

Young Wildlife Poor For Pets

Hands off of young wildlife. This is the warning of the Director of Law Enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission. Right now reports are coming in about persons capturing young deer, coyotes, and other "babes" of the wild, hoping to make pets of them.

It's against the law, the Director warns. Wardens have been asked to keep a close watchout for persons who go into the woods and come out with the young pets.

In addition to being against the law, it also is dangerous, the Director says. For instance, a coyote pup is a cute little thing. While still very young, it is playful and full of fun. As it grows older, however, the animal instinct develops.

We have many cases on record where these young coyote pups

have bitten the hand that feeds them, the Director warned. "Every year we have any number of calls from persons who have found a deer they thought to be lost in the woods," the Director said. "It might be lost, but the chances are it has a much better chance of survival in the wild than when you take it away from its mother." He advised persons finding distressed wildlife to contact the Game Warden. He'll know what to do about it.





Guar as a crop is becoming established and popular with farmers who have grown it as a soil conditioning summer legume in agricultural crop rotation. It is not an expensive crop to grow and pays its own way readily as a soil improving crop to result in substantial increased yields for prime cash crops following in rotation on guar land. These benefits last, and are readily apparent, for three to four years, when guar as a summer legume should again be grown on the field as a rotation crop for repeat performance.

Guar offers a triple purpose legume crop which is based on the following: It serves as a green manure crop, it may be grown as a cash crop and it may be used as a bean production crop for on-the-farm protein supplement for cattle feed. Other advantages in planting guar are

that it requires no special equipment, it puts abundant residue into the soil and it uses water intake and greatly increases the soil's water holding capacity of the soil. Guar is drought resistant and thrives in hot weather and reduces the effect of root rot on cotton following in rotation.

Guar should be planted when the soil is warm, "cotton planting time", when weather is assured. It has been found that guar produces the best results by planting in rows 5 to 6 pounds per acre. It is generally recommended that a commercial fertilizer be put down with the seed that have been inoculated. Being important to inoculate the seed at planting time with "Urbana Inoculant" or "E Guar". Guar

inoculated will result in an unsuccessful planting. The required growing season for guar as a green manure crop is entirely dependent on the amount of moisture. With adequate moisture available to the plant, the optimum green vegetative tonnage will be produced in 90 days for return to the soil for maximum soil conditioning and soil improving benefits.

There are three varieties of guar. They are Mesa, Groehler and Texsel. Mesa produces lots of foliage but not many seeds. Groehler produces the most seed. However, Texsel is the most common variety and is the one that has been used in this area in the past.

For further information regarding the planting of this summer legume, contact your local Soil Conservation Service technicians.


