# **Shooting Incident Claims Life** Of 14 Year Old Haskell Youth

Wade Martin, a 14 year old Haskell eighth grader, was the victim of a fatal gunshot incident early Sunday, near the community of Sylvester.

The circumstances surrounding the shooting were still being investigated by Fischer County authorities Monday.

Martin was pronounced dead on arrival at Hamlin Memorial Hospital after he was shot once in the right temple. Reports indicate that the youth was shot with a .22 caliber revolver being carried in the pickup in which he was riding.

Two men, ages 18 and 20, were with Martin when the incident

The youth's body was taken to the Insitute of Forensic Sciences in Dallas, where an autops performed, as ordered by Fischer J.P. Geneva Chandler.

In a preliminary autopsy report from Dallas the report indicated that the gun was fired somewhere between 1-3 inches from the victim's head.

Following the autopsy report findings, charges of involuntary manslaughter were filed in Fischer County against Sean McLendon, 20, of Sylvester, according to Fischer County sheriff, Mickey Counts.

# Rain Drenches Haskell Area

Rains seemed to engulf Haskell and the surrounding area last week, with some places getting up to nearly 7 inches.

In Haskell proper, the reports came in from about 21/2 to 41/2

In the southern part of the City, there were reports of less rain, while it seemed like the northern portion received more rain.

Out in the Paint Creek area, Wallar Overton reported that they had received some 234 inches, and had some accompanying winds, but no hail and no damage.

At Weinert, Mrs. Harlan Weinert reported that they had received about 4.3 inches of rain, with high winds only once during the siege. She also said that they had some damage to their cotton, which was confined to the terraces only. A road west of the Weinert farm had to be closed because of high water,

At the Kenneth Sanders residence, west of the Weinert's, there was a report that they had received 3.2 inches of rain, and had a little wind, but no hail.

Sanders reported that some of the cotton was probably washed

In the Sagerton area, at the Allen Meier residence, a report came in

rain, but no hail or winds were present with the storm.

In the Mattson area, Mrs. Gus Rueffer said that they had received close to 5 inches of rain all together, and at that point in time she was not sure of the damage to the cotton. They reside 18 miles northeast of

In Rochester, a report from Nine Point Grain, by Lillian Pisasale, indicated that there was anywhere from 4 to 5 inches of rain, depending on where the location was, and several of the county roads were washed out.

Mrs. Pisasale also said that the Rule-Rochester highway (highway 6) had been underwater, with water on some roads up to the hubcaps and higher on pickups.

At the City Hall in Rochester, the report came in that rains in the amount of 6.2 inches had fallen.

In the Goree-Munday area, reports indicated that there had been up to 4.5 inches of rain in some

Knox City reported having 6.8 inches to top the list. Farmers in that area were saying that they had

that they had received 4.5 inches of cotton which was flattened by the hard rains, with nearly all of the fields washed out.

Some of the feed which was still left in the fields had been blown over, but it was expected to be salvageable.

In Haskell, the farmers are still trying to tally their losses.


Most of the reports indicate that at least some of the cotton in the Haskell area will have to be replanted.

According to Frankie SoRelle. at Agriculture Services, Inc., some of the wheat that was left (mainly in the Paint Creek-Lueders area), will be hard to save.

"Farmers are reporting that the wheat that was still in the fields has been shattered (in the head area of the plant), and some of it is laying down, with swirling taking place in the taller wheat."

Reports from Hale Farm Supply and Nine Point Grain both indicated that farmers are looking at having to begin again on cotton which just plain got "drowned





#### **RECORDKEEPING LAW REPEALED**

requiring controversial law "contemporaneous recordkeeping" to substantiate tax deductions and credits taken for the business use of vehicles, personal computers, and other equipment has been repealed.

The business use of such equipment can now be substantiated by "adequate records or sufficient documentation." Written logs kept as the equipment is used are no longer required; instead, receipts, expense account records, trip sheets, etc., will be considered adequate recordkeeping.

Anticipating that such easing of the rules will result in less tax revenue, the new law reduces allowable depreciation deductions and investment credit for vehicles. Investment credit for vehicles purchased after April 2, 1985, is limited to \$675 (former limit, \$1,000). The new law puts a cap on first year depreciation of \$3,200 (formerly \$4,000) and a cap of \$4,800 (formerly \$6,000) annually for subsequent years.

The new law does not intend to give taxpayers the freedom to deduct whatever they choose for business use of equipment. 1985 tax returns will ask taxpayers six questions about claimed deductions and credits. For example, for automobiles the taxpayer must give the total number of miles driven during the year, the percentage of personal use claimed, whether the vehicle was used for commuting and, if so, the commuting distance, whether the vehicle was available for personal use in off duty hours, whether another vehicle was available for personal use, and whether adequate records or sufficient evidence exists to justify the deduction and whether or not such evidence is written.

Keeping a written record of business use will still be the surest way to substantiate deductions and credits to which you are
