## Haskell County Farm Bureau Announces Plans For Contest

Haskell County Farm Bureau announces plans to conduct a county Queen Contest and Talent Find.

Winners of both contests in the county will be awarded a cash prize of one hundred dollars and a trip to compete at district. District winners will receive a five hundred dollar scholarship and an opportunity to compete in the state contest. State runners-up and winners will be awarded five hundred and one thousand dollar scholarships respectively.

Entries in the Queen Contest must be 16-21 years old as of September 1, 1985. They must also be single and a daughter or sister of a Farm Bureau member from Haskell

County. Contestants will be judged on appearance-35pts.; poise-20pts; personality-35pts.; and speech-10pts. Participants will be expected to wear a formal length gown and be prepared to give a one to two minute answer on a Farm Bureau current event question.

Talent Find contestants must also be 16-21 years of age as of September 1, 1985. An individual or group must perform a five minute presentation of their choice. The entrant will be judged on audience appeal-50pts. and performance-50pts. They also should be Farm Bureau members or members of Farm Bureau families in Haskell County.

Haskell County Queen for 1984 was Tiffany Welborn of Rule. Tempa Wofford, of Rule also was winner of the Talent Find in both the county and district level. She competed at the State Farm Bureau Convention in San Antonio for state honors.

Entry forms for each of these contests are available at the Haskell County Farm Bureau office. Forms must be completed and turned by July 19, 1985. All entries will be notified of the specific date, time, and location of the judging. The contest will be held prior to the end of July.

## Families Invited To Participate In Program

Pointing to the importance of recognizing and remembering the pioneer farm and ranch families in Texas, Rep. Perry invited long-time farming families to participate in the Texas Department of Agriculture's 1985 Family Land Heritage Program.

Registration for the program, which recognizes families who have had land in agricultural production for 100 years or more, is now open and will extend through August 30, Rep. Perry said.

"To date, no properties in Haskell Co. have been involved in Family Land Heritage Program, and this year I hope we will be able to identify qualified owners," he said. Since the program was established in 1974 to honor pioneering families, 1,821 such families have been recognized.

The basic requirements of the program include continuous agricultural production on the farm or ranch for 100 years, land ownership within the family, complete operation or supervision of the farm/ranch production by

family members who are Texas residents, and a size of at least 10 acres with a minimum income of \$50 from farm or ranch products. If the farm or ranch is smaller than 10 acres, sales must total \$250 per year.

"These families are living, productive symbols of our family farm unit. We celebrate their past achievements, and acknowledge the importance that such family farms hold for us in the future," he said.

This year's certified registrants will be honored at a state ceremony in the Capitol in November. The honorees will receive a certificate and a copy of the Family Land Heritage Registry.

## Good Land Conservation Is Program Requirement

"Good conservation management of cropland withdrawn from production is a requirement of the 1985 acreage reduction and land diversion programs," Glenn R. Brzozowski, County Executive Director, said. The diverted acres are called acreage conservation reserve (ACR) to emphasize the importance of saving soil and water.

Brzozowski said as soon as possible after the normal planting period for spring crops, farm program participants are required to establish conservation protection on their ACR by devoting these acres to annual, biennial or perennial grasses and legumes, volunteer stands other than weeds, small grains or crop residue from the use of no-till or minimum-till practices. Other cover or plantings, such as those benefiting wildlife, may be developed as long as the practice or cover meets erosion control standards.

He said ACR may be put into a permanent vegetative cover or conservation practice such as trees, sod waterways, filter strips, windbreaks and approved cover practices. Permanent conservation practices are eligible for cost-share payments under the Agricultural Conservation Program. "The cover and practices authorized for these acres are sufficient to protect the land from wind and water erosion" Brzozowski said.

To protect ACR from insects, weeds and rodents, program participants are required to use normal control measures and maintain the acreage throughout the year. "Keeping the land free from weeds is a very important program requirement and farmers who fail to do so will be out of compliance and could lose program benefits."

ACR land may not be harvested. Grazing is not permitted between May 16 through Oct. 15 except in areas approved for special or emergency haying and grazing, according to Brzozowski.

"In deciding on the cover and control measures

for their acreage conservation reserve, farm program participants are urged to consider the soil and water conservation benefits, protection or wildlife, and the long-term nutrient returns from a well-chosen cover crop," the ASCS official said.

**1985 TAX PLANNING**

Nineteen eighty-five is already half gone and with it half of your opportunity to save by tax-wise financial action. Many tax planning steps are most uncertain because there are so many proposed changes that might occur. However, there are still a number of moves that can be safely made and are sure to reduce your tax bill if you give them enough time to work.

1. Your IRA contribution may be able to increase this year if the new tax bill goes through, but regardless it still will pay you to make at least the old maximum payment as early as possible.
2. If you can move assets by way of a trust or an outright gift to a lower taxed member of the family, then the interest or dividends from those assets paid between now and the end of the year will be taxed at the lower level.
3. If you can employ one of your dependents for the rest of the year or even only for the summer, the wages they earn if they directly reduce your farm or business profits will be taxed at a low level to them instead of a high level to you or your company.
4. Major charitable contributions made now in July will earn interest for your chosen charity for the rest of the year, cutting your tax bill.

These are only a few of the many taxwise moves you can make using the remaining months of 1985. There are many opportunities already lost, but there are many still left. Your Tax Advisor will probably have many suggestions in addition to the above which will help you, even with this year's uncertain picture. Most of them take time to work and you should move promptly.

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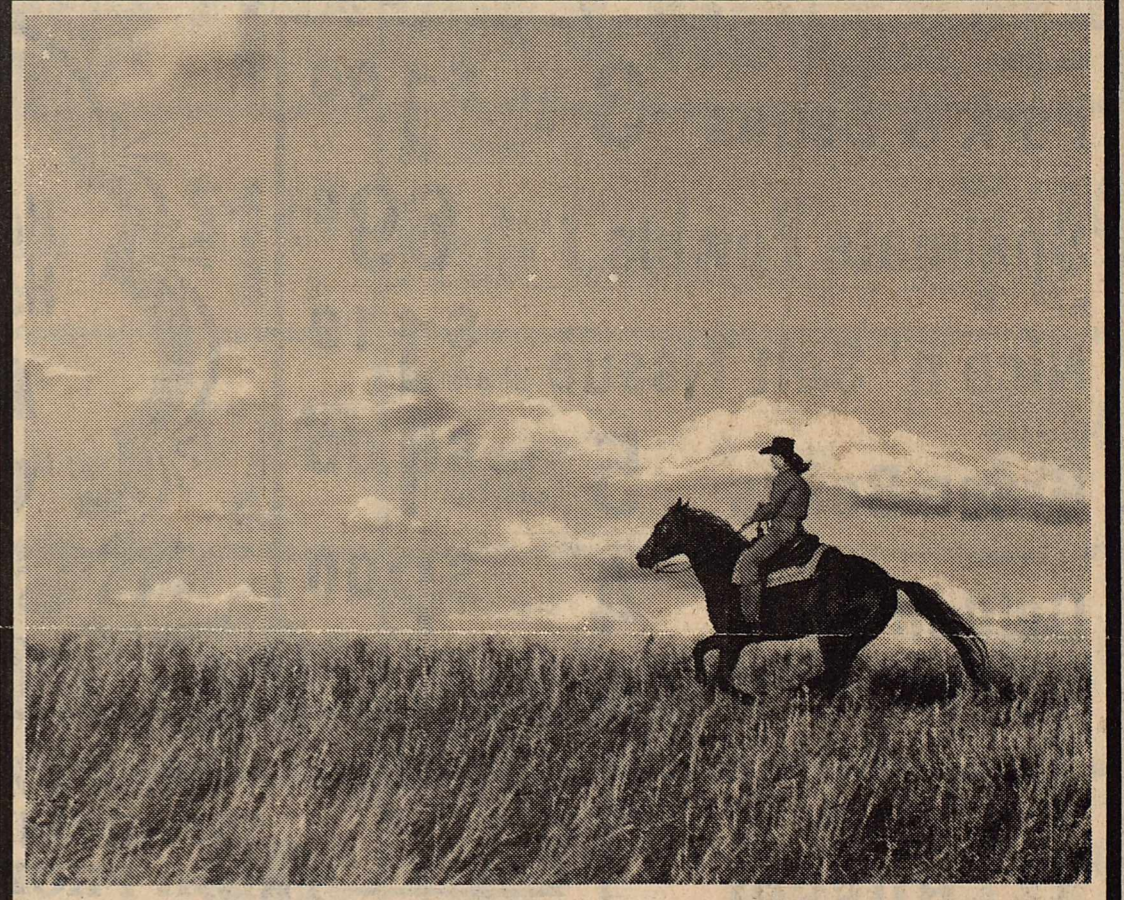
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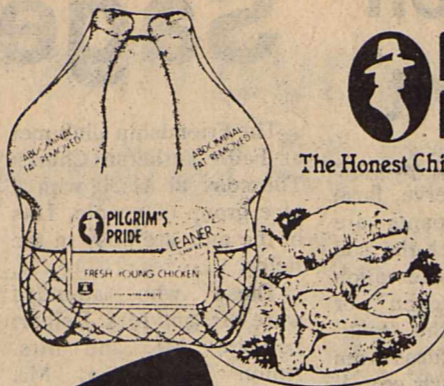
