Prior to this time, anyone hunting in their county of residence was not required to have a license except for deer and turkey.

Dove season will open Sunday morning and will continue through Nov. 9 in the north zone, which includes Haskell County. Bag limit will remain at 12 per day. In addition to the new license

requirement, new fees will also be in effect beginning this year. Resident hunting license will be \$10.00; fishing license, \$8.00 and combination hunting and fishing will be \$15.00. A non-resident small game hunting license will be \$75.00 and a non-resident license which includes deer and turkey will be \$200.00.

pean and Asian daisies, the Shasta was developed by Luther Burbank in Sonoma County,

California, and was first introduced in 1901. Its most devoted fans think it should be the official flower of the United States.

The Marguerite daisy gets its name from two European noblewomen, Marguerite D'Anjou of France, who used it as her badge of aristocracy, in the 15th century, and Marguerite de Valois, the Queen of Navarre, who filled her garden with the flower. That garden, incidentally, was the setting for Shakespeare's "Love's Labour's Lost.'

Gerbera daisies, which come in a wide range of colors, are named for the German naturalist Traugott Gerber, who discovered the flower.

When you're not picking the petals to decide whether he or she loves you or not, here are some tips about daisies: • The centers of Marguer-

ites should be greenish yellow when you buy them and the petals should not be discolored. The foliage should be a crisp green color.

• Gerberas and Shastas should be arranged in shallow, tepid water. If any droop, remove them and trim about two inches off the end of the stem, cutting on an angle with a sharp knife. Be careful not to bruise the stems.

Here at the Texas Veterans Land Board, we are proud of a government program that really works, and that's the Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program.

Since the program began in 1983, we have not spent a single penny of Texas taxpayers' money, yet we have put over 22,000 Texas Veterans into homes.

We do this by pledging the credit of the state to secure the lowest interest rates possible for our Texas Veterans--through the sale of general obligation bonds. The Veterans who participate in the program pay back the bonds, plus the cost of administering the program, in their low monthly payments.

Currently, we are loaning \$20,000 at a 9.97 percent interest rate, well below current market interest rates. We loan the first \$20,000 on a home. That \$20,000 can be combined with a conventional loan or a federal Veterans Administration loan.

Our program, which loans Texas Veterans \$20,000 at this low interest rate, has enabled many younger Veterans to move into the homebuying market much earlier than they could have done had there been no Veterans Housing Assistance Program.

Older Veterans have been able to use this successful program to help build their dream retirement home, using their loan as a down payment or to buy equity in an existing home.

As chairman of the Texas Veterans Land Board, I'm even surprised at how popular this program has become. We have been loaning Texas Veterans money at the rate of \$1 million a day, and by the end of the year, the original \$500 million pledged to this program by Texas voters will be close to being exhausted.

Proposition 8 will be on the constitutional ballot on November 5 and will give our voters the option of renewing this government program that works.

example, took on the General Services Administration in court. She won, but she was also driven out of business by the legal expenses.

An Oklahoma man decided to contest a \$14,000 ruling against him by the Labor Department. He spent \$30,000 in legal fees proving himself right.

These two cases took place before Congress in 1980 approved the Equal Access to Justice bill, at the urging of President Carter's White House Conference on Small Business.

This act allows small businesses and individuals of modest means to be reimbursed for legal fees if they win a suit fighting "substantially unjustified" actions against them by a federal agency.

Further, the reimbursed fees are taken from the budget of the agency that started the problem.

The equal access process has proved to be an effective weapon for the little guy in the battle against government red tape.

It has also served as a warning to federal bureaucrats to take care that their actions are justified.

And contrary to initial predictions, it has not been a "budget buster." Between 1980 and 1984, less than \$4 million in reimbursements was claimed.

When I joined in sponsoring the original Equal Access to Justice bill, it was set up as a temporary measure in order to judge its value.

In that time, the equal access concept has attracted a broad array of support ranging from small business associations to senior citizens groups.

Congressional supporters have been working to expand the number of agencies covered by the Equal Access to Justice Act, and to make it permanent. I have consistently joined their ranks. Last month, I am pleased to report, we succeeded.

The federal government was never intended to be a juggernaut. Our founding fathers would shudder to think that an American citizen or business would endure unfair penalties from a capricious and arbitrary bureaucracy rather than risk ruin fighting an injustice through an expensive legal system.

After all, they set this up as a government of the people, by the people and for the people.

The Equal Access to Justice Act places the "little guy" on equal footing with federal agencies and clears the path to justice for those who know they have been wronged by the bureaucracy.





Conflict between employ-

lem early on will prevent it from developing into a major disruptive issue. Here are some guidelines for confronting office problems: Remember that confron-

tation should be used to clear the air and improve a relationship. Confronting a problem demonstrates that you care enough to iron out your problems.

• Always plan what you will say before confronting someone. Otherwise, you're likely to bring out a whole list of grievances, whether re-

lated or not. • Use an explorative style of speech: "Help me understand..." or "I'm concerned about..." Don't be accusatory. • Expect a counter confrontation, but don't argueinstead let them present their point of view. This allows time to get your emotions under control and gives them the respect of being heard (something that is often at the root of the problem).

• Thank them for telling you how they feel, and explain what you heard them say. Then, move back to your initial issue since you have now defused emotions. Don't stop until you have resolved the problem.

Once you have learned how to conduct a confrontation on this efficient level, you should be able to defuse most office conflicts before they develop into serious problems.
