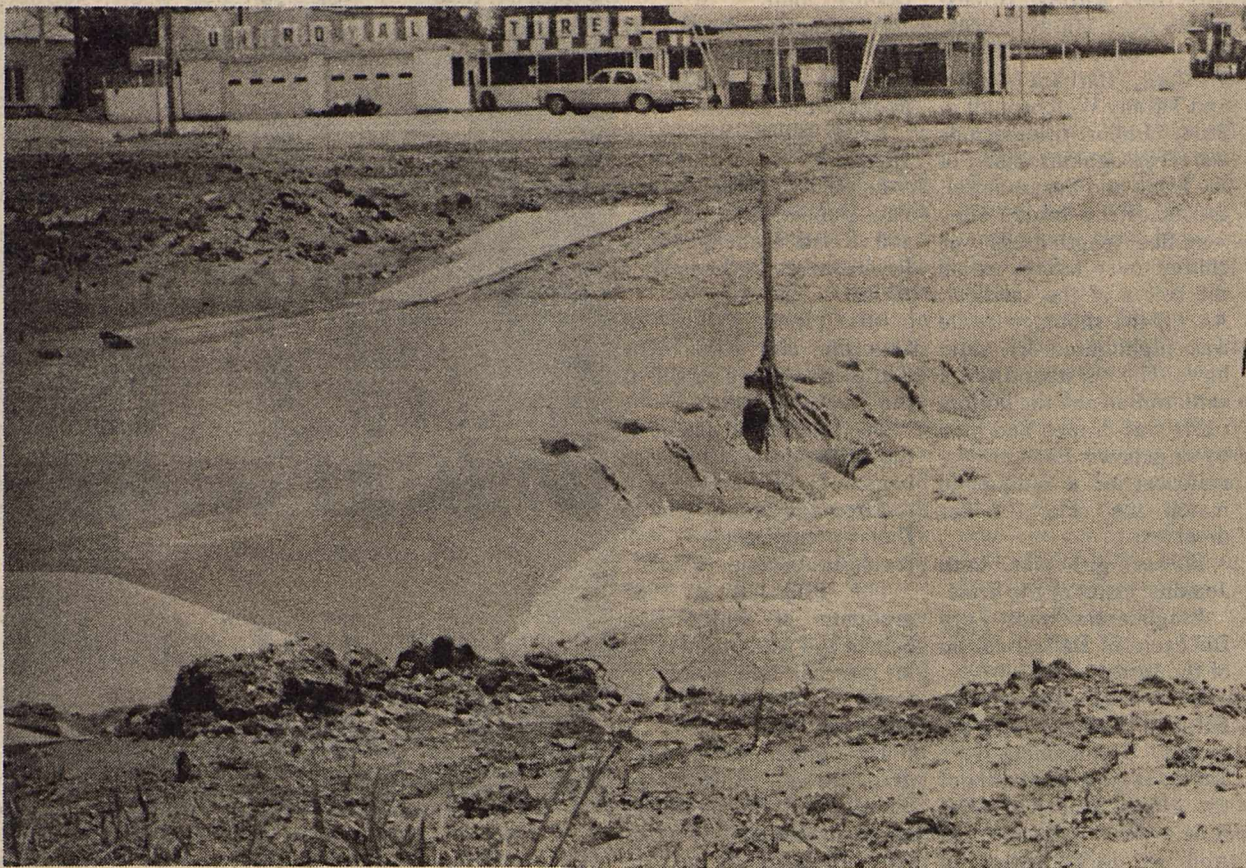

## Shooting Incident Claims Life Of 14 Year Old Haskell Youth

Wade Martin, a 14 year old Haskell eighth grader, was the victim of a fatal gunshot incident early Sunday, near the community of Sylvester.

The circumstances surrounding the shooting were still being investigated by Fischer County authorities Monday.

Martin was pronounced dead on arrival at Hamlin Memorial Hospital after he was shot once in the right temple. Reports indicate that the youth was shot with a .22 caliber revolver being carried in the pickup in which he was riding.

Two men, ages 18 and 20, were with Martin when the incident occurred.

The youth's body was taken to the Insitute of Forensic Sciences in Dallas, where an autopsy was performed, as ordered by Fischer J.P. Geneva Chandler.

In a preliminary autopsy report from Dallas the report indicated that the gun was fired somewhere

between 1-3 inches from the victim's head.

Following the autopsy report findings, charges of involuntary manslaughter were filed in Fischer County against Sean McLendon, 20, of Sylvester, according to Fischer County sheriff, Mickey Counts.

McLendon man had not made a written statement concerning the shooting, but had made a verbal statement.

Mike Douglas, 18, an ex-step-brother of Martin, was also with the two when the shooting occurred, but according to Counts, he was not expected to be charged in the incident.

The case was expected to be turned over to the Fischer County grand jury next Wednesday.

The shooting occurred three miles south of Sylvester on Farm-to-Market road 57. Martin had been staying in Sylvester for the summer.

## Rain Drenches Haskell Area

Rains seemed to engulf Haskell and the surrounding area last week, with some places getting up to nearly 7 inches.

In Haskell proper, the reports came in from about 2 1/2 to 4 1/2 inches.

In the southern part of the City, there were reports of less rain, while it seemed like the northern portion received more rain.

Out in the Paint Creek area, Wallar Overton reported that they had received some 2 3/4 inches, and had some accompanying winds, but no hail and no damage.

At Weinert, Mrs. Harlan Weinert reported that they had received about 4.3 inches of rain, with high winds only once during the siege. She also said that they had some damage to their cotton, which was confined to the terraces only. A road west of the Weinert farm had to be closed because of high water, she said.

At the Kenneth Sanders residence, west of the Weinert's, there was a report that they had received 3.2 inches of rain, and had a little wind, but no hail.

Sanders reported that some of the cotton was probably washed out.

In the Sagerton area, at the Allen Meier residence, a report came in

that they had received 4.5 inches of rain, but no hail or winds were present with the storm.

In the Mattson area, Mrs. Gus Rueffer said that they had received close to 5 inches of rain all together, and at that point in time she was not sure of the damage to the cotton. They reside 18 miles northeast of Haskell.

In Rochester, a report from Nine Point Grain, by Lillian Pisasale, indicated that there was anywhere from 4 to 5 inches of rain, depending on where the location was, and several of the county roads were washed out.

Mrs. Pisasale also said that the Rule-Rochester highway (highway 6) had been underwater, with water on some roads up to the hubcaps and higher on pickups.

At the City Hall in Rochester, the report came in that rains in the amount of 6.2 inches had fallen.

In the Goree-Munday area, reports indicated that there had been up to 4.5 inches of rain in some areas.

Knox City reported having 6.8 inches to top the list. Farmers in that area were saying that they had

cotton which was flattened by the hard rains, with nearly all of the fields washed out.

Some of the feed which was still left in the fields had been blown over, but it was expected to be salvageable.

In Haskell, the farmers are still trying to tally their losses.

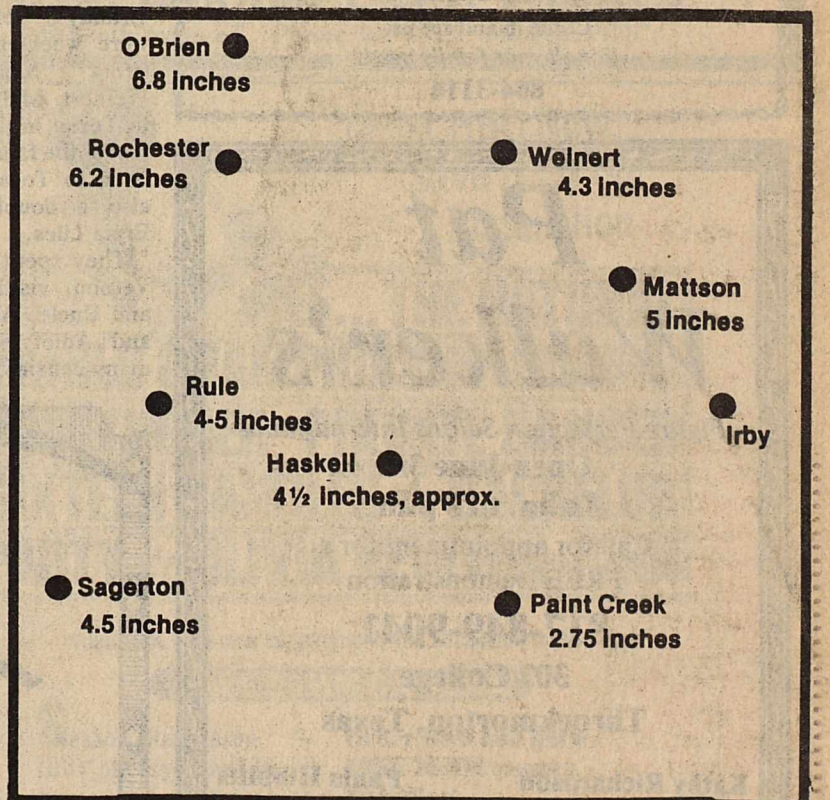
Most of the reports indicate that at least some of the cotton in the Haskell area will have to be replanted.

According to Frankie SoRelle, at Agriculture Services, Inc., some of the wheat that was left (mainly in the Paint Creek-Lueders area), will be hard to save.

"Farmers are reporting that the wheat that was still in the fields has been shattered (in the head area of the plant), and some of it is laying down, with swirling taking place in the taller wheat."

Reports from Hale Farm Supply and Nine Point Grain both indicated that farmers are looking at having to begin again on cotton which just plain got "drowned out."

## Couple To Celebrate 50th Anniversary

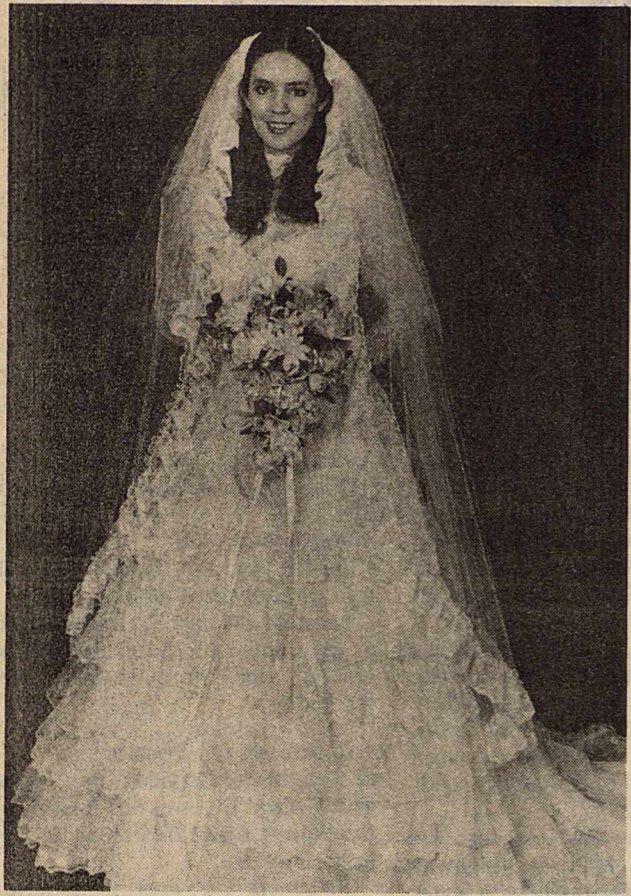

**RECORDKEEPING LAW REPEALED**

The controversial law requiring "contemporaneous recordkeeping" to substantiate tax deductions and credits taken for the business use of vehicles, personal computers, and other equipment has been repealed.

The business use of such equipment can now be substantiated by "adequate records or sufficient documentation." Written logs kept as the equipment is used are no longer required; instead, receipts, expense account records, trip sheets, etc., will be considered adequate recordkeeping.

Anticipating that such easing of the rules will result in less tax revenue, the new law reduces allowable depreciation deductions and investment credit for vehicles. Investment credit for vehicles purchased after April 2, 1985, is limited to \$675 (former limit, \$1,000). The new law puts a cap on first year depreciation of \$3,200 (formerly \$4,000) and a cap of \$4,800 (formerly \$6,000) annually for subsequent years.

The new law does not intend to give taxpayers the freedom to deduct whatever they choose for business use of equipment. 1985 tax returns will ask taxpayers six questions about claimed deductions and credits. For example, for automobiles the taxpayer must give the total number of miles driven during the year, the percentage of personal use claimed, whether the vehicle was used for commuting and, if so, the commuting distance, whether the vehicle was available for personal use in off duty hours, whether another vehicle was available for personal use, and whether adequate records or sufficient evidence exists to justify the deduction and whether or not such evidence is written.

Keeping a written record of business use will still be the surest way to substantiate deductions and credits to which you are entitled.

## Hadaway To Play In All-Star Classic

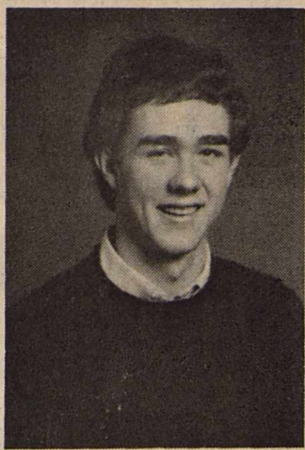
Shane Hadaway will be playing on the north team at the Texas High School Coaches Association All Star basketball game.

# Rick Perry Finishes First Session In Legislature

Rep. Rick Perry (D-Haskell) this week concluded his first session as a member of the Texas House of Representatives and returned home to the 64th District. Perry said that he was looking forward to being able to spend more time with his family, and also visiting with his many friends in the area. But that visiting will have to wait, at least for a little while.

"It's been too wet to plant, up until the last few weeks," Perry said from his Austin office just before he left. "So I guess the first thing I'll do when I get home is help my dad finish planting the cotton. After that, I hope to be able to travel around the district and discuss some of what went on in Austin during the session."

Perry cites the passage of a comprehensive water plan as the major accomplishment of the Legislature this year. "The plan that was passed is not perfect, but it should provide a framework that we can build on in future years. No one is really happy with this plan. The folks along the Gulf Coast didn't get everything they wanted; neither did the environmentalists. We in West Texas didn't get all we hoped for. But this plan is a start, and I did support it. Hopefully, it can help us avoid the kind of critical water shortages we saw last summer."

Passage of the state budget was another major accomplishment, according to the freshman democrat. "When we first got down here, it looked like we might have to raise taxes to keep the state going. But thanks to the hard work put in by the committees, especially the Appropriations Committee, we were able to reduce the size of most state agencies and avoid a tax increase. Of course, we did have to raise fees for many state services, but the feeling here was that users of State services should pay a larger share of the costs of providing those services, and not be subsidized by everybody else's taxes. Tuition costs, for example,

Tuition rates had not been seriously debated for nearly 30 years. It was time to either increase tuition, or scale back educational services."

Perry is also proud of the work he did in carrying a bill to provide buyers of agricultural products clear title to those products. "The banking associations were strongly opposed to our bill in the beginning. But we were able to develop a compromise plan, and put together a coalition, that helped us pass our bill." The bill is currently on the Governor's desk, awaiting his signature.

It was not always smooth sailing for the young lawmaker, though. He did not always find himself on the winning side of every issue. On the question of mandatory seat belt use, he led the unsuccessful fight to extend an exemption to certain large pickups. He also voted against repeal of the blue law, believing that its repeal will hinder a family's ability to spend time together.

Perry also expressed reservations about the Indigent Health Care Program, which was the subject of a brief special session, immediately following the regular session. Although he is not opposed to the concept of health care assistance for those who need it, Perry is concerned that the plan as passed by the Legislature may cause more problems than it solves.

"My biggest concern is over funding," Perry said. "This plan was thrown together in the final few

hours of the regular session and later passed during the special. I believe we should have had more time to study it. I supported a substitute plan which would have still provided protection for the counties from catastrophic medical expenses, but was smaller in scope. Unfortunately, our substitute was defeated. I am very concerned about how this plan will affect property tax bills for residents in our area."

In conclusion, Perry said that he believes this session was a very productive one. "I am very proud to have had this opportunity to serve the citizens of the 64th District. I feel that I have learned from my experiences in Austin, and I believe that this will help make me a better representative in the future."
