. It's time to buckle up

The 90-day amnesty period for compliance with the new Texas Seat Belt law comes to an end Sunday.

Although it took effect Sept. 1, drivers and front-seat passengers of cars and trucks up to three-quarter ton capacity have not been cited for failture to comply with the new law. But beginning Sunday, they will

be subject to fines of \$25 to \$50 for violations. Informal observations around

Haskell indicate that many local motorists are already complying with the new law. But the same observations indicate that quite a number of Haskell drivers will need to develop the habit of buckling up of face the prospect of paying a

observing this statute are risking losing their lives or being seriously injured in a vehicle accident, and soon they'll also be facing the prospect of paying a fine for their oversight," said Jim Adams, Department of Public Safety director.

Adams said that in most instances, troopers will be checking for compliance with the safety belt law during routine traffic violator contacts. However, he pointed out that troopers will have the option of stopping motorists if the officers have probable cause to believe the law is being violated.

"The possibility of paying a fine for failing to use a safety belt should increase the incentive for Those motorists who are not observing this law, but much

greater consequences could be involved for motorists who don't use this proven, lifesaving device," Adams said. "What value can be placed on the loss of a human life or a long-term, serious injury resulting from a crash in which a safety belt could have made the difference?"

The new law did not change the child safety seat statute, which provides that children under two years of age must be secured in a federally-approved child safety seat system when they are riding in a passenger car or light truck (3/4 ton capacity and less). Children from two to four years of age must be secured by a safety belt or safety seat system when riding in a car or light truck.

Solar scams

With the 40-percent federal tax credit due to expire Dec. 31, the solar energy industry is being infiltrated by high-pressure con men and hucksters.

"They use some of the slickest, most manipulative pitches I've seen in my 13 years with the Consumer Protection Division," says Asst. Atty. Gen. William O. Goodman. "It's like all the crooked timeshare and vinyl siding salesmen jumped on the solar bandwagon.'

Consumer Protection has six suits filed or pending against solar energy promoters since January. Typically, unscrupulous companies inflate the prices of their systems to near the \$10,000 ceiling allowed by the tax credit. This lets them use the bait of a tax credit that approaches \$4,000. Since the credit will expire shortly, they can then exert pressure for the customer to "hurry up and buy before it's too

These promoters also grossly exaggerate projections about the increases in the cost of traditional fuels and they make wildly inaccurate claims about the efficiency of their units. One promoter even had the audacity to claim his unit could make you independent" from "totally

The state official listed these warning signs for potential rip-offs:

•Salespersons who represent themselves as energy "inspectors" or "auditors."

•Claims of being able to provide

Sam West

Former major league baseball star Sam West died at 9:20 a.m. Saturday at Methodist Hospital after an illness. He was 81.

The Longview native, who grew up in Haskell County, was a major league baseball player for 18 years with the Washington Senators, the St. Louis Browns and the Chicago White Sox.

West played in the first baseball All-Star game in 1933 and saw action in three others before World War II ended his career in 1942. He had a lifetime batting average of .299, hit .300 or better for 10 seasons and held an American League record with four years of 400-plus putouts in center field.

He once batted six-for-six against Hall of Fame pitcher Ted Lyons, another Texan, and was a rookie at Washington when Babe Ruth hit his 60th home run of the 1927 season.

Avalanche-Journal in 1982, West said that he did not resent the fact that during his playing days he made far less than athletes of the '70s and '80s.

"More power to 'em," West said. "If they can make that much money, then I'm glad for them. I never thought about making anywhere near that kind of

His was an era when Ruth, the greatest player West ever saw, received public criticism for making more money than the President.

"I'll never tell you what I made as a player," West said. "But I will say this. Bobby Layne once said he never made more than \$25,000. I never made more than \$15,000."

Before retiring in 1942, he coached for two years. After moving to Lubbock in 1930, he married Grace Cross. she died on Nov. 14. He was a partner in Jarrett-West Drug Store until 1945 and operated the Sports Center in Lubbock until his retirement in 1970. He was a member of the Lubbock Country Club and the Red Raider Club. He was a Methodist.

Survivors include two brothers, A.Y. of Carlsbad, N.M., and Pete of Lubbock; a sister, Dolly Todd of Wichita Falls.


Cattle outlook shows improvement

The cattle market finally seems to be turning around, according to a livestock marketing economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. Cattle numbers are down, and the price recovery that began a few weeks ago should continue at least until the spring.

The latest cattle-on-feed figures suggest that the oversupply problems of the beef industry caused by larger marketings of overweight feedlot cattle are about over. A 13 percent reduction in calves placed on feed during July-September should assure light supplies of fed beef for the last quarter of this year and continued lower marketings through the first quarter of 1986.



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

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
