Light turnout expected for vote on amendments

A light vote turnout is expected in Haskell County Tuesday for the Amendments Constitutional election.

County Clerk Woody Frazier estimated that only 400 to 600 of the county's more than 4,800 eligible voters will cast ballots. As of Friday, only three absentee ballots has been issued.

All county voting polls will open at 7 a.m. and remain open until 7

In Haskell, voters will cast their ballots at the Community Bank Building (Precinct 1); the Haskell County Library (Precinct 2), the Extension Building County Precinct 3) and the Justice of Peace office (Precinct 4).

Voters in Rule (5), Weinert (8), Paint Creek (9) and Sagerton (10) will vote in the school buildings of those communities.

In Rochester (6) they will vote at the Home State Bank and in O'Brien (7) at the gin office.

As usual in such elections, only a handful of the proposed amendments has produced more than passing interest among local voters.

Foremost of these are Amendments 1 and 2, the so-called water amendments.

Amendment 1 would authorize the issuance of an additional \$980 million of general obligation bonds to finance water development, water quality enhancement, water conservation and flood control.

Amendment 2, actually companion of the Amendment 1, would authorize the issuance of \$200 million of agricultural water conservation bonds.

Most Haskellites appear to favor these two proposals. State Rep. Rick Perry has urged their passage. "No other factor is so critical to the future of our great state," Perry said in a newsletter mailed last week to his constituancy in Callahan, Haskell, Hood, Palo Pinto, Shackelford, Stephens, Throckmorton and Young counties.

The Haskell City Council passed a resolution Oct. 8, endorsing Amendments 1 and 2. Many state and regional organizations, including the West Texas Chamber

of Commerce, are calling for adoption of these two amendments. But on the local level, thee is at least vocal opposition to Amendments 5 and 13.

Amendment 5 which would authorize the legislature to regulate the provision of health care by hospital districts is opposed by Bud Comedy, administrator of Haskell Memorial Hospital, and Anita Perry, director of nurses. They say that passage of this amendment will enable the legislature, rather than the local hospital district, to determine what and how local services are provided.

Amendment 13 would authorize the creation of a Judicial Districts Board, providing for the reapportionment of district court districts. The Board would provide for the administration and jurisdiction of the courts.

Haskell attorney Royce Adkins is

urging the defeat of this proposed amendment, saying it will deprive the rural areas of Texas of the judicial system they now have. He said that Haskell County, and other counties of comparable size, will be consolidated into containing much larger counties. "We'll be real small fish in a great

big pond," said the long-time former district attorney.

Few of the other amendments seem to have attracted a great deal of support or opposition on the local level.

Among them are:

No. 3 Enabling cities to spend public health funds for replacing water lines on private property and assess the cost against property

No. 4 Permitting proceeds from the sale of land dedicated to the permanent school fund to be used to acquire other land for that fund.

No. 6 Permitting state prisoners to be placed in penal facilities in other states.

No. 7 Allowing Chambers County to be divided into two to six justice of peace precincts.

No. 8 Providing \$500 million in additional general obligation bonding authority for the Veterans Land Board to finance more low-interest home mortgage loans to veterans.

No. 9 Permitting the legislature to provide for the prior approval of the expenditure or emergency transfer of appropriated funds.

No. 10 Authorizing the Veterans



"YELLOW PAD" FINANCIAL PLAN

Financial planning does not have to cost a lot of money. If your financial affairs are simple, your financial plan may also be simple. Good financial planners will review your list of assets

Assert your power

The Texas constitution created in 1876 states emphatically that "all political power is inherent in the people."

Constitutional amendment elections give the voters of Texas the opportunity to seert that power. Since 1879 a total of 436 amendments to the constitution have been proceed. So for 260 of

amendments to the constitution have been proposed. So far 269 of them have been adopted, but only because a majority of Texans voted their approval of the amendments. Yearly, Texas voters are given

Yearly, Texas voters are given the opportunity to alter the most powerful document in the state, to decide what is best for the future of Texas, their communities, themselves and their families. The constitution directly affects everyone in this state and yet voter turnout for the proposed amendments in off-year general elections is a disappointing 12 percent or less.

This means that of the nearly 8 million registered voters in the state, less than 1 million take advantage of a right that affords more authority to voters than to the

power to change what is written in the constitution.

Fourteen proposed constitutional amendments will be on the ballot next Tuesday. Especially significant are the proposed water amendments. This is the third time Texas voters have been faced with a porposed solution to the state's water problem.

A myriad of other issues are touched by the proposed amendments. The state of Texas prisons has been much publicized. Proposition 6 speaks to that issue.

Regulation of local hospital districts by the state legislature, re-alignment of district-court districts and funding to continue established programs and create new ones are addressed in other proposals.

In addition to the right to vote, citizens of Texas have the obligation to inform themselves on the issues to be decided.

There used to be a simple way to say it

People don't look for jobs anymore.

Instead, they "mainstream their talents."

And when they do this, they're in a selection process."

So wrote syndicated columnist Erma Bombeck last week as she told of a conversation with her jobless son.

Erma's a funny writer and she's been known to exaggerate a time or two. But in doing so, she always makes a point.

The point here is her bewilderment with the modern tendency to get away from simple English and try to say ordinary things in unordinary ways.

"At this point in time" surfaced a few years ago when Sen. Howard Baker kept repeating it during the Watergate hearings. For some strange reason, it has stayed around to torment us. The word "now" works just as well with a lot less effort, but it's far too simple for inclusion in a lot of vocabularies these days.

Our founding fathers gave us a

constitution which was the envy of the world. But if you don't think it's been butchered up by later generations, take a look at it some day and compare the simplicity of the original 10 amendments to the voluminous wordage of subsequent additions.

Lincoln's literary masterpiece at Gettysburg contained fewer words than most of today's politicians use to answer a "yes or no" question. The Lord's Prayer has only one three-syllable word in the first 36, and none at all for those who use the non-Bibical pronunciation of the word "hallowed."

I once had a neighbor whose six-year-old son was not doing well in such first-grade artistic requirements as cutting, pasting and coloring.

They took him to a child psychologist who interviewed him, quizzed him, tested him, analyzed him, etc. A few days later the parents received a three-page typewritten report from the psychologist, containing, I suppose, a complete evaluation of the child's problems.

It was filled with 15- and 20-letter words and all kinds of medical, psychological and psychiatric terminology which would make Howard Cosell's utterances pale by comparison. Best we could figure, the doc was trying to say the kid was weak on digit dexterity. I don't know why he didn't just say Junior was clumsy, awkward or inept.

My wise old great aunt reached the same conclusion when she analyzed me when I was about six. She didn't have all those fancy initials after her name; in fact her formal education was probably limited to three or four years. Her credentials were experience and common sense—and a way with

After watching me for a couple of minutes as I tried to help my older sister cut paper dolls from a Sears catalog, she rendered her verdict by use of an age-old expression: "Your fingers are all thumbs."

I'm reminded of a notice printed by the Deming (N.M.) Chamber of Commerce several years ago after a sharp devaluation of the Mexican peso. Being located near the border, Deming merchants regularly accepted the foreign currency.

But after the devaluation and the resulting instability of the peso, most merchants quit taking it. The Chamber had the notice printed for merchants to tape up near their cash registers.

It went something like this:
"Due to the instability of the
Mexican peso and the uncertainty

Mexican peso and the uncertainty of the ever-changing exchange rate, this firm can no longer accept Mexican currency in payment for our merchandise and/or services. We regret any inconvenience this action may cause...blah, blah, blah."

An enterprising cashier at the Bel Shore Restaurant condensed the message to a simple form. At the top of the notice, she scrawled in red ink: "No Mexican Money."

The identical communique was transmitted vociferously and articulately—and truncated.

Or you might just want to say:
The same message came across loud and clear—and short.

Agency endorses amendments

Editor: I am deeply concerned that there may be widespread misunderstanding of Propositions 1 and 2 (state "water amendments") to be voted on at the Nov. general election. Based upon questions I have received, many voters are apparently under the mistaken impression that approval of these two proposed Constitutional amendments would authorize expenditure of more than a billion dollars of State funds for water projects. This is emphatically not the case.

The programs that would be authorized by Propositions 1 and 2 are loan programs, to be financed through the issuance of bonds, not through the appropriation of tax dollars, and the loans made are to be repaid to the State with interest by the borrowers. This means that projects financed with State assistance under these programs will be paid for by the beneficiaries of those projects, which is as it

The benefits to the citizens of the State would be that funds will be available as needed to help communities throughout the State meet their needs for water supplies, wastewater treatment facilities, and drainage and flood control works, and those funds will be available at a lower interest cost than would be the case if the bonds were issued by individual subdivisions of the State.

This program is, in fact, an extension and expansion of a program that has been in place for 20 years. In 1957, the voters approved the sale of \$100 million in State bonds to finance development of water supplies. In 1962, 1971, 1975 and 1981, the voters approved issuance of additional State bonds and expansion of the program to include water quality enhancement. In total, \$600 million in State bonds have been authorized by the voters, and \$500 million from the funds thus obtained have been loaned at interest to Texas cities and water districts for water supply and water quality enhancement projects. This has made it possible to accomplish water resource development to meet the needs of the people of Texas that could not otherwise have been accomplished, and there has never been a default on any of these

Today, only \$90 million is available to continue this program.



According to Boleman, cottonseed is a good buy when 100 pounds costs less than 35 pounds of cottonseed meal plus 65 pounds of sorghum. Cottonseed is \$3 per hundredweight, representing almost a \$2 savings over a like amount of meal-sorghum mix.

Other factors that cattle-Agricultural men should consider in Extension Service, Texas feeding cottonseed are these:

1. Since cottonseed is fed whole, it does not require grinding, rolling, pelleting or any other preparation.

2. Cottonseed can be fed alone or combined with currently selling for about other ingredients to produce a variety of mixed feed, cubes or pellets.

3. Cottonseed can combust spontaneously if stored too wet and stacked too high, so it should be percent total digestible bought at a mositure level

stored in a flat bulk container. Cottonseed can be stored a year or more without fumigation if kept

4. Cottonseed is best fed from a trough since it will not flow well in self feeders.

5. Because of the high oil content, cottonseed should be fed so as not to exceed these daily limitations--4 pounds for weaned calves, 5 pounds for yearlings, 6 pounds for cattle from 1,000 to 1,300 pounds and 7 for heavier animals.

6. Cattle unaccustomed to eating cottonseed may have to be trained a bit, and sprinkling cottonseed with molasses or grain will entice them.

Boleman advises cattlemen interested in cottonseed for feeding cattle this winter to contact a cotton farmer or gin as soon as possible while supplies are still plentiful and the price is right.



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

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Haskell County Library Can Please Any Reader

Almost any book not on the well-stacked shelves of the Haskell County Library can be obtained,

says Mrs. Elsie McGee, librarian. "We borrow books from the Abilene Public Library," says the long-time librarian. "They nearly always have what we request, but when they don't, they can tell us where to get them."

As the name implies, Haskell County Library, located at 300 North Ave. E, is a county library and is funded by Haskell County.

Mrs. McGee is the only employee, except for occasional part time help. During the summer, the Council of Governments pays the salary of a high school girl to help with the children's program. Angie Arellano was that high school girl this past summer and also is helping Mrs. McGee during the school year on an occasional basis. The county provides some money for part time help.

Most of the books in the library are owned by the county. Books are normally ordered early in the year from Cokesbury in Dallas. Just about all of the book budget is expended at that time.

During the rest of the year, the

library replenishes its supply through loans from the Abilene Public Library, through the Inter-Loan Library Program and through donations.

McGee's Through Mrs. familiarity with the reading habits library patrons, she is able to inform them when books of their interest are received.

Books borrowed from the Abilene library are shipped pre-paid but the expense of returning them is borne locally. Mrs. McGee said these books are sent back and replaced on a regular basis. She stated that Jo Cox frequently returns books to Abilene without charge or trouble to the local library.

Interest of Haskell County readers cover a wide range, the librarian says, but fiction is the most common. Among the most popular authors are Daniel Steele and Janet Dailey. Extremely popular are the western novels of Dana Fuller Ross and Louis L'Amour.

Many of the offerings are paperbacks, often donated to the library. It's not uncommon for a person to check out 15 or 20 paperbacks at a time. Magazines,

also donated, are responsible for considerable library traffic.

Mrs. McGee finds the summer reading program for children one of the most interesting and enjoyable of her duties. Under the Texas Reading Program, children check out books to be read either at home or at the library. At the end of the summer, there is a program, with a speaker and presentations of certificates to participants.

Any resident of Haskell County may sign up at the library to check out books. The normal check-out period is two weeks, but Mrs. McGee said a two-week extension is granted liberally.

The library is open from 1 to 5 Monday, Tuesday. Wednesday and Friday; 1 to 7 p.m. Thursday and 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday.

Mrs. McGee has been the librarian for 29 years. The library is now in its third location since she began her duties. She started when the library was on the second floor of the court hourse. It later moved to a building on South 1st St., and then 11 years ago to its present North Ave. E location.



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
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
