PRESIDENT REAGAN'S tax proposals have been the major topic of conversation since his nationwide television address on the subject May 28.

The president proposes to radically change the federal tax structure, calling for a much more simplistic system. He calls the present system unjust and un-American, and says that it promotes cheating on one's taxes.

The new system that President Reagan proposes will see (the experts say) 79 per cent of American families paying the same or less taxes than they now do, while the other 21 per cent of the taxpayers would pay more taxes.

Among the provisions in the president's program are an increase in the personal exemption, a tax (for the first time) on some health insurance payments made by employers for their employees, and an end to the tax deduction for state and local taxes.

Even the Democrats in the congress have recognized the need for tax reform. Dan Rostenkowski of Illinois, chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, which will write the tax plan, called the president's plan "a starting point."

The oil and gas industry, which has orchestrated a hard and fast lobby in an attempt to keep its tax benefits, will also come under the austerity axe, if the president's proposals are adopted.

Under Reagan's program, oil and gas will be asked to pick up a larger share of the national tax burden by losing the "old oil" depletion allowance. However, the industry would be allowed deductions for the exploration and drilling for new oil.

Of course, the new tax bill isn't written as yet, so it's hard to say how it will affect most people, and in reality it affects everyone differently.

One tax said that the immediate result, in his opinion, would be that the president's plan would benefit those taxpayers who do not itemize deductions on their returns. This category was estimated to contain around two-thirds of the nation's taxpayers.

Tax reform will undoubtedly be a subject of which we'll hear considerably throughout the summer. With all of the built-in security enjoyed by so many in the upper tax brackets, you have to applaud the president for even broaching the subject.

None Hurt In Wreck Here Sun.

A two-vehicle accident Sunday morning at 1:40 a.m. resulted when a near head-on collision occurred on Highway 60 near the roadside park west of Bovina.

Tom Gonzales of Amarillo was driving a 1979 Electra Buick eastbound on Highway 60, when he crossed over the center line and struck a semi-trailer rig driven by Gene Clapp of Niconia Park, Oklahoma, traveling west.

Clapp was driving a 1980 Freightliner cab-over semi-truck pulling a trailer loaded with Hormel bacon headed to El Paso.

Gonzales crossed the center line and struck the tires under the trailer causing the accident. The truck veered off the highway and struck a tree.

Neither of the two men were injured. Highway officials worked until Sunday afternoon clearing the wreckage and debris from the highway.

Bobby's Auto & Coach Clinic, for repairs to the sheriff's car. The car had been damaged recently in an attempt to stop a fugitive.

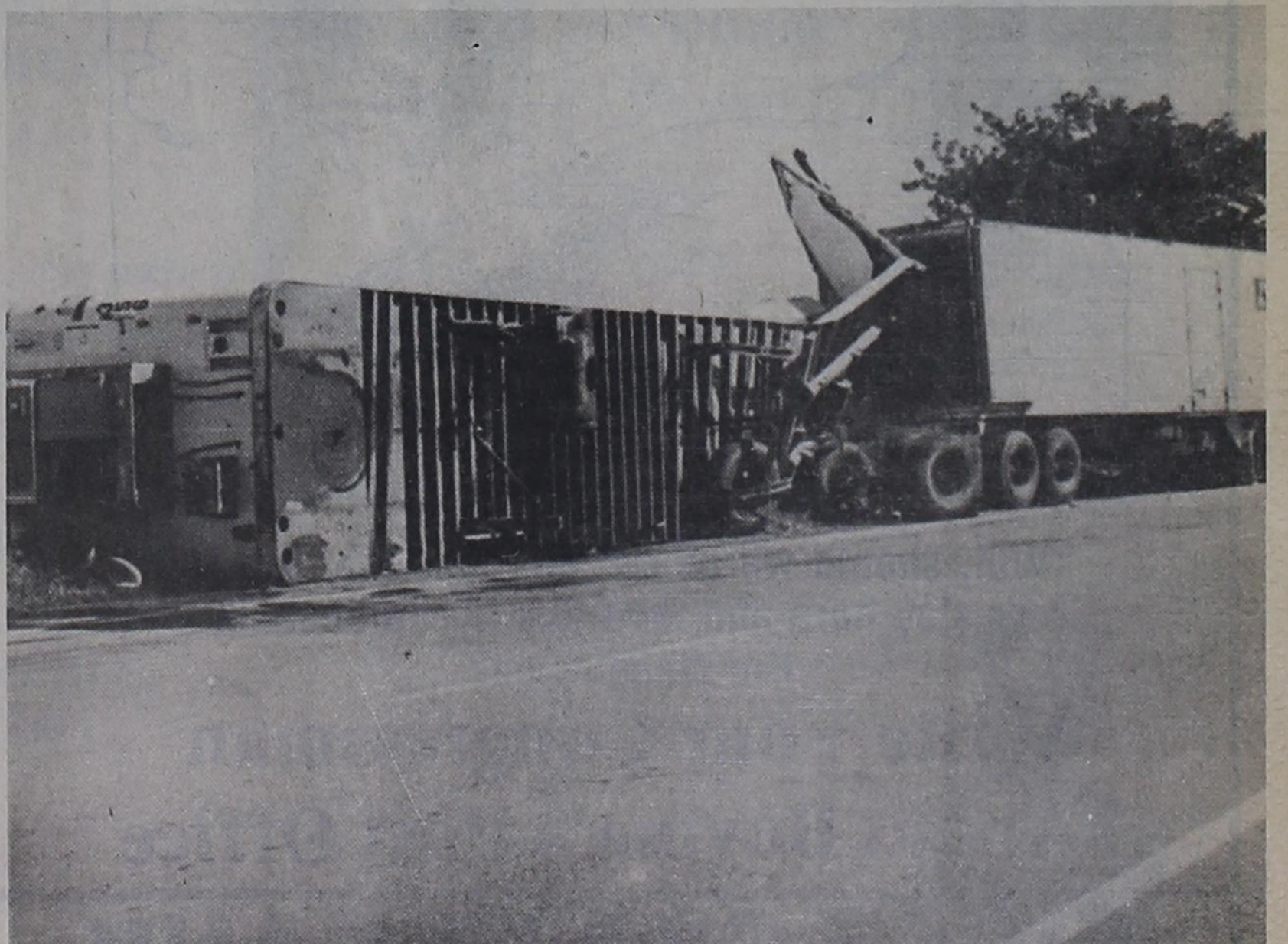

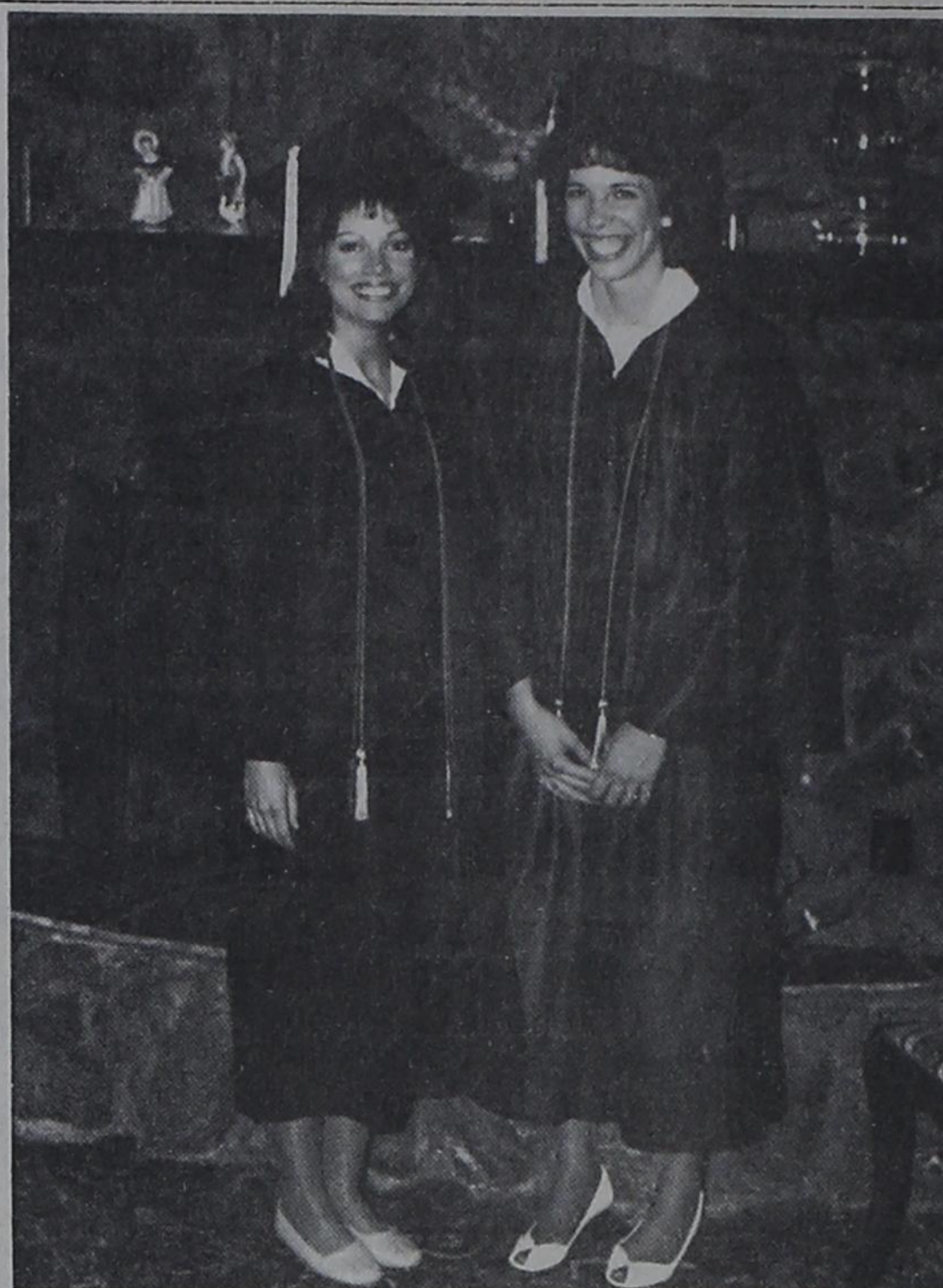
June 11, Sherley Grain received its first load of barley.

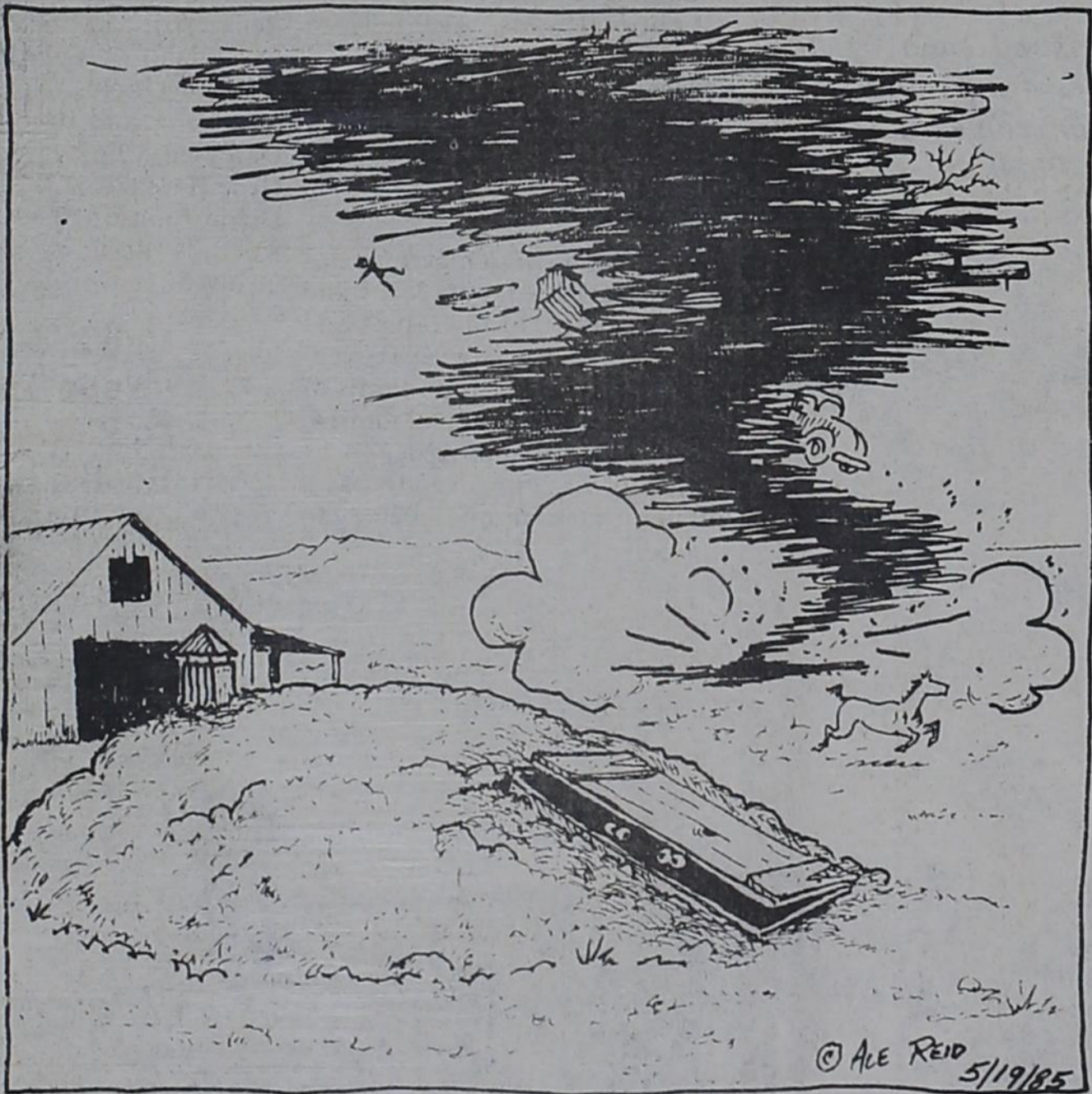





GSPA Sponsoring Yield Competition

The National Grain Sorghum Producers Association (GSPA) will sponsor the first nationwide sorghum yield contest this year, with top winners receiving a trip abroad. "The contest will focus on yield and management," said Elbert Harp, executive director of the National GSPA, "and will help us gather information on the most efficient and cost-effective ways to grow sorghum."

"We feel this is important because of a trend indicated by recent USDA figures. The cost of sorghum production is up as much as 50 cents a bushel over production costs for corn. If this trend continues, sorghum farmers will find it harder to remain

Chris Cupit of Bovina was among 418 Eastern New Mexico University students named to the 1985 spring semester Dean's Honor Roll.

Eastern students receive one of four designations as a Dean's Honor Roll student and are graded on a 4.0 scale. Summa Cum Laude students have a 3.8 to 4.0 grade point average and Chris Cupit, a senior is a member of the Dean's Honor Roll cum laude.

"Business Of Year" Award Goes To SPS

Gov. Mark White presented Southwestern Public Service Company an award symbolic of "business of the year" in Texas this week.

At a special luncheon in Austin, White presented SPS Chairman and Chief Executive Officer Berl M. Springer with the Texas Association of Business (TAB) Ed C. Burris Award.

The award is presented annually to one company that exemplifies the best in Texas business and industry, said Bob Myers of Fort Worth, Chairman of the TAB committee that made the selection.

SPS's efficiency in operations, power plant construction, fuel management and other areas that directly benefit electric customers played a major role in its selection, Myers said.

Among the many SPS accomplishments noted by the selection committee were:

--This summer the company will complete its fifth coal-fired generating unit on schedule, within budget--and at a cost about one-half the average for similar power plants throughout the nation. SPS is one of the few electrical utilities in the United States that design and supervise construction of their own power plants.

--SPS was a leader in the utility industry in the early 1970s when it made the decision to meet increasing demand for electricity in its service area with coal-fired power plants. That decision has paid off for SPS customers. Last year alone, fuel costs for its customers were \$157 million lower than if the company had to rely

solely on natural gas as a boiler fuel.

--SPS is working hard to keep down all fuel costs, including costs of coal. After extensive negotiations completed last year with the Burlington Northern and Santa Fe Railroads, SPS renegotiated its coal-haul contracts. The new contracts will save consumers \$27 million in fuel costs this year--and \$790 million over the next 17 years.

--In a further effort to keep down costs in the future, SPS is constructing a test facility near Amarillo that will examine the feasibility of a coal slurry pipeline using liquified carbon dioxide in place of water to transport coal.

If feasible, such a pipeline would be built from northeastern New Mexico to a proposed SPS power plant near Lubbock. It would be the first of its kind in the world. It would conserve previous water and perhaps be a source of carbon dioxide (CO2) for Texas' oil industry. CO2 is used to extend the life and increase productivity of oil wells through territory recovery.

--SPS also has led the development of historic interconnections between the Eastern and Western Electrical Grids of the United States, with two connections that began operation last year. These interconnections have made practical several opportunities for utilities in different halves of the nation to share power, for the benefit of the customers.

--As a participant in the energy conservation programs of the Governor's office and the Public Utility Commission, SPS is making its customers more aware of ways to use energy wisely.

--The company's air-quality control efforts, including the use of low-sulfur western coal at its coal-fired power plants, help protect the environment.

--SPS has developed many safety programs to remind the public about the dangers of carelessness around electricity, and also has an impressive record of employee safety.

--In SPS's "Partners on Patrol," meter readers and other employees who work outdoors are trained by local law enforcement agencies to watch for crime, fires and other problems in neighborhoods where they are working.

--Also recognized were the individual efforts of SPS employees in United Way and other community programs.

Southwestern Public Service Company primarily provides electric service to a population of more than one million in a 52,000-square-mile area of the Panhandle and south plains of Texas, eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the Oklahoma Panhandle and southwestern Kansas.

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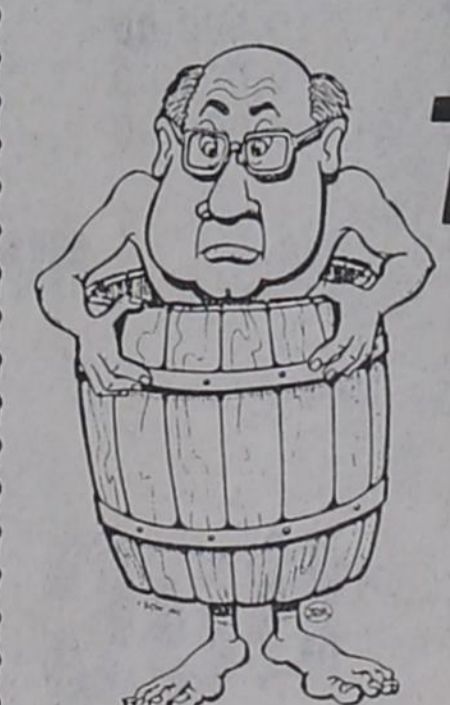

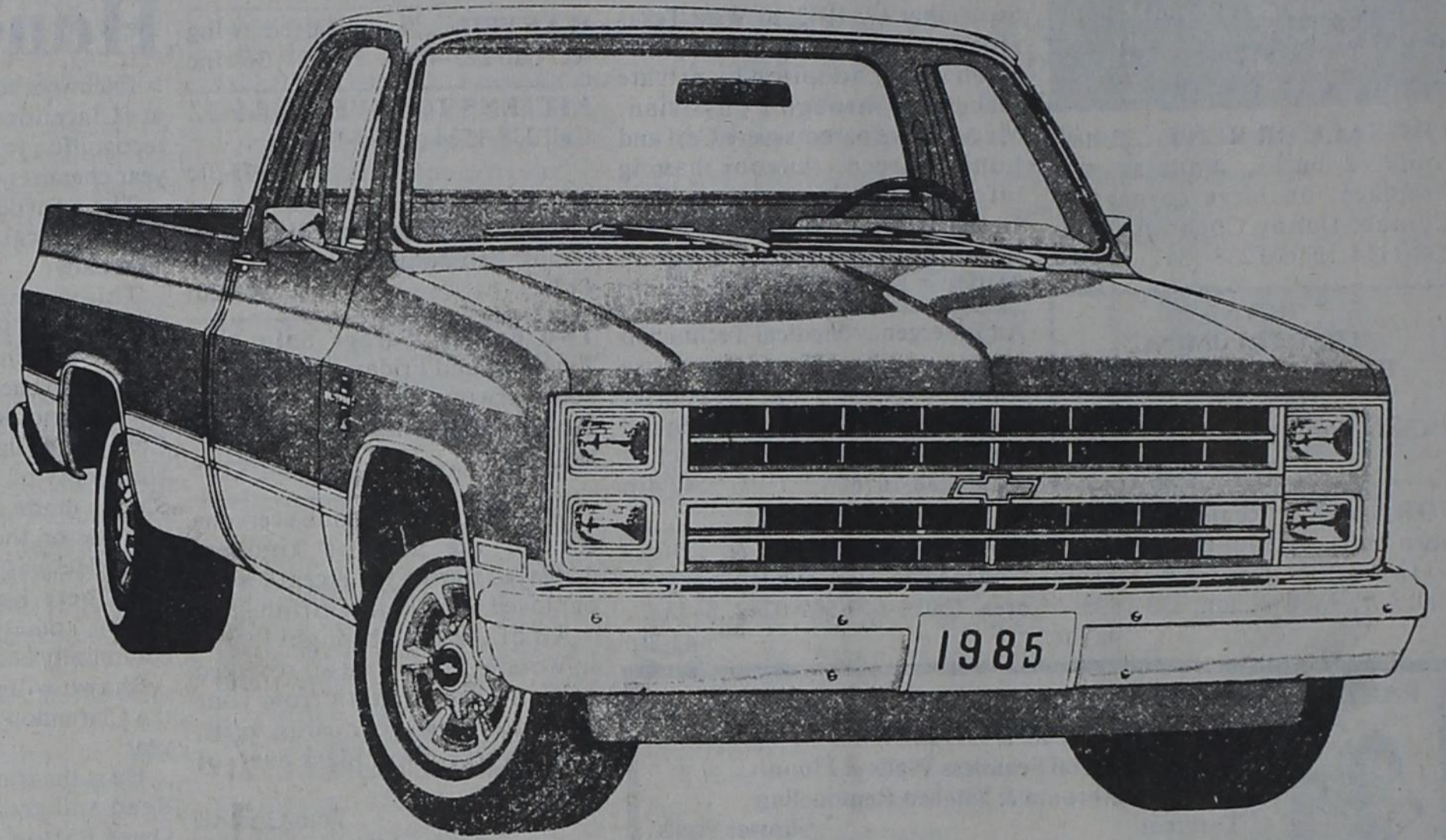
