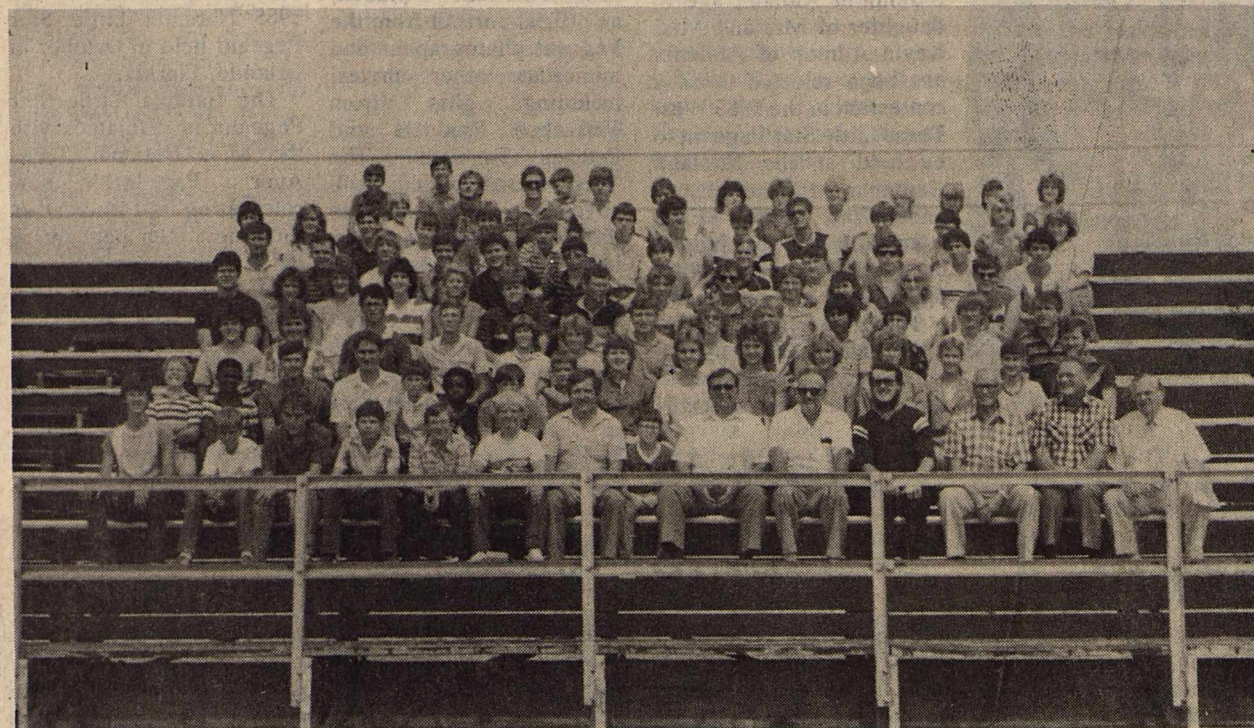

# Contracts, Lunch Prices Topics Of School Board

The hiring of two teachers, granting a leave of absence to one teacher, and extending principal's contracts were the main items of discussion on the agenda at the meeting of the Haskell ISD Board of Trustees meeting Tuesday night.

Linda Watson and Rhonda Lisles were employed with the school district as teachers for the 1985-86 school year. Ms. Watson will be a part time resource room teacher, while Mrs. Lisles will be a fulltime Kindergarten teacher.

Additionally, Mrs. Peggy Hairgrove requested that the Board of Trustees grant her a maternity leave and also that she be re-employed on a half term rather than full term teaching basis. Trustees voted to grant those requests.

The contracts of Clayton Neal and Bill Blakley were extended to two year terms, reviewable on a year-to-year basis. They will be paid at the same rate as before.

Trustees voted to raise the amount charged for school lunches for the 1985-86 school year. Elementary rates will go up from 80¢ to \$1, and junior high and high school rates will go up from \$1 to \$1.25, with guest adult trays going up from \$1.35 to \$1.50. Additional milk will cost 20¢ and breakfast will be 50¢.

Haskell ISD will receive \$6,089 in federal funds from the Education Consolidation Improvement Act, Chapter 2 funding. These monies will be used to purchase new library books. A public hearing was held prior to the regular Board meeting Tuesday night, so public comment could be made on the uses of the funds. There was no public comment on the matter. Haskell will also receive \$57,088 in Chapter 1

funds from ECIA, which will be used to employ an additional resource room teacher and an additional resource room aide.

In reports to the Board, Dr. James Kemp told members that he felt that the property which the school district recently acquired in the purchase of the James Lanier

home would need to be cleaned up and repaired before the district could sell the house. It was suggested by Kemp that the school's custodial personnel do the clean up work and repairs, as time permitted.

Kemp informed the Board that he is still looking into an insurance policy for the school employees

## Sagerton Church Celebration

Dr. Harvey A. Stegemoeller, the president of Capital University in Columbus, Ohio, will be the guest preacher at Faith Lutheran Church in Sagerton, on July 14th as the congregation celebrates "80 Years" of Lutheran ministry. The current pastor, Rev. Mel Swoyer, states that, "Dr. Stegemoeller is a product of the Lutheran emphasis on the Word and the Sacraments and, having grown up in Sagerton, he is well qualified to challenge us to a continued ministry of the gospel into the twenty-first century." Faith Lutheran Church is a merger of the two historic congregations in Sagerton St. Paul's (ALC), organized in July 1905, and Zion (Missouri Synod), organized in April 1909.

There will be a Festival Service of Holy Communion at 10:00 a.m. on Sunday, July 14, 1985, followed by a luncheon in the Fellowship Hall and a time of remembering the past eighty years of Lutheran ministry in Sagerton. Assisting Pastor Swoyer in the distribution of Holy Communion will be two sons in the ministry of Sagerton: Dr. Harvey A. Stegemoeller, formerly of Zion Lutheran Church (LCMS), and Pastor Herbert F. Lammert, formerly of St. Paul's Lutheran

Church (ALC). All former pastors, former members, and friends of Faith Lutheran Church are invited to the July 14th "80 Year" Celebration.

Dr. Harvey A. Stegemoeller was selected the 11th President of Capital University of July 26th, 1979.

A native of Sagerton, Dr. Stegemoeller is a graduate of Concordia College, St. Louis in 1950 and Concordia St. Louis Seminary in 1953. Dr. Stegemoeller also holds a master's degree from the University of Toledo and a Doctor of Divinity degree from Concordia, St. Louis. He has done further study at Southwestern College, Washington University, the University of Toledo and Georgetown University. In 1967-68 he was awarded a fellowship in the Non-Western Studies Project sponsored by the Ford Foundation. His area of concentration was the history of China. During this time, he served as Special Assistant and Administrative Assistant to U.S. Senator Vance Hartke, Washington, D.C.

He and his wife, Marian, live in Bexley near the Capital campus. They are the parents of four sons and two daughters.

# Commissioners Open Bids, Divide Revenue Sharing Check

Haskell County Commissioners held their regular session on Monday, July 8, at 10 a.m. in the Commissioners Court room.

In business matters, the Commissioners agreed to divide the revenue sharing check received by the county four equal ways between the precincts. The check was in the amount of \$22,061, which will give each precinct about \$5515.25 each.

Commissioner C.A. Turnbow reported on the west wall of the jail and also said that he had received reports that one area of the building at the ECC was leaking. The commissioner said he would see to it that these repairs were taken care of.

Each of the commissioners received reports for the County agent and the extension agent.

The county treasurer's report was reviewed and accepted.

Bids for two used 14 yard dump trucks were opened, and the commissioners rejected all of the bids, opting instead to re-advertise for bids for the two trucks. These bids will be opened July 23, at the regular session on the Commissioners Court, at 10 a.m. This is for Precinct 2.

In other bid openings, the Commissioners had two bids on their advertisement to purchase a new motor grader for precinct 4.

One bid came from Darr Equipment of Wichita Falls, on a new Catapillar 140G, which they submitted a bid on at \$89,029.00.

The second bid came from Plains Machinery Co. of Abilene, who submitted a bid of \$66,801 for the purchase of a new AJ60E Galion Motor Grader.

In a motion made by C.A. Turnbow, and seconded by J.R. Perry, the commissioners decided to accept the low bid of \$66,801 from Plains Machinery for the motor grader.

In a motion made by Commissioner Perry and seconded by Commissioner T.C. Burson, it was decided by the commissioners that the time that the funds must be

deposited with the county treasurer be extended to 30 days after receiving the funds. A new law required that funds in larger counties, must be deposited with the county treasurer each day, but in smaller counties, it can be voted on by the commissioners that the funds can be deposited for up to 30 days after they have been received.

Judge B.O. Roberson reviewed

for the commissioners some of the new laws affecting county government as they have been passed recently by the legislature.

Judge Roberson told the commissioners that he would be in a continuing education session for three days this week in San Antonio, and later in Lubbock.

The next meeting of the commissioners Court will be July 23 at 10 a.m. in the court room.

# Russians To Appear

The famous Christian speaking team of Peter and Nikolai Pankratz, of Russia, will be featured at the First Assembly of God Church here, Saturday night, at 7:30 p.m.

There is no charge, but the pair have agreed to speak on a "love offering" basis only.

The message of the Russians, as they call themselves, packs into it the memories the two men had as children growing up in a Christian family, in a non-Christian country. They recount the hardships they encountered because of their faith, and also recall how family members were persecuted for their belief in God.

The team not only speaks of their life in Russia, but they are also renown singers in the contemporary Christian music world. They have two albums out: "Believe It Like It Is", and "Love Forever More".

Peter and Nikolai renounce their

past for having lived in a Communist country by saying that their persecution was, and is, an act of hatred by the Communists towards the Christians in the Soviet Union, but that love, unity and zeal for Christianity in the USSR are even more abounding.

Their story will tell of the electrocution of a Christian soldier because of his faith, it will relate the cruelty of the USSR even to their own armed service members, it will tell of the tragedy of separating families because of their faith in God.

The Russians now headquarter themselves in Lynchburg, Virginia, but they still have loved ones in Russia, Germany, and abroad.

The pair is slated to appear in Dallas after leaving the Haskell area.

They have been the featured guests on all of the prominent Christian talk shows.

Haskell Little League All Stars blasted their first opponent, Twin Cities All Stars, 9-2 in the Monday night game, played in Stamford.

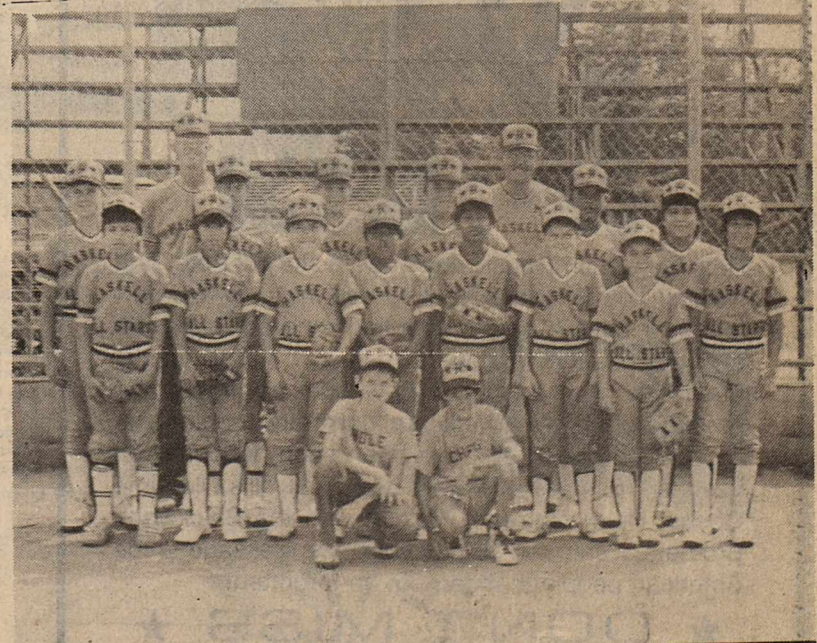
Winning pitcher was Chad Gibson, who only gave up two points, while pitching several strike outs. He remained in the whole game.

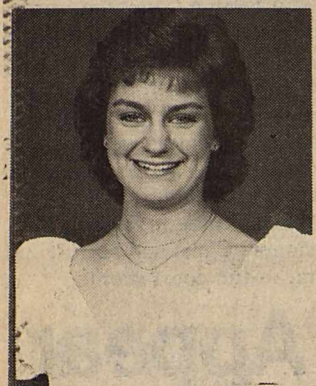


## Tamra Burnett To Compete At State 4-H Fashion Show

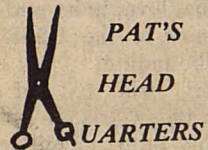

Barbara was surprised by the extremely hot weather when she came here, but now admits that she kind of dreads going back home, because she said her father reported to her recently that it was raining at home.

Speaking of her father, Barbara was able to visit with him at Christmas as he came to Haskell to visit. She also has a sister who spent this year in Grapevine, near Dallas, and Barbara has seen her sister several times over the course of the past months while here.

Then, recently, Barbara visited with her mother who also made a trip to Texas. The only member of the Spiewak family who Barbara has not seen is her brother, Holger, who is 18, and who has been an only child the past several months while his sisters have been in the U.S.

One of the first things Barbara has planned to do upon her arrival home is to catch up on visiting with her friends. She is also very good at western dancing, and will probably be teaching her other friends

that new art form.

Barbara has decided that she has dined on the finest of foods, like taco salad and cheese enchiladas, and lists Austin and San Antonio as two of her favorite places.

Many things will go back home with Barbara from Haskell, but one of her treasures will be her memories of graduation. She said that the senior parties, the graduation ceremony, and being a part of it all, will stay with her long after the trip is over.

While she attended HHS this year, Barbara was active in the basketball program, and was a member of FHA, as well as a member of the War Whoop newspaper staff.

While in FHA, she also went to the area and state meetings.

One thing that Barbara can say she did get in school was a paddling. She had never had "licks" in school until coming to Haskell, because in West Germany there is no form of corporal punishment in the school system. However, it should be noted that Barbara's only fault was that she had her birthday while here, thus necessitating the spanking.

German schools are much different from American schools because German students attend 13

years of school. They get out of school each day at about 1:30 and are expected to go home and study.

German television stations even cooperate in this effort by blacking out between the hours of 1-4 p.m. so the students won't sit in front of the TV instead of doing their lessons.

However, don't get the impression that TV is not shown in Germany, because Barbara said that she was surprised that Texas was not like it was shown to be on "Dallas".

Living with Bettye McBroom, who owns the Hayloft, a ladies and juniors fashion store, Barbara had ample opportunity to be well dressed, but as Bettye remembers, the McBroom crew had a heck of a time getting Barbara to wear the "long" pants which all Texas teens wear. Miss Spiewak was most accustomed to the shorter crop pants in her native land. She now admits that if she had the choice to wear anything in the world, it would be a pair of jeans.

When asked if she would give advice of any type to other German students coming to America to live for a year, Barbara said, "I would tell them that they must know the language, and not to bring too many clothes, but to buy them here".

"We don't have pickup trucks in West Germany," said Barbara.

This was a unique year for the Haskell school district in that there were two foreign students attending school here.

Elizabeth Scharff, who is a native of Sweden, also lived here this year, with the Duward Campbell family. She has already gone back to her homeland, but Barbara said that having another foreign student here made it more fun. She says she is expecting to hear from Elizabeth and the two have already planned to keep in touch.

Ethel Bradford had several visitors recently and included in the number were Val and Ronnie

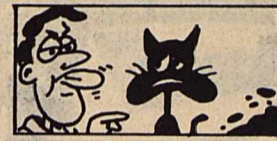
Bradford, from Peacock, Brenda Bradford also from Peacock, and Vicky and Susan Bradford from Swenson.

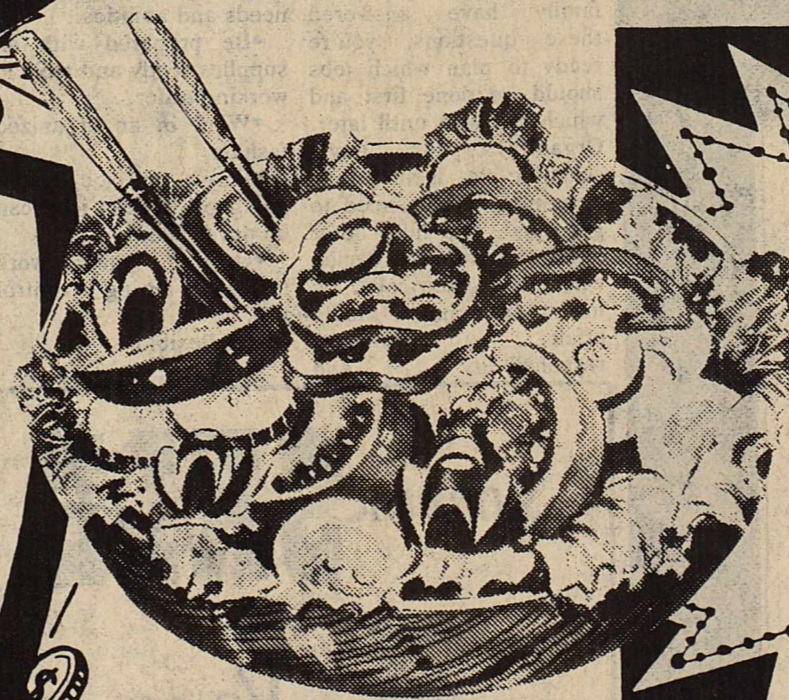

## Extension Agents To Attend State Improvement Training Conference

Staff members of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, an agency of the Texas A&M University System, will attend a state professional improvement training conference at Texas A&M University, July 15-19.

Specialized training in 24 different subject areas will highlight the conference, which will involve more than 1,000 Extension Service personnel. The

two-and-a-half-day training sessions will include topics in livestock, crops, natural resources, home economics, community and horticulture. The conference officially will get under way Tuesday morning, July 16, and will include remarks by Dr. Zerle L. Carpenter, Extension Service director; Dr. Arthur Hansen, Texas A&M University System

chancellor; and Dr. Frank Vandiver, Texas A&M president. The session also will include the presentation of Distinguished Performance Awards by Dr. Perry Adkisson, deputy chancellor of the A&M System. Highlighting the morning session will be an address by Dr. Mary Nell Greenwood, administrator of the Extension Service,

U.S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. Other speakers will include Dr. Neville Clarke, director of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, and Dr. Norman Borlaug, distinguished professor of international agriculture at Texas A&M and 1970 Nobel Peace Prize winner.

A special banquet on Thursday evening will feature the presentation of the Knapp-Porter Award to several outstanding Texas agricultural leaders. The award is the highest honor bestowed by the Extension Service in Texas. The concluding session Friday morning will feature talks by Mrs. Billie McCraw, director of the National Extension Advisory Council and past president of the Texas Extension Homemakers' Association, and State Rep. Tom Uher of Bay City, chairman for Budget and Oversight, House Higher Education Committee, along with the "Director's Challenge" by Carpenter. Lou Gilly and Max Stapleton, County Extension Agent for Haskell County, will be participating in this meeting.

## Ultra-sonic Pest Repellers Are Proven Ineffective

Tests prove what you may have already suspected. Ultra-sonic devices don't drive insects or any other kinds of pests out of your home.

U.S. Department of Agriculture researchers tested some ultrasonic pest repellers against German cockroaches and two species of biting mosquitoes. This research was done at the request of the U.S. Postal Service, which has received complaints from the public about the devices.

The ultrasonic waves neither drove the insects away nor stopped the mosquitoes from biting. In one test, mosquitoes actually bit more frequently when one of the machines was turned on than when it was turned off.

The ultrasonic waves were supposed to be inaudible to the human ear and not harm humans or household pets. In the devices tested, the lowest of the three frequencies on each machine was clearly

audible. The sound pressure level, in decibels, produced by one device exceeded the safety level permitted by the Occupational Safety and Health Act.

So what should you do about mosquitoes, flies, roaches and mice? It's back to repellents, screens, fly swatters, roach traps, poisons or maybe a 4-legged mouse catcher!

Employers should give working mothers more 'board room' opportunities.

COLLEGE STATION — Dads are getting more involved in the nursery and the laundry room, and that means employers should give moms more opportunities to get involved in the board room, says a Texas A&M University sociologist who studies the changing patterns of married women's responsibilities.

Dr. Elizabeth Marek's studies have shown that working women less and less frequently shoulder sole responsibility for child care, laundry, grocery shopping and other responsibilities associated with running a household.

"There is a conviction that women are first and foremost wives and mothers and that their responsibilities within the family prevent or inhibit them from a wider range of responsibilities outside the family and in society at large," she said. "Increasingly, that is a false conviction."

Employers are sometimes reluctant to hire or promote a woman because they believe home responsibilities, such as a sick child, will call her away from the job more often than a man, she said.

But Marek says that stereotypical view's time has passed.

"When employers finally begin to believe that child care is a shared responsibility — which they don't right now — they'll make more effective personnel decisions," she said.

Guide to coastal plants published by Texas A&M

COLLEGE STATION — Beachcombers have long entertained themselves by walking up and down the Texas coast, collecting shells. Now a new book from the Texas A&M University Press offers a new pastime: identifying plants along the shore.

Plants: the basis of life in the dunes and wetlands, often go unnoticed by visitors, according to authors Mary Michael Cammatella and Rita E. Arnold. For those willing to explore beyond the hotels, restaurants and amusement parks that are part of the coastal landscape, a variety of beautiful and interesting plants, both exotic and commonplace, are waiting. The authors say in "Plants of the Texas Shore—A Beachcomber's Guide."

## TAX PLANNING

### GIVE WISELY

Billions of dollars in cash and property are donated each year to various charitable causes and charitable organizations. Part of the public's generosity may be due to the tax deductibility of qualifying contributions. Tax legislation now under consideration may change the tax treatment of contributions. However, whether charitable giving remains deductible or not, any individual giving to charities should do so intelligently. The object of charitable giving is to have the donated money or property used by those in need, not to have the funds diverted for administrative purposes or, worse yet, for the personal use of individuals running the charity.

Never allow yourself to be rushed into making donations. Take the time to check the organizations and give only to those that spend the most where you want your contributions spent - on charitable activity.

Two organizations that provide information about charitable giving and various charitable organizations are the Council of Better Business Bureaus (1515 Wilson Blvd.; Arlington, VA 22209) and the National Charities Information Bureau (19 Union Square West; New York, NY 10003). The Council of Better Business Bureaus offers two free booklets on charitable giving. The National Charities Information Bureau provide a free guide on charitable organizations. The NCIB evaluates different charities to determine if board members of charities have conflicts of interest that might affect how contributions are used. It also checks how much charities spend on fund raising and administrative costs in relation to the amounts spent on actual charitable activity.

If charitable giving is a part of your way of life, stay abreast of tax legislation affecting contributions. Also discuss your charitable activities with your tax advisor to get the best tax benefits for your donations.

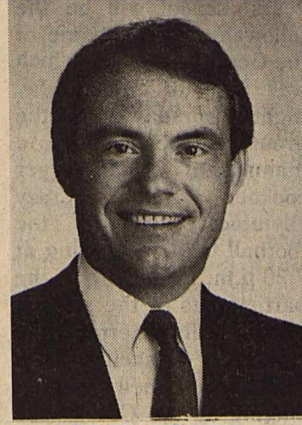

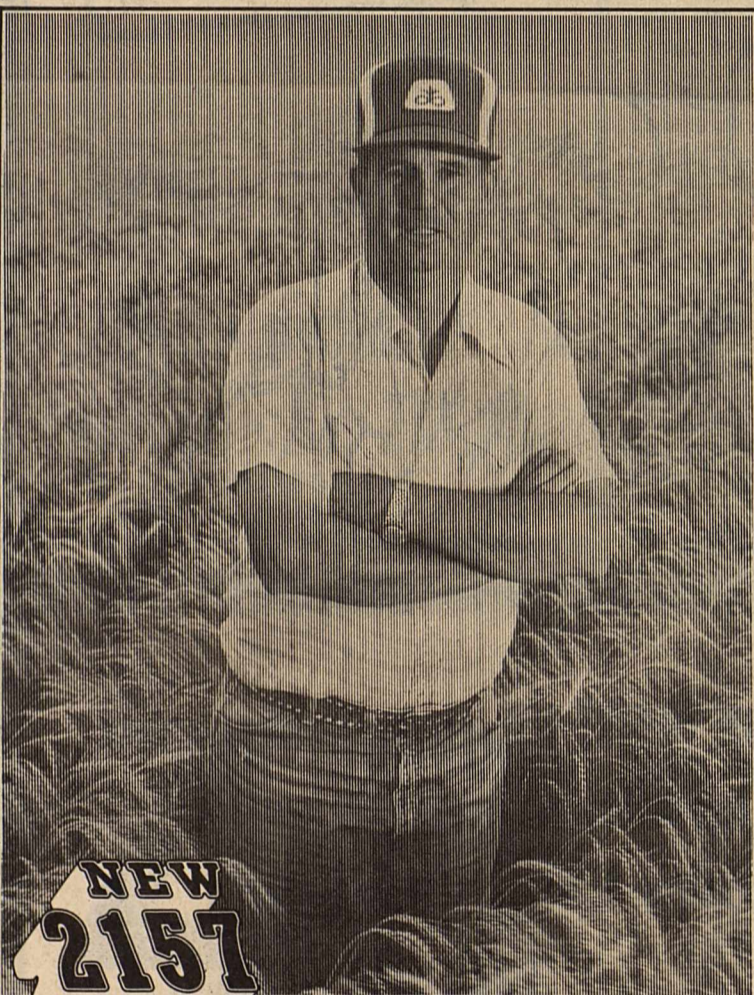

Witnessing these events made our government more real to the delegates, while at the same time they gained appreciation of our American Heritage of Democracy. The next stop was at the National Archives. The National Archives preserves and makes available for use the permanently valuable records of the United States government. These include the Constitution, Bill of Rights, Declaration of Independence, and the Magna Carta.

In workshop sessions at the National 4-H Center, the young people learned and practiced life skills, discussed and debated legislative issues and policies, proposed possible solutions to domestic and international concerns, and held simulated senate

hearings and county council meetings. They also developed a plan to incorporate what they learned into ongoing 4-H programs in their home communities.

Chad believes one of the best parts of his experience was being able to share ideas with other 4-H members from across the country. An Ideas Fair was held to allow an exchange of state activities. The Texas delegation gave lessons to native Texas dance steps. Facts and myths about each state were also exchanged. Many lasting friendships were formed as exchanges took place.

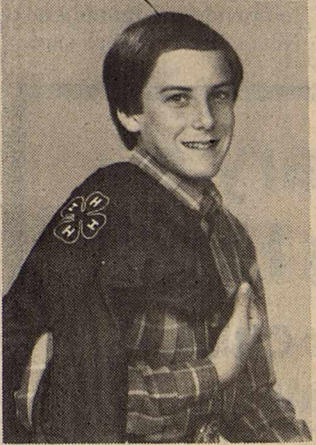

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## Eleven Oil Companies Are Fined For Violations

Eleven oil and gas companies operating in Texas were fined a total of \$15,000 Monday by the Railroad Commission for violations of RRC well plugging rules.

In each of the cases, wells were found inactive and unplugged. Commission rules require operators to plug or bring back into production wells that are inactive for more than 90 days.

The stiffest penalties—\$3,000—were assessed to operators who failed to appear at hearings called by the Commission to inquire into the violations.

Hayes Resources, Inc. of S. Londondry, Vermont, was assessed two \$3,000 penalties for violations in Anderson County. One involved the Dan Trigg lease and the other involved the George Beeler lease.

Another \$3,000 penalty was assessed to Diamark Energy Corp. of San Angelo for violations on the Trail lease in Concho County.

In other penalty actions taken by the Commission,

nine operators agreed to penalties of \$500 to \$1,000. These included Morrell and Parrott of Albany, Hendrick "A" lease, Throckmorton County, \$1,000; Harris Production, Ltd. of Houston, Quinteete lease, Liberty County, \$500; H.G. Ritchie, Jr. of Taft, Ritchie B lease, La Salle County, \$500; Frank Holcomb of Wichita Falls, George lease, Wichita County, \$1,000; Jade Operating Co. of Dallas, Scarber lease, Jack County, \$1,000; J-B Production of Denton, Herman Heinze lease, Rannels County, \$500; San Angelo Investment Co. of San Angelo, Kuasnicka lease, Rannels County, \$500; Danny May, Inc. of Brownwood, Gid Vick lease, McCulloch County, \$500; and Garner Oil Co. of Levelland, Garner lease, Hockley County, \$500.

## The View From Here

It certainly is nice that July fourth comes when it does. I needed that break in the summer that was afforded by the holiday. Makes me want to come back and do twice as much work...well maybe only better quality work.

Anyway, it was nice to be able to celebrate the occasion with family and friends, and get away for awhile.

Our country is now 209 years old and I hope that she can survive 209 more years as the greatest country on earth.

Last week we did an article on the creek project being half over. It is costing an estimated \$239,000 at the half way point in the project, but the need for a project such as this was beginning to get more serious each time the rains came, and began flooding the creek. I am sure that those folks on Ave. L will be relieved, to say the least, whenever the workers finally get the drainage problems over there solved.

Meanwhile, each time it looks like it is going to pout-up and rain, I am sure those people who live along Ave. L still pray that that storm won't be another 100 year flood, as the last one was.

The office of Lou Gilly sent over some very good swimming tips which I feel should be shared with everyone, but should be especially noted by those, like myself, who cannot swim at all, or swim just a little.

First, the most important rule about swimming is to never swim alone. Even good swimmers should follow this rule. If you swim alone, while there are people on a nearby shore, that is acceptable, but be sure that someone who is watching is able to rescue you in the event that you should need help.

Poor swimmers and non-swimmers should be very careful when using rafts and other inflatable devices. It's easy to get far from shore and into deep water while using these devices. Keep close to the shore and certainly in water that is not more than chest high.

Children who cannot swim should wear a life jacket when boating or when on boat docks or on other areas extending into deep water.

Keep pools protected with high fences and locked gates. Keep lifesaving devices handy at the pools, swimming areas, and on boats.

Stay out of water during thunderstorms.

When swimming in large bodies of water be extra careful on windy days or when the water is rough. These conditions can make familiar waters treacherous. Large waves and strong winds which there are on calm days, can sweep you off your feet and carry you away from the shore.

Watch where you dive. Before you dive in a lake or pond, the area should be thoroughly checked for stumps, rocks, and depth.

While these rules may seem silly to you, common sense must play a big part when playing in the water. Many people who thought these tips were foolish had to find out that the only foolish things about water safety is the lack of it.

## Proposition 10 Will Aid In Farming Revitalization

A program to revitalize the family farm in Texas will be modeled after the successful and self-supporting Texas Veterans loan programs, so as not to cost taxpayers a single penny, Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro said.

Established by the recent Legislature, the Farm and Ranch Finance Program would be funded by the sale of \$500 million in general obligations bonds which must be approved by the voters next November—Number Ten on the constitutional amendment ballot. If voters approve Proposition 10, the first loans could be made in September 1986.

Sen. Bill Sarpalius (D-Amarillo) and Rep. L.P. (Pete) Patterson (D-Brookston) authored the legislation that provides for low-interest loans of up to \$100,000 for the purchase of a minimum of 50 acres of land for a working farm. To be eligible, a family must have one member of the household that receives at least 35 percent of his income from agricultural purposes for the last three years before the loan is requested and have a net worth of no more than \$250,000. Also, Texas residency for the last five years is required.

Mauro pointed out that a Texas Veteran would be eligible for a Farm and

Ranch Finance Program loan even if he had already used his Texas Veterans program loan.

Designed to be a local farm and ranch program, the enabling legislation provides for a local committee appointed by the county judge and consisting of two resident agricultural producers and an officer of a financial institution located in the county.

Under the legislation signed by Gov. Mark White, the maximum mortgage period would be 40 years with a required down payment of at least five percent.

The Veterans Land Board will administer the new farm and ranch program and set the actual mortgage periods and interest rates after bonds have been approved by the

voters and sold on the bond market.

"If the success of Texas Veterans Loan Programs are any indication," Mauro said, "this new program should prove to be even more successful because it appeals to an even broader number of Texans. We intend to model the program closely after the Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program and the Texas Veterans Land Program—the best Veterans loan programs in the entire United States."

"Those highly successful Veterans programs are self-supporting and have not cost the tax-payers a single penny. The Farm and Ranch Finance Program should prove equally as popular, but now it is up to the Texas voters to provide the funding next November," Mauro said.

## Tax Board Visit Set For July 18 In Abilene

Representatives of the State Property Tax Board will visit 13 Texas cities July 15-August 1 to explain truth-in-taxation

procedures and the new property tax laws passed by the 69th Legislature.

One of those seminars is scheduled for 9 a.m. to noon on Thursday July 18 at Taylor Co. Court in Abilene.

Many taxing units will begin the process of adopting a property tax rate in late July and August. The truth-in-taxation statutes of the Texas Property Tax Code require taxing units to inform their taxpayers through public notices of proposed increases in the tax rate. Taxpayers then have an opportunity to express their opinions concerning the proposed increase at public hearings and can later petition for an election to roll back the tax

increase.

The truth-in-taxation laws also spell out the method of calculating the tax rate, to ensure that tax increases result only from the deliberate action of a taxing unit's governing body and not from an increase in property values.

In addition to truth in taxation, the seminars will also discuss the 27 new property tax laws passed by the 69th Legislature.

The seminars are aimed at local tax officials but are open to the general public. There is no registration or fee required to attend.

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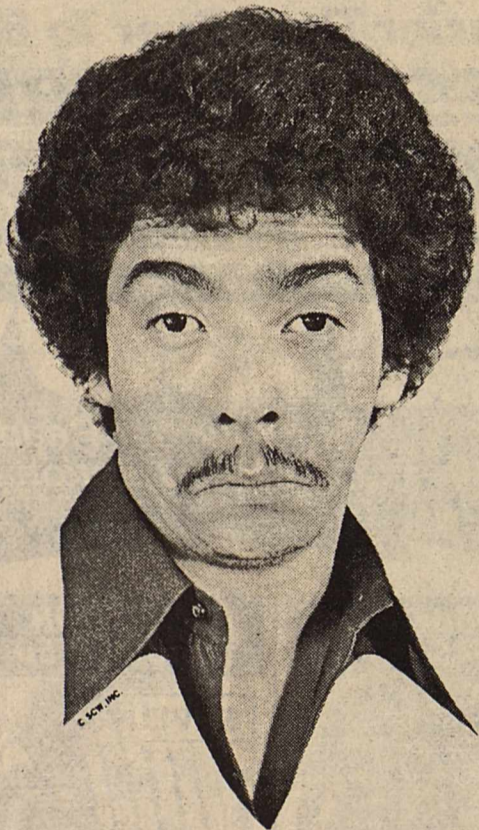
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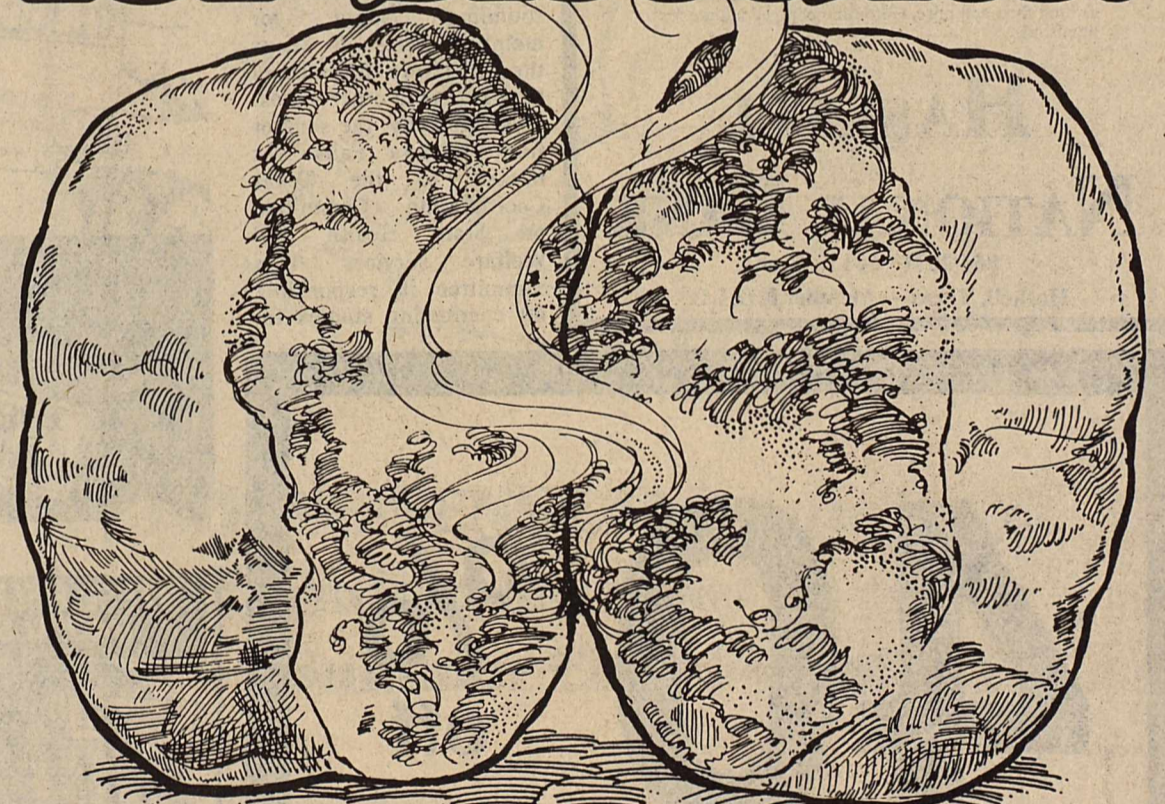


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## HB 196 Assists Farmers In Acquisition Of Land

Beginning next year family farmers and ranchers may find it easier to acquire land or expand their holdings under the provisions of HB 196, which Governor White signed into law earlier this month.

The bill, sponsored by Representative Pete Patterson and Senator Bill Sarpalius, establishes a low-interest loan program with rates fixed for up to 40 years for the purchase of farm and ranch land. It will be administered by the Veterans Land Board using procedures similar to those of the Veterans Land Program.

The Farm and Ranch Finance Program becomes effective Sept. 1, 1986, if Texas voters approve a constitutional amendment this November authorizing the sale of general obligation bonds by the state to fund the program.

"The program's low, fixed interest rates and low down payment requirements make it a boon to young farmers acquiring their first acreage and to established family farmers and ranchers who want to expand their holdings," Governor White said. "The Farm and Ranch Finance Program poses no financial risk to the state since it retains title to the land purchases until the loans are paid off, so I hope Texans will vote their approval for the program in November."

## Family Violence Victims May Have Better Protection

Texas courts may soon be able to offer greater protection to the victims of family violence under the provisions of HB 2160, which Governor White signed into law last week.

Sponsored by Representative David Patronella and Senator Craig

Washington, the law amends the Family Code to ensure the confidentiality of family violence shelters and other safe places. Currently the courts may provide protection to the victims of family violence by issuing protective orders prohibiting the

accused from visiting certain places, but these protective orders must specifically describe the locations they place off-limits.

Effective Aug. 26, the courts will be permitted to issue these orders without including the address and telephone number of the protected person. The law further guarantees the confidentiality of shelters and safe places by providing that details of their location may be stricken from public record.

"Until we can erase all traces of family violence from our society, we must do whatever we can to protect those women and children who are its victims," Governor White said. "This law takes an important step in enabling us to reach this goal."

### NOTICE OF INTENT TO IMPLEMENT RATES

General Telephone Company of the Southwest in accordance with the Public Utility Regulatory Act and the Rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas gives notice of its intent to implement new exchange access rates for the provision of shared tenant and tenant resale services.

These proposed rates are applicable to customers of General Telephone Company of the Southwest, excluding hotel/motel customers, who provide local exchange telephone service of General Telephone Company of the Southwest to their tenants or patrons on a resale or shared use basis. This resale or sharing arrangement is normally provided utilizing a customer-provided PABX or other similar stored control switch capable of common control processing or other features commonly associated with a PABX "Smart" switch.

These proposed rates are designed to recover costs on a usage basis for local exchange telephone service access and are identical to General Telephone's "Optional Measured Service" rates. The monthly access rate will be \$28.95 per trunk line and the usage rates are as follows:

As this is a new service offering, we are unable to determine the number of customers who may be affected. Currently, there are no known prospective customers. Until any customer utilizes this new offering, there will be no effect on the revenues of the telephone company, and in any event, the telephone company does not expect revenues to be affected by more than 2 1/2 percent. These proposed rates, where applicable, will provide tariffed local exchange access to customers who then will provide shared or resale services to tenants.

These proposed rates have been suspended by the Public Utility Commission of Texas and will become effective as proposed or modified by order of the Commission on a date to be determined by the commission.

The proposed rate schedule is on file with the Commission for public inspection and is also available at any business office of General Telephone Company of the Southwest.
