we have achieved other savings in the past. In 1983, most state agencies were buying gas on the retail market at \$5 per mcf, while gas produced on state land was being sold for \$2.75 per mcf.

So, when I pointed this out to the Legislature, they included in an appropriations rider a directive that state agencies determine whether there was state gas available at a price lower than there respective contracts called for on the retail market.

The results include the following:


-- Southwest Texas State University was buying gas at \$4.95 per mcf, but when the General Land Office offered them gas at \$3.54 per mcf, Entex, the university's commercial supplier, matched this offer, resulting in a savings of \$1.1 million over a sixteen-month period.

- The University of Texas at Austin renegotiated its gas contract with Valero earlier this year after a similar offer of state gas was made, thus achieving a one-year savings of \$6 million.

-- In 1983, the state signed a long-term contract with the City of San Antonio that increased state revenues by \$11,132,500 the first year. Over the next four years the contract will bring in \$12 million for the state and save San Antonio consumers \$25 million.

The General Land Office is also negotiating with the University of Houston for a contract that could save the university about \$1.4 million a year if the offer is accepted. Other entities we are negotiating with for the sale of state gas include Texas A&M University, the Texas Department of Corrections and the Capitol area complex, as well as other state agencies located in Austin.

This is the kind of common sense resource management by the General Land Office that can serve as a partial solution to the state's fiscal problems--this revenue comes at a time when the state is hard pressed to meet the demands of the state government's day to day operating expenses.





The European corn borer is a major enemy of the American farmer. It's reducing yields and killing profits. First brood borers begin to

appear when the corn is about knee high. They bore into the stalk, causing cavities that interfere with movement of moisture and nutrients within the plant. The USDA Corn Borer Laboratory estimates that one egg mass per plant from first generation corn borers can cause a loss of six to nine bushels per acre.



Many farmers are cutting their losses with a planting application of Furadan 15G, from FMC Corporation. Birdwatchers by the Laguna Madre, shrimpers along the Texas coastline, and duck hunters on the Panhandle playa lakes all appreciate the value of Texas' wetlands. But this valuable resource is threatened.

The worth of our wetlands lies not only in the vital feeding, spawning, breeding and resting habitat they provide fish, fowl and other wildlife, but in other ecologic and economic benefits Earning the Arion Award as well.

> The playa lakes of the Panhandle rank second only to our-Gulf Coast in importance as wintering places for waterfowl in the Central Flyway. In a good year, 100,000 ducks escape the northern cold at Muleshow National Park. Our Gulf Coast plays winter host to half a million geese and hundreds of thousands of shorebirds, with estimated total ranging from two to seven million waterfowl. Many rest there temporarily on the way to South America.

These birds form the base of a multi-million dollar industry that includes hunters, birdwatchers and people who enjoy recreation in natural settings.

Fish that spawn and feed in our wetlands can provide more than a million of our states' recreational fishermen with more than five million tall tales during a year. The Texas commercial fishing harvest in 1981, worth nearly \$175 million, totaled Oliver has already planned 113,108,000 pounds of fish and shellfish, most of which had depended on coastal marshes and estuaries for part of their life cycle.

Our wetlands also support many endangered species of wildlife, as well as the nutria and muskrat valued by trappers for their pelts.

In addition to the wildlife they support, wetlands are also vitally important to the control and maintenance of our water supply. They act as a buffer between salt and fresh water, naturally burify polluted water and recharge ground water. They also help control crosion, floods and hurricane damage. In the Panhandle, the playa lakes collect up to three million acre feet of water a year for irrigation and livestock.

But wetlands are disappearing at a rapid clip in our state and our nation.

Across the U.S., we are losing wetlands at the rate of 458,000 acres a year to dredge and fill activities, and almost half of our nation's wetlands are now gone.


Texas already has lost more than 600,000 acres of its original coastal wetlands

I am sponsoring legislation that will help save more of our marshes, swamps and tidelands by purchasing the land and placing it under state and federal protection.

Funds would be provided by new entrance fees at wildlife refuges and by increasing the cost over a four-year period of Migratory Bird Hunting and Conservation Stamps. Holders of these "Duck Stamps" would be exempt from the entrance fees.

Hunters favor the increased cost of Duck Stamps for buying wetlands when a fair share of the purchasing monies come from non-hunters, such as birdwatchers and nature photographers, through the entrance fees.

Texas, like the rest of our nation, is blessed with a rich variety of wetlands that provide a multitude of benefits. We must take action to protect them, before this valuable resource disappears forever.

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
