? Why Give Blood?

Blood, a most precious natural resource, is a gift that helps thousands of people every day recover their health. The American Red Cross is the sole supplier of blood to 44 hospitals in the Red River Region. In case the need for blood transfusion arises during your hospital stay or that of a family member, these are the main things to remember.

(1) The blood you receive through the ARC is available because a volunteer - a caring neighbor in your community - donated it.

(2) There is no known substitute for human whole blood, and there is no way to maintain a reliable blood supply except by donations from healthy individuals. (3) If you are hospitalized in the Region, you will automatically receive Red Cross blood. In the year of 1984 the Haskell hospital used 186 pints of blood, and so far this year of 1985 we've used 120 pints. So you can see that we've already used more than the 45 units and 43 units of blood that were donated the last two bloodmobile. The ARC had informed us (Haskell Hospital) that if our donations "don't" come up, they have the right to STOP sending us blood. And then the citizens of Haskell would have to go to Abilene or another hospital to get blood.

So PLEASE when the bloodmobile comes to Haskell, get out and donate.

The Bloodmobile will be in Haskell Wednesday, August 28, 1985 from 10:30 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. at The First Baptist Church.

Senator Lloyd Bentsen Watching Washington

In March 1976, during the last year of the Ford Administration, Secretary of the Navy J. William Middendorf announced that pilot training at the Corpus Christi Naval Air Station would be transferred to Pensacola, Florida.

This was terrible news for Corpus Christi and it also threatened the existence of air training stations at Kingsville and Beeville. Along with the people of Corpus Christi, I fought this pro- and posal tooth and toenail. It was a tough battle and several times it Haskell officiated. Burial looked as if we had lost. The next year, President Carter named Charles W. Duncan Jr. of Houston as Deputy Secretary of Defense. We were able to con- Mountain View, Ark., he vince Secretary Duncan that the plan was a mistake. In December 1978, Navy Secretary W. Graham Claytor Jr. rejected the proposal and the Corpus Christi pilot training program remained in place.

Now, nine years later, the Navy has reversed its original plan of the First Baptist Church. and announced it is shifting some of its pilot training from Pensacola to Corpus Christi. The USS Lexington, an aircraft carrier the age of 14 and farmed used for training pilots, will be moved from Florida to the Texas Coast

This announcement was made in conjunction with the recent selection of Corpus Christi as homeport for the battleship USS Wisconsin. In addition, the city will be assigned a cruiser, a destroyer and a minesweeper.

The Navy also will base part of the Wisconsin's Surface Action Group-two frigates and three minesweepers-in Galveston.

Together it is estimated the projects will bring \$238 million in economic benefits to Texas. They will create 7,140 permanent returned from the 37th jobs and will have a combined annual payroll of more than \$100 annual cheerleaders clinic million.

This will be a boon to our state's coastal area, which has been suffering record unemployment. Support industries throughout held in the SMU Moody our state will benefit from the activities at these Navy bases, as Coliseum. well.



- what parents should do about children who bang their head in a fall or other accident - can be helped if the parents look for certain signs that mean medical treatment is required, says a Texas A&M University expert on

A persistent headache or uncontrollably severe vomiting mean a doctor should be consulted, said Dr. Kenneth Hackney, chairman of emergency medicine at Scott and White hospital in Temple and a member of the Texas A&M medical faculty. Dizziness or blurred vision are other

symptoms indicating medical treatment is needed, he explained.

"If the pupil of one eye is larger than the other and will not get smaller when light is shined into it, the child should be evaluated by a physician," he said.

Other signs of a serious head injury are loss of hearing, facial weakness or drooping of the eyelid on one side of the face, clumsiness or weakness, paralysis or numbness in the arms or legs, slurred or confused speech, irregular breathing patterns and loss of consciousness or convulsions.

Crying, although a sign of pain, is not necessarily an indicator of a more serious problem, Hackney explained.

In young infants, a persistent bulging of the soft spot on top of the head can indicate excessive pressure, said Hackney. Such bulging may occur normally when the infant cries, but physicians should be notified if bulging persists because it could be a sign of injury or





Texas A&M needs \$800,000 before constructing wildlife study facility

COLLEGE STATION - About a third of the money has been raised or pledged to build a \$1 million-plus wildlife studies facility at Texas A&M Un-iversity capable of housing some of the exotic animals rounded up last year from a ranch near Laredo.

Another \$800,000 is needed - urgently, say university officials - before construction can begin on the star-shaped center which would be located on about 20 acres of land belonging to Texas A&M's veterinary school. The center sports a special design to shelter several different varieties of ani-

mals as they undergo studies aimed at increasing basic knowledge about how they reproduce. A 10-foot fence surrounding the site

was recently finished at a cost of almost \$30,000 paid for by private donations, said veterinary researchers heading the project — Drs. J.D. McCrady, Duane Kramer and Stephen Seager.

Plans also call for donations to finance a 50-foot-tall aviary within the fenced area where exotic birds being studied by Texas A&M researchers could enjoy considerable free flight, said Seager

BUSINESS BUY/SELL AGREEMENTS

The price paid for a going business will often exceed the fair market value of the tangible assets.

In business jargon, this excess is usually referred to as "blue sky." Under the tax regulations, this excess gets very specific treatment. The blue sky is either goodwill or a convenant-not-to-compete.

The amount of money allocated to goodwill can be treated by the seller as capital gain and, therefore, is afforded a more favorable tax treatment. The buyer, however, cannot deduct goodwill during his ownership of the business. The buyer must treat the goodwill as part of the cost of the business should he ever re-sell it.

The dollars allocated to a covenant-not-to-compete are favorable to the buyer. The buyer is entitled to write off the allocated dollars over the life of the covenant (in effect, he can depreciate the value of the covenant). The seller, on the other hand, must report the covenant dollars as ordinary income as opposed to the more favorable capital gain.

All too often the buy/sell agreement is silent as to the allocation between goodwill and a covenant-not-tocompete. The buyer will probably treat the blue sky as covenant and the seller will treat it as goodwill. This inconsistent treatment is unacceptable to the IRS. Upon audit, the IRS will adjust the tax returns for consistent treatment and assess back taxes and interest.

It is in the best interests of both the buyer and seller to have the allocation for goodwill or covenant spelled out in the contract. It is always unpleasant to have an IRS audit adjustment on a prior year return.

The tax consequences of the blue sky allocation can be significant. To get the best tax advantage, consult your accountant early in the sale negotiations.

School Lunch Guidelines Presented

Haskell Independent School District has released the quidelines for the school lunch program:

The school district serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for \$1.00 in the elementary school. \$1.25 for high school and 50¢ for breakfast.

Children from families whose income falls within the level shown on the pictured scale are eligible for either free meals or reduced priced meals at 40¢ for lunch and 30¢ for breakfast.

To apply for free or reduced meals, parents should fill out an application as soon as possible, sign it, and return it to the school. Please answer all questions on the form. An application which does not contain the following information cannot be processed by the school: 1) the total household income must be listed by the amount received by each household member receiving income and the type of income it is (such as wages, child support, etc.) or food stamp case number if the household is on food stamps, (2) names of all household members, (3) social security numbers of all household members 21 years of age or older or the word NONE for any household member who does not have a social security number and (4) the signature of an adult household member.
