Contracts, Lunch Prices **Topics Of School Board**

granting a leave of absence to one teacher, and extending principal's contracts were the main items of discussion on the agenda at the meeting of the Haskell ISD Board of Trustees meeting Tuesday night.

Linda Watson and Rhonda Lisles were employed with the school district as teachers for the 1985-86 school year. Ms. Watson will be a part time resource room teacher, while Mrs. Lisles will be a fulltime Kindergarten teacher.

Additionally, Mrs. Hairgrove requested that the Board of Trustees grant her a maternity leave and also that she be reemployed on a half term rather than full term teaching basis. Trustees voted to grant those requests.

The contracts of Clayton Neal and Bill Blakley were extended to two year terms, reviewable on a year-to-year basis. They will be paid at the same rate as before.

Trustees voted to raise the amount charged for school lunches for the 1985-86 school year. Elementary rates will go up from 80¢ to \$1, and and junior high and high school rates will go up from \$1 to \$1.25, with guest adult trays going up from \$1.35 to \$1.50. Additional milk will cost 20¢ and breakfast will be 50¢.

Haskell ISD will receive \$6,089 in federal funds from the Education Consolidation Improvement Act, Chapter 2 funding. These monies will be used to purchase new library books. A public hearing was held prior to the regular Board meeting Tuesday night, so public comment could be made on the uses of the funds. There was no public comment on the matter. Haskell will also receive \$57,088 in Chapter 1

funds from ECIA, which will be used to employ an additional resource room teacher and an additional resource room aide.

In reports to the Board, Dr. James Kemp told members that he felt that the property which the school district recently acquired in the purchase of the James Lanier home would need to be cleaned up and repaired before the district could sell the house. It was suggested by Kemp that the school's custodial personnel do the clean up work and repairs, as time permitted.

Kemp informed the Board that he is still looking into an insurance policy for the school employees

Sagerton Church Celebration

Dr. Harvey A. Stegemoeller, the president of Capital University in Columbus, Ohio, will be the guest preacher at Faith Lutheran Church in Sagerton, on July 14th as the congregation celebrates "80 Years" of Lutheran ministry. The current pastor, Rev. Mel Swoyer, states that, "Dr. Stegemoeller is a product of the Lutheran emphasis on the Word and the Sacraments and, having grown up in Sagerton, he is well qualified to challenge us to a continued ministry of the gospel into the twenty-first century." Faith Lutheran Church is a merger of the two historic congregations in Sagerton St. Paul's (ALC), organized in July 1905, and Zion (Missouri Synod). organized in April 1909.

There will be a Festival Service of Holy Communion at 10:00 a.m. on Sunday, July 14, 1985, followed by a luncheon in the Fellowship Hall and a time of remembering the past eighty years of Lutheran ministry in Sagerton. Assisting Pastor Swoyer in the distribution of Holy Communion will be two sons in the ministry of Sagerton: Dr. Harvey A. Stegemoeller, formerly of Zion Lutheran Church (LCMS), and Pastor Herbert F. Lammert, formerly of St. Paul's Lutheran Church (ALC). All former pastors, former members, and friends of Faith Lutheran Church are invited to the July 14th "80 Year" Celebration.

A native of Sagerton, Dr. Stegemoeller is a graduate of oncordia College and Concordia St. Louis Seminary in 1953. Dr. Stegemoeller also holds a master's degree from the University of Toledo and a Doctor of Divinity degree from Concordia, St. Louis. He has done further study at Southwestern College, Washington University, the University of Toledo and Georgetown University. In 1967-68 he was awarded a fellowship in the Non-Western Studies Project sponsored by the Ford Foundation. His area of concentration was the history of China. During this time, he served as Special Assistant and Administrative Assistant to U.S. Senator Vance Hartke, Washington, D.C.

He and his wife, Marian, live in Bexley near the Captial campus. They are the parents of four sons and two daughters.

Commissioners Open Bids, **Divide Revenue Sharing Check**

Commissioners Court room. In business matters, the Commissioners agreed to divide the revenue sharing check received by the county four equal ways between the precincts. The check was in the amount of \$22,061, which will give each precinct about \$5515.25 each.

Commissioner C.A. Turnbow reported on the west wall of the jail and also said that he had received reports that one area of the building at the ECC was leaking. The commissioner said he would see to it that these repairs were taken care

Each of the commissioners received reports for the County agent and the extension agent.

The county treasurer's report was reviewed and accepted.

Bids for two used 14 yard dump trucks were opened, and the commissioners rejected all of the bids, opting instead to re-advertise for bids for the two trucks. These bids will be opened July 23, at the regular session on the Commissioners Court, at 10 a.m. This is for Precinct 2.

In other bid openings, the Commissioners had two bids on their advertisement to purchase a new motor grader for precinct 4.

One bid came from Darr Equipment of Wichita Falls, on a new Catapillar 140G, which they submitted a bid on at \$89,029.00

The second bid came from Plains Machinery Co. of Abilene, who submitted a bid of \$66,801 for the purchase of a new AJ60E Galion Motor Grader.

In a motion made by C.A. Turnbow, and seconded by J.R. Perry, the commissioners decided to accept the low bid of \$66,801 from Plains Machinery for the motor grader.

Extension Granted For Acreage Reports

Due to the excessive rainfall Haskell County received this spring, during the planting season, a 10 day extension has been granted by the Texas State ASC Committee for producers to report their crop acreage.

This extension was granted to allow farm operators sufficient time to accurately determine their acreage due to the fact that a large number of acres in the county had to be replanted or planted in another field or plot than originally intended.

Producers are encouraged to certify as soon as possible and not wait until the end of the extended deadline of July 25. The County Office is open between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.

Response to crop certification has been good and it is hopeful that it will continue, to avoid the long line and the last minute rush.

The team not only speaks of their life in Russia, but they are also renown singers in the contemporary Christian music world. They have two albums out: "Believe it Like It Is", and "Love Forever

Peter and Nikolai renounce their

past for having lived in a Communist country by saying that their persecution was, and is, an act of hatred by the Communists towards the Christians in the Soviet Union, but that love, unity and zeal for Christianity in the USSR are even more abounding.

Their story will tell of the electrocution of a Christian soldier because of his faith, it will relate the cruelty of the USSR even to their own armed service members, it will tell of the tragedy of seperating families because of their faith in God.

The Russians now headquarter themselves in Lynchburg, Virginia, but they still have loved ones in Russia, Germany, and abroad.

The pair is slated to appear in Dallas after leaving the Haskell

Talking on the parking lot, making a drag through town, and the Mexican food are some things which most teenagers take for granted. But, for Barbara Spiewak, these will be the very things that she will miss most when she leaves here to return to Germany July 16.



First, the most important rule about swimming is to never swim alone. Even good swimmers should follow this rule. If you swim alone, while there are people on a nearby shore, that is acceptable, but be sure that someone who is watching is able to rescue you in the event that you should

Poor swimmers and non-swimmers should be very careful when using rafts and other inflatable devices. It's easy to get far from shore and into deep water while using these devices. Keep close to the shore and certainly in water that is not more than chest high.

Children who cannot swim should wear a life jacket when boating or when on boat docks or on other areas extending into deep water.

Keep pools protected with high fences and locked gates. Keep lifesaving devices handy at the pools, swimming areas, and on boats.

Stay out of water during thunderstorms.

When swimming in large bodies of water be extra careful on windy days or when the water is rough. These conditions can make familiar waters treacherous. Large waves and strong winds which there are on calm days, can sweep you off your feet and carry you away from the

Watch where you dive. Before you dive in a lake or pond, the area should be throroughly checked for stumps, rocks, and depth.



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HB 196 Assists Farmers In Acquisition Of Land

Beginning next year farmers ranchers may find it easier to acquire land or expand their holdings under the provisions of HB 196, which Governor White signed into law earlier this obligation bonds by the month.

The bill, sponsored by Representative Pete Patterson and Senator Bill Sarpalius, establishes a low-interest loan program with rates fixed for up to 40 years for the purchase of farm and ranch land. It will be administered by the ranchers who want to Veterans Land Board using procedures similar to those of the Veterans Land Program.

The Farm and Ranch Finance Program becomes effective Sept. 1, 1986, if Texas voters approve a constitutional amendment this November authorizing the sale of general state to fund the program.

"The program's low, fixed interest rates and low requirements make it a boon to young farmers acquiring their acreage and to established family farmers expand their holdings," Governor White said. "The Farm and Ranch Finance Program poses no financial risk to the state since it retains title to the land purchases until the loans are paid off, so I hope Texans will vote their approval for the program in November.'


